BACKGROUND INFORMATION

At their August 3, 1999 regular meeting the Planning Commission heard this city initiated amendment to the provisions of the Land Development Code. After much testimony concerning the provision to allow placing a wireless telecommunication facility on a tower operated by a public entity in the P/OS (Public Open Space) Zone, the commission, on a 4 to 1 vote recommended approval of the amendments with the following changes:

- Remove the C-3 (General Commercial) zone from those which allow these facilities.
- In Section 168.050.B, Abandoned Towers, the Planning Commission recommended that they be the authority to allow an extension of time to remove an abandoned tower.
- To include wording in Section 168.040 to address the maximum height of the tower. (This is addressed in both the attached staff report and in the proposed ordinance.)
- To include wording in Section 168.040.E to require sight obscuring fencing.

 (This is addressed in both the attached staff report and in the proposed ordinance.)
- Address who is responsible for the removal of an abandoned tower and explore the
 possibility of pre-bonding for the removal of the tower.
 (The phrase "by the operator" has been added to Section 168.050.B. Staff has discussed the

concept of pre-bonding for the removal of an abandoned tower with the City Attorney. He indicated that while this may be desirable, it may not be particularly workable. He raised the question of who would write such a bond, what would be the life of the bond, and would the amount of the bond be sufficient after a ten or twenty year period?

The Planning Commission Staff Report is attached to this report. All of the changes to the staff report resulting from recommendations of the Commission are in *italics*. The attached ordinance (99-0-446.GG) has been written to reflect the changes recommended by the Planning Commission. In the event the Council desires to keep the C-3 Zone as a location for these facilities, staff has also prepared an ordinance to that effect.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In recent months there has been increased interest in placing a wireless telecommunications facility in the city. In response to this the city has attempted to accommodate this interest within the bounds of the existing ordinances. The attempt by the City to construct a new 150 foot 911 tower and to place a cellular facility on that tower has been appealed to LUBA, *Vern Garvin v. City of Brookings*, LUBA No. 99-075. A conditional use permit for a cellular facility was denied because the existing ordinances do not specifically define telecommunication towers and only allowed antennas and aerials to 60 feet in height. Recognizing that more applications for cellular facilities would be submitted in the future, the city staff, with the advise of the City Attorney, began the process of creating a wireless telecommunications ordinance for the city.

The staff has created the following ordinance to be included in the Land Development Code as Section 168, Wireless Telecommunication Facilities. The City Attorney has reviewed and made recommendations as the work proceeded. The following is the draft ordinance.

Staff is also recommending that Sections 52, General Commercial; 64; Industrial Park; and 68, General Industrial, be amended to allow wireless telecommunications as a conditional use pursuant to Section 168. Staff is also recommending the Section 40, Public Open Space, be amended to allow wireless telecommunications facilities as a permitted use, pursuant to Section 168, in conjunction with a tower operated by a public entity.

SECTION 168 WIRELESS TELECOMMUNICATIONS FACILITIES

Sections

Section 168.010 Purpose
Section 168.020 Definitions
Section 168.030 Application

Section 168.010 <u>Purpose</u>. The purpose of this section is to provide criteria to regulate the siting and operation of Wireless Telecommunication facilities within the City of Brookings, that meet the provisions of federal law and do not unreasonably discriminate among wireless telecommunications providers.

Section 168.020 Definitions. For the purposes of this section the following definitions will apply:

Antenna. A device commonly in the form of a metal rod, wire panel or dish, for transmitting or receiving electromagnetic radiation. An antenna is typically mounted on a supporting tower, pole, mast or building.

<u>Collocation</u>. The placement of two or more antenna systems or platforms by separate FCC license holders ("providers") on a structure such as a tower, building, water tank or utility pole.

<u>Stealth Capabilities</u>. The use of camouflage techniques to disguise or minimize the visual impact of a tower or antennas (i.e., located in conjunction with a church, steeple, stadium lighting, made to look like a tree or flag-pole, etc.)

<u>Wireless Telecommunication</u>. The transmission, via radio frequency electromagnetic waves, between or among points specified by the user, of information of the user's choosing, without change in the form or content of the information as sent and received.

<u>Wireless Telecommunication Facility</u>. An unmanned facility for the transmission and reception of radio frequency (RF) signals; usually consisting of an equipment shelter, cabinet or other enclosed structure containing electronic equipment, a support structure (tower), antennas or other, transmission and reception devices.

<u>Wireless Telecommunication Provider</u>. A person or company in the business of offering telecommunications for a fee directly to the public, or to such classes of users as to be effectively available directly to the public, regardless of the facilities used.

<u>Wireless Telecommunications Tower</u>. Means a structure more than ten feet tall, built primarily to support one or more telecommunications antennas.

Section 168.030 Application.

An application for a Wireless Telecommunications Tower shall be made and processed pursuant to Section 140, Conditional Use Permit, of this code, except when in the Public Open Space Zone as allowed in Section 40, Public Open Space (P/OS) District, of this code.

Section 168.040 Siting Requirements.

- A. Height. The maximum tower height shall not exceed 100 feet from the finished grade at the base of the tower.
- B. Front, side and rear yard setbacks. Front and yard setbacks shall be determined by the underlying zone in which the tower is to be placed.
- C. Construction: All new wireless telecommunication towers shall be of a monopole structure. Where possible new towers will be located in such a manner that they blend in with the background around them.

If the new wireless telecommunications facility is to be collocated on an existing non-monopole tower, the design of any antenna(s), accessory structures or equipment shall, to the extent possible, use materials colors and textures that will match the existing tower structure to which the equipment of the collocating provider is being attached.

- D. Collocation. New towers shall be constructed so as to allow at least two or more users to collocate on the facility. If collocation is not possible, all applications shall include findings which demonstrate why it is not possible.
- E. Fencing and security. For security purposes, towers and accessory facilities shall be enclosed by a minimum eight-foot (8') sight obscuring fence.
- F. Lighting. No lighting shall be permitted on a tower except as required by the F.A.A.
- G. Advertising/Signs. No advertising or signs of any type are to be placed on the tower at any time except those required or necessary for safety and warnings.
- H. Landscaping. All sites shall be landscaped pursuant to the requirements of the underlying zone. Towers located in the C-3 (General Commercial), P/OS (Public Open Space) and I-P (Industrial-Park) zones will also include site obscuring landscaping around the security fence. The Planning Commission may require additional landscaping as a condition of approval.

Section 168.050 Abandoned Towers

A. Wireless telecommunication towers that do not have functioning antennas for a period of six (6) months shall be considered to be abandoned and shall be removed by the operator within 60 days thereafter. (The Commission asked staff to explore the concept of a bond or other mechanism to pay for removal if necessary)

B. Upon written application, prior to the expiration of the six month period, the Planning Director? Planning Commission? City Council? may, in writing, grant a six-month time extension for reuse of the facility. Additional extensions beyond the first six-month extension may be granted by the Planning Director subject to any conditions required to bring the project or facility into compliance with current regulation(s) and make it compatible with surrounding development.

Section 168.060 Severability.

That the terms and provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed to be severable and that if the validity of any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance should be declared to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of any other section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance.

Issue:

Extension of City's Cable TV franchise with Falcon Cable

Background:

- 1. Our franchise extension with Falcon will expire October 9, 1999.
- 2. Nancy Brendlinger, Council Liaison to the Falcon Cable TV Negotiations and I have been working with Curry County officials and our joint consultant on this matter in developing a proposed new franchise.
- 3. That proposed new franchise is still a "work in progress", that is, it is not finished.
- 4. We have agreed with Falcon Cable to extend the franchise 60 days.
- 5. Curry County has also been asked and will approve extending their franchise.

AGREEMENT TO EXTEND THE FALCON CABLE TV FRANCHISE IN THE CITY OF BROOKINGS

This agreement is entered into by and between the City of Brookings, a Political Subdivision of the State of Oregon, and Falcon Cable TV, as follows:

WHEREAS, the extension of the non-exclusive franchise agreement granted by the City of Brookings to Falcon Cable TV for cable television installation, construction, operation, and maintenance of a cable television system in the City of Brookings expires October 9, 1999; and

WHEREAS, to allow additional time for the negotiation of a new franchise, the Council deems it in the public interest to extend the current franchise for a period of 60 days;

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY AGREED by and between the parties that the franchise agreement between them embodied by Ordinance No. 83-O-380 as amended by Ordinance No. 420, a copy of which is attached, be continued on the same terms and conditions until December 9, 1999.

Issue:

Replacement of Chief's Vehicle

Background:

Several years ago the Brookings Firefighters Association purchased a 1980 Chevy Blazer from Crescent Fire Protection District for use by the Fire Chief as a response vehicle and transportation. That vehicle cost the Fire fighters Association \$1,000. We fixed up this used vehicle and got several years use out of it. Recently the engine in the vehicle started to give us some problems. We had the truck checked out and the engine is not worth repairing. The truck has extensive rust and steering and suspension problems which limits its use as an emergency response vehicle. In short, the truck has worn out its use to us and needs to be replaced. This vehicle is now unsafe and consequently I am using my own vehicle and the quick response truck.

The Fire Department has currently budgeted funds that could be utilized for a lease purchase of a vehicle. This money was originally budgeted to purchase a hydraulic ram (part of the "JAWS: equipment), but because of the recent deterioration of this Chief's vehicle, replacing it is now a higher priority. We could put this \$10,000 down and pay off the balance over a couple of years.

I have checked with auto dealers and found some good options whereby we could lease purchase a vehicle with yearly payments for up to three years and own the vehicle at the end of the lease period.

Recommendation:

Authorize Fire chief to develop information on replacing this 1980 Chevy Blazer with either a new vehicle or a newer used vehicle.

Councilor George Ciapusci attended the Brookings Planning Commission September 7th and provided an overview of the meeting, which included one county referral recommended for approval.

Councilor Frances Johns attended the HOPE conference, which included James Fullbright, an excellent speaker on building programs working with youth and community; a follow-up meeting for the school district; and has attended the S.A.Y. committee (Swim All Year) meetings most every week, which have included important financial information from the City's Finance Director Gail Hedding and information on covering the pool at Best Western Inn from John Zia. An architect from Medford specializing in covering pools will be attending the next SAY meeting.

Councilor Keith Pepper met with the Parks and Recreations
Commission and reported the sidewalk project at Azalea Park is
almost completed. He will be attending the Harbor Sanitation
Meeting tomorrow. Councilor Pepper reported the Canopy Project
had won top honors in an annual national competition sponsored by
the American Society of Landscape Architects. He stated the
architecture and engineering study of the Portico Group of Seattle,
the Canopy Project, Inc. board and Egret Communications won the
honors award, which is the highest possible in the planning and
Analysis category.

Mayor Bob Hagbom reviewed the meetings he had attended for the Chetco and County Watershed Council and shared Brookings' long range plan to those committees.

B. Unscheduled

City Manager Tom Weldon introduced the President and Director of the Brookings Harbor Youth Association, who presented a packet of information regarding the organization's liability insurance renewal status. Dana Jensen, President thanked the Council for their continued support throughout the year, and proceeded to explain their insurance renewal process and proposal from Murray Insurance Services, Inc. of Gold Beach. She and Director, Heather Weckler, requested the Council to assist the

youth association with paying their liability and property package insurance renewal premium for the Youth Center building located at 632 Hemlock Street in the amount of \$1,243.00, due September 25, 1999. After further information and discussion, Weldon recommended the Council pay \$1243 through the City's local agency, Cal/Or Insurance.

Councilor Pepper moved, Councilor Johns seconded, and the Council voted unanimously to add the request to pay the Brookings-Harbor Youth Association's Insurance Renewal Premium to the agenda.

Councilor Pepper moved, Councilor Ciapusci seconded, and the Council voted unanimously to pay \$1,243 to Cal/Or Insurance Specialists, Inc., for the Brookings-Harbor Youth Association's liability and property package insurance renewal premium.

VIII. STAFF REPORTS

 - Awarding bid for sidewalk improvements Wharf & Cove Streets at new Public Works Yard
 Community Development Director Leo Lightle explained the awarding of the bid for sidewalk improvements on Wharf and Cove Streets at the new Public Works Yard. He recommended the City Council award the contract to Ron Bodman Construction in the amount of \$6,825.00 and authorize the City Manager to sign the Agreement and the Notice to Proceed.

Councilor Johns moved, Councilor Pepper seconded, and the Council voted unanimously to award the sidewalk improvements of Wharf and Cove Streets at the new Public Works Yard to Ron Bodman Construction in the amount of \$6,825.00.

Director Leo Lightle presented the results of the bid for the Old

and Tidewater Contractors were the low bidder. Lightle
recommended the City Council authorize awarding the contract for

3. Acceptance of dedication deed

Director Lightle explained as a condition of approval of a construction project, specifically Azalea Reach, the City has received a dedication deed for an additional 10' strip of right-of-way along the northerly side of Lundeen Lane. This is an incremental step in bringing Lundeen Lane to full City standards. He recommended the acceptance of the deed.

Councilor Pepper moved, Councilor Johns seconded, and the Council voted unanimously to accept the deed for an additional 10' strip of right-of-way along the northerly side of Lundeen Lane, with direction to staff to have the deed recorded.

Mayor Hagbom discussed the successful opening ceremonies of Azalea Reach and possible referrals from other grant funded agencies. He stated "Azalea Reach" directed many compliments publicly regarding the cooperation of City staff.

4. Awarding Water Management & Conservation Plan proposal-H.G.E., Inc.

Community Development Director Lightle explained the background and his department's and the interview team's request to authorize the hiring of HGE as the consultant to create the Water Management and Conservation Plan. He noted his appreciation of the press/media expressing the Mayor's comments regarding this issue, so that the public agencies could understand the City's position and desire for cooperation between all. Mayor Hagbom reminded the Council this survey is mandated by the State of Oregon for all water districts to develop, present, and comply with their own water management plan.

Councilor Curry moved, Councilor Johns seconded, and the Council voted unanimously to hire HGE, Inc. as the consultant to create a Water Management and Conservation Plan for the City.

1. By a 5-0 vote (motion: Commissioner Krebs, second: Commissioner Freeman) the Planning Commission approved the Final ORDERS and Findings of Fact for File No. CUP-2-99 with the following changes in the "Conclusions" section:

Telecommunications towers or "towers" are not specifically allowed as a permitted or conditional use in any of the zones with the city except the P/OS (Public Open Space) Zone. Nor are towers defined within Section 8, <u>Definitions</u>, of the Land Development Code. Section 132.030, <u>Exceptions to height regulations</u>, of the Land Development Code does not specifically list communication towers. Since the I-P Zone will only allow a aerial, mast or antenna up to a height of 60 feet, the proposed 100 foot communication tower is not consistent with the provisions of the I-P Zone nor with those of Section 132.030.

- By a 5-0 vote (motion: Commissioner Breuer, second: Commissioner Krebs) the Planning Commission approved the Final ORDERS and Findings of Fact for File No. VAR-2-99 as written.
- 7. By a 4-1 vote (motion: Commissioner Krebs, second: Commissioner Freeman; voting for Commissioners Krebs, Smith, Dentino and Freeman; opposing: Commissioner Breuer) the Planning Commission voted to send a favorable recommendation to the City Council on (File No. LDC-5-99) an amendment to the City's Land Development Code to add Section 108, titled Wireless Communications Facilities; city initiated. The favorable recommendation will include changes to the staff recommended wording to:
 - 1. remove the C-3 General Commercial, Section 52, from this ordinance.
 - 2. include wording in Section 108.040.A to address the maximum height of the tower.
 - 3. include wording in Section 108.040.E to require the fencing to be site obscuring.
 - 4. address the responsibility of who and explore the cost of removing an abandoned tower and explore pre-bonding of the tower in Section 108.050.
 - 5. bring any extensions of the 6-month abandoned tower clause (Section 108.50.B) before the Planning Commission for action.

This vote was taken after an amended motion made by Commissioner Smith and seconded by Commissioner Breuer was defeated (vote 3-2 against; voting for: Commissioners Breuer and Smith; voting against: Commissioners Dentino, Freeman, and Krebs). The amended motion would have eliminated the tower height restriction in Section 108.040.A and cause tower height to be considered at the hearing for a conditional use permit for a tower. The amended motion also eliminated the sentence in Section 108.040.C stating that all new wireless telecommunication towers shall be of a monopole structure. After discussion of the amended motion Commissioner Smith further amended the motion to state that all new wireless telecommunication towers shall be of a self-supporting structure. This amendment was seconded by Commissioner Breuer.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING DIRECTOR

- 1. Planning Director Bischoff reported that although Dr. Chickenell had made some progress on the landscaping at this dental office it was not complete.
- 2. Landscaping along the west side of the Subway Sandwich Shop is completed. The back boundary has been cleaned out but it has not been landscaped. The ordinance only requires landscaping equivalent to 7% of the parking area and they may have met this requirement. Director Bischoff will discuss further plans with them.
- 3. The new Building Official will be contacting the owner at Railroad and Alder streets to clean up the accessory buildings there.
- 4. In September the Oregon Planning Institute will hold their annual conference in Eugene. Again there is no Planning Commission training held in conjunction with the Planners' meetings.

PROPOSITIONS AND REMARKS FROM COMMISSION MEMBERS

1. Commissioner Freeman noticed they have removed some of the stacked soil from the old

Union 76 station lot. This is soil that is being cleaned after a spill while removing the old tanks from the property.

- 2. Commissioner Krebs again asked whether outside lube bays are legal as these are being used in an area behind the dirt piles. These were formerly behind the old station building which was removed. Staff has not seen them being used but will check into it.
- 3. The Commissioners voted unanimously that staff should notify Dr. Chickenell that his conditional use permit will be revisited at the September 7, 1999, meeting (motion: Commissioner Freeman, second: Commissioner Breuer).
- 4. Commissioner Krebs questioned that since the city water department had a water use restriction in July, should there be a notice on all Final ORDERS and Findings of Fact similar to that for wastewater. Director Bischoff said he would speak with the Community Development Director regarding this.
- 5. At the Lea Building at Pacific and Railroad streets there is congestion caused by cars parked too near the corner. Staff will look into having the curbs here painted yellow signifying no parking.
- 6. Parking at an adult foster home is causing problems at the intersection of Oak and Railroad streets. Commissioner Krebs noted that at noon time six to eight cars are parked in front of the facility, all parked so as to necessitate backing onto Railroad Street to leave the facility. This site had been granted a conditional use permit to operate an assisted living facility in August, 1997, but the permit lapsed as the project never got underway. The same principals are operating the adult foster home and had been notified earlier in the day that they need a business license and a sign permit for a newly erected sign posted in the yard.
- 7. Commissioner Krebs thanked Commissioner Smith for bringing in copies of an article he found about camouflaging communications towers.
- 8. Commissioner Krebs also reminded all Commissioners about the joint Planning Commission/City Council meeting of August 17 regarding the Public Facilities and Services Plan. The meeting will begin at 7:00 p.m. in the Council Chambers. The final draft document has been received and copies will be distributed this week.

The city of Brookings ordains as follows:

Section 1. Addition of Section 168, Section 168 is hereby added to Ordinance No. 89-O-446 to read as follows:

Name: SECTION 168, WIRELESS TELECOMMUNICATIONS FACILITIES

168 Sections

168.010	Purpose.

168.010 Purpose.

The purpose of this section is to provide criteria to regulate the siting and operation of wireless telecommunication facilities within the City of Brookings, that meet the provisions of federal law and do not unreasonably discriminate among wireless telecommunications providers.

Antenna. A device commonly in the form of a metal rod, wire panel or dish, for transmitting or receiving electromagnetic radiation. An antenna is typically mounted on a supporting tower, pole, mast or building.

<u>Collocation</u>. The placement of two or more antenna systems or platforms by separate FCC license holders ("providers") on a structure such as a tower, building, water tank or utility pole.

Stealth Capabilities. The use of camouflage techniques to disguise or minimize the visual impact of a tower or antennas (i.e., located in conjunction with a church, steeple, stadium lighting, made to look like a tree or flag-pole, etc.)

<u>Wireless Telecommunication</u>. The transmission, via radio frequency electromagnetic waves, between or among points specified by the user, of information of the user's choosing, without change in the form or content of the information as sent and received.

Wireless Telecommunication Facility. An unmanned facility for the transmission and reception of radio frequency (RF) signals; usually consisting of an equipment shelter, cabinet or other enclosed structure containing electronic equipment, a support structure (tower), antennas or other, transmission and reception devices.

Wireless Telecommunication Provider. A person or company in the business of offering telecommunications for a fee directly to the public, or to such classes of users as to be effectively available directly to the public, regardless of the facilities used.

Wireless Telecommunications Tower. Means a structure more than ten feet tall, built primarily to support one or more telecommunications antennas.

Section 168.030 Application.

An application for a Wireless Telecommunications Tower shall be made and processed pursuant to Section 140, Conditional Use Permit, of this code, except when in the Public Open Space Zone as allowed in Section 40, Public Open Space (P/OS) District, of this code.

Section 168.040 Siting Requirements.

- A. Height. The maximum tower height shall not exceed 100 feet from the finished grade at the base of the tower.
- B. Front, side and rear yard setbacks. Front and yard setbacks shall be determined by the underlying zone in which the tower is to be placed.
- C. Construction: All new wireless telecommunication towers shall be of a monopole structure. Where possible new towers will be located in such a manner that they blend in with the background around them.

If the new wireless telecommunications facility is to be collocated on an existing non-monopole tower, the design of any antenna(s), accessory

- structures or equipment shall, to the extent possible, use materials colors and textures that will match the existing tower structure to which the equipment of the collocating provider is being attached.
- D. Collocation. New towers shall be constructed so as to allow at least two or more users to collocate on the facility. If collocation is not possible, all applications shall include findings which demonstrate why it is not possible.
- E. Fencing and security. For security purposes, towers and accessory facilities shall be enclosed by a minimum eight-foot (8') sight obscuring fence.
- F. Lighting. No lighting shall be permitted on a tower except as required by the F.A.A.
- G. Advertising/Signs. No advertising or signs of any type are to be placed on the tower at any time except those required or necessary for safety and warnings.
- H. Landscaping. All sites shall be landscaped pursuant to the requirements of the underlying zone. Towers located in the P/OS (Public Open Space) and I-P (Industrial-Park) zones will also include site obscuring landscaping around the security fence. The Planning Commission may require additional landscaping as a condition of approval.

Section 168.050 Abandoned Towers

- A. Wireless telecommunication towers that do not have functioning antennas for a period of six (6) months shall be considered to be abandoned and shall be removed by the operator within 60 days thereafter.
- B. Upon written application, prior to the expiration of the six month period, the Planning Commission may, in writing, grant a six-month time extension for reuse of the facility. Additional extensions beyond the first six-month extension may be granted by the Planning Commission subject to any conditions required to bring the project or facility into compliance with current regulation(s) and make it compatible with surrounding development.

Section 168.060 Severability.

That the terms and provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed to be severable and that if the validity of any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance should be declared to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of any other section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance.

Section 2. <u>Amendment to Section 40</u>, Section 40, Ordinance No. 89-O-446, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 40.020, Permitted uses. The following uses are permitted:

H. Wireless communication facilities, pursuant to Section 168 of this code, in conjunction with an existing tower operated by a public entity.
