



Issue:

Financial Planning - 1997/98 Fiscal year and beyond

Synopsis:

Effective June 30, 1997, unless something is done, your city government will have \$500,000 less each fiscal year to provide general fund services (Police, Fire, Planning, Code Enforcement, City Manager, Council, Municipal Court, City Attorney, Parks and Recreation, Finance and Utilities) than each of the prior two fiscal years.

Recommendation:

Council ask for public comment on what should we do about this financial situation.

Rationale:

The tax base election to continue this present level of services was defeated in May of 1996 even though essentially the same package of services and costs was passed on a two-year serial levy in March of 1995. Council should know what our citizens think about these services and costs before making a decision as to whether they want to go to the voters again and if yes - for what.

Background:

- 1) The Council's number one goal for this fiscal year is to get voter approval of a new tax base.
- 2) Tax base elections can only be held in May and November of even numbered years.
- 3) Serial levies, for up to 5 years, can be held four times each year March, May, September, and November.
- 4) Brookings voters have passed the last serial levy election and turned down the last two tax base elections.
- 5) I cannot, in good conscience, recommend any deletions in items or dollars that would have been funded by the increased tax base. I, and staff, believe each of these items vitally important to the community and available at an affordable price.

- 6) If you decide to ask the voters to fund these services at the November election, you need to pass a motion on a ballot title at your July 29, 1996 Council meeting. Staff will be prepared to help you do whatever you want at that meeting.
- 7) We are about to have to sign a Mutual Order and Agreement with DEQ calling for, among other things, us to have an election in March or May of 1997 to make required improvements in our Wastewater Treatment Plant.

Options listed below are options we have reviewed and are not recommending.

Issue:

Appeal of the UGB to the Court of Appeals, additional information.

Synopsis:

The following is an estimate of attorney, consultant, and staff time needed to respond to the appeal.

Recommendation:

Acceptance of the proposed attorney and consultant fees.

Rationale:

These fees are necessary to ensure the city's interest is protected during the appeal hearing process.

Background:

In a previous memo the City Manager recommended that \$10,000 be set aside for attorney fees. At a rate of \$200 an hour this would provide 50 hours of legal representation. The actual rate may be something less than \$200/hour but to ensure adequate representation the \$10,000 amount is recommended.

Staff also recommends that Linda Davis of Cogan Owen Cogan be retained to help the attorney prepare the city's arguments, participate in the coordination meeting and to be present at the oral argument phase of the hearing. In providing support for the LCDC appeal hearing, Ms. Davis charged 18.5 hours at \$70 an hour. Although there is no way of knowing how much of her time will be needed for support, discussion with her has indicated that 25 hours should be sufficient. This would total \$1750.

City staff time will primarily be involved with ensuring that the record that goes from DLCD to the court is correct, support of the attorney's preparation, participation in the coordination meeting, and attending the oral arguments. This should involve no more than 50 hours of staff time. The City Attorney is and will continue to advise staff throughout the process. It is estimated that his time will be 15 hours. The county is also preparing to intervene in this process, thus they will also provide staff time including legal counsel.

This process began in the fall of 1987, as a part of the requirements for the periodic review of the City's Comprehensive Plan.

There have been seventeen public meetings/hearings held locally.

I estimate there have been approximately 1,800 hours of City and County volunteer (Mayor and City Council, County Commissioners and City and County Planning Commissions) time spent on this issue.

Without doing considerable research, I don't have accurate numbers on City cash expenses for attorneys, consultants (\$45,000.00), notices, travel in and out of county, etc., but I am sure it would hit \$75,000.00 over the nine years.

This does not include the \$1,600.00 cash we just spent on the LCDC appeal hearing and staff and volunteer time.

SUBJECT: Bids for Stout Park Improvements

Synopsis: We received one late bid on this project and it is over the engineers estimate.

Recommendation: Council direct staff and the Parks and Recreation Commission to review the entire situation and come back to you with a recommendation as to how we can do this project.

Rationale: We can not waive the timeliness issue since the base bid is somewhat over the engineers estimate and over the budget. Staff believes we can readjust the project and still get most of it done this year.

Background:

The Parks and Recreation Commission and staff worked with the engineer to put together a project to make improvements to Stout Park. The engineer put together a bid packet and after review the project went "out to bid." We received one bid. The bid although late, was by mutual agreement opened with a request by the contractor that if we did not accept the bid, that we not make his bid price public. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Pine Street consists of a paved travel way with no other improvements within a 40 foot wide right-ofway that extends from Fern Ave. on the west to Myrtle St. on the east. It intersects with (from west to east) Fern Ave., Oak St., Alder, St. and Myrtle St. The street passes through Stout Park on the west side of Oak St. with 350 feet of park frontage along the northerly right-of-way line and 200 feet of park frontage on the southerly right-of-way line. Both frontages start at Oak St. and extend west.

PROPOSED VACATION

The city wishes to vacate a portion of Pine St. that extends west from Oak St. for a distance of 175 feet and lies within the city owned Stout Park. The purpose of this vacation is to create an uninterrupted park area that allows for more efficient use of the park, cohesive trails and landscaping and to enhance the aesthetic qualities of the park. The remaining section of Pine St. that extends east from Fern Ave. will terminate in a cul-de-sac on the park property.

ANALYSIS

Section 152, Vacations, Subsection .030, Vacation Criteria, provides that request to vacate will be considered by the Planning Commission for recommendation to the City Council following a determination based upon the findings prepared and submitted by the petitioner(s), which shall address the following criteria:

- 1. Compliance with the comprehensive plan, circulation element or other applicable sections of the document.
- 2. If initiated by petition pursuant to ORS 271.080, the council shall make the determinations pursuant to ORS 271.120 based upon evidence provided by the petitioner(s) in the written findings.
- 3. If initiated upon a recommendation of the Planning Commission and/or by the City Council on its own motion pursuant to ORS 271.130, a determination shall be made that the vacation will not substantially affect the market value of all such abutting property to the area proposed to be vacated, unless the City Council proposes to provide for paying such damages.

The following is staff's analysis of the proposed vacation in relation to the criteria cited above.

Criterion 1, Compliance with the Comprehensive Plan. The proposed vacation will cause what is now one continuous street to be broken into two unconnected segments. This could cause confusion for emergency service providers unless steps are made to make them aware of the changes. The city must ensure that all emergency providers are made aware of the street vacation.

Criterion 2, Petitioner Initiated. The proposed street vacation has been initiated by the city and therefore this criterion does not apply. (See Criterion 3)

Criterion 3, City Initiated. Due to the fact that the proposed street vacation is entirely within the city owned Stout Park, there will be no effect on the market value of abutting property and thus no damages will be created.

FINDINGS

- 1. The city has initiated, on the motion of the Council, an application to vacate a 175 foot section of Pine St. extending west of Oak St. and located totally within the city owned Stout Park, pursuant to the provisions of Section 152, <u>Vacations</u>, of the Land Development Code.
- 2. The proposed vacation will cause what is now a through street to become two unconnected segments with the name of Pine St.
- 3. The street vacation has been noticed pursuant to ORS 271.110.

CONCLUSIONS

The proposed street vacation could have the effect of causing confusion on the part of emergency response vehicles due to the breaking of Pine St. into two, unconnected, segments. To mitigate this impact, the city will notify all emergency service providers of the change and supply maps of the vacated area. Since the property abutting all sides of the vacated street is a city owned park, the issue of market value is moot.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends APPROVAL of Case File No. VAC-1-96 based on the findings and conclusions stated in the staff report.
