Closing lower part of Old County Road for middle school class

Background: 1.

1. (see attached letter)

This request came in after the packet and agenda had been prepared. Some of the students and a teacher will be at tonight's Council meeting.

- 2. I have talked with Community Development Director Lightle and Police Chief Lewis about this request and we see no significant problem with closing this road for an hour and twenty minutes this Tuesday and Wednesday mornings. This would be from the intersection at Azalea Park Road and Old County Road to the intersection of Old County Road and Constitution Way.
- 3. Public Works will provide some barriers and the Police Department will, assuming nothing else in particular is happening, send a patrol car to the area.
- 4. The only inconvenience this will cause to anyone will be to those people who want to use this section of Old County Road at that time. They would have to use Oak Street, which shouldn't be a big deal.

Recommendation:

We recommend you authorize the closing of Old County Road June 13 and 14, 2000, from approximately 8:20AM to approximately 9:40AM for this Azalea Middle School Class.







RE: 1999/2000 Supplemental Budget

Issue:

Due to circumstances not known at the time of budget preparation for the fiscal year 1999/2000, a supplemental budget is required.

Background:

The unforseen expenditures and revenues proposed for the supplemental budget are:

Police Department-\$21,000 in Materials & Services. This item consists of \$3,500 in account 10-13-6155 Drug Restitution Reserve-Federal, \$10,000 in account 10-13-6160 Drug Restitution Reserve-State and \$7,500 in account 10-13-6180 Community Policing. The expenditures in the drug restitution funds are for purchase of a computer network for the detectives and subsequent payment of the \$5,000 insurance deductible for the replacement of the computer network system destroyed by flooding. The funds expended in Community Policing were for the police trading cards and reimbursement to Oregon State Police for seat belt enforcement classes. The expenditures are a result of additional revenues being received by these two police programs. Additional funds were received by the City from asset forfeiture in the amount of \$19,000 to cover the expenditures (account 10-06-4130). Community Policing obtained a grant of \$1,025 (account 10-13-4050) to finance the trading cards as well as donations of \$6,475 (account 10-06-4135) in support of other activities which necessitated the other expenditures.

Police Department-\$6,145 in Personal Services. This item is the overtime incurred by Police Officers in enforcement of seat belt and DUII laws (account 10-13-5010). This overtime is reimbursed to the City of Brookings by a State of Oregon grant. Therefore, I also recommend an addition to the budget of \$6,145 in grant revenues (account 10-03-4055).

Police Department-\$9,400 in Capital Outlay. This budget addition consists of two items. The first is \$3,900 spent for a radar gun (account 10-13-7020). This asset was purchased from donated funds in the prior year. These funds were a portion of the carryover to fiscal year 1999/2000. The remaining \$5,500 in capital outlay is for a vehicle for the Chief of Police. The funds for this expenditure are from sale of assets in the drug restitution funds.

Non-Departmental-\$9000 in Materials & Services. This increase in budget becomes necessary due to increased revenues from the Transient Room Tax. Our current agreement with the Brookings Harbor Chamber of Commerce stipulates 25% of Transient Room Tax collections will be paid to the Chamber for the promotion of tourism. We had an unanticipated increase in Transient Room Tax of approximately \$36,000 which necessitates an unanticipated transfer to the Chamber of Commerce of \$9,000 (account 10-19-6185).

Dawson Bancroft Bond Fund -Revenue & Expenditures - \$2,500 in Materials & Services. The City paid past due taxes on a piece of property (account 44-10-6065) in Dawson Tract in order to begin foreclosure proceedings. This expenditure was not planned or budgeted. There are \$2,500 in addition revenues (account 44-08-4150) to cover the unbudgeted expenditure.

Recommendation:

Approve Resolution 00-R-678 incorporating the above items in a supplemental budget for the fiscal year 1999/2000.

Issue:

Prior to the adoption of the 2000/2001 approved budget, some reclassification of capital outlay dollars is needed in the Street, Water-Distribution, and Wastewater Collection Funds.

Background:

The capital outlay approved for the Street, Water-Distribution and Wastewater Collection Funds did not include an amount for property improvements. The recommended budget for property improvements is \$29,800 for each fund. These dollars are to be used for the preparation of plans and construction of a public works shop. A new shop is necessary due to the sale of property previously used by public works and the construction at the wastewater plant where their current facilities are located. The Community Development Director and Public Works Superintendent are currently obtaining plans and an estimate of total project cost. The changes recommended do no result in additional money budgeted in capital outlay, but rather a reclassification of funds. See the attached budget sheets that illustrate the reclassifications. Before any bids are requested for construction, we will come back to the Council for approvals.

Recommendation:

Approve the reclassification of \$29,800 from construction in the Street Fund (account 15-10-7025) to property improvements in the Street Fund (account 15-10-7005) and the reclassification of \$29,800 from improvements in the Water Distribution Fund (account 20-21-7005) to property improvements in the Water Distribution Fund (account 20-21-7008) and the reclassification of \$29,800 from improvements in the Wastewater Collection Fund (account 25-31-7005) to property improvements in the Wastewater Collection Fund (account 25-31-7008).

Budget for Fiscal Year 2000/2001

Issue:

Due to circumstances that have surfaced subsequent to the Budget Committee Meeting on April 26, 2000, there are some changes that need to be made to the approved budget before adoption by City Council.

Background:

The Fire Department proposed a budget of \$24,000 for equipment. It was the intention of the Fire Chief to purchase a First Response Vehicle with these funds. Chief Sharp has obtained information and believes he can now purchase and equip a First Response Vehicle for \$19,000. He is requesting the \$24,000 be reduced to \$19,000 and \$2,500 of the \$5,000 reduction be placed in the budget for the Brookings Firefighters Association. The proposed budget for the Association was \$22,500 and the addition would bring the total to \$25,000. The Association has been allocated \$20,000 for the past several years. These funds are used by the Brookings Firefighters' Association to purchase clothing and other items for the 30 person volunteer fire department. When the fire department budget is reduced, the revenue generated from the fire protection contracts is reduced. This reduction in expenditures results in a reduction in revenue of \$600. I propose the remaining \$1,900 be moved to Contract Services in the Legislative/Administrative Department to increase the funds budgeted for the Grant Writer from \$5,000 to \$6,900. See the attached sheets for the requested changes.

Recommendation:

Approve the reduction of Equipment in the Fire Department budget from \$24,000 to \$19,000 (account 10-14-7020); approve the increase of Brookings Firefighters' Association expense from \$22,500 to \$25,000 (account 10-14-6165); approve the reduction in Fire Protection Contract Revenue from \$47,500 to \$46,900 (account 10-04-4105) and approve the increase of Contract Services in the Legislative Department from \$7,000 to \$8,900 (account 10-12-6090).

RE: Lease of Copy Machine in City Hall

Issue:

The current lease on the primary copy machine, Xerox 5352 expires in June 2000. A new lease needs to be executed for the copy machine.

Background:

A Request for Proposal (RFP) for the lease of a copy machine was advertised in the Curry Coastal Pilot on May 13, 2000. In addition, a mailing of the specifications for the machine was completed on May 10, 2000. An addendum to the mailing further expanding the acceptable specifications was sent on May 23, 2000. I received four responses to the RFP. The proposals were reviewed to determine if all specifications were met and a cost analysis was prepared. The proposal requested each respondent to quote two different technologies. An analog copier (current technology) and a digital copier. If it could be achieved within budgetary constraints, it is our goal to move to the digital technology. This provides additional features and capabilities that do not currently exist in analog copiers. A digital copier can be connected to the computer network so a user can print/copy documents from each workstation. In addition, the digital copiers provide for an unlimited number of sorted copies. The limit with an analog copier is 20 sorter bins, and we frequently exceed that amount for projects such as council packets, budget reports, monthly financial statements, and planning commission mailings.

The bid results placed Xerox and Toshiba copiers in competitive position for the analog copier and Toshiba only for the digital copier (see the attached cost comparison). References were checked for the Toshiba products. All references (including three in Del Norte County) were very positive and pleased with their choice of a Toshiba copier and the service provided by the vendor CMI Business Systems of Medford. The monthly lease costs of \$310 plus the cost/per number of copies/month, estimated to be \$120.00, are within the budgeted amounts for fiscal year 2000/2001 of \$443.00 per month.

Recommendation:

Authorize staff to enter into lease arrangement for a four year period of a Toshiba Digital 5570 copier with CMI Business Systems effective immediately.

The council is being asked to sign a landlord's consent presented on behalf of Family Security Bank. In addition to a general review of the Landlord's Consent there are several specific issues the council should consider.

<u>First</u>, the first sentence of the paragraph entitled 'LEASE DEFAULTS' states "Both Borrower and Landlord agree and represent to Lender that, to the best of their knowledge, there is no material breach or offset existing under the Lease or under any other agreement between Borrower and Landlord."

I am not personally aware of any defaults, however, this should be carefully considered by persons familiar with the present status of the golf course operations.

Second, the paragraph entitled 'DISCLAIMER OF INTEREST' states, "Subject to the other provisions of this Agreement, Landlord hereby consents to Lender's security interest (or other interest) in the Collateral as defined as Leasehold Improvements to include Fencing, Club House, Decking, Well, Septic, Paving of lot and driveway and all fixtures associated with same and disclaims all interest, liens and claims which Landlord now has or may hereafter acquire in the Collateral. Subject to the other provisions of this Agreement, Landlord agrees that any lien or claim it may now have or hereafter have in the Collateral will be subject at all times to Lender's security interest (or other present or future interest) in the Collateral and will be subject to the rights granted by Landlord to Lender in this Agreement."

The City's lease agreement at <u>Section 7.01 - Ownership of Real Property</u> <u>Improvements</u> states "In the event of default by Lessee and the re-entry of Lessor to the leased premises as provided in this Article, all of Lessee's right, title and interest in and to the improvements and fixtures constructed on the real property shall cease and those improvements and fixtures shall thereupon become the property of Lessor. Lessee shall have no further right to occupy or possess those improvements or fixtures on the real property in the event of such default."

The proposed Landlord's Consent would give the bank a priority claim to the Collateral defined as Leasehold Improvements including Fencing, Club House, Decking, Well, Septic, Paving of lot and driveway and all fixtures associated with same.

Additionally, I have reviewed a proposed Deed of Trust Subordination Agreement between Steve Muir, The Claveran Group and Family Security Bank. The agreement will not impact the City's position as Lessor.

THIS LANDLORD'S CONSENT is entered into among The Claveran Group, LLC ("Borrower"), whose address is; 99040 South Bank Chetco River Road, Brookings, Oregon 97415, Family Security Bank("Lender"), whose address is PO Box 3000G, 16271 Hwy 101 South, Harbor, Oregon 97415, CCD Business Development Corporation ("Lender"), 744 Southeast Rose Street, Roseburg, Oregon 97470; and The City of Brookings ("Landlord"), whose address is 898 Elk Drive, Brookings, Oregon 97415. Borrower and Lender(s) have entered into, or are about to enter into, an agreement whereby Lender(s) had acquired or will acquire a security interest or other interest in the Collateral. Some or all of the Collateral may be affixed or otherwise become located on the Premises. To induce Lender to extend the Loan to Borrower against such security interest in the Collateral and for the valuable consideration, Landlord hereby agrees with Lender(s) and Borrower as follows.

DEFINITIONS. The following words shall have the following meanings when used in this agreement. Terms not otherwise defined in this Agreement shall have the meanings attributed to such terms in the Uniform Commercial Code. All references to dollar amounts shall mean amounts in lawful money of the United States of America.

Borrower. The word "Borrower" means The Claveran Group, LLC.

Collateral. The word "Collateral" means certain of Borrower's personal property in which Lender has acquired or will acquire a security interest in the following specific property: Leasehold Improvements to include Fencing, Club House, Decking, Well, Septic, Paving of lot and driveway and all fixtures associated with same.

Landlord. The word "Landlord" means The City of Brookings. Landlord's interest in the Premises is that of a fee owner.

Lease. The word "Lease" means that certain lease of the Premises, dated February 17, 1998 between Landlord and Borrower. The lease has not been recorded.

Lender. The word "Lender" means Family Security Bank and/or CCD Business Development Corporation, its successors and assigns.

Loan. The word "Loan" means the loan, or any other financial accommodations, Lender has made or is making to the Borrower.

Premises. The word "Premises" means the real property located in Curry County, State of Oregon, commonly known as 99040 South Bank Chetco River Road, Brookings, OR 97415, and legally described as:

Landlord's Consent Claveran Group, LLC Page 1 of 4 BORROWER'S ASSIGNMENT OF LEASE. Borrower hereby assigns to Lender all of Borrower's rights in the Lease, as partial security for the Loan. The parties intend that this assignment will be a present transfer to Lender of all of Borrower's rights under the Lease, subject to Borrower's rights to use the Premises and enjoy the benefits of the Lease while not in default on the Loan or Lease. Upon full performance by the Borrower under the Loan, this assignment shall be ended, without the necessity of any further action by any of the parties. This assignment includes all renewals of and amendments to the Lease or the Loan, until the Loan is paid in full.

CONSENT OF LESSOR. The city of Brookings, an Oregon municipal corporation, Lessor under the Lease dated February 17, 1998, the subject of the Lender's Leasehold Trust Deed, consents to the encumbrance by Lessee of Lesseo's Leasehold, but Lessor waives none of its rights under the Lease as to the Beneficiary under the Leasehold Trust Deed. Specifically, as examples and without limiting the generality of the foregoing, this consent is subject to the following:

- 1. It is hereby acknowledged that the Lender's Lessehold Trust Deed and the interests created hereby shall specifically be subordinate to the interests of Lessor under the Lease Agreement.
- 2. The Trustee under the Lender's Lessehold Deed Trust shall notify Lessor of any and all defaults on the part of Trustor.
- 3. The Trustee and Beneficiary shall give Lessor the right of first refusal, for a purchase price equal to the amount owed to Beneficiary under the Promissory Note and any additional indebtedness which the Lender's Leasehold Deed of Trust secures, in any foreclosure or other action to enforce rights given under the Lender's Leasehold Deed of Trust.

- This consent of Lessor shall be attached to and made part of the recorded Lender's Leasehold Deed of Trust.

LEASE DEFAULTS. Both Borrower and Landlord agree and represent to Lender that, to the best of their knowledge, there is no material breach or offset existing under the Lease or under any other agreement between Borrower and Landlord. Landlord agrees not to terminate the Lease, despite any default by the Borrower, without giving Lender written notice of the default and an opportunity to cure the default within a period of sixty (60) days from the receipt of notice. If the default is one that cannot reasonably be cured by Lender (such as insolvency, bankruptcy, or other judicial proceedings against Borrower), then Landlord will not terminate the Lease so long as Landlord receives all sums due under the Lease for the period during which Lender is in possession of the Premises, or so long as Lender reassigns the Lease to a new lessee reasonably satisfactory to Landlord.

DISCLAIMER OF INTEREST. Subject to the other provisions of this Agreement, Landlord hereby consents to Lender's security interest (or other interest) in the Collateral as defined as Leasehold Improvements to include Fencing, Club House, Decking, Well, Septic, Paving of lot and driveway and all fixtures associated with same, and disclaims all interests, liens and claims which Landlord now has or may hereafter acquire in the Collateral. Subject to the other provisions of this Agreement, Landlord agrees that any lien or claim it may now have or hereafter have in the Collateral will be subject at all times to Lender's security interest (or other present or future interest) in the Collateral and will be subject to the rights granted by Landlord to Lender in this Agreement.

Landlord and Borrower grant to Lender the right to enter upon the Premises or conducting sales of the Collateral on the Premises. The rights granted to Lender in this Agreement will continue until a reasonable time after Lender receives notice in writing from Landlord that Borrower no longer is in lawful possession of the Premises. If Lender enters onto the Premises and removes the Collateral, Lender agrees with Landlord not to remove any Collateral in such a way that the Premises are damaged, without either repairing any such damage or reimbursing Landlord for the cost of repair.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS. This Agreement shall extend to and bind the respective heirs, personal representatives, successors and assigns of the parties to this Agreement. Lender may do or not do anything it deems appropriate or necessary with respect to the Loan, any obligors on the Loan, or any Collateral for the Loan; including without limitation extending, renewing, rearranging, accelerating any of the Loan indebtedness. No delay or omission on the part of the Lender in exercising any right shall operate as a waiver of such right or any other right. A waiver by Lender of a provision of this Agreement shall not constitute a waiver of or prejudice of Lender's right otherwise to demand strict compliance with that provision or any other provision. Whenever consent by Lender is required in this Agreement, the granting of such consent by Lender in any one instance shall not constitute continuing consent to subsequent instances where such consent is required.

I. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Bob Hagbom called the meeting to order at 7:05PM.

II. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

III. ROLL CALL

Council Present: Mayor Bob Hagbom, Councilors Larry Curry, Keith Pepper, and Frances Johns, a quorum present.

Council Absent: Student Ex-Officio Councilors Shiloh Thom and Cindi Peterson, excused

Staff Present: City Manager Tom Weldon, Finance Director/Recorder Gail Hedding, Fire Chief William Sharp, Police Chief Ken Lewis, Community Development Director Leo Lightle, and Administrative Secretary Sharon Ridens

Media Present: Chuck Hayward, Curry Coastal Pilot

Other: Parks and Recreation Chair Craig Mickelson, Chamber of Commerce President Richard Gyuro, Augie Kofoet-Vice President Businesses for a Better Brookings, Curry Transfer & Recycling Manager Pete Smart, Port Manager Russ Crabtree, ODOT District 7 Assistant Director Lee Sparks, and approximately 20 other citizens.

Mayor Hagbom called for Agenda Item No. V.A. - Scheduled Public Appearances, out of order, so that the youth involved in this matter would be able to return to school commitments for the evening.

Hagbom introduced Dave Manzella from the Curry County Health Department, who in turn introduced Students Mary Ball-840 Cameo Court, Brookings; Eve Campbell-P.O. Box 7302, Brookings; and School District Nurse Holly Hoenke, 16708 Thompson Road,

Brookings. The students presented information from a random survey study for Curry County which provided evidence in support of an ordinance that would limit self service sales of tobacco products. Manzella advised the Council twelve stores in the Brookings-Harbor area were surveyed and eight of the twelve had self serve displays. Nurse Honeke, and students noted Brookings would not be the first to consider this type of ordinance in Oregon, not to mention across the nation, and asked for the Council's support in passing an ordinance to restrict the sale of tobacco to minors. Mayor Hagbom confirmed the major problem areas with which the students were concerned for purposes of ordinance writing and adoption. After a few questions and answers, the Mayor and each Councilor commented on their personal concerns and support of this issue.

Mayor Hagbom asked for audience comments. Richard Gyuro, 810 Chetco Ave, Brookings, spoke as a prior smoker, but now a 40 year non-smoker, would definitely support the idea of our city looking into this ordinance. He stated "we" as tax payers pay for this eventually and in the interest of the community, the Council needs to at least look into the issues.

After thanking the students for their hard work, Mayor Hagbom summarized the discussion and asked staff to proceed on an ordinance for Council to consider.

IV. PUBLIC HEARING

Mayor Hagbom recognized Finance Director/Recorder Gail Hedding's new appointment to the Board of Trustees of Sutter Coast Hospital. Hedding thanked the Mayor and stated she is looking forward to making a contribution to the health care delivery system that serves the citizens of this area.

A. 2000/2001 Fiscal Year Budget

Finance Director/Recorder Gail Hedding reported that the budget committee had approved the budget on April 26, 2000, and tonight was the time for the Council to hold the 2000/2001 Fiscal Year public hearing on the proposed budget.

Mayor Hagbom recessed the Common Council meeting at 7:30PM.

Mayor Hagbom called the Public Hearing to order at 7:30PM.

There was no comment from the staff or council present. Hagbom asked for audience comments.

Richard Calkins, 941 Helen Lane, Brookings, asked what was the line item for the City Manager's salary and shared his concerns for providing an adequate salary for attracting the best possible new City Manager. Hedding provided answers for

his questions, and will send him a copy of the approved minutes from the recent meeting regarding City Manager recruitment.

Russ Crabtree, 920 Midland, Brookings and Ken Byrtus, 320 Mill Beach Road, Brookings, spoke supporting the Klamath Coalition. They asked the Council to expand the City's participation to support these activities. Byrtus added "in kind" services would gladly be accepted for the Port's "Kite Festival" in July. Discussion ensued, with the Council stating they would taking the request in consideration.

Don Nuss, 808 Pioneer Rd, Brookings, thanked Mayor Hagbom on his comments regarding the \$20,000, set aside for downtown. He asked to be able to address optional changes in the bed tax contract with the Chamber coming up for renewal in August, 2000. Hagbom noted there had been conversation regarding reviewing the contract with the Chamber in relation to the bed tax, and no rate increase had been discussed, but this could be part of the review.

Pedro Alaniz, 950 Kinwood St, Florence, Oregon, spoke regarding a liquor license application and was advised it would be further along on the agenda.

B. Proposed Uses of State Revenue Sharing Funds
Mayor Hagbom asked Finance Director/Recorder Gail Hedding to explain the
proposed use of State Revenue sharing dollars. Having done so, Mayor Hagbom
asked for comments or questions from the public and Council. There were none.
Hedding advised the matter would return for the June 12, 2000, meeting for final
adoption.

The Public Hearing was closed at 7:53 PM.

The Common Council meeting reconvened at 7:53PM.

VI. ORAL REQUESTS AND COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE AUDIENCE

- A. Committee and Liaison reports
 - 1. Chamber of Commerce
 Chamber President Richard Gyuro, 810 Chetco Ave, presented the Mayor

with a new Azalea Festival T-shirt, carrying the motto of this year's theme of "Sandcastle Days... Lighthouse Nights and a picture of a "registered" lighthouse. He proceeded with a report on the upcoming festival status.

2. Businesses for a Better Brookings
There was no report.

3. Port of Brookings-Harbor

Port Manager Russ Crabtree, 920 Midland Way, Brookings reported on the current and future projects at the Port of Brookings Harbor. He stated the Port of Brookings Harbor prides itself in being progressive, providing 32 jobs, and supports the need for a paid economic development director. The Curry Economic Development Association provides seed capitol locally and is self perpetuating. Crabtree then gave an update on the boat basin project with mid-summer as target date. Permits have been extended until June 30th, so as to have completion in a legal, timely manner. He stated he sees many future plans which will help the economic development of the community and lead to an all events center, which is currently on the drawing board.

4. Council Liaisons

Councilor Johns reported on the Azalea Middle School Character Education program.

Councilor Pepper reported on the Parks and Recreation Commission meeting and activities.

Councilor Curry advised he had attended the Coos-Curry-Douglas Economic Development Corporation's annual board meeting and had passed the balanced budget, elected officers, and accepted new members.

Mayor Hagbom reported about the county's lack of participation in SWACT. To support their resolution to support SWACT, the County has appointed Dan Crumley (County Road Master, as Robert's alternates).

Mayor Hagbom acknowledged audience member Assistant District Manager of ODOT District 7 Lee Sparks and thanked him for the work ODOT had accomplished regarding the crosswalk downtown by the Redwood Theater, along with highway signing efforts and safety issues on the south-end of the Chetco River bridge.

B. Unscheduled

Richard Caulkins, 941 Helen Ln, Brookings spoke in reference to his personal experience involving traffic and the significance of a speed change north of town on U.S. Hwy 101. He asked the Council for procedures to move the speed limit changed further down the road some 300 yards.

Lee Sparks, 3500 Stewart Parkway, Roseburg advised there is a current request to ODOT for moving the 45mph sign in process, but due to requirements of official engineering stamps and other minor red-tape procedures, it has not been completed. However, all the concerns mentioned tonight are in the requested issue. Councilor Pepper reminded the Council and advised Sparks, two years previously the City had asked ODOT to study the speed limits coming into the City of Brookings as issues to consider. However, the request was not official. Sparks advised he would check into the status of the left turn pocket north of town.

VII. STAFF REPORTS

- A. Fire Department
 - Cape Ferrelo RFPD request for contract negotiations
 Fire Chief William Sharp presented a request for contract negotiations with Cape Ferrelo RFPD and asked for authorization to explore the possibilities.

Councilor Pepper moved, Councilor Johns, seconded, and the Council voted unanimously to authorize staff to meet with Cape Ferrelo RFPD representatives to explore 1) Should the City contract with Cape Ferrelo RFPD for services, and if yes, 2) what should be in the contract?

Sharp advised he will return to the Council with recommendations in a timely manner.

B. City Manager

- Approval of golf course loan
 City Manager Weldon advised he did not have all the necessary papers for this matter, and recommended the Council not take action at this meeting.

 He will have it ready for the next meeting.
- 2. Parks and Recreation Commission recommendation
 City Manager Weldon reported that the Parks and Recreation Commission
 asked for a change in City Ordinance No. 93-0-482.A, regarding the
 length of time an elected officer can hold that position.

Councilor Pepper moved, Councilor Johns seconded, and the Council voted unanimously to direct the City Manager to prepare an ordinance to eliminate term limits for the Parks and Recreation Commission.

3. Approval of liquor license request for <u>La Flor de Mexico Restaurant</u> - Pedro Alaniz

City Manager Weldon recommended the approval of a new liquor license for the new owners of a Mexican restaurant downtown - La Flor De Mexico, Inc. He advised the owner was present to answer any questions. There was no discussion.

Councilor Pepper moved, Councilor Johns seconded, and the Council voted unanimously to approve the liquor license request for La Flor de Mexico Restaurant.

4. Curry Transfer and Recycling rate increase
City Manager Weldon acquainted the Council with Curry Transfer and
Recycling's rate increase requests provided in the Council packets, and
recommended the Council approve the resolution. Manager Pete Smart
was present for questions. There was no discussion.

Councilor Pepper moved, Councilor Johns seconded, and the Council voted unanimously to approve Resolution No. 00-R-673, along with the attached "Exhibit A", in the matter of approving rates for sanitation services to be charged by Curry Transfer and Recycling to customers in the City of Brookings.

The City of Brookings ordains as follows:

Section 1. Title. This ordinance shall be known as the Sale of Tobacco to Minors Ordinance.

Section 2. Purpose. The City Council finds that youth addiction to tobacco products is a public health problem with grave health consequences. More than half of all smokers begin smoking before the age of 14, and 90% begin by the age of 19. The average age of first use of tobacco products is now 11 to 15 years of age. In recognition of the Surgeon General's conclusion that nicotine is as addictive as cocaine or heroin, action is needed to curtail the easy access of minors to cigarettes and other tobacco products. Therefore, the purpose of this ordinance is to implement a strict and enforceable system to prevent the illegal sale of and access to cigarettes and other tobacco products to minors.

Section 3. Definitions

- 1. "License" means a license issued by the City of Brookings for the retail sale of tobacco products.
- 2. "Licensee" means the holder of a valid license for the retail sale of tobacco products.
- 3. "Minor" means any person under 18 years of age.
- 4. "Self-Service Displays" means open displays of tobacco products and point-of-sale tobacco promotional products that the public has access to without the intervention of a store employee.
- 5. "Tobacco Product" means any tobacco cigarette, cigar, pipe tobacco, smokeless tobacco or any other form of tobacco or tobacco papers which may be utilized for smoking, chewing, inhalation or other means of ingestion.
- 6. "Tobacco Vending Machine: means any machine or device designated for or used for the vending of cigarettes, cigars, tobacco, or tobacco products upon the insertion of coins, trade checks, or slugs.
- 7. "Vendor-assisted" means only a store employee has access to the tobacco product and assists the customer by supplying the product. The customer does not take possession of the product until after it is purchased.

Section 5. Fee. \$20 per year.

Section 6. Non-Transferability. A tobacco retail license is non-transferable, except a new license, with no fee required, will be issued to a tobacco retailer who changes location.

<u>Section 7. Vending Machines.</u> After ___(date)____, tobacco vending machines or any other devices for the sale or distribution of tobacco products are prohibited in any hotel/motel.

<u>Section 8. Vendor-Assisted Sales.</u> It shall be unlawful for any person, business, or retailer to sell, permit to be sold, or offer for sale any tobacco product by means of self-service displays or any other means other than vendor assisted sales or a vending machine, where authorized by law.

Section 9. Revocation of License.

- A. Any license holder who violates Section 8 of this ordinance shall be fined and have their license suspended as follows:
 - 1. In the case of a first violation, the licensee shall be fined up to two hundred dollars (\$200) and shall be notified in writing of penalties levied for further violations.
 - 2. In the case of a second violation in a two year period, the licensee shall be fined up to five hundred dollars (\$500) and the license shall be suspended for not less than thirty (30) consecutive days nor more than three (3) months. Licensee must remove all tobacco merchandise from all areas accessible to the public while the license is suspended.
 - 3. In the case of three or more violations within a two year period, the licensee shall be fined up to one thousand dollars (\$1,000) and the license shall be revoked not less than six (6) months nor more than eighteen (18) months from the date of revocation. Licensee must remove all tobacco merchandise from all areas accessible to the public while the license is suspended.

<u>Section 10.</u> Advertising placement. No tobacco product advertising shall be placed below thirty-six (36) inches, as measured from the establishment's natural floor.

Section 11. Enforcement. Violations of Section 4 and 7 of this ordinance are subject to a fine of \$500 per day for each violation. The City Attorney or City Manager and the Police Department shall have the authority to enforce this ordinance.

Section 12. Severability. If any provision, clause, sentence or paragraph of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be held to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the provisions of this article which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions are declared to be severable.





The parties intend that this assignment will be a present transfer to Lender of all of Borrower's rights under the Lease, subject to Borrower's rights to use the Premises and enjoy the benefits of the Lease while not in default on the Loan or Lease. Specifically, as examples and without limiting the generality of the foregoing, this consent is subject to the following:

- 1. It is hereby acknowledged that this Leasehold Trust Deed and the interests created hereby shall specifically be subordinate to the Lessor under the Lease Agreement.
- 2. The Trustee under the Leasehold Deed Trust shall notify Lessor of any and all defaults on the part of Trustor.


