

Replacement of City Telephone System

BACKGROUND

The City of Brookings budget currently has \$35,000 available for the purchase of a new phone system to replace our current, nearly ten year old antiquated system.

Our current system is no longer compatible with the 911 phone system in the police department which was replaced by the State of Oregon at no cost to the City. Also, the Public Works and Waste Water Treatment Plant sites have never been able to be part of the City wide phone system because of their location. Our current system also has maintenance issues. Its age and requirements are making the system difficult to maintain. The voice mail module has not worked correctly for some time, but Verizon does not have a correctable solution for the problem. All of these issues will be corrected with a new system.

Verizon and Unicom, Inc. submitted proposals to the City for a new system. The initial cost of equipment proposed by Unicom was \$4,400 more than Verizon, but after factoring in cost of maintenance, long distance and local service over a four year period, Unicom generates a \$9,774 savings. See attached cost comparison.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends acceptance of the Unicom proposal of \$31,922 for a Networked ADIX-APS Digital Telephone System.

REPORT

The Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) is requesting applications for projects that address pedestrian an/or bicycle problems. City staff has identified the Fern Street Improvement project as one which fits the criteria for the grant funding. The following is an outline of the project.

The Brookings Harbor School District 17-C campus is located between Fern Avenue on the south and west, Pioneer road and Pacific Avenue on the East and Ransom Avenue on the north. The campus contains the Elementary, Middle and High schools for the district and serves the entire population in the 97415 area code.

The campus is located in the Brookings city limits in a mixed use neighborhood with residential. commercial and senior care facilities bordering the campus. Gaps currently exist in the sidewalk network (see attachment #1) and this creates potential problems for pedestrians and the biking public. This project will provide a completed walking network around the entire campus and the enhanced paved area will provide a shared roadway to enhance the experience for our biking population.

The project will provide 6 foot sidewalks, ADA accessible ramps, intersection crossings, storm drainage control, and a paved connection to the existing asphalt for use by the walking and biking public. Providing this venue for our children, senior and disabled population and our residents will increase the aesthetic value, community pride of ownership, safety, and the environmental quality of the area while making this a user friendly environment for our population.

RECOMMENDATION

Endorse the project and agree that, if it is constructed, the City will maintain the improvements.





 Councilor Mickelson attended the last Planning Commission meeting and said he bailed out at 11:30 p.m. The lengthy meeting did not

adjourn until nearly 2:00 a.m. He will be attending another Planning Commission meeting on July 27 which will focus on the Borax master plan. He also attended American Cancer Society's Relay for Life on July 9.

Councilor Johns Kern attended the Economic Development Committee meeting July 8.

Councilor Dentino was at the Community Agencies meeting July 7, assisted with Relay for Life, worked an American Music Festival concert July 11, and participated in a Pelican Bay Telecommunications board meeting at noon today.

Councilor Anderson attended a workshop with LCDC Director Lane Shetterley July 2 and the Community Agencies meeting on the 7th. Both watershed council meetings were cancelled this month. He attended a happy event for him, the Saturday, July 10 wedding at Salmon Run Golf Course of Brookings Harbor School District Superintendent Chris McKay and Rod Nichols.

Mayor Hagbom said he had also attended many of the meetings mentioned by the Councilors. In addition he and Chamber President Les Cohen drove to Bandon to meet with Karen Minnas, Speaker of the Oregon House of Representatives. The meeting was attended by some 30-35 community leaders and discussion centered on items that will before the legislators in the upcoming legislative session.

B. Unscheduled

- Rex Atwell, 17169 Parkview Drive, Brookings said while he is
 impressed with the new City handout to builders and contractors he
 thought not one suggestion on the sheet had been complied with.
 Citing the Parkview Drive area, he felt all the contractors working
 there were in violation and that contractors are devastating the
 country side on Parkview Drive. City Manager Blodgett invited
 Atwell to meet with him regarding these concerns. Atwell agreed to
 contact Blodgett.
- 2. Barbara Nysted, 427 Buena Vista Loop, Brookings, read a letter to the Council regarding the last Planning Commission meeting in which she stated she does not believe the commissioners listen to citizens that are in opposition to an agenda item. She also talked about burning permits, specifically a burn on Tanbark Circle.

City Manager Blodgett said DEQ will not be issuing construction burn permits within the city limits until the end of fire season. Burn barrel and back yard burn permits will continue to be issued.

- 3. Sally Laasch, PO Box 7816, Brookings, thanked Councilor Dentino, City Manager Blodgett, and Economic and Development Director Ed Wait who helped transport items for the Relay for Life silent auction. Laasch said the auction raised over \$1,000 bringing the total income for the annual American Cancer Society fundraiser to over \$54,000.
- 4. Carla Dillenburg, 627 Richard Street, Brookings, addressed the Council with her concerns on the possible sale of Richard Street Park. She listed reasons to keep the park in its current undeveloped state. Kathy Wooten, 631 Richard Street, Matt Bristow, 682 Richard Street, and Matt Hickely, 1001 Easy Street, also addressed the Council stating their opposition to the possible sale.

City Manager Blodgett said the Parks and Recreation Commission discussed the public benefit of Richard Street Park vs. the cost to maintain it. He said the sale of the park could have an overall benefit to the City but a negative benefit to the neighborhood. In his eyes the parks seems so local that for the City to continue to maintain it with public money didn't seem right. He said he would contact local neighbors to see if the neighborhood would like to purchase the property. Dillenburg countered, saying many, other than neighborhood residents, use the Park.

Blodgett said City staff is following up on Parks and Recreation Commission's request to investigate sale of the property but before any sale can be done there would be a public hearing before the City Council who would then decide whether to sell the property or not. Blodgett is researching the park deed, and any possible restrictions on its use or sale.

Bristow asked where was the most appropriate place to voice concerns on this possible sale of City land and Blodgett answered the Parks and Recreation Commission would be the most appropriate public body.

VII. Staff Reports

- A. Community Development Department
 - Acceptance of Hedenskog Waterline Extension on Old County Road
 Community Development Director Lightle asked for acceptance of a
 completed waterline just outside of the city limits. The line will be a
 part of an overall development planned for the Old County Road area.

Councilor Anderson moved, a second followed, and the Council voted unanimously to accept the Hedenskog Waterline Extension on Old County Road

Declaring Inoperable Vehicles as Surplus Property
 Community Development Director Lightle said the Public Works
 Department has two inoperable vehicles that have not been in service for many years and are considered unsalvageable.

Councilor Mickelson moved, a second followed, and the Council voted unanimously to declare a Ford flatbed truck, License No. E134763, and a Ford Ranger pickup truck, License No. E162007, as surplus equipment and that they are unsalvageable.

3. Authorizing Fifth Street Project for STP Street Project 2004
Community Development Director Lightle said the City will receive
2004 Surface Transportation Program (STP) funds of \$47,373. He
recommended the monies be used for a project beginning 229 feet
south of the Fifth and Easy streets intersection and continuing 150
feet north of the intersection. System Development Charge funds will
also be used to fund the upper end of the project. The City is looking
at having utilities moved that may be in the way for the project. There
is adequate room for a widened driving surface but no room for
curbside parking in the project area.

Councilor Dentino moved, a second followed, and the Council voted unanimously to authorize the change of project location for Surface Transportation Program Funds for 2004 to Fifth Street beginning 229 feet south of the Fifth and Easy streets intersection and continuing north of the intersection 150 feet.

B. City Manager

1. Memorandum of Understanding—Harbor Sanitary District
City Manager Blodgett said the City and Harbor Sanitary District
have been negotiating a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to
establish a method and rate for treatment of wastewater received from
HSD. The negotiated rate is \$2.97 per hundred cubic feet of
wastewater. If the Memorandum of Understanding is approved the
City will no longer require or collect SDCs from HSD. HSD will be
able to establish their fees and use the income to pay their monthly
rate charge. The MOU has been reviewed by both HSD's and the
City's attorneys and has been signed by the Harbor Sanitary District's
board of directors. The City and HSD still have one agreement, the
Urban Services Agreement, in the negotiation stage. Blodgett said he
will bring it to the Council once the document is complete and
reviewed by both attorneys.

Councilor Johns Kern moved, a second followed, and the Council voted unanimously to approve a Memorandum of Understanding with Harbor Sanitary District setting the rate of \$2.97 per hundred cubic feet of wastewater received into the City's Wastewater Treatment Plant from HSD.

Call to Order

Chair Boynton called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and welcomed our new *student ex officio*, Paul Cleary. Paul introduced himself as a Brookings-Harbor sophomore student. He stated he was interested in participating in a volunteer community service position. After his introduction he led the pledge of allegiance.

Roll Call

Commissioners Present: Dave Gordon, Pat Sherman, April Gothard, Bill Boynton, and Tony Parrish.

Commissioners Absent: Dori Blodgett and Daryn Farmer.

Staff Present: Councilor Frances Johns Kern; Dave Lentz, Parks Foreman-Public Works; Ed Wait, Economic and Urban Director, and Cathie Mahon, Secretary.

Media: Don Allison for The Pilot.

There were approximately 25 members of the public present.

Minutes

After the minutes were amended, Commissioner Sherman moved, a second followed, and the Commission voted unanimously to approve the minutes for the April 22, 2004, Parks and Recreation Commission meeting as amended.

PUBLIC APPEARANCES

Summer Recreation Program:

Cathy Hafterson introduced herself as the supervisor for the Summer Recreation Program. She stated it has been an interesting journey since agreeing to oversee the project but is currently experiencing the problem of finding volunteers. Volunteers from last year's program are not available to return this year, so she recruited her daughter to help.

Hafterson circulated a *draft* copy of the 2004 schedule for events, and activities. She explained the program is geared to children in grades first through sixth, classes will be held Monday through Thursday, and run from June 21st to the first week of August. Fridays are reserved for staff meetings and to organize for the next week. Arts and crafts plus conversational German, and Chess will be offered, and a tour of the Chetco River Coast Guard Station. Registration is June 7th and the 8th at K-school.

She stressed again volunteers are needed to oversee arts and crafts classes, and assist with tours and sports events. Volunteer requirements are simply someone who is enthusiastic, energetic, and likes being with children.

Discussion ensued. Commissioner Gordon questioned how Hafterson was advertising for volunteers. She responded the program was discussed during a spot on the radio and will be discussed again on KURY on June 7th. Commissioner Parrish suggested putting the notice on the City events calendar on the Channel 4 television site.

Tennis:

Jack Hawkins, tennis pro, who began offering tennis lessons in the spring at Bud Cross Park for junior high and high school girls, stated the courts are adequate at this time, but there are some factors not conducive to a good environment and concentration for the game; loud music, the courts are often used as a basketball court, and trash scattered on the courts. He explained with the positive response from the community to tennis, a new location, away from the distracting elements, could be something for the commission to consider. He circulated a plot plan of Stout Park and an illustration of three tennis courts. He asked the Commission to consider the proposal of three tennis courts in Stout Park for the Brookings Harbor Community Tennis Association. Additionally he discussed year-around tennis would be available with a "bubble" cover for the courts. In the summer the bubble would not be needed, it would be placed over the courts during the usual rainy months, November through April. He stated he was of the opinion that the courts would be unobtrusive to the park, there would be minimal noise, and the environment factor would be positive. Hawkins added he had two possible sources for funding of the court cover.

Hawkins concluded stating to have a successful tennis program needs a tennis director and year-round courts. He introduced tennis professional Stuart Hutchinson, to the commission, who has expressed interest in taking the reins from Hawkins and moving forward with the program.

Commissioner Sherman questioned Hawkins if restrooms would be included in the plan. Hawkins responded they would, plus a small building to house equipment such as the ball machine. Commissioner Gordon complimented Hawkins on contributing his time and effort in getting involved with the game of tennis. He expressed a long range goal might be to get some of the young boys involved with tennis.

Hawkins thanked the Commission for listening to his proposal. Chair Boynton advised Hawkins that nothing could directly be done until the proposal was discussed with City Manager Blodgett. Director Wait affirmed, stating provisions in the agreement for the use of Stout Park would have to be researched.

Chair Boynton stated this is one of the issues that could be studied when the University of Oregon Community Planning Workshop conducts a study for a recreational facility. Perhaps it could be a combined swimming pool and tennis court recreational center.

Frisbee Golf:

Jeremy McVeety, a key promoter of Disc Golf, thanked the commissioners for attending the tour of Azalea Park. He stated he was not ready to present a formal layout of the course.

Lorraine Williams, representing the Azalea Park Foundation, addressed some concerns expressed by the Azalea Park Foundation regarding Disc Golf at Azalea Park. Some of the issues were:

- How much land would be required for the course?
- Who would be responsible for supervision and maintenance?
- What would the environmental impact on the park be?
- How much money will it cost? "Dreams are cheap" but concrete work is costly and clearing the brush would take a lot of manpower.
- Safety-who would be responsible if a disc hits someone?

Lorraine Williams continued with the reminder there are some valuable old bushes and trees in the park, a lot of man hours were used to preserve the plants and maintain the park, and until all the issues are discussed, questions answered, and a formal plan submitted, a decision should be on hold.

McVeety responded he will take those comments into consideration as he goes forward with the project. Chair Boynton stated until a formal lay-out of the project is presented to the commission along with a detail plan of the finances involved with the project, the commission will place the project on hold. Commissioner Sherman stated after the tour, she had some questions. She thinks the community seems divided on the project. Then there is the issue of clearing the berry bushes which is a huge project. She expressed some concern about hikers in the park and the infringement of the course on the hikers. She concluded stating it is a bad use for the park.

McVeety responded that it is a perfect spot for Disc Golf, adding hikers and players of Disc Golf can co-exist. Commissioner Gordon stated he would like to see the proposal, he's willing to listen and look at the plan. Commission Gothard stated there is a lack of education on Disc Golf, perhaps the right information would educate people on the game and understand the concept.

Chair Boynton asked if McVay Park had been considered. McVeety agreed stating he would research McVay to see if there is enough area for an 18-hole course. Commissioner Gordon suggested McVeety look at the possibility of alternative locations. Elmo Williams stated his concern was one of safety; a Frisbee could fly out into traffic on the North Bank, which is often a busy road. Wait concluded the discussion stating all the options will be weighed and reviewed to see if Disc Golf is a compatible sport to have at the park. Lorraine Williams said she might play once the course is in place.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Stout Park: Commissioner Parrish reported the trees were trimmed along Oak Street resulting in more light in the park. Commissioner Sherman suggested a "work party" and asked if one was scheduled. Parrish responded he would be very interested in a clean-up party. He reported the existing trash cans are inadequate because they are falling apart. He asked if there was some way to get replacements, larger ones if possible. Chair Boynton asked Wait if he would ask City Manager Blodgett about obtaining 2 new trash cans for the park. Parks Foreman, Dave Lenz stated Western Tree Service was contacted to take care of any broken limbs that might fall in a windstorm.

Chetco Park: Commissioner Sherman stated she was pleased that we got the grant to go ahead with the Chetco Point Project. (Note: Ed Wait, Economic & Urban Development Director applied for a \$50,000 Coastal Resources Management Improvement Grant in March). Wait stated he received notification of the funds approval and the contract will follow. He added, matching funds (\$50,000) were included in the budget. He anticipates in the next couple months someone will be brought in to design the project. He said he was pleased that it is the first time the City has applied for this grant, and a lot of hard work went into obtaining it.

Bud Cross Park and Softball Fields:

Commissioner Gordon reported he visited the fields and talked to some of the players, who thought the fields were in good shape.

Kidtown: Chair Boynton reported he has driven to the park several times and it always has someone playing on the equipment; it is a highly used park.

Easy Manor Park: Commissioner Gothard reported the bathrooms are in very bad shape but the park has great potential.

Pool: The 2004 pool fee schedule was circulated to the commissioners. Commissioner Gothard reported the pool needs Lifeguards. She explained a guard must have a Red Cross certification, Jeanne conducts the required classes, and 30 hours of training are required. Commissioner Gordon said he would take the request to the next Brookings-Harbor Youth group meeting. Wait suggested maybe the Eagle Scouts could be contacted as a project to earn a badge.

STAFF ANOUNCEMENTS/CONCERNS/FOLLOW-UP

Financial Report: No discussion.

Commissioner and Staff Comments:

Commissioner Parrish stated he is trying to find the number of the person who was interested in organizing tournaments at the volleyball court. The court is ready for use, but no one seems to be in charge.

With no further business before the Commission, Commissioner Sherman moved the meeting be adjourned at 8:25 p.m.

THE PLANNING COMMISSION TOOK THE FOLLOWING ACTION ON WRITTEN REQUESTS AND COMMUNICATIONS

1. By a 4-0 vote (Motion: Commissioner Freeman) the Planning Commission approved the request for an extension for the *Andruss Subdivison*, to divide a .97 acre parcel into four (4) residential lots; located at 17234 Passley Road; Assessor's Map 40-14-36 BA, Tax Lot 2000; R-1-6 (Single-family Residential, 6,000 square foot minimum) zone; Martin and Elizabeth Andruss, applicants.
