WHEREAS, the Brookings-Harbor School Board members dedicate their role as public servants to uphold and accomplish the educational goals of the district;



I. BACKGROUND

On 12-09-96 I received a Driver Taxi Permit Application from the Finance Department to be reviewed by our department on a Mr. Jack Doyle. The permit was reviewed and a routine drivers license check was conducted. This showed Mr. Doyle having had his drivers suspended on February 4, 1993 to May 5, 1993 for driving under the Influence of Alcohol. Per City Ordinance 8-387.6B a person being suspended in the last ten years cannot obtain a City Taxi License. The Permit was marked denied and returned to the Finance Department. At this point it was determined that Mr. Doyle already had a Taxi License and this was a renewal.

Memorandum

On 12-10-96 I contacted our City Attorney John Trew and advised him of the problem where Mr. Doyle had been mistakenly issued a City Taxi Permit a year ago when his license had been suspended in 1993 in violation of City Ordinance in Taxi Permits.

On 12-11-96 I was contacted by John Trew who advised that we could deny the license.

On 12-11-96 at 2:10 pm I contacted Mr. Doyle at the Police Department. I advised Mr. Doyle of the problem with the Taxi Permit and what I had done. I showed Mr. Doyle a Department of Motor Vehicles printout showing his license being suspended in 1993 and per the City Ordinance he would be denied a Taxi Permit. I asked if anything had been said to him when he first applied for the original permit or if he had talked to Chief Owens at that time. Mr. Doyle said he didn't recall, he just put in the application and it went through.

I showed Mr. Doyle the City Ordinance and told him he shouldn't have been granted the first permit. Mr. Doyle advised he understood but didn't think the Ordinance was very good as being penalized for 10 years on a 3 month suspension wasn't right. I again advised Mr. Doyle that I could only go by what the Ordinance said and didn't want to start setting any precedence in this and we would be denying the application. Mr. Doyle wanted to know what his next

action would be and I advised him that the City Council would have to change the Ordinance, and that he might first make an appointment with the City Manager and talk to him.

On 12-26-96 I met with Mr. Doyle and City Manager Tom Weldon. Mr. Weldon advised he couldn't change what has been done and advised Mr. Doyle how to go about taking his case to the City Council at their next meeting.

II. RECOMMENDATIONS:

We recommend that the City Council review the Ordinance on drivers license suspension and consider a change to section 8-387.6b4. Some considerations staff has briefly reviewed has been a 5 year limitation on licensing privileges and a step system where if suspended for 30 days on a diversion for DUII, no permit would be issued for 1 year. The entire Ordinance should be reviewed and discussions held with the Taxicab company's owners before a final product is brought to the Council.

Section 7. Creation of office of municipal judge pro tem.

The office of municipal judge pro tem is hereby created. The municipal judge pro tem shall be appointed in the same manner as the municipal judge. The municipal judge pro tem shall serve as municipal judge pro tem when the municipal court judge is absent from the city, incapacitated, or otherwise unable to discharge the duties of municipal judge. When occupying the office of municipal judge, the municipal judge pro tem shall have all the powers and authority of the municipal judge. [Section 7 added by Ordinance No. 175, adopted February 11, 1964.]

Section 6. Authority of municipal court judge. The municipal judge shall have authority to issue process for the arrest of any person accused of an offense against the ordinances of the city of Brookings, to commit any such person to jail or admit him to bail pending trial, to issue subpoenas, to compel witnesses to appear and testify in court on the trial of any cause before him, to compel obedience to such subpoenas, to issue any process necessary to carry in effect the judgments of the court, and to punish witnesses for contempt of court.

Section 7. Creation of office of municipal judge pro tem. The office of municipal judge pro tem is hereby created. The municipal judge pro tem shall be appointed in the same manner as the municipal judge. The municipal judge pro tem shall serve as municipal judge pro tem when the municipal court judge is absent from the city, incapacitated, or otherwise unable to discharge the duties of municipal judge. When occupying the office of municipal judge, the municipal judge pro tem shall have all the powers and authority of the municipal judge. [Section 7 added by Ordinance No. 175, adopted February 11, 1964.]

Section 8. Applicability of Oregon laws. When not governed by ordinance or by charter of the city of Brookings, all proceedings in the municipal court for the city of Brookings for the violation of a city ordinance shall be governed by the applicable general laws of the state of Oregon governing justices of the peace and justice courts.

Section 9. [Section 9 repealed by Ordinance No. 67-0-195 adopted December 12, 1967.]

Section 10. Municipal court rules. The municipal judge shall have authority to form and adopt such reasonable rules for the conduct of the business of the municipal court for the city of Brookings; provided, however, that he/she shall not form or adopt any rule which is in contravention with the constitution of the United States, the constitution of the state of Oregon, the laws of the state of Oregon or any ordinance of the city of Brookings.

Issue:

Measure 47 Meeting in Salem

Synopsis:

Yesterday the Oregon Department of Revenue held a meeting in Salem for all local governments and special districts to hear recommendations from the Governors Task force working on interpretation of Measure 47. Attached to this memo is the agenda and packet handed out at that meeting. As you look through the packet you will notice handwritten comments next to many of the recommendations made by the Task Force Committee. These are items that have been reviewed by the State Attorney General and he has given his preliminary approval of their findings.

Within the packet is a copy of the measure itself, and following, the issues and recommendations on how to implement the measure. Implementation of this measure is going to be quite complicated and the process to determine how it is going to be

done will be in progress for some time.

It was a very informative session from which I gained a much better understanding of Measure 47. I will not attempt to cover all that I heard, except for a few highlights that I know you will be interested in:

- a) Levies Don Lindley, Chairman of the Governor's Task Force: "Making a strong recommendation to allow levies outside the tax base, although not yet finished determining this issue." We should have information regarding the status of levies by the end of January.
- b) Prioritizing public safety in the Task Force committee's appraisal of the wording of the measure, even \$1 more spent on Public Safety over Non-Public Safety areas is prioritizing.
- c) The percentage used by the Task Force in calculating approximately the amounts governments will lose from Measure 47 is 20%.

PLANNING DIRECTOR'S QUARTERLY REPORT December 3, 1996

- 1. TGM Study Study is underway and first committee meeting has been held. This is a study of the in-fill and redevelopment potential of the developed area within and adjacent to the old UGB. It will entail the examination of the existing infrastructure to determine if it can support in-fill and redevelopment and a study of existing lots to determine if they can be divided further, or redeveloped to a higher use. The tentative December 11 meeting has been canceled because it took much longer to order, receive and prepare the information needed from the tax rolls. We were looking for lot sizes and improvement value to land value ratio but the county's computers cannot sort in either manner so it must be done by hand. The next meeting will be in January. The city has also been granted a supplemental grant for \$10,000 to do a financial analysis and a funding search, to finance the Waster Water Treatment project. The contract and work program has just been approved and the TGM Program will send out a RFP.
- 2. Public Facilities and Services Plan The city has received Periodic Review Grant for \$30,000 to prepare the Public Facilities and Services Plan for the new UGB. The Public Facilities Plan is the third task of our periodic review work program. This plan will review the existing water, sewer and storm drain systems, recommend improvements, determine where new lines are needed to serve the new UGB and to prepare a time line of future projects to extend the system. The plan for the new water, sewer and storm drain systems will be only to the boundaries of the Master Planned areas of the new UGB. The extension of the mains into these areas will be the responsibility of the developer. This study is closely related to the TGM study and the work programs for both have been designed to coordinate the work rather than duplicate it.
- 3. Couplet Refinement Study ODOT has funded the refinement study for the highway couplet project. This study will determine what additional right-of-way is needed to tie Railroad St. to 101 at each end and where the right-of-way will be. An advisory committee will be established to oversee the project and also a technical advisory committee. This is a big step in getting the highway onto the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) list. One of the things that they will be evaluating is the enthusiasm for the project within the community. We have received the work program from ODOT for review. Since this is funded by ODOT they will be hiring the engineering firm, etc, that will do the study.
- 4. CPACT Study CPACT (Coastal Policy Advisory Committee On Transportation) is undertaking a study of the scenic attributes of the Highway 101 corridor between the state line and Pistol River. This is not a study of the highway itself but may involve such factors as the safety of getting on or off the highway at scenic overlooks and such. A committee will be established to oversee this process. The results of this study, coupled with the results along other such studies along the corridor, would determine if 101 is listed as a national scenic highway. Although the city has representatives on the local committee, Councilors Curry and Scott, the city staff will not be particularly involved beyond setting up the committee.

- 5. Driving Range The driving range at Jacks Creek is essentially built with only the putting green left to do and is expected to be completed this winter.
- 6. SWOCC Signs for and at the SWOCC facility are now in place, including directional signs and the signs required in the conditions of the use permit.
- 7. UGB Appeal Nothing really new to report. An effort to explore the possibility of mediation did not come about. Currently waiting for 1000 Friends to file their written arguments.
- 8. Fast Gas They have been contacted about the landscaping along Spruce Street.
- 9. The Commission has discussed establishing committees to study various aspects of the Land Development Code including:
 - a. Parking regulations
 - b. Deferred Improvement Agreement issues
 - c. Residential care facilities
 - d. Neighborhood circulation plan provisions.

We have several committees working now and its not feasible to establish a committee to consider any of these at this time, however, they are mentioned here to keep the them current.

10. I would also like to thank Linda for all of the excellent work she has done in the past year and look forward to working with her in the next.
