

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LEASE AGREEMENT

This Agreement is made and entered into this day
of, 1997, by and between the CHETCO COMMUNITY
PUBLIC LIBRARY, a library district organized under the laws of
the State of Oregon, hereinafter "Lessor", and the CITY OF
ROOKINGS, a municipal corporation of the State of Oregon,
nereinafter "Lessee";

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, Lessor is the owner of certain real property located within the City of Brookings, Oregon;

WHEREAS, Lessee wishes to occupy certain property under a lease arrangement with Lessor for purposes of construction, maintenance and operation of a park; and

WHEREAS, the parties desire to reduce the terms of a lease agreement in writing.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

1. Property Description: Lessor leases to lessee and lessee agrees to lease from lessor the real property described as follows: an area of real property located West of the existing public library at 405 Alder, Brookings, Oregon, said area being surrounded by Hemlock Street to the North, Oak Street to the West and Del Norte Street to the South. Attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference is a diagram depicting the

location of the real property which is the subject of this lease agreement.

- 2. Term: The term of this lease shall be from year to year. The original term of the lease shall commence on the date of execution of this agreement and shall continue for a period of one year. The lease shall automatically renew for a subsequent one year period unless either party, at least 90 days prior to expiration of the preceding term, provides notice to the other of its intention to terminate the lease.
- 3. Condition of Premises: Lessee acknowledges that it has fully examined the real property which is the subject of this lease agreement and acknowledges that it accepts the real property and any improvements thereon "as is" with no promise or agreement on the part of lessor to repair, maintain or improve the premises during the term hereof. Lessee shall maintain the property in good condition and repair throughout the term of this lease and in accordance with all applicable laws, rules and regulations of city, county and state governments.
- 4. Use of Premises: Lessee shall use the real property to construct and maintain a public park, including placement of a boat to be donated by the Port of Brookings Harbor and plants, picnic tables, benches, fencing and a parking area. Lessee may, from time to time, construct, improve, remodel or repair improvements placed on the premises.
- 5. Rent: Rent shall be paid annually to lessor in the amount of \$1 per year, commencing with a payment on the date of LEASE AGREEMENT 2

execution of this agreement and continuing on the same day of each year thereafter.

- 6. <u>Assignment</u>: Lessee shall not assign, transfer, sublet, pledge, surrender or dispose of this lease, or any part thereof, without first having obtained the written consent of lessor.
- 7. Maintenance of Premises: Lessee shall be solely responsible for maintenance and upkeep of the lease premises. Such maintenance shall include pick up and disposal of garbage and refuse, mowing lawns, trimming shrubs and maintaining the property in a clean and orderly condition.
- 8. <u>Insurance</u>: Lessee shall obtain and continuously maintain personal injury, public liability and property damage insurance, insuring its activity on the real property during the term of this lease.
- 9. Liens and Encumbrances: Lessee shall not permit or suffer any liens or other encumbrances to attach to the subject real property or improvements thereon. Lessee shall keep the premises free of all liens and shall indemnify, defend and hold lessor harmless therefrom.
- 10. <u>Default</u>: In the event of the failure of lessee to comply with any term or condition of this lease within thirty (30) days after written notice specifying the nature of the default is provided to lessee, lessee shall be deemed in default.
- 11. Remedies on Default: Time is declared to be of the essence as to all provisions of this agreement. In the event LEASE AGREEMENT 3

of a default, and failure to cure by lessee during the period afforded hereunder, the lease may be terminated at the option of lessor by giving notice in writing to lessee. Upon termination of this lease, lessee shall vacate the lease premises, perform any cleanup work required to leave the premises in at least as good of condition as existed on the date of execution of this lease agreement and shall return the premises to lessor.

- terminate this lease agreement, without cause, by giving at least ninety (90) days written notice to the other party at any time. Upon notice of termination being given, lessee shall be afforded a reasonable time to remove all of its improvements and structures from the subject real property.
- 13. <u>Mon-Waiver</u>: Waiver by either party of strict performance of any provision of this agreement shall not waive or prejudice that party's right to require strict performance of the same provision or any other provision in the future.
- 14. Notice: Any notice required to be given under this agreement shall be made in writing and shall be deemed given when actually delivered or when deposited in the mail, certified mailing, addressed to the parties as follows: To Lessor: 405 Alder, Brookings, Oregon 97415; To Lessee: 898 Elk Drive, Brookings, Oregon 97415.



Attached is the ballot title language for the September 16, 1997 election for the sale of wastewater bonds for the Wastewater Treatment system improvements.

The language in this ballot title requests authorization from the voters to issue general obligation bonds. Although the intent of the City is not to sell bonds (but to obtain a State Revolving Fund loan at a lower interest rate) the passage of this measure will show the support of the voters for the project, as well as provide additional backing for the City in obtaining the State loan. If, in the case that the rates should somehow not provide the funds for repayment of the loan, the approval of this bond measure allows the City use property taxes to meet the loan obligations. There is no reason to expect that this option will ever be exercised, but the security provided by "backing" of the bonds is helpful in obtaining a loan and provides a "comfort level" for those providing funding for the project.

Even though the wording of this ballot title states that "if the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes, etc" does not mean the City is required to sell the bonds, this statement is required by Oregon State law.

Also attached for your information is the bond election calendar showing the time line of events for this bond ballot measure.

CAPTION:

To allow sale of wastewater bonds

QUESTION:

Shall the City of Brookings be authorized to issue general obligation bonds not exceeding \$13,100,000 for wastewater treatment plant improvements?

If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of section 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY:

This measure allows the City of Brookings to issue general obligation bonds. Bonds not to exceed \$13,100,000 may be sold. The money will be used for required wastewater system improvements to bring the system into compliance with State and Federal environmental standards and provide capacity for approximately 15 years of projected growth. Sources of repayment may include system development fees, sewer service charges and property taxes. These bonds are not subject to Measure 50 property tax limitations.

Wastewater Program Implementation Steps

Dear Mr. Lightle:

The May 5 work session on the wastewater program and associated financing options was perhaps our most constructive meeting to date. There was keen public interest and our recommended plan received strong support from the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ). At the conclusion of our presentation to the city council on May 5, 1997, we outlined a number of recommended steps to continue your progress on water quality management. In this letter, we propose additional tasks to our agreement to address the following issues:

Task 1. Respond to DEQ Comments on the Facilities Plan. Your Plan has received preliminary approval from DEQ. All items detailed in our original scope of work have been approved with the exception of the infiltration and inflow (I/I) work which will be discussed later. The DEQ has added a requirement for an evaluation of each of your 12 pump stations as a condition of approval. Structural inspections must be conducted of the pump station wet wells and receiving manholes. Pumping capacities and the presence of overflows and alarms must be noted.

Task 2. Assist the DEQ in Development of a Mass Load Increase. The recommended wastewater plant expansion is planned to meet new permit limits currently under negotiation with DEQ. To acquire these new limits, it has been necessary to prove to DEQ that no degradation of water quality will result. We have provided a significant amount of this documentation including an analysis of the effects of your existing ocean diffuser. Additional effort will be necessary to support this mass load increase request which is the basis for your permit. Jon Gasik of the DEQ has asked us to evaluate numerous performance scenarios based upon differing flow conditions and permit limitations. It is critical that the final negotiated permit conforms as closely as possible to the planned performance of your recommended plant improvements. We understand DEQ will present their permit recommendations to the Environmental Quality Commission in July for their approval.

Task 3. Provide Assistance at Public Hearing and Work Sessions. Development of public understanding and support will be key to achieving passage of your funding measure on September 16. We propose to prepare handouts and presentation materials and attend meetings at your request. It is expected these public meetings will be held in July.

Task 4. Prepare a Wastewater Program Fact Sheet. This would include responses to the most commonly asked questions regarding your project. Now that the project has been in front of the public a number of times, most of the basic questions and concerns have been voiced. A fact sheet will aid the city in providing clear and consistent responses to voter questions.

Task 5. Continued I/I Removal Program Assistance. We have worked with your current and prior plant operators to provide oversight for your on-going I/I removal efforts. As discussed in the May 5 meeting, the most promising approach to flow reductions typically results from targeting inflow and structurally defective pipes. DEQ considers inflow reduction mandatory. The city's recent experience repairing broken sewers is a good indication that structural repairs are needed in portions of your system.

Smoke testing will be used to identify potential inflow locations. Video inspection of sewers will show areas of defective piping. To assist your staff during the busy summer months, we propose to contract directly for smoke testing and video inspection of sewer lines. Hopefully the city crews can clean the sewers as necessary. We will then solicit quotes and provide oversight for the entire process. We recommend the city focus on the basins which showed the highest levels of I/I in your 1987 Cost Effectiveness Analysis. The top five basins include approximately 29,000 linear feet. We recommend all five of these basins be smoke tested and most of them video inspected. The five basins with the next highest I/I amount to 41,000 linear feet should be smoke tested. This approach of targeting the basins which have historically shown the most I/I will provide the most effective program at the lowest cost. Typically, smoke testing and video inspection of sewers costs approximately \$0.20 and \$0.50 per foot, respectively.

The following subtasks are anticipated for smoke testing and video sewer inspection:

5A - Perform Smoke Testing. The city will inform the police and fire departments of the smoke-testing schedule provided by Brown and Caldwell. Twenty-four hours prior to smoke testing a specific area of the system, Brown and Caldwell will distribute door hangers on houses having the potential to be affected by the smoke. Isolation of sewage flows from each test section with plugs will be required to ensure forced flow of smoke.

- 5B Review Smoke Testing Results. We will document identified inflow connections using maps and digital photographs. We will also estimate tributary drainage area(s) to each inflow source and the hydraulic impact of inflow sources. The identified inflow sources will be located on an electronic map of the city's service area.
- 5C Perform Dye Tests. Brown and Caldwell will identify sites where roof drain connections and storm system cross-connections are likely to exist, but were not detected with smoke testing. The city will review and approve the suggested sites, and obtain permission from homeowners for Brown and Caldwell to enter the property and conduct the test. We will document identified inflow connections using maps and photographs. We will also estimate tributary drainage area(s) to each inflow source and estimate hydraulic impact of inflow sources. Budget will be allocated for performing up to five such tests.
- 5D Select Video Inspection Contractor. Brown and Caldwell will select a contractor for sewer cleaning and video inspection through solicitation of competitive quotes.
- 5E Perform Video Inspection. Video inspection would be limited to five basins where it would have the greatest utility. We will provide guidelines to the contractor for video inspection procedures and reporting. Using voice-overlaid videotape plus a written log, the contractor will identify sections being inspected and record conditions of line including root intrusion, leaks, conditions of joints, line sags, cracks, and location of laterals and joints.

Brown and Caldwell will review the written log and selected portions of the recorded tape. We will then summarize the field activities performed, indicating specifically the amount of each type of test, and report findings.

5F - Recommend Repairs. Under this task, we will identify the best candidates for pipe repair or replacement. If repair is warranted, a pipe rehabilitation method will be specified. A planning level construction cost estimate will be provided for each recommended repair or replacement.

Attachment A shows a breakdown of the costs associated with each of these tasks. The costs associated with Task 5 - Continued Infiltration and Inflow Removal Program Assistance can be tailored to the actual sewer length selected by your staff. In addition, if your crews are available to assist in this program, other Task 5 costs can be reduced.

Please review this approach and contact us so we may modify these tasks as necessary. We are optimistic that the positive momentum of your wastewater project can be maintained and preliminary design can begin early this fall.

Cost Allocation for Wastewater Treatment Improvement

Development of future rates and SDCs must consider the appropriate allocation of system improvement costs. Tables 3-3 and 3-3A in our March 12, 1997, draft of the Brookings Wastewater Rate and Fee Study were developed using a methodology which considered the function and design criteria of each process unit. Your plant expansion was initially developed to be constructed in two phases. Phase 1 was to provide permit compliance, reliability, and an increment for growth of about 8 years. Phase I components are shown in Table 3.3 of the Rate and Fee Study. Phase 2 improvements were designed entirely to accommodate new growth and costs for these improvements are shown on Table 3.3A. The cost allocation process for the Phase 1 costs began with a review of the basis for sizing for each improvement. Unit sizing is based upon peak hydraulic loading, sludge production, or average dry weather flow (ADWF) at the plant. The basis for unit process sizing for each Phase 1 process area is shown below:

Headworks

The headworks area is composed of two elements: the barscreen and the grit removal system. The current barscreen will only accommodate the existing peak wet weather flow of 10 million gallons per day (mgd). The new barscreen is needed for growth and will cost \$135,000. The existing grit system will accommodate 7 mgd. The current peak weather flow is 10 mgd. The new grit system will handle 10 mgd and will cost \$141,000. The percentage of the new grit system to handle current flows is:

Secondary Clarifier

The existing clarifier will handle 8.5 mgd of the current 10 mgd flow. The new clarifier will add 8.5 mgd capacity and cost \$760,000.

UV Disinfection

Shop Building

The new shop building is required because the new secondary clarifier must be built where the current shop is located. An allocation on the basis of peak wet weather flow is appropriate for this \$250,00 improvement.

Current user costs -(10 mgd - 8.5 mgd)/(8.5 mgd) (\$250,000) = \$44,000 Future user costs -\$250,000 - \$44,000 = \$206,000

Sludge Treatment Components

The following components considered sludge production in the allocation of costs.

Anaerobic Digester

This unit was sized based upon sludge production during the peak month. The current sludge production is 11,101 gallons per day (gpd). The current capacity is 4,174 gpd. Future sludge projections estimate a flow of 15,113 gpd. A new digester is estimated to cost \$823,000.

Current user costs -(11,101 gpd - 4,174 gpd)/(15,113 gpd)(\$823,000) = \$377,000Future user costs -\$823,000 - \$377,000 = \$446,000

Sludge Lagoon

The sizing criteria for the sludge lagoon will be peak month pounds of biochemical oxygen demand (BOD). The sludge lagoon will be sized to handle 5,209 pounds per day (ppd) BOD compared to the current plant load of 3000 ppd BOD. The estimated cost of the sludge lagoon is \$401,000.

Current user costs -(3,000 ppd/5,209 ppd)(\$401,000) = \$231,000Future user costs -\$401,000 - \$231,000 = \$170,000

Operations Building Improvements

The operations building improvements are required to improve operator safety and efficiency now and in the future as the community grows. To consider both the current and future

needs of the operations building staff, assume an allocation based on ADWF which is directly related to population. The current ADWF is 1 mgd. The future ADWF will be 1.74 mgd. Operations building improvements will cost \$105,000.

Current user costs - (1 mgd/1.74 mgd)(\$105,000) = \$60,000Future user costs - \$105,000 - \$60,000 = \$45,000.

Percentage Allocations

At the facilities plan level of cost estimating, a percentage allowance is made for contractor management and mobilization, yard development, yard piping, electrical and instrumentation, loan/bond cost and engineering. These percentages are applied to the subtotal of the plant improvement costs as follows:

Contractor management and mobilization – approximately 9 percent Yard development – approximately 2 percent Yard piping – approximately 9 percent Electrical and instrumentation – approximately 24 percent Bond cost – approximately 1 percent

An allocation of 20 percent is included both for contingency for unidentified items and for engineering. These cost allocations are summarized in Table 1 for your convenience.

Every effort has been made to be as consistent and fair as possible in the allocation of these costs. We look forward to discussing our approach and findings with you at your convenience.

Issue:

Application for the 1998 Special City Allotment Program Grant: Continuation of Oak Street Project

Synopsis:

The City of Brookings meets the criteria for the Oregon Department of Transportation's Special City Allotment Program and continuation of the Oak Street Project meets their criteria for a street improvement project. The first portion of the Oak Street Project was selected for a Special City's grant in 1997. The 1997 monies will be used this summer to overlay approximately 150 feet of Oak Street between Chetco Avenue and Spruce Street, replace the storm drain, install sidewalk on the west side and curbs on the east side of the street.

To apply for the grant for 1998 the Council needs to pass a resolution and forward it, as well as the Special City's Allotment application, to the Oregon Department of Transportation so it is received by them before July 1, 1997.

Recommendation:

City Council select the continuation of the Oak Street Project for the Special City Allotment Grant for \$25,000 and authorize the Mayor and City Manager to sign the necessary documents for the application.

Rationale:


Continuation of the Oak Street Project seems the best project for the Special City Allotment Grant in as much as it meets the state requirements for this grant. Continuing this project will complete work started with the 1997 Special City Allotment Grant. These projects address deterioration of the street driving surface, a collapsing storm water piping system and installation of sidewalk in a congested area where there is substantial pedestrian traffic.

Background:

The State of Oregon makes funds available for street projects to cities of less than 5,000 population based on the latest federal census. These funds are for streets that are inadequate for capacity or the condition of the street. Due to limited funds the practice has been to allot no more than one project per year per city. Funds are available up to \$25,000 with the City paying all amounts in excess of \$25,000.

The Oak Street Project or portions of the project are listed in the City of Brookings Capital Improvements/Expenditure Plan 1996-2001 (CIP/EP) with funding possible from both System Development Charges and System Replacement Charges.

This year's project is estimated to cost \$40,157 with the city paying the \$15,157 over the stated \$25,000. The recommended continuation project is estimated to cost \$40,000 with the city paying the \$15,000 over the state's \$25,000 share.

Property owners receive exemption

A resolution passed by the Brookings City Council at its last meeting exempts a number of property owners along Easy Street from having to build curbs, gutters and sidewalks if they improve their property.

The congregation of Trinity Lutheran Church requested exemption from having to improve the curbs, gutters and sidewalks along Easy Street if the church undertook a major building project. They attended a council meeting last year bringing forward the request.

Mayor at that time, Tom Davis, and the council agreed that the church and other property owners along the stretch of Easy Street still lacking curb or sidewalks should not be forced to build those improvements.

There is a need to exempt the owners of the following tax lots from the requirements of curb, gutter and sidewalk improvements in the event of future development on those parcels: TL2700, TL2701, TL1525, TL1528, TL2100, TL2200, TL2201, TL2400, TL2600, TL2900, TL1800, TL1900, TL2000, TL2101 and TL2102.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BROOKINGS THAT:

In the event of future development on their respective properties, the owners of the following tax lots in the City of Brookings shall not be required to incur the expense of curb, gutter or sidewalk improvements along Easy Street:

MINUTES:

The Board met in the Council Chambers at 898 Elk Drive, Brookings, Oregon at 1:30 PM on Thursday, May 22,, 1997.

Members present were Bob Krebs, Ross Shawaker, Larry Smith, Russ Fritz and Jim Collis. Members present constituted a quorum. Mayor Nancy Brendlinger, City Manager Tom Weldon, Community Development Director Leo Lightle and Finance Director Beverly Adams were also present.

The Chair stated that the minutes of the previous meeting April 15, 1997 had been distributed and unless there were changes or corrections the minutes would stand as presented.

The Chair noted that at the previous meeting on April 15th Mr. Lightle requested the opportunity to review SDC expenditures and come back to the Board with more complete information. The City Manager noted that the Capital Improvement Committee would be reconvening on June 11th and the SDC Board needed to have a representative. Also the Board needed to meet and consider the recommendations made by the CIP Committee. Bob Krebs was designated to be the SDC Board representative on the CIP Committee. A SDC Board meeting was scheduled at 1:30 PM on June 24 to consider the action taken by the CIP Committee and such other matters as may be appropriate.

There was a discussion of the handling of fund withdrawals from the Harbor Sanitary Waste Water Treatment system development account. There appears to be procedural delays in the process. The Board requested further information and agreed to take up the matter of handling of Harbor system development payments at a later date.

The Chair noted that the Board had asked the City Manager for a recommendation regarding maintaining dual Water and Wastewater funds to correspond to assessments specified in the System Development Charge schedule. The City Manager suggested the matter be taken up as part of the update or revision of the SDC schedule now underway.

The next meeting of the Board was scheduled for 1:30 PM June 24, 1997.

Digester Improvement Project Funding

Dear Mr. Weldon:

At your request, we have reviewed the individual components of this project to determine what portion may be allocated to increases in treatment capacity. In general, the project elements can be divided into two categories. First, we replaced the existing boiler, sludge mixing, and heat exchanger to improve reliability and treatment efficiencies. This work did not add any appreciable treatment capacity.

Second, we added an interim sludge thickener to increase the concentration of solids in your digester. Current sludge regulations require a minimum detention time of 15 days.

Before this project was started up, plant records indicate the digestion system operated with a detention time of only 11.7 days at a solids concentration of 2.3 percent. Now that the sludge thickener is on-line, we are confident the sludge concentration in the digester can be raised to 4.0 percent solids. This would raise the theoretical detention time to approximately 20.3 days. Thirty-eight percent of this increase in detention time can be allocated to meeting the required minimum detention. While we do not recommend extended operation of the digester at minimum detention times, it appears that approximately 62 percent of the expanded capacity may be available for growth.

The enclosed breakdown of the contractors cost for this project shows their approximate allocation of costs to each segment of the project. Note that the total cost of the sludge thickening components including engineering is approximately \$287.444. If you were to assume that 62 percent of this system cost could be allocated to interim reserve capacity, this would calculate to (\$287.444)(0.62) = \$178.215.

Commissioner Krebs questioned the RV that is being used at the Southern Curry Ambulance site on Railroad. Director Bischoff responded they were given permission by the City Council for a small mobile home to sit on the property but not a RV. He will investigate this and take action if it is needed.

Parked cars with "for sale" signs have reappeared at the corner of Spruce and Alder. Commissioner Krebs saw 4 or 5 on the City owned property at that corner. Director Bischoff will asked the Police Department to cite the owners if the cars are located on City property.

Commissioner Krebs questioned the status of the RV located on a lot on Railroad next to GTE's compound. Lights are on in the RV during the evening and it appears to be inhabited. The owner of the RV has been cited and fined in the past for hooking the RV's waste system into the City wastewater system. Staff will follow up to determine if the RV is being used as a residence again.

Commissioner Pepper gave a brief report on Park and Recreation Commission activities. The work on Stout Park is beginning and the City is doing grubbing work in preparation for closing Pine Street next month. There has been a proposal made by a group to use some land in Azalea Park for a BMX race track. Although news reports have indicated the group wanted to use land set aside for soft ball fields, representatives from the two groups have met and another site adjacent to the ball fields has been chosen for consideration. While understanding the work is being done by volunteers, the Parks

and Recreation Commission is still concerned with the length of time the softball fields project has taken. The Parks and Recreation Commission has asked for input from the Planning Commission on future park developments and requested a joint meeting of the two commissions. Chair Ciapusci and Commissioner Krebs felt this was a good idea and one that has been mentioned in the Planning Commission Annual Report in years past. Commissioner Pepper will suggest the Parks and Recreation Commission prepare a list of topics, as will the Planning Commission, and propose a date for the joint meeting.

Several bills are being considered by the Oregon Legislature regarding land use issues. Commissioner Krebs reported on these.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business before the Planning Commission, the meeting was adjourned at 9:55 p.m.

- 1. The Planning Commission duly accepted the application filed in accordance with Section 152, <u>Vacations</u>, of the Land Development Code; and,
- 2. Such application is required to show evidence that all of the following criteria has been met:
 - A. Compliance with the comprehensive plan, circulation element or other applicable sections of the document.
 - B. If initiated by petition pursuant to ORS 271.080, the council shall make the determinations pursuant to ORS 271.120 based upon evidence provided by the petitioner(s) in the written findings.
 - C. If initiated upon a recommendation of the Planning Commission and/or by the City Council on its own motion pursuant to ORS 271.130, a determination shall be made that the vacation will not substantially affect the market value of all such abutting property to the area proposed to be vacated, unless the City Council proposes to provide for paying such damages.
- 3. The Brookings Planning Commission duly considered the above described application on the agenda of its regularly scheduled public hearing on April 1, 1997; and
- 4. Recommendations were presented by the Planning Director in the form of a written Staff Agenda Report dated March 25, 1997, and by oral presentation, and evidence and testimony was presented by the applicant and the public at the public hearing; and,
- 5. At the conclusion of said public hearing, after consideration and discussion of testimony and evidence presented in the public hearing, the Planning Commission, upon a motion duly seconded, accepted the Staff Agenda Report and recommended that the City Council approve the request, and

- The Brookings City Council duly considered the above described application in a public hearing at a regularly scheduled public meeting held on May 12, 1997, and is a matter of record; and
- 7. At the conclusion of said public hearing, after consideration and discussion of testimony and evidence presented in the public hearing, the City Council, upon a motion duly seconded, accepted the Planning Commissions recommendation; and

THEREFORE, LET IT BE HEREBY ORDERED that the application for an vacation of the subject right-of-way is approved. This approval is supported by the following findings and conclusions:

FINDINGS

- 1. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 152, <u>Vacations</u>, of the Land Development Code, the applicant has filed a petition to vacate a 75 foot wide portion of the Bridge St. right-of-way the extends 691.11 feet along the northerly boundary of the applicant's property. The total area of the vacation is 0.94 acres.
- 2. The area to be vacated only abuts the applicant's property and the remaining portion of the Bridge St. right-of-way.
- 3. The proposed vacation does not involve the vacation of Bridge St. itself, just a portion of the right-of-way on the south side of the street.
- 4. The area to be vacated is located on a steep hillside that drops from the travel way onto the applicant's property.
- 5. The proposed vacation will leave at least 25 feet of remaining right-of-way along the south side of the existing 28 foot wide paved travel way.

CONCLUSIONS

- 1. The proposed vacation is over an area of excess right-of-way that in some places extends more than 100 feet beyond the southerly edge of the paved travel way of Bridge St. The area to be vacated is on a steep slope that drops from the existing road bed and thus cannot be used for any future improvement for Bridge St. The proposed vacation will leave at least 25 feet of right-of-way along the south side of the paved travel way which is sufficient to provide full standard street improvements for Bridge St. if required in the future. Prior to passing the required ordinance to vacate the street the city will ensure that any required slope easements and drainage maintenance agreements are submitted by the applicant.
- 2. The applicant has submitted the required number of notarized consent letters agreeing to the

street vacation. Since the entire area to be vacated is located adjacent to the applicant's property, the proposed vacation will not impact any of the surrounding properties nor prevent any of them from having access.

3. The proposed vacation will not have an adverse affect on the goals or policies of the city's Comprehensive Plan.

Honorable Council Members:

In connection with my application as Municipal Court Judge, I would like to call your attention to the following:

My consulting work for the past ten years has included skills and experience that I believe transfer well to the duties required of a Municipal Court Judge. For example, in 1989 and 1990, following a school bus accident in Texas, in which twenty two children drowned and eighty children were injured, I was asked by corporate attorneys to review all law suits against the corporation for claims of medical and psychological injury. Many of these claims were legitimate; several were false and misleading. I shared my judgment and my advice on how to proceed with many of these cases.

In my consulting work involving threats of violence, stalking, sabotage, conflict resolution and mediation, I frequently interview employees who have broken laws or are suspected of doing so. Employers and managers ask for my judgment, based on interview and review of evidence about guilt or innocence. Frequently, employers prefer to settle these matters in non-adversarial ways. They often ask for my advice on how best to resolve such matters without recourse to criminal and legal proceedings.

As a psychologist for Contra Costa County in California, I interviewed and evaluated hundreds of probationers, that is, criminals on probation. The Courts routinely asked my opinion about chances of recidivism and rehabilitation.

Finally, City Manager Tom Weldon has told me that the direction given to the Municipal Court Judge is to settle matters as efficiently and constructively as possible without emphasizing punishment and court imposed fines. I believe my work as a mediator and as conflict resolution consultant would serve the court and city well toward these ends.


