Mayor Hummel called the meeting to order at 4:05 p.m.

#### 1. Summer Youth Recreation Program

#### V. <u>SCHEDULED PUBLIC APPEARANCES</u>

1. Brookings Area Council for the Arts - Blanche Lombard

Ms. Lombard introduced herself to the council and indicated that BACA is being revitalized. No formal action taken.

2. Non-navigability of Chetco River - Ted Freeman, Jr. Following discussion at the July 22 work session, Mr. Freeman requested to speak to the council at the August 12 council meeting, to request a letter from the city opposing the takeover of a portion of the Chetco River by the Oregon Division of State Lands.

Doris Freeman, speaking for Ted Freeman, Jr., spoke in opposition to the state takeover and asked for support from the city.

Maxine and Frenchy Arrell spoke in opposition to the takeover.

A letter was received from Tidewater Contractors opposing the takeover.

Councilor Brimm moved to direct the city manager to write a strong letter of opposition to the Division of State Lands opposing the takeover of the Chetco River and to leave signature lines for the mayor and each councilor, which motion was seconded by Councilor Brendlinger. The clerk called the roll with the following results:

At this point, Councilor Davis moved to set a recess time for this meeting of 10:30 p.m., postponing unfinished business to a reconvened meeting on Thursday, August 15, 1991 at 7:00 p.m., which motion was seconded by Councilor Brimm. The clerk called the roll with the following results:

3. Opposition to Ransom Avenue LID - Clarence Branscomb

Clarence Branscomb, 800 Cameo Court, opposed the Ransom Avenue Local Improvement District and he introduced Arlene DeJarnett, who protested the costs assessed against each property owner on Ransom Avenue for the LID. She read a written statement demanding that the city use the monies received from the Curry County Road Fund to make the improvements on Ransom Avenue as well as Easy Street. Ms. DeJarnett demanded Mayor Hummel's resignation or face recall.

Mayor Hummel explained that Ransom Avenue is not eligible for the Curry County Road Fund monies.

City Manager Dennis Cluff explained the budgetary process involved in forming a Local Improvement District. **No formal action taken.** 

4. Request for fire hydrant at Beach Avenue - Roger Lauen

A petition signed by property owners on Beach Avenue requesting a fire hydrant be installed in the immediate area of the Beachview Subdivision was presented to the council, along with a letter sent back to Mr. Roger Lauen explaining city policy and suggesting alternative solutions.

Mr. James Lawson, 1515 Beach Avenue, in the absence of Mr.Lauen from the state, requested that the city place a fire hydrant in the immediate area of the Beachview Subdivision.

It was explained to Mr. Lawson that the particular area he resides in is not one of the priority areas for placement of a fire hydrant.

Mr. Lawson requested that the city consider installing a fire hydrant in the area of the Beachview Subdivision on Beach Avenue during their next budget process. No formal action taken.

1. The Planning Commission at their August 6 meeting, approved other definitions which were incorporated into Ordinance No. 91-0-446.F for council consideration.

Administrative Assistant Donna Van Nest read Ordinance No. 91-0-446.F into the record in its entirety.

Mayor Hummel asked for public comment. There being none, Mayor Hummel closed the public hearing closed 8:08 p.m.

#### E. Resolutions

1. Resolution No. 91-R-516 - A resolution of the City Council of the City of Brookings approving a change of appropriations in the Wastewater Fund for fiscal year 1990-91.

The wastewater reconstruction project revenues received in 1990/91 were less than budgeted and expenses on the project have been as The city and Harbor Sanitary anticipated. District are to provide the revenue necessary The Harbor to fund this shortfall of cash. Sanitary District has been billed for a portion of the revenues needed and the City of Brookings provided some of the revenue from a supplemental budget approved in June, 1991. However, after the Harbor Sanitary District receivable posting and the transfers provided in the supplemental budget, there is still a deficit of \$61,909.23 in the Wastewater Reconstruction Fund on June 30, 1991. Wastewater Treatment Fund balance is greater at year end than anticipated, allowing the appropriation of a fund transfer to the Wastewater Reconstruction Fund to be increased. The city auditor was consulted and this process was approved.

2. Resolution No. 91-R-517 - A resolution of the City Council of the City of Brookings adopting rates, fees and charges to the users of the City of Brookings sewer services; and repealing Resolution No. 89-R-468.

#### F. <u>Miscellaneous</u>

 Change Order No. 2, Dawson Tract Water and Sewer Improvement Project, Schedule "A" -James W. Fowler Company

An alternate method of manhole testing was proposed by the Contractor using the vacuum method, ASTM C-13. After investigation this method was approved for use and a reduction in cost to the Owner was negotiated due to the reduced scope of work for this alternate method.

2. Change Order No. 5, Dawson Tract Water and Sewer Improvement Project, Schedule "D" -James W. Fowler Company

Excavation at Pump Station No. 3 resulted in intercepting a groundwater vein. If not addressed it would result in an unstable site for vehicle access. A rock-pack drain was installed to collect and channel the groundwater flow to daylight on the hillside.

#### ARTICLE V - MEETINGS

<u>Section 1.</u> <u>Regular Meetings - Executive Committee.</u> The committee shall meet at 7:00 p.m. on the second Wednesday of the months of February, April, August and October. Meetings will be held in the three cities on a rotating basis.

2. Report on merits of two council meetings per month - Councilor Brendlinger

Councilor Brendlinger suggested a split council meeting, all on one day. One meeting would be held during the day and the second in the evening.

Several questions arose pertaining to attendance by staff and the city attorney.

Councilor Davis suggested two meetings per month to be held on different days with a 1-1/2 hour work session preceding each meeting, and to limit the city attorney's attendance and staff to only one meeting.

Following further discussion, Councilor Brendlinger moved to have a 3-month trial of two council meetings per month, both meetings being on the same day, one beginning at noon and ending at 1:30 p.m., and the next starting at 7:00 p.m., which motion was seconded by Councilor Curry.

3. Intergovernmental Agreement between Oregon Building Codes Agency and City of Brookings.

In March the Council authorized the Mayor to sign an Intergovernmental Agreement for the enforcement of administration and and manufactured manufactured dwelling dwelling accessory building and structure program under the provisions of Oregon Revised Statute (ORS) 446.250. The Oregon Building Codes Agency has changed their format and now require a Letter of Delegation and a new Intergovernmental Agreement. This is simply a housekeeping item to keep the city current.

Councilor Brimm declared a potential conflict of interest and stepped down from the bench.

City Manager Dennis Cluff advised that H.G.E. is preparing cross sections of the Old County Road section, past Marina Heights Road, that need repair. For safety purposes, the city will need to widen the road at the last curve of the area needing improvement. The options to the city are either to seek (and perhaps have to condemn) uphill property and cut the bank further, or fill in the downhill side right-of-way where road exists. engineering information should have available by the Monday council meeting.

Mr. Cluff explained that the report from the engineer has not yet arrived. This matter will be brought back before the council when the report arrives.

Don Jaklewicz asked why the property owners had not been contacted yet. Mr. Cluff explained that the engineering report was necessary before the property owners were contacted. No formal action taken.

If the council approves the bid contingent on the DEQ and Army Corps of Engineers approval, staff will be able to expedite the work schedule for the project.
