BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The city has long had the policy that all businesses within the zones listed above shall be conducted from a structure placed on a permanent foundation unless they were specifically exempt by the provisions of this code or other city ordinances. The purpose of this policy is to ensure that development in these zones meets certain standards of visual impact and to prevent the use of modular units setting on blocks as store fronts or manufacturing facilities. This amend the Land Development Code to formalize this policy and thus make it easier to understand and to enforce. Staff is recommending the following wording changes to each section.

Section 36, Professional Office Space (PO-1) District.

Amend Section 36.100 to read:

- A. Site plan approval required as provided in Section 80.
- B. All businesses shall be conducted from a structure placed on a permanent foundation unless specifically exempted by the provisions of this or other city ordinances.

Section 44, Neighborhood Commercial (C-1) District.

Amend Section 44.080 to read

D. All businesses shall be conducted from a structure placed on a permanent foundation unless specifically exempted by the provisions of this or other city ordinances.

Section 48, Shopping Center Commercial (C-2) District.

Amend Section 48.080 to read:

D. All businesses shall be conducted from a structure placed on a permanent foundation unless specifically exempted by the provisions of this or other city ordinances.

Section 52, General Commercial (C-3) District.

Amend Section 52.080 to read:

D. All businesses shall be conducted from a structure placed on a permanent foundation unless specifically exempted by the provisions of this or other city ordinances.

Section 56, Tourist Commercial (C-4) District.

Amend Section 56.080 to read:

D. All businesses shall be conducted from a structure placed on a permanent foundation unless specifically exempted by the provisions of this or other city ordinances.

Section 64, Industrial Park (I-P) District.

Amend Section 64.080 to read:

BACKGROUND:

The city has experienced two slides which we had to pay for this fiscal year and, coupled with the Ransom Street pedestrian facilities project, we had not planned to do asphalt overlays this fiscal year.

We have closely monitored the deterioration of Fifth Street and feel that we should not wait to do the project as it's becoming a safety issue.

We have similar issues on Railroad Avenue and Mill Beach Road. There is also a need to prep and pave on Cove Street and Wharf Street as there is a gap between the asphalt and curb that needs to be paved and, due to the liability, we need to have the paving done now. We also need to do an overlay on Ross Road which is not as critical but needs urgent attention.

One third of Measure 66 is designed to provide funds for Curry County and to build a campus facility in Brookings, 20 -25, 000 sq ft, including offices for students and staff, a book store, class rooms including multimedia, art, computer labs, and mechanic's facilities. The balance of Measure 66 funding will include adding to the Coos Bay facility. A brief discussion and comments ensued by the Council and Ex-Officio Councilors Thom and Peterson.

Councilor Johns moved, Councilor Ciapusci seconded, and the Council voted unanimously to support Bond Measure 66.

ORAL REQUESTS AND COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE AUDIENCE VII.Committee and Liaison reports

- - Chamber of Commerce 1. Chamber President Richard Gyuro of 810 Chetco Ave, Brookings reported to the Council of the Chamber's vote to unanimously support Bond Measure 66 at their March 15, 2000, board meeting. He stated the board saw this support as not only an opportunity to have our students stay in area but to promote a high interest in high tech businesses.
 - 2. Businesses for a Better Brookings Vice President Augie Kofoet advised there was no report.

Council Liaisons Councilor Frances Johns advised she attended the Citizens Advisory Commission to the Pelican Bay Prison last week, and shared information from the prison's "Community Connections Magazine", which discussed a new teen program called "ROCK". Johns continues her work with the Census, advising forms can be secured from the Chetco Senior Center,

Councilor George Ciapusci attended the regular Planning Commission meeting on April 4, which involved two public hearings: an amendment to the LDC and one county referral.

Councilor Larry Curry reported he had attended the community agencies meeting held last Wednesday at the Chetco Senior Center and was disappointed in the turnout. He hoped for better attendance at the next meeting to be held May 3, 2000.

Ex-Officio Councilor Cindi Peterson reported on the success of the girls softball team, having won all their games to date.

Ex-Officio Councilor Shiloh Thom gave a brief scenario of the Sophomore Class' recent talent show fund raising event and that other such events are occurring for local causes.

B. Unscheduled

Don Nuss, 808 Pioneer, Brookings, asked for clarification of the agenda item No. VIII.A.1 - Review of Ethics Guide for Public Officials. Mayor Hagbom explained that item would not be addressed tonight as the City Attorney was not here, but be continued to the next meeting.

Richard Calkins, 941 Helen Ln, Brookings expressed his support for City Council and their hard work, especially with the golf course work. However he stated he missed the Chetco Vision Action Team (CVAT), asking for the group to be reactivated for the purposes of increasing the growth rate for Brookings, of which he asked for clarification. Mayor Hagbom and City Manager Weldon responded that the Mayor's comments, reported in the Pilot, were speculative as to what could happen with growth here. Calkins provided the Council with prepared growth charts of the city.

General Manager Pete Pavich of the Salmon Run Golf and Wilderness Preserve, 99040 South Bank Chetco River Road requested the Council to authorize repainting the signs at each entrance to the City. He suggested a change to have them read "Welcome to Brookings ~ Home of winter flowers and Salmon Run Golf and Wilderness Preserve", and have a picture of their signature golf hole (4th hole) take up the majority of the space on the sign. Pavich stated Salmon Run would be willing to pay to have the signs redone in this manner. He also stated the community would benefit from the travelers noting the golf course and to staying longer and spend more money in our City's businesses. Mayor Hagbom asked the City Manager to put the request on the next Council agenda

Councilor Ciapusci made note of the signature hole photo behind the Mayor in the Council Chambers. The Council was positive on the idea.
