Subject: Four Ports Group Marine Reserve Review Request

<u>Recommended Motion</u>: Port Commissioner Relaford is requesting a motion to authorize Mayor to execute a letter of support for the "Four Ports Group" to be recognized as the community nominating team to review proposals for Marine Reserve designations.

Financial Impact: None

<u>Background/Discussion</u>: Port of Brookings Harbor Commissioner Jim Relaford has requested a letter from the City in support of the formation of the "Four Ports Group" to provide local review and analysis of any nominated Marine Reserve sites located within southern Coos County and Curry County. The Four Ports Group would consist of the Port Commissions of Brookings, Bandon, Port Orford and Gold Beach.

The Gold Beach City Council has endorsed the concept. Port Orford and Bandon have not yet considered the matter. Port Orford recently adopted a Resolution endorsing the concept of a Port Orford Stewardship Area, which includes certain environmental and economic objectives.

Staff recommends that the City Council discuss the level of involvement the City wishes to pursue in the Marine Reserves issue. Perhaps it is appropriate for the Ports to be the lead agencies in this issue; perhaps it is appropriate for the cities and the County to be involved in the issue from a broader economic perspective.

Policy Considerations: Governor Kulongoski has, by Executive Order, directed the Oregon Ocean Policy Advisory Council (OPAC) to recommend not more than nine sites along the Oregon coast for the establishment of Marine Reserve areas. The Executive Order provides that OPAC is to give priority consideration to marine reserve designation nominations developed by coastal community nominating teams comprised of coastal community members, ocean users and other interested parties. The Port Commissions of Brookings, Bandon, Gold Beach and Port Orford are seeking designation as a regional coastal community nominating team. Policy considerations include whether the City desires participation in this issue, and whether the City feels that other stakeholder groups, such as Chambers of Commerce, should be a part of the community nominating team.

RESOLUTION 2009-02

A RESOLUTION OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PORT ORFORD, ENDORSING THE CONCEPT OF A PORT ORFORD COMMUNITY STEWARDSHIP AREA AND SETTING FORTH THE OBJECTIVES OF THE COMMUNITY STEWARDSHIP AREA

WHEREAS the marine ecosystem adjacent to Port Orford encompasses outstanding biodiversity and nearshore habitats, and represents a vital ecological, economic, social, cultural, and recreational resource for the community; and

WHEREAS many Port Orford residents and businesses depend directly on local fisheries, including groundfish, crab, salmon, tuna, blackcod, and halibut for their livelihood; and

WHEREAS state and federal fisheries management alone do not always produce optimal outcomes (from both an economic and a conservation perspective) for Port Orford commercial fishermen and the community at large; and

WHEREAS marine ecosystems in Oregon are increasingly threatened by pollution, habitat degradation, energy development, and other impacts; and

WHEREAS the *goal* of the Port Orford Community Stewardship Area is a sustainable fishery and marine ecosystem that provides optimal economic, ecological, and social benefits to the Port Orford community; and

WHEREAS the *principles* of the Port Orford Ocean Resource Team (POORT) are to empower fleet members and other citizens with information and to support inclusive, bottom-up efforts related to management, science, and marketing; and

WHEREAS the U.S. Commission on Ocean Policy in its 2004 Report to Congress advocates for a "bottom-up" approach that consists of broad voluntary participation, as part of a national policy framework,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of Port Orford, by virtue of the authority vested in this body by the City Charter and the State of Oregon, does hereby endorse the concept of a *Port Orford Community Stewardship Area* that encompasses the community's traditional fishing grounds and proximate watersheds; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Port Orford pledges its support for advancing the following objectives of the Port Orford Community Stewardship Area:

- Enhancing scientific understanding of the Port Orford nearshore marine ecosystem through research & monitoring
- Maintaining fishing access and a diversity of harvest opportunities for local fishermen
- Protecting key habitats and stock sustainability through an area-based management approach that may include a properly funded and actively managed marine reserve and/or marine protected area
- Promoting watershed stewardship through education, partnership building, water quality monitoring, and local government planning
- Supporting economic development opportunities including branding & marketing of local seafood and establishment of a nearshore research institute.
- Engaging citizens in the bottom-up stewardship of their coast and ocean.

Call to Order

Mayor Anderson called the meeting to order at 7:00pm.

Roll Call

Council Present: Mayor Larry Anderson, Councilors Hedenskog, Gordon, Kitchen and Pieper; a quorum present.

Staff Present: City Manager Gary Milliman, City Recorder Joyce Heffington.

Other: Curry Coastal Pilot Reporter Arwyn Rice and approximately 5 public.

Mayor Anderson announced Yard of the Month Awards for August as follows:

Council Liaison Reports

- Mayor Anderson attended one high school and six City meetings.
- Councilor Hedenskog attended two City meetings.
- Councilor Pieper attended two City and one County meeting.
- Councilor Kitchen attended three City and one Coos Curry Electric Cooperative meeting.
- Councilor Gordon attended two City meetings.

Public Comments

Bob Menshew, 1349 Chetco Avenue, commented on City spending, generally stating that the City could not afford to keep spending.

Regular Agenda

City Manager Milliman reviewed the recommendation to adopt the Azalea Park Master Plan.

Councilor Gordon moved, a second followed and Council voted unanimously to adopt the Azalea Park Master Plan as recommended by the Parks and Recreation Commission and with the addition of other delineation of buffer and other areas.

Pete Chasar presented a concept proposal for the hardscape of Lower Stout Park to feature such elements as terraced grounds, water fall, ADA compliant walkway and stone, semi-circular benches. Funding for the project, Chasar stated, would be sought from private and agency funding as much as possible.

Councilor Kitchen moved, a second followed, and Council voted unanimously to approve in concept the proposal for Lower Stout Park as shown in the models presented by Chasar.

At Councilor Kitchen's request, the possibility of amending the Alcohol Prohibition Ordinance to allow a permitting process for certain activities in the park and other public places was discussed.

Councilor Kitchen moved, and second followed to amend the Alcohol Prohibition Ordinance to allow permitted drinking on public property. The motion failed, three votes to two, with Councilor Kitchen and Councilor Pieper voting "Yes" (to amend) and Councilor Gordon, Councilor Hedenskog and Mayor Anderson voting "No" (not to amend).

City Manager Milliman reviewed the recommendation to reclassify and adopt the job description for the Planning Director position and approve a pay grade increase.

Councilor Kitchen moved, a second followed and Council voted unanimously to adopt the job description for the position of Planning Director, reclassify the position of Planning Director to salary Grade 20 on the miscellaneous employee salary chart, and place Planning Director Dianne Morris on Step Five of Grade 20 effective with the first pay period following August 11.



Subject: Water Service Charter Amendment

<u>Recommended Motion</u>: Adopt Resolution 08-R-906 placing Charter amendment regarding water service on November 2008 ballot.

<u>Financial Impact</u>: Administrative costs associated with preparing a ballot measure.

Background/Discussion:

The City is currently working with Curry County and various special districts located within the City of Brookings Urban Growth Boundary (UGB) to develop Urban Services Agreements. The goal of this effort is to develop a transition plan for providing urban services in the event the City boundaries are extended to incorporate properties within the UGB.

There are several existing entities that already provide "urban services" to properties within the UGB, including fire districts, the Harbor Sanitary District, and the Harbor Water District. City and County management staff have been discussing how these agencies and the services they provide might be affected by an annexation of a portion of the territory served by them into the City Limits.

Specifically with regard to the water and sewer utility providers, it is important to note that they operate physical facilities located within streets and right-of-ways. While the Harbor Sanitary District delivers sewage to the City for treatment, thus providing an interconnect between the two systems, the Harbor Water District operates an entirely independent system. Management staff does not see the need for the City to assume the operation of these two utility systems if areas they currently serve are annexed.

Indeed, by allowing the Harbor Water District to continue as the water service provider in newly annexed areas, the City would avoid the cost of developing new water sources of supply and maintenance of the distribution system south of the Chetco River.

The City Charter currently provides in Chapter XI, Section 42:

"The right to furnish the inhabitants of said City with water shall be forever vested in the City of Brookings, and no franchise, right or privilege shall hereafter be granted to or contract made with any person or corporation by said City to furnish or supply said City or its inhabitants with water, without

the authorization of the legal voters of said City."

This section was enacted as a part of a Charter section authorizing the City to sell \$1.3 million in bonds to pay for water system improvements in 1989. Management believes that the purpose of this section was to prohibit the City from selling or contracting the operation of the water system after the bonds were sold as a part of the security for the bond holders; the City would retain authority to set rates as needed to pay the debt service, and the facilities constructed with the proceeds of the bonds would remain the property of the City and an asset supporting the bonds.

There is no similar provision with respect to wastewater (sewer) service.

At its meeting of July 28, 2008, the City Council instructed the City Attorney to prepare the title and question for the ballot measure. The City Manager worked with the City Attorney to prepare the wording, which has been reviewed by the County Elections Department. The proposed Measure would provide eliminate the current Charter provision as stated above.

Policy Considerations:

It is not unusual for a public agency or private company to provide utility services within a City. The City has participated in the establishment of an Urban Growth Boundary, and it is good public policy to develop a transition plan for properties within the UGB that may become a part of the City. The current City Charter presents an impediment to such a transition when the properties involved are served by the Harbor Water District. The water service restriction provision was, apparently, made a part of the Charter not for the purpose of restricting growth, but to protect bond holders.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF BROOKINGS AUTHORIZING THE CITY'S ELECTIONS OFFICER TO SUBMIT TO THE CURRY COUNTY ELECTIONS OFFICE THE BALLOT TITLE AMENDING CHAPTER XI, SECTION 42 OF THE CITY CHARTER.

RESOLUTION 08-R-906

WHEREAS, the City of Brookings is in the process of developing Urban Service Agreements with special districts located within the City's Urban Growth Boundary; and

WHEREAS, the goal of this effort is to develop a transition plan for providing urban services in the event City boundaries are expanded due to annexation; and

WHEREAS, the City Charter does not restrict the provision of sewer services by separate districts within its City limits; and

WHEREAS, it is in the City's best interest to allow existing water districts to continue to supply water services to areas within the Urban Growth Boundary even after they are annexed in order to avoid the cost of developing, maintaining and operating new water sources; and

WHEREAS, at its meeting of July 28, 2008, the City Council did unanimously vote to put before the citizens of the City of Brookings a measure that would amend Chapter XI, Section 42 of the City Charter,

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

The City Council of the City of Brookings, Curry County, Oregon, does hereby authorize the City's Elections Officer to submit to the Curry County Elections office for final approval, a ballot title, prepared by the City and reviewed and approved by the City Attorney, to read as follows:

CAPTION

Amend the City Charter regarding provision of water service.

OUESTION

Shall language in the Brookings City Charter, Section 42, allowing only City to furnish water to City inhabitants be repealed?

SUMMARY

Section 42 of the City Charter provides, in part:

"The right to furnish the inhabitants of said City with water shall be forever vested in the City of Brookings, and no franchise, right or privilege shall hereafter be granted to or contract made with any person or corporation by said City to furnish or supply the said City or its inhabitants with water, without the authorization of the legal voters of said City."

This Measure would remove the above language from the Charter.

The change would enable the City to annex areas receiving water service from other public agencies without the expense of expanding the City water system or obtaining additional water rights.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City's Elections Officer is directed to have the above ballot title placed on the ballot for the general election to be held on November 4, 2008.
