APRIL 12, 1977

The meeting was called to order at 8:10 p.m. by Mayor Robert L. Kerr. Members present were Councilmen Tony Leeds, Ray Lockman and Darrell Allsup. Also present was City Manager Al R. Hooten.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

MOTION was made by Councilman Lockman, seconded by Councilman Leeds and carried unanimously that the minutes of March 8, 1977, regular Council meeting, be approved as presented.

PUBLIC HEARINGS:

SUPPLEMENTAL BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 1976-77

The purpose of this meeting was to discuss the supplemental budget with the public. Explanation of the supplemental budget was given by the City Recorder.

Resolution No. 194 adopting the Supplemental Budget was read in full.

MOTION was made by Councilman Allsup, seconded by Councilman Lockman and carried unanimously that Resolution No. 194 be adopted.

4. RESOLUTION NO. 195. TRANSFER OF MONIES

Resolution No. 195 was read in full.

MOTION was made by Councilman Allsup, seconded by Councilman Leeds and carried unanimously that Resolution No. 195 be adopted.

5. LEAVE OF ABSENCE REQUEST BY DONNA ASHLEY

Donna Ashley, Secretary/Matron in the Police Department, requested a leave of absence for a period of six (6) months beginning June 1, 1977 and ending November 30, 1977, due to personal reasons.

After some discussion a MOTION was made by Councilman Leeds and seconded by Councilman Lockman that this request for leave of absence be accepted for the six month period only. Motion carried.

6. APPOINTMENTS

a. Budget Committee Member

With the approval of the Council, Mayor Kerr appointed Andy Anderson to fill the unexpired term of Gil Batty. Term to expire February 1, 1979.

b. Building Official for the City of Brookings as required by State Law effective July 1, 1977.

Mayor Kerr appointed Wendell M. Bartholomew to this position.

7. UPDATED AID AGREEMENT FOR FIRE PROTECTION - COUNTY MUTUAL AID

MOTION was made by Councilman Allsup, seconded by Councilman Lockman and carried unanimously that this agreement be approved and that Mayor and City Recorder be authorized to sign said agreement.

8. FRANK M. CEMPELLIN'S ZONE CHANGE

Cameron C. Thom, City Attorney, advised that he had prepared an Ordinance establishing provisions for the granting of conditional zone changes within the City of Brookings.

The Council had not had the opportunity to review this ordinance thoroughly and recommended that this matter be tabled until the next regular Council meeting of May 10, 1977, for approval.

MOTION was made by Councilman Lockman and seconded by Councilman Allsup that the zone change of Frank M. Cembellin be tabled until next regular Council meeting. Councilman Leeds opposed this Motion. Motion carried.

9. PLANNING COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION NO. 177

Recommend to the Council that the zone change for the Star of the Sea Catholic Church be approved on Tax Lots 400 and 600, Map No. 41-13-5B to change from RL to RH.

MOTION was made by Councilman Leeds, seconded by Councilman Lockman and carried unanimously that a Public Hearing be held on this zone change request at the next regular Council meeting of May 10, 1977.

10. BROOKINGS PARKS & RECREATION COMMISSION REQUEST

Ellis H. Watkins, Chairman, advised the Council of the following actions taken by the Parks and Recreation Commission subject to approval by the Council:

a. Motion to name the Children's Park on Easy Manor Drive the "Elmer Lee Park" in recognition of the interest and efforts by him in

promoting this and the Ransom Avenue Recreation Complex.

Mayor Kerr stated that this would have to be taken under advisement.

- b. Agreement to accept and supervise construction of a chain link fence on the North side of the Palm Stout Park property, this fence to be bought and installed at the expense of Mrs. Palm Stout.

Six months have passed since first action, and the fence is still not completed.

Discussion followed on this project. Materials for project were received in December 1976, the job is not complete as of this date so the bill has not been paid. Mrs. Stout agreed to pay for the fence and installation when the project was completed.

The City crew was to do the clearing where the fence was to be installed. In the process of clearing the debris they ran into one area that was more or less swamp land and the fence erector was in the process of installing the fence, but the condition of land made it impossible to complete the project. The City crew was with the impression that it would be more feasible to eliminate that part of the fence. Mrs. Stout refuses to pay for the fence until it is completed as originally planned.

The bill for the fence is still outstanding against the City of Brookings which reflects bad credit for the City. To correct the area where the fence was not installed requires a considerable amount of fill.

Joe Stonecypher, Consultant Engineer, advised that there is a considerable amount of shale that has been stockpiled from the Chetco Avenue Water Project that could be used for the fill. The City crew was instructed to proceed with the completion of preparation of the area in order that the fencing could be completed.

- c. Agreement to endorse the Chetco Fountain and Park, known as the Bankus Memorial, and see to its functioning and maintenance.
- d. Presented a budget of \$14,000.00 with provision for a full time parks employee as supervisor of parks, with transportation.
- e. Request the availability of a local attorney for Park business. The Palm Stout Trust for the City of Brookings appears to be losing its funds through a practice by the Trustor known as "churning", or manipulating action in the folio for the purpose of claiming commissions. These funds are for the use of the City, but are evidently being milked and legal help is needed to combat this.

11. PAYMENT OF VOUCHERS

MOTION was made by Councilman Leeds, seconded by Councilman Lockman and carried unanimously that vouchers in the amount of \$21,674.77 for the month of March 1977 be paid.

12. SANDRA DIEDRICH (CCCOG) IN REFERENCE TO AERIAL TOPOGRAPHIC MAPPING FOR THE CITY OF BROOKINGS

Mrs. Diedrich explained this type of grant had not been applied for before, but it is possible that it might be approved for it is land use related. The requested grant would be for the amount of \$24,500. and the City of Brookings would contribute \$6,000.00 of in-kind service.

In-kind service is City participation, such as City crew labor to install the control markers and etc., also office personnel for paper work.

A copy of the Preliminary Model Project Proposal, prepared by Robert Higbie, Senior Planner, is attached to the minutes. This explains the project in full.

Mrs. Diedrich advised that before they could proceed with this request authorization would be required from the Council.

MOTION was made by Councilman Allsup, seconded by Councilman Leeds and carried unanimously that Mrs. Diedrich be authorized to file an application for the Topographic Mapping for the City.




ADJOURNMENT

MEMORANDUM

From: City Manager

At various times since having come to this community it has been most clear that topographical aerial photos would be a tremendous tool for this area.

This sort of thing is available from the Oregon State Highway Commission, but only along the highway and generally in 5 foot contours.

Their photos generally do not reach too far from the highway and become less accurate the farther one gets from that highway.

During our planning efforts with the COG staff helping us I have begun to wonder if the City might be lucky enough to get help along these lines and suggested the idea to Bob Higbie, COG planner.


I explained what aerial photos were and how they could be utilized in the planning of proper land use, street lay-out, water and sewer projects, zoning procedures, etc., whereupon he wrote a grant proposal on this. (See enclosed proposal.)

You will note that Higbie is suggesting this as a demonstration project and goes further in depth explaining the merits of this plan to the Commission.

We have no way of knowing what their response will be.

I feel that we have a real possibility of successfully implementing this project and to explain it further, Bob Higbie will be on next regular Council meeting agenda on April 12.

Dear Mr. Brauner:

The attached Demonstration Grant for the City of Brookings is a serious attempt to obtain a useful tool for the purpose of Comprehensive Planning. We are hopeful that this preliminary proposal is given serious consideration for both the City of Brookings and, on the project outcome, for other Oregon cities experiencing a rapid growth in population.

As a model demonstration project this tool will hopefully show that the planning process can be speeded up while, at the same time, increasing the accuracy of data used in developing an effective, realistic Comprehensive Plan.

The proposal identifies many additional benefits which would be of considerable value as an on-going planning tool for use by the city policy-makers in ordinance administration, public facilities extensions and private development.

We are unaware of other rapidly growing cities having a similar aerial topographic mapping tool being used in plan development. We are aware that the basic data concerning soils, topography, and rural land use in the Brookings area is not available at the level existing for all other cities in the integrated grant request. This information will certainly be available within two years but because of the rapid growth and expansion into the foothills, Brookings is in a position of needing more accurate information than what will be available through regular sources. Without this tool, many of the problems now foreseen will be a reality by the time a Comprehensive Plan is adopted and implemented.





Project Description

Aerial topographic mapping provides small scale maps of an area which delineate the topography of the landscape in two foot intervals with a one-inch margin of error. This is accomplished through careful engineering of horizontal and vertical ground control. Each map would cover three to five square city blocks and could identify to the City and developers exact information down to property lines and housing setbacks.

The project requires two specific stages for completion. Initially, the ground controls must be installed. This activity requires engineering and survey expertise plus city labor to install the control markers.

The second state is the aerial photography which requires a clear, winter day when foliage is at a minimum.

The maps are produced by computer and the cost of the initial print is expensive. Additional prints are produced through regular, inexpensive methods.

Introduction

The City of Brookings planning process has been concerned over the rapid growth of the City and the resulting construction in areas of relatively rugged terrain in the coastal foothills which lie immediately adjacent to the urbanized area.

Planning and developing service extensions such as roads, sewer, and water are difficult because of the catch-up positions both activities are currently in. With an annual growth in population of 15 percent, this catch-up position may never be resolved until accurate information is available on the topography and geology of the area.

This proposal attempts to provide the City with a tool that can be utilized in accurate land use planning, as well as the realistic aspects of developing public service extensions in a manner that is efficient and provides for orderly urban growth.

Project Benefits

1. Provides for proper location of streets, sewers, and water systems.
2. Identifies areas where development is inappropriate or to what extent development should be limited.
3. Provides for close examination of the landscape for planning purposes to determine density, development trends, watershed areas, hazards, agricultural and forestry uses, and existing land use.
4. Provides City Council and Planning Commission with accurate data to assist in the decisions of determining appropriate and inappropriate development. This information would also be valuable to private citizens and developers when considering the purchase or development of specific parcels of land.
5. Provides long term savings to the City in the decreased need for engineering and surveying. Most work of this kind could be accomplished without field surveys.
6. The Comprehensive Plan land use map could be developed based on site specific inspection and, therefore, translated into site specific implementation ordinances.
7. The identification of areas to be inventoried to address the Coastal Goals would be clearly portrayed in terms of visual photography, existing uses and growth trends as well as accurate topographic information. As an inventory tool the photographs would allow the City to actually see, in detail, the actual land uses and formations in more clarity than would be attainable through any other form of aerial photography.

Many other benefits would be realized by the City and its citizens which are unknown at this time. However, a priority use would be a visual tool to use in developing a consistent street and housing numbering system essential to emergency units such as fire, police, and ambulance services. Currently, the numbering system is not sequential and disaster has been prevented only because emergency employees are closely familiar with the City. As growth continues the danger is also increased.

Coordination

The project concept has been discussed with the Curry County Planning Department and is well accepted. This is due primarily to the fact that the project includes three sections of land north of the City which is being developed and is expected to continue development. The County realizes that this area will eventually become a part of the City and information from the project will be mutually beneficial to the City and County in determining land use in the Urban Growth Boundary.

CITY MANAGER REPORT

April 13, 1977

CENSUS:

My thanks first to Leo Appel II and his J.C.'s who took this project on and Leo's very precise organizational efforts.

Findings: (Approx. 3000) - Not entirely what we expected.

Enumerator Comments:

- (a) Many new homes under construction
- (b) Housing - some very bad conditions related to outward appearance and upkeep.
- (c) A number of summer homes - out of town owners.
- (d) A number of large residences in area where a single, adult person lives. (This causes the number of persons per residence to decrease.)
- (e) House numbering and addressing system has no consistency or pattern and many residents do not know the name of the lane, drive, or street they live on.

Naming of streets needs to be looked at very directly and a policy should be established that causes a drive or a lane, or street, or boulevard, etc.

Attitude of the City residents:

Very cooperative in every area!

Observations:

Because of the very short time element in conducting this preliminary count there are the following items to consider:

- (a) People not home
- (b) Information obtained from the neighbors for many residents. (Possible inaccuracy.)
- (c) Possible over-reaction to certain, observed situations that may have effected the enumerator's attitude in the project.
- (d) The City's structural permits and growth increased evaluation.

Each of these factors would lend itself to the feeling that this count, in spite of the effort, does not present a true picture.

Concensus of opinions is that the 3240 population figure is still low!

INDUSTRIAL EXPANSION FEASIBILITY STUDY:

Five responses and proposals have been submitted and now reviewed and evaluated. Three areas of evaluation were used:
