**WHEREAS,** suicide is the 10th leading cause of all deaths in the United States; and the 2nd leading cause of death for ages 10-24; and

**WHEREAS,** tragically, more Oregonians die by suicide than by homicide. Suicide is the 8th leading cause of death overall in Oregon and the second leading cause of death for ages 10-34 giving Oregon the 10th highest rate of suicide in the U.S. and

**WHEREAS,** over 50% of people who die by suicide use a firearm; guns stored in the house are used for suicide 40 times more often than for self-protection; and

**WHEREAS,** Curry County ranks first in the state in total veterans who commit suicide, and according to the 2014/15 Oregon Healthy Teen Survey, Curry County led all Oregon school districts in the percent of 8th and 11th grade students who seriously considered attempting suicide in the 12 months prior to the survey and represented more than double the average 8th and 11th grader actually attempting suicide during that same period, and

**WHEREAS**, the stigma associated with mental illness and suicide works against suicide prevention by discouraging persons at risk from seeking lifesaving help and further traumatizes survivors of nonfatal attempts, and

**WHEREAS,** The Oregon Plan for Youth Suicide Prevention: A Call to Action, updated in 2016, outlines strategies for community based action to end the stigma associated with suicide.

**NOW, THEREFORE,** I, Ron Hedenskog, Mayor of the City of Brookings, hereby declare September, 2016 as

#### **SUICIDE PREVENTION AND AWARENESS MONTH**

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that the City encourages schools, students, parents, health care workers, religious institutions, and community organizations to engage in a variety of prevention and awareness activities designed to remove the stigma around suicide.

WHEREAS, bullying is physical, verbal, sexual or emotional intimidation or harm intentionally directed at a person or group of people and occurs in neighborhoods, playgrounds, schools, on the iob and through technology, such as the Internet and cell phone; and

**WHEREAS**, research indicates that bullying is the most common form of violence, annually affecting millions of American children and adolescents and thousands of Oregon children and adolescents; and

WHEREAS, in the 30 days before taking 2014/15 Oregon Healthy Teen survey, over half of all Curry County 8th graders felt harassed. They led the state in the percentage that felt harassed for being perceived as gay, lesbian, bisexual or transgendered, because of their weight, clothes acne, or physical characteristics, for their group of friends, and being harassed via cyberbullying, or other reasons. Plus during the 12 months before the survey, they were in more physical fights on school property, or were threatened with a weapon on school grounds than 8th graders in any other Oregon county. Curry County 8th graders ranked 2nd in the state having received unwanted sexual comments or attention or because of their race or ethnic origin. In seven of these 11 categories, Curry County 8th graders were negatively impacted at more than twice the rate of the average Oregon 8th grader.

WHEREAS, targets of bullying are more likely to acquire physical, emotional, and learning problems; students who are repeatedly bullied often fear such activities as riding the bus, going to school, and attending community activities; and

WHEREAS, children who bully are at greater risk of engaging in more serious violent behaviors while children who witness bullying often feel less secure, more fearful, and intimidated.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Ron Hedenskog, Mayor of the City of Brookings, hereby declare the month of October, 2016, as

#### **BULLYING PREVENTION MONTH**

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all Curry County Oregon citizens are encouraged to engage in activities designed to make our communities safer for all children and adolescents, and show support for students who have experienced bullying.

#### **RESOLUTION 16-R-1089**

#### A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF BROOKINGS ELECTING VOLUNTEER WORKERS COMPENSATION INSURANCE COVERAGE.

WHEREAS, the City of Brookings elects the following:

- 1. An assumed monthly wage of \$800 per month, as required by Oregon statute, will be used for public safety volunteers; and
- 2. An aggregate assumed annual wage of \$2,500 will be used per volunteer board, which include the City Council, Planning Commission, and Budget Committee; and
- 3. Non-public safety volunteers will keep track of their hours and have their assumed payroll reported in the correct class code for the type of work being performed using Oregon minimum wage. Current class codes include volunteer building maintenance/lifeguards and volunteer parks/summer recreation; and
- 4. A roster of active volunteers (public safety, non-public safety) will be kept monthly for reporting purposes. It is acknowledged that City/County Insurance Services may request copies of these rosters during year-end audit; and
- 5. Unanticipated volunteer projects or exposure not addressed herein will be added onto the City of Brookings' coverage agreement (1) by endorsement, (2) with advance notice to CIS, and (3) allowing two weeks for processing. It is hereby acknowledged that coverage of this type cannot be backdated.

**Now THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED,** by the City Council of the City of Brookings, Curry County, Oregon, to provide workers' compensation insurance coverage, as indicated above.

Background/Discussion: The Easy Street Sidewalk project is scheduled to be constructed later this summer. In order to align the sidewalk from its termination point west of Mardon Court it was necessary to obtain a permanent easement or a dedication of additional right-of-way from the Lutheran Church. It was also necessary to obtain a temporary construction easement in order to facilitate construction of the sidewalk. The Easy Street Sidewalk project was budgeted as a high priority project in the 2015-16 Streets SRF and Capital Improvements project list.

#### **TEMPORARY CONSTRUCTION EASEMENT**

("Grantor") hereby grants to the City of Brookings, Oregon, a municipal corporation ("Grantee"), a temporary construction easement for grading and paving to existing driveway on the property as set forth herein in the City of Brookings, Curry County, State of Oregon.

Subject: Support for funds to restore Coastal Zone Management Grants.

<u>Recommended Motion</u>: A motion to authorize the City of Brookings to be included on a letter to Governor Brown supporting funds to restore the Coastal Zone Management Grants.

Financial Impact: Unknown at this time. Possible future restoration of grant funds to support the City's Planning program.

Approved by Finance & Human Resources Director:

Background/Discussion: Since the mid 1990's the City has received grant funds in the amount of \$3,000 annually from the Coastal Management Zone program administered by the Department of Land Conservation and Development (DLCD). In 2003 the amount was increased to \$6,000 annually; in 2012 the grant was reduced to \$5,400 due to rising costs and decreased funding. In 2015 the grant awards were discontinued due to lack of funding. The grant could be used for any planning activity; the City match was staff time working on day to day planning matters.

The Coastal Management Grants were federally funded by National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) under the Coastal Zone Management Act (CZMA). Under this act the State of Oregon was required to adopt measures for reducing non-point source water pollution that meet the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requirements. EPA made a determination that protection of streams from logging under the Oregon Forest Practices Act did not meet the requirements. As a result, NOAA was required to withhold 30% of the grant funding. In response, DLCD cut all planning and technical assistance grants and cut DLCD staff as well as reduced employee travel that resulted in the loss of Coastal Planners Network meetings.

DLCD is requesting that the Governor's budget for 2017-2019 include two Program Option Packages (POP) to fill the gap left by the federal funding reduction. One would expand state funds for planning assistance grants, although as proposed would not fully restore the grant funding. The other would restore funding for two professional positions that are currently vacant and without funding would not be filled. Both of the positions provide technical and planning assistance to local governments.

The City received an email from Keith Tymchuk, former 6-term mayor of Reedsport, requesting support in a letter to Governor Brown asking her to include the two POP's in the upcoming budget.

#### Letter to Governor Brown:

Dear Governor Brown:

We are writing to express our strong support for two Program Option Packages (POPs) submitted by the Department of Land Conservation and Development (DLCD) for inclusion in the Governor's FY2017-2019 budget.

One POP would include funds to restore planning and technical assistance grants to coastal cities and counties that were eliminated by the DLCD because Oregon's federal Coastal Zone Management (CZM) grant has been cut 30 per cent by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) as a result of a lawsuit over the state's coastal water quality program. Restoration of these grants is critical to enable coastal cities to address unique, difficult planning challenges and responsibilities due to our location on the Oregon coast. These issues include impacts from sea level rise, tsunami preparation, federal mandates, limited land for development, seasonal economies, and geographic isolation.

The second POP would restore funding for two staff positions within the DLCD coastal program, both of which are vital to providing technical and planning assistance to coastal cities and counties on issues such as estuary planning, natural hazards planning, and coastal geographic information systems. Coastal local governments, especially small cities, rely on the assistance provided by DLCD to help resolve complex coastal planning issues.

As you know, neither coastal jurisdictions nor DLCD had any control over the state regulations at issue in the lawsuit that resulted in loss of federal CZM funds. Yet coastal cities and counties are bearing the brunt of this loss of funds and we are struggling to maintain planning capacity necessary to meet local and state requirements and address crucial planning needs. Quite simply, we do not have the ability to make up this shortfall with local budget resources.

We urge you to include these two POPs in your budget and we look forward to working with you to advocate for them in the legislative budget process.
