



The above gives us an approximate cost of \$18.00/Per Student which is a small price to pay for the safety and well being of a child.

The tricycles are of a quality that should last for several years. The store fronts can be touched up and more can be added as we get more sponsors. The paints, properly stored,

will also last several years. We will be adding a turn signal to our traffic light and Jeff will be working on different wiring to allow sequencing of the signals. These can also be used for the Bicycle Safety Fair during the competitions.

Due to emergencies several agencies were unable to be present but did send materials which allowed us to proceed with a training session - Coos Curry Electric and U.S. Forest Service. A program such as this must be flexible due to the nature of the instruction.

We have two goals for 1999. The first being able to have four different sessions during the summer which would allow us to target at least half of the incoming kindergartners. The second goal is obtaining an area (with adjoining classroom space) to have a permanent "Safety City". Once the property is located, I have no doubt we can get the paving and curbing done by our local businesses and the striping done by city workers. There should be no additional expense. Should we be able to find an area at the school - this could be used throughout the school year by the teachers should they have any activity that would fit the area. The other possible location would be the triangle beside the library. During off times this could be a place for library patrons to sit among small groomed trees and miniature flower areas. Maintenance for the area could be a project for the garden club.

I hope we can get together down the road, discuss the program and work towards next years goals. Next year's estimated budget would be 60 students at \$18.00 per student - \$1,080.00. With our current sponsors and new sponsors - this should be covered with little to no monies coming from our budget.

Our Volunteers, Instructors and Sponsors deserve a round of applause because they made the program a success.

Issue:

Traffic Light Control Devices

Background: The Fire department for some time has experienced difficulty at responding through traffic signals in Brookings because of traffic and no area for traffic to move over to allow emergency vehicles to pass when responding to emergencies. When the traffic light was installed at the intersection of 101 and 5th street, the Fire Department recommended that a device be installed on the light to allow the Fire Department to change the light to green so that the traffic on 5th street could proceed, thus allowing us to get out onto the highway or proceed across the highway. That was not done.

> We now regularly experience problems in that a fire truck can not get on to 5th street as the traffic is backed up in front of Elk Drive, and Ray's driveway. This happens because the traffic light is red for 5th Street traffic and that traffic has no where to go to allow our vehicles access to the roadway.

> Another intersection we are concerned with is Oak and 101, When we come up to this intersection with the light red in our direction it is difficult for our vehicles to negotiate the intersection as again there is no place to go while the cars are stopped at the light waiting for it to change.

> We attempted to get a grant that would have paid the cost to have the three lights in Brookings and two more in Harbor equipped with these traffic light controllers. The cost at that time to install this equipment was \$21,000. We were unsuccessful and I don't believe we would be successful now.

> Recently I was contacted by Harbor Fire Chief, Frank Kelly, on this subject. He requested that we join with them to have the equipment installed at a reduced cost of \$8,400 for our department. The Oregon Department of Transportation will install the equipment at no cost to us. In the past they were going to charge us for that installation.

> With the installation of this equipment, any future lights installed in our area will automatically come equipped with this equipment and not require any further cost to us or Harbor Fire District.

For this \$8,400, we will also get one actuator to be installed in a truck to change the lights. Harbor Fire District will loan us two of these to be used on our other trucks until next fiscal year when we can budget \$1,000 each for more of the actuators to be installed in our other trucks.

This is a one of a kind item that is the only brand the state will let us use.

The Fire Department has budgeted \$25,000 under capital improvement for the purchase of breathing apparatus. The amount needed to satisfy our current contract purchase of the breathing apparatus is approximately \$17,000. The remainder was for the purchase of additional breathing apparatus units. The purchase of these traffic light signal devices now at this very good price, is a high priority rather than more breathing apparatus.

Supplemental Environmental Project (SEP)

Background:

We were assessed a civil penalty of \$4,200 by DEQ for sewage spills. The penalty has been reduced by \$600 due to the City's cooperation. The Council indicated it wished to do a Supplemental Environmental Project (SEP) to further mitigate the penalties. Department of Environmental Quality will consider allowing the City to use up to 80% of the civil penalty on a SEP.

Recommendation:

City Council authorize the City Manager to submit to DEQ Supplemental Environmental Projects to mitigate the assessment for civil penalties. Suggested projects would be \$1,000 to have the fish symbol with words "No dumping, flows to the river" painted near storm drains by high school students, and \$1,880 for a project by the Chetco Watershed Council to be determined later and approved by the City Council, as well as DEQ.

RESOLUTION NO. 98-R-641

A RESOLUTION EXEMPTING FROM COMPETITIVE BIDDING THE PURCHASE OF THREE (3)TRAFFIC LIGHT CONTROL DEVICES.

The Common Council of the City of Brookings finds as follows:

- 1. Occasionally, responses to emergencies by city fire vehicles are slowed down because of heavy traffic at the three (3) traffic signals on U.S. Highway 101.
- 2. There is a traffic light control device that can be installed in each signal that can be activated by an emitter mounted in a fire vehicle. This will turn signals to the appropriate color to allow the fire vehicle to proceed through an intersection safely.
- 3. Harbor Fire District will be paying to have these devices installed in the two (2) signals in Harbor and it is logical and economic for the City to also do this at this time. The State of Oregon owns these traffic signals and will install these devices at no cost to local jurisdictions.
- 4. The State of Oregon only uses the 3M Opticom "Priority Control System" for traffic light control systems.
- 5. The total price of this system installed in three (3) traffic signals in Brookings is \$8,400. This is available from the Fire Department's section of their 1998-99 fiscal year budget.
- 6. The awarding of a contract to 3M will result in substantial cost savings to the City and improved response time by fire vehicles during emergencies.
- 7. It is unlikely that an exemption from competitive bidding in this instance will encourage favoritism in the awarding of contracts or that it will diminish competition.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BROOKINGS THAT:

The purchase of a 3M Opticom Priority Control System in the amount of \$8,400 is exempted from competitive bidding requirements under ORS chapter 279 and City of Brookings Resolution No. 92-R-539.
