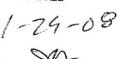

Subject: Public Hearing Concerning Community Development Block Grant Program

<u>Recommended Motion</u>: No action required. The City Council is required to conduct two public hearings if the City plans to submit applications for funding under the Community Development Block Grant program in 2008. The first hearing is to take comments from citizens about both community development needs and any projects proposed for grant funding.

Financial Impact: None at this time.

Background/Discussion:

The federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program is administered by the Oregon Economic and Community Development Department (OECDD). Program guidelines for 2008 were received in late December. CDBG funding can be obtained for a variety of projects benefiting low and moderate income persons, including housing, community facilities, social services and economic development. While larger cities (entitlement cities) receive CDBG funds annually and conduct an internal system of determining appropriate projects, small cities (non-entitlement cities) like Brookings must participate in a competitive process to receive funding.

OECDD administers the program by accepting grant applications in four cycles. The first cycle is the period January 1-March 31. Funding decisions for this cycle would be made in May.

There are three federal national objectives for the CDBG program. All projects must meet one of these national objectives:

- Benefiting low and moderate income persons.
- Aiding in the prevention or elimination of slum or blight.
- Urgent need.

The State expects to have approximately \$14 million in new federal CDBG funds available for grants to non-entitlement cities and counties during 2008.

The City Manager has identified two projects for submission in the first CDBG cycle for 2008.

- 1. Continuation of the façade improvement program.
- 2. Design engineering for a downtown street improvement project.

FAÇADE APPLICATION

OCEDD has created a special Set-Aside for downtown façade improvement projects. The maximum amount of grant to the City is \$60,000, and the maximum façade grant to individual property owners is \$10,000. The Urban Renewal Advisory Committee (URAC) is currently revising the façade improvement program guidelines to include a \$10,000 limit.

This grant would augment the Urban Renewal Agency (URA) funding for the façade improvement program, and, if approved, would enable the URA to fund six or more facade programs in 2008 without using tax increment funds.

DESIGN ENGINEERING

The URA identified the reconstruction of streets in the downtown area, including the installation of curb, gutter and sidewalk, as a priority. A preliminary estimate has been obtained for the cost of this project, which would involve reconstruction of Railroad, Hemlock and Spruce Streets between Oak and Center Streets, and Oak, Fern, Willow, Wharf and Center Streets between Chetco and Railroad. This estimate is \$3.9 million for construction and \$454,000 for engineering. CDBG has a program for public works infrastructure improvements in conjunction with downtown revitalization with a maximum of \$300,000. The City Manager proposes to seek \$300,000 to be used to assist in paying the cost of engineering services. The balance of the engineering cost would be paid from URA funds. The City Manager is preparing to submit a debt financing proposal to the Agency for the construction project.

ELIGIBILITY

A second public hearing with more detail on the specific projects to be submitted must be held prior to submission of the project application.

For the City to be generally eligible for CDBG funding, at least 51 per cent of households within the City Limits must be of low or median income according to the U.S. Census. That Census found that 44.4 per cent of Brookings households met this criteria, thus making the City ineligible for CDBG funding without pursuing alternative means of eligibility. One of those alternative means, for example, is for the City to declare that at least 25 per cent of the buildings in the project area (downtown) are deteriorated or deteriorating, or that public improvements in the project area are in a general state of deterioration.

The City may also be able to obtain funding for projects which serve "special populations" such as low income seniors, and the homeless.

NON PROFIT AGENCY PROJECTS

Non-profit agencies may also receive grant funding through CDBG for projects benefiting special populations. Funding may be available to non-profits for facilities and program delivery costs associated with such projects as emergency shelter, senior services and food banks. City staff has worked with several local non-profits, including Community Food Share, Chetco Activity Center and His Haven of Hope Women's Shelter, to discuss prospects for project applications.

Policy Considerations:

Both of the proposed CDBG applications are consistent with the City's Downtown Master Plan and the Urban Renewal Agency plan.

Subject: 9-1-1 Services

<u>Recommended Motion</u>: Motion to authorize City Manager to send a letter to the Oregon Office of Emergency Management opposing any change in the current 9-1-1 PSAP configuration in Curry County.

Financial Impact: Potential loss of \$100,000 in 9-1-1 revenue.

Background/Discussion:

For a number of years, 9-1-1 services have been provided through two Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs) in Curry County...one at the County Sheriff dispatch center and one at the Brookings Police Department dispatch center. Staff understands that this arrangement occurred primarily because of technical limitations present at the time.

A South County 9-1-1 Board was formed with membership consisting of six fire departments, Brookings Police Department, Cal-Ore Life Flight, U.S. Coast Guard, and Coos Forest Patrol. This Board developed a 9-1-1 Plan for the south County area. The 9-1-1 Plan can only be amended upon the approval of the 9-1-1 Board (there is a process for arbitration and the ultimate decision on 9-1-1 configurations can be assumed by the State Office of Emergency Management). There is also a North County 9-1-1 Board.

The current 9-1-1 configuration is that all 9-1-1 calls originating in the 469 and 412 prefix areas (generally, south of Pistol River) are directed to the Brookings Police Department dispatch center (South County PSAP). All 9-1-1 calls originating north of this area are directed to the Sheriffs Dispatch center in Gold Beach (North County PSAP). What has evolved from this is a system where the PSAP also provides dispatching services for those local agencies within the PSAP region. For example, the South County PSAP (Brookings) also provides dispatching services for all of the fire departments, Brookings Police, Cal-Ore ambulance and other local emergency services agencies in the region. 9-1-1 calls from the unincorporated area requiring Sheriff Services are also answered at the South County PSAP and are immediately transferred to the Sheriff's Dispatch center in Gold Beach for dispatching; this change occurred within the last year as, previously, the South County PSAP dispatched Sheriff's deputies to calls within the South County region.

The City receives two types of payments from the State for providing 9-1-1 services. One payment is an allocation for providing 9-1-1 services in the City (about \$30,000 annually).

Another payment is an allocation for providing 9-1-1 services to the South County PSAP region (about \$100,000 annually). The later funds are actually paid to the County, who then remits a portion of their payment (approximately 50 per cent) to the City upon being invoiced. This formula was agreed-upon in the 1980's and was then based primarily upon population and call volumes.

The City does not charge a fee to any of the fire agencies for dispatching. Cal-Ore ambulance pays a flat fee of \$1,000 per month to the City of Brookings for dispatching services.

There is a distinction between 9-1-1 and dispatching, although this distinction has become blurred in the manner it is functioning in south Curry County. The intent of the 9-1-1 system is to have a central answering point (a PSAP) for all emergency calls. The PSAP then transfers the call to the agency responsible for providing the service (i.e., ambulance, fire, police). In many areas the PSAP only provides this call routing function and does not perform direct dispatch. However, many areas have also consolidated 9-1-1 and dispatching to varying degrees; such is the case in Curry County. Dispatching service, as provided by the Brookings Police dispatch center, includes "managing the call." What this means is that the dispatcher remains in contact with the emergency responders throughout the duration of the incident, and assists the responders in coordinating responses from other agencies, and arraigning for and coordinating other support services, such as tow service or the electric utility. This dispatching/coordination service is not a 9-1-1 service.

Essentially, Brookings provides dispatch service to adjacent fire districts at no cost as a consideration for receiving 9-1-1 funds.

The County is now seeking to have all 9-1-1 calls originating in the unincorporated area directed to the Sheriff's dispatch center in Gold Beach. The Brookings Police Department would remain as a PSAP for the City of Brookings only. All other 9-1-1 calls originating in south County...including calls for the Brookings Rural and Upper Chetco Fire Departments which contract with the City for staffing...and ambulance calls would go to the Sheriff's dispatch center, and would then be whether directly dispatched by them or transferred to the Brookings Police dispatch center.

The County is seeking to make this change because they now believe the technical capability exists to receive 9-1-1 calls from South County, and because the Sheriff desires to have the PSAP in Gold Beach directly answer 9-1-1 calls for Sheriff services originating in south County. This change is opposed by the South County 9-1-1 Board (see attached letter). According to Chief Wallace, the County technical equipment does not have greater capability than the equipment used by the City, but it is newer.

This change raises a number of issues, among them:

- 1. The City would lose \$100,000 annually in 9-1-1 revenue.
- 2. If the City continued to dispatch for adjacent fire departments, who pays for the service?
- 3. The Brookings Fire Department has a simultaneous dispatch agreement with the Harbor Fire Department. This has assisted in securing more favorable ratings by the fire insurance rating bureau, which is used...in part...to determine insurance premiums for private property in Brookings and the unincorporated area. Would splitting the dispatch impact the City's insurance rating?

- 4. The City provides contracted fire service and staffing to the Brookings Rural Fire District and the Upper Chetco Fire District. Under the County proposal, 9-1-1 calls from these areas would now be directed to the Sheriffs dispatch center in Gold Beach. Would the Sheriff then provide dispatch services or transfer the calls back to Brookings? Would this result in response delays?
- 5. Sheriff Boice has indicated that the County would not charge the fire departments and others for dispatching services for 3-5 years while an assessment of the number of calls and the cost of providing those services is conducted. Will fire departments ultimately be charged a fee for this service?
- 6. While the County receives a small amount of 9-1-1 funds because the cities of Port Orford and Gold Beach are in the North County 9-1-1 area, the County currently provides dispatching service to north County fire departments and the Cities of Port Orford and Gold Beach Police Departments at no charge. This cost is paid from County General Fund revenues. The City of Brookings pays for the operation of its own dispatch center from the City General Fund.
- 7. South County emergency responders are unconvinced that the County has developed a reliable communications system at the Sheriff's dispatch center. They cite recent incidents, such as the inability of anyone outside of Gold Beach to communicate with the Sheriff dispatch center during the recent major windstorm. South County emergency responders have a high level of confidence in the Brookings Police dispatch center.
- 8. There is good coordination...a seamless system...among south County emergency agencies, and south County emergency responders are concerned that this coordination will be disrupted by splitting the dispatch function. The consensus among south County emergency agencies (except the Sheriff) is that the current system works and should not be changed.
- 9. Operationally, this change would require emergency medical and some fire agencies to carry two pagers instead of one. Over 40 new pagers would be needed just for Cal-Ore. At about \$400 per pager, this would be a significant cost burden for the ambulance service and south County fire agencies.
- 10. According to Chief Wallace and Chief Sharp, there has been a history of lack of cooperation by the County in developing redundant and mutually beneficial communications systems. This history influences confidence in working through future issues.
- 11. Transferring of 9-1-1 calls would add an unnecessary complexity to the dispatching emergency responders. Currently, the South County PSAP only transfers about 9.0 per cent of the 9-1-1 calls to the County (Sheriff's calls). The change is estimated to redirect about 40 per cent of the 9-1-1 calls to the North County PSAP, a great percentage of which would be routed back to Brookings (assuming Brookings retained the fire, rescue dispatch function).
- 12. Every emergency agency in South County...except the Sheriff's Department (which is not a member of the 9-1-1 Board)...is happy with the way 9-1-1 service and dispatch service is currently provided. Local fire departments, staffed with community volunteers, believe they know what's best for their community.

Many of the South County emergency responder concerns are subtle nuances in how they do their job. For example, the Harbor Fire Department is now able to monitor the activities of the Upper Chetco Fire Department and can begin to prepare a response before being dispatched. Responders believe they will no longer be able to easily monitor each others calls, and that this

will result in delays in "powering up" to respond when mutual aid is needed. The small fire departments rely heavily upon well developed mutual aid relationships.

The City Manager recently attended a special Curry County Commission meeting to discuss the 9-1-1 issue. State Office of Emergency Management (OEM) leaders were present. OEM management has requested that the City of Brookings take an official position on the 9-1-1 change as proposed by Curry County.

(Sheriff Boice plans to attend the February 4 workshop City Council meeting, and OEM 9-1-1 manager Ken Kime has also been invited.)

Subject: Request to Abandon Easement - Tanbark Circle

Recommended Motion:

Discussion and direction to staff.

Financial Impact: Processing costs, which the affected property owners may be willing to pay.

Background/Discussion:

The City has received a letter from Reginald Milhon, 99 Tanbark Circle, requesting that the City abandon a 10-foot-wide "pedestrian way" adjacent to his property. The pedestrian way was dedicated for public use when the Tanbark subdivision was approved in 1987. The pedestrian way broadens to 20-feet in width at its terminus with the Pacific Ocean.

The pedestrian way is overgrown with vegetation and, according to Tanbark Circle residents, is not used for public access to the coast. The City does not have the resources to maintain the access way in a useable condition.

If abandoned, the property would be ceded to the adjoining property owners at 99 Tanbark and 97/98 Tanbark (three property owners).

Staff is seeking Council direction before contacting other property owners and proceeding with the legal process of abandoning the pedestrian way.

Policy Considerations:

Dedication of this pedestrian way and one other located between 117-120 Tanbark Road were conditions of approval for the Tanbark Subdivision. Does the City wish to preserve these areas for future use in providing public access to the coast?

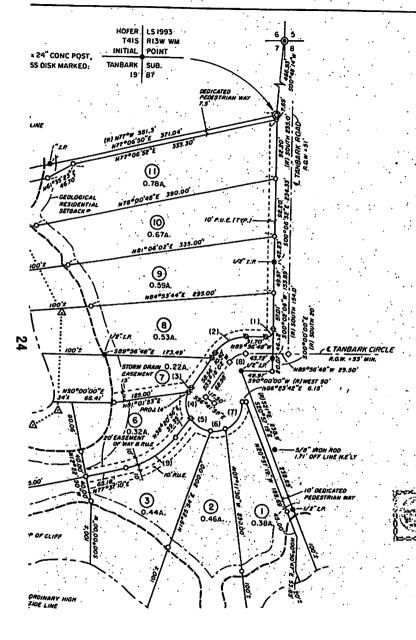
Please accept this letter as my request for the 10' easement that comes off of Tanbark Circle located on my west property line be dedicated to the adjacent property owners.

As you are aware from the October meeting with property owners there were multiple repair and maintenance items discussed requiring corrective action by the City. With the transference of the easement to the adjacent property owners the future maintenance requirements and expense for the easement would then be borne by the property owners and not the city. Subject: Job Description and Reclassification of Planning Director

Recommended Motion:

- 1) Adopt job description for the position of Planning Director.
- 2) Reclassify the position of Planning Director to salary Grade 20 on the miscellaneous employee salary chart.
- 3) Place Planning Director Dianne Morris on Step five of Grade 20 effective February 1, 2008, and designate February 1 as the employees' new anniversary date for salary review purposes.

<u>Financial Impact</u>: Approximately \$2,900 in additional salary and benefit costs for the current fiscal year.

Background/Discussion:

The City Manager conducted a study of management compensation in December, 2007, which found that the base compensation of the City Manager and four of the five department managers were at or within six per cent of the median salary paid for similar positions in Oregon cities of like size. The one position that emerged as significantly under compensated was that of Planning Director, who lagged behind the median by nearly 30 per cent.

In reviewing the history of this position, it appears that there was reorganization in mid-2006 which resulted in eliminating the position of Community Development Director and elevating two "division head" positions to "department heads" adding additional duties and increased responsibility. Dianne Morris was appointed as Planning Director on July 1, 2006. She was placed on Grade 16; elevated from Grade 15 as Deputy City Planner. John Cowan was appointed as Public Works Director on August 28, 2006. He was placed on Grade 20; elevated from Grade 15 as Public Works Supervisor.

The previous Planning Director, who worked under the direction of the Community Development Director, was also on Grade 16. For reasons unknown to current management, the compensation level for Planning Director appears to have been uncharacteristically low even before Dianne Morris was appointed to the position. In additional to the current market evidence, there was only a one-Grade differential between the Planning Director and his Deputy City Planner immediate subordinate, while the Grade differential in other departments is significantly broader (i.e., public works/5 grades, police/3 grades, administrative services/5 grades, fire/6 grades).

An additional finding in this review is that there is no adopted job description for Planning Director. Staff has prepared a proposed job description.

The Planning Director plays a key role in the City organization. The planning function influences the City's economic future, quality of life and aesthetic values of the community. The planning function is governed by a unique body of laws and requires interaction with other levels of government in a highly professional manner. While the employee supervision demand is comparatively low with operating departments like public works and police, the level of responsibility for helping guide the City's future development and assuring compliance with city standards is high.

The recommended action would reclassify the Planning Director position from Grade 15 to Grade 20, where the incumbent would be placed on Step five of the seven-Step Grade at \$61,932 annually, an increase in base annual compensation of \$5,761 effective February 1, 2008. The top step of Grade 20 remains at about 5.8 per cent below the median compensation for the position of Planning Director in cities of like size.

Policy Considerations:

It is good public policy to offer a fair level of compensation to employees equal to their comparative level or responsibility and contribution to the organization. Market comparisons should be conducted at least every three years. It is important to remain competitive in the market in order to recruit and retain quality employees.

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State of the City February 11, 2008 Mayor Pat Sherman

Brookings, OR

The most visible signs that our City is making progress are the new facades, streetlights, and street furniture. Many terrific projects were undertaken by our downtown businesses in conjunction with the City's Urban Renewal Agency. I certainly wouldn't want to diminish the importance of any of these projects, but I cannot resist: "aren't you pleased that we no longer have a pink theater building?"

Less visible upgrades include the new roof on a previously drippy City Hall, and a patch to mitigate the nuisance of Rowland Lane sewage overflow. Also, as you walk through Azalea Park, note the new, wider, walkways that make the stroll more pleasant and safer.

As you likely recall, Azalea Park was targeted by the Sudden Oak Death disease that has been spreading up the coast. The experts who are tracking and trying to control this infestation came into Azalea Park, took out the infected trees, quarantined the affected grounds, and are now planning a replanting project this spring. Whether or not this will be a permanent solution to this infestation remains to be seen, but we need to thank the men and women from the Agricultural Department who directed the efforts.

In the paperwork department, we can note several accomplishments:

- resolution of the water tank conflict at Pacific Terrace PUD
- revision of seven chapters in the Land Development Code
- creation of a process for Council to allocate donations to community groups requesting funding assistance
- review and renewal of contracts for marketing (Chamber of Commerce), computer services (PRN Data Services) and financial audit (Wall and Wall, PC)
- adoption of Storm and Surface Water Master Plans and approval of priority projects
- adoption of Water Master Plan and final preparation of two projects: 1.5 million gallon water tank in Seacrest area and the new water line on North Bank Chetco Road

There were also some disappointments. Obtaining funding for the biosolids A project has been frustrating. It is hoped that this problem will be resolved and the project underway by summer. Another important project in need of funds is the replacement of the Westside sewer line which sometimes overflows when we have heavy rain events. These funds are currently being sought.

Finally, what is planned for 2008? Here are some of the highlights:

- completion of the Emergency Operations Center along with the Radio Communication Tower project
- adoption of an Azalea Park Master Plan which will reflect the community needs and desires
- acquisition of grant funding to upgrade Easy Manor Park with new play structures and ADA compliance
- completion of design for the lower Stout Park area
- completion of several water and wastewater projects in the Public Works Department queue
- design and implementation of a county/city plan to address underfunded public safety/law and order issues

And such, in brief, is the state of the City of Brookings
