

Recommendation:

Background:

This amendment would revise the ordinance which allows the City Manager to enter into contracts up to \$5,000 without prior authorization by the Board (City Council) where emergency conditions exist. The previous limits were \$3,000.

In reality, the state lawmakers recognized that with the inflation of costs raising the limits from \$3,000 to \$5,000 was reasonable so we are asking the City Council to authorize the same increase for the city's purchasing ordinance.

We still have resolutions that are more restrictive than the ordinance which we will bring back to the Council to repeal or amend.

Issue:

Should Council accept the proposed Skateboard/Bike Park goals

Background:

Attached is a copy of the proposed Skateboard/Bike Park goals. The items listed are derived from suggestions given by various people and communities that have built, operated and used such parks. Having 20,000 square feet will allow both beginner's and advanced skater's areas as well as a street course that would include stairs, rails, curbs, benches, etc. These items are a normal part of a bigger, better park and this is ideal - "best." A 10,000 square foot park would not allow everything, but is "minimally acceptable" - that is, it is a lot better than nothing.

The Brookings-Harbor Youth Association agreed to these goals on behalf of the skateboarders and bicyclists, and the Parks and Recreation Commission has agreed to them and recommends you accept them. These goals establish a set of benchmarks for everyone involved in developing a skateboard/bike park. These goals will be used to evaluate proposed permanent sites for such a park.

Recommendation:

The City Council establish the road width of 20 feet with no parking for the first 500 feet beginning at the intersection with Old County Road with the improvement along the northerly portion of the right-of-way.

Rationale:

The city wishes to preserve the Kidtown improvements and to maintain a buffer between the street improvements and Kidtown and to preserve the existing trees.

Background:


The street improvement required by the development by Shelter Resources, Inc. on Lundeen Lane would require removal of several trees and would, when the street is completed, put the improvements within less than five feet of Kidtown (see attached drawings). Drawing A shows full street; Drawing B shows 20 feet travel lanes with no parking either side of the street


When reviewing the improvements staff looked for options to allow a buffering area and a means to keep from removing any more trees than necessary.

In Section 80.040.F, the Land Development Code gives the authority to determine the needed improvements in the Public Open Space Zone to the City Council with input from the Site Plan Committee. Azalea Park is Public Open Space, therefore the Council has authority on the south side of the street to specify improvements. In as much as the north side of Lundeen Lane has to be built to accommodate the improvements on the other side of the street, the city in fact is able to determine the road width on the north side of the project.

Staff met with the developer's representatives and they did not want to negatively impact Kidtown or the park and were willing to work with the city to find an acceptable solution to the problem. The developer is providing parking for their development on their site, therefore they are not concerned about not having parking on the street.

The Park and Recreation Commission met and supports the idea of preserving the trees and buffer area between the improvements and the park area.

STOUT PARK

Gro Lent handed out some written comments from her in regards to Stout Park now and what she would like to see happen to the park. She discussed plants and the maintenance for the future of the park. Section 2. Amendment to Section 3. Section 2 of Ordinance No. 85-0-389 is hereby amended to read in full as follows:

Section 3. Executive Officer. The executive officer of the Board shall be the City manager; and further, said executive officer shall have all the powers and duties as enumerated and set forth for the director, as defined and contained within Oregon Revised Statute chapter 279. The executive officer has full authority and all necessary powers to enter into contracts where emergency conditions require prompt attention, without prior authorization of the Board, up to an amount not to exceed \$5,000.00; however, for any such emergency condition affecting the immediate health, safety or welfare of the city of Brookings or its inhabitants, such stated expenditure limitation shall not pertain.

Section 3. Amendment to Section 5. Section 5 of Ordinance No. 85-0-389 is hereby amended to read in full as follows:

Section 5. Competitive Bids and Exemptions.

Competitive bid exemptions shall be as provided in Oregon Revised Statutes Chapter 279 and Oregon Administrative Rules Chapter 125, Divisions 300 through 360, inclusive, as adopted and effective through June 30, 1998.

Section 2. Amendment to Section 28.

The City of Brookings ordains as follows:

Section 1. Ordinance Identified. This ordinance amends Ordinance No. 89-O-446, enacted April 10, 1989 entitled, the Land Development Code.

Section 2. Amendment to Section 28. Section 28 of Ordinance No. 89-O-446 is hearby amended to read as follows:

Section 28.020. Permitted Uses. The following uses are permitted:

- A. Two-family Dwellings or Duplexes
- B. Multiple-family dwellings and apartment houses
- C. Rooming and boarding houses, and group living.
- D. Single family dwellings, provided the building permit applicant or the applicant's spouse, parent, child or sibling, purchased the property prior to the effective date of this amendment. A single family dwelling may include a manufactured home as defined by ORS 446.003, and subject to Section 28.100 of this code, provided, however, nothing in this subsection abrogates a recorded restrictive covenant which may prohibit the placement of a manufactured home on a given lot. The city has no obligation to identify, investigate or enforce any such restrictive covenant.
