MINUTES BROOKINGS COMMON COUNCIL CITY OF BROOKINGS DECEMBER 14, 1976

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Mayor Robert L. Kerr. Members present were Councilmen William Guthrie, Jack Ross, and Darrell Allsup. Absent were Councilman Ellis Dowden and City Manager Al R. Hooten.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

MOTION was made by Councilman Guthrie, seconded by Councilman Ross and carried unanimously that the minutes of regular meeting November 9th, adjourned to November 18, 1976, be approved as presented.

PUBLIC HEARING - STREET IMPROVEMENTS ON OXFORD, MAPLE, AND A PORTION OF CEDAR STREET.

The purpose of this public hearing was for the Council to receive public opinion on this street improvement project. All property owners involved in this street project were notified by certified mail of this public hearing. There are 18 property owners involved. The following remonstrances by letter were received:

Mrs. Audrey Symonds, who owns lot 9 & 10 of Seaview Subdivision. Mr. William O. LaVigne, who owns lot 6 of Coast View Subdivision.

Mr. John P. Long was in the audience and he expressed his opposition to this improvement. Mr. Long owns lots 7, 8, and 9 of Seaview Subdivision.

Ralph E. Renn submitted a letter expressing his objection to the method of financing this project. Mayor Kerr inquired if he owned property in this street improvement district. Mr. Renn advised that he did not. Mr. Renn was then advised by Cameron C. Thom, City Attorney, that only property owners involved have any weight on the project.

Mrs. Clell Frazier was in the audience and inquired why the cost had increased on their lot 17 in the Smith Tract, for at a prior meeting a lesser cost had been proposed. This part of the district will not have a sidewalk for it is a dead end street. Council agreed that some adjustment would be considered.

Mayor Kerr advised that there is a very good chance that the County will be allocating money to the City for street improvement and this can be used in the above named project.

MOTION was made by Councilman Allsup, seconded by Councilman Ross and carried unanimously that the City proceed with the improvements in accordance with Resolution No. 192 and adopt an assessment ordinance at a later date.

3. AGREEMENT FOR ENGINEERING SERVICES WITH H.G.E., INC.

This agreement was tabled until regular meeting of January 1977. At that time the two new Councilmen will be in office.

4. PLANNING COMMISSION RECOMMENDATIONS NUMBERED 172 & 173.

No. 172 recommends to the City Council they authorize zone change of the lower portion of tax lot 300, map 41-13-6CD from RL to RH to permit the construction of multi-family units in a planned development condominium as requested by Frank Cembellin.

Property owners located within the affected boundaries of the above requested zone change were in the audience and expressed their opposition to this zone change. They presented the Mayor and Council with a signed appeal to the Planning Commission's Order of December 7, 1976, changing the Mill Beach area from RL to RH. This appeal is made a part of these minutes.

City Manager was directed to call for a Public Hearing before the Council on the above named zone change when the necessary plans and documents are received from Frank Cembellin.

No. 173 recommends to the City Council they authorize the Building Department to make a block to block inspection of buildings in Commercial Zone in order to comply with Safety, Fire and Building Codes. No action need be taken for this is part of their job.

5. APPOINTMENTS OF PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSIONERS.

Mayor Kerr reappointed John Lacy, Clarence Fix, and H. Lee Hansen to another four year term as Commissioners on the Brookings Parks and Recreation Commission.

Lee Hansen read a letter of appreciation from the Parks and Recreation Commissioners that was presented to Councilman Jack Ross, thanking him for his help during his term as Councilman. Copy of this letter is attached.

6. PAYMENT OF VOUCHERS.

MOTION was made by Councilman Ross, seconded by Councilman Guthrie that the vouchers for the month of November 1976 be paid with the exception of the bill to Brookside Construction Co. for the amount of \$400.00, this is to be held until a lease purchase agreement for street roller be presented to the Council for approval. Total amount to be paid of \$24,105.34. Motion carried.

OTHER MATTERS:

John Darjany, who is purchasing property on Wharf and King Streets, asked the Council to either move the sewer and water lines along the roadway on one corner of this property or purchase half acre of this parcel, which he stated that this half acre is a loss to him. He requested that the City make a reasonable offer. Mr. Darjany was advised that this road has been located there for some twenty years. City Attorney advised Mr. Darjany that he should have his legal counsel advise the City why we have to move the sewer and water lines. Mr. Darjany stated that City Engineer and Superintendent of Public Works advised him that the City was in error and that it would be corrected. Mayor Kerr advised that any decision of this magnitude would have to come from the Council, not City employees. Hany Parsi, City Engineer, was instructed to supply City Attorney with all information on this property and he will advise.

CITY MANAGER REPORT

ITEM - OXFORD, MAPLE, CEDAR STREET PROJECT

We have proposed costs of approximately \$44,000.00 for this project and have recently been assured by the Board of County Commissioners that we will be receiving financial help for street and drainage projects.

This could result in the property owner's assessment being reduced to 1/2 the original figure (\$14.00/ft). (Proposed City Policy).

This would allow for more street projects if the City were to offer to go on a 50/50 basis of a street improvement effort.

I feel also that if this could become a reality then the City would be in a favorable position to set minimum improvement levels such as curbs and paving at least; no more oil matting which does not allow for any drainage solutions.

ITEM - DRAINAGE PROJECTS

Curry Medical Clinic Ransom Street Extension Bicycle Path at Crissey Circle

These three projects are also included in the County Assistance and will be constructed as soon as possible.

We are planning on ordering the materials for these projects through the County. This way the pipe and bands can be shipped in and the projects implemented prior to a supplemental budget process at the County level which will occur shortly after January 1. This would allow the City crews to be working on these projects in the very near future.

ITEM - 3RD STREET SEWER PROJECT

This project will extend the sewer line from Easy Street up 3rd Street to serve several pieces of property, the primary one being an 8 home dvelopment by Keith and Draheim, builders.

This project was engineered once before and the property owners at that time refused to be included in a District or to accept any assessments. Recently they signed a statement requesting such improvement. They are now concerned that the City may by traditional habit assess on a square footage basis and they resist this. Proposal: That the assessment be made on a front footage basis with the idea of an additional hook-up fee of \$205.00 per unit be applied. This then allows them to pay their share of the initial costs along with the developer who will construct his own 8" service line to City specs and each service line and pay \$205.00 per unit.

Later, each of the other properties as they would be built upon would pay the \$205.00 hook-up fee.

The records on the 5th Street special project will show that of the \$1,100.00 per lot fee that wes paid \$205.00 was the hook-up charge; the balance was for their cost of the construction. The City has now received enough payment to meet all bills on that project and we will receive an additional \$5,500.00 from

added properties on that line.

ITEM - RANSOM LITTLE LEAGUE PROJECT

We have requested, (as instructed by Curt Baker, B.O.R.), our 75% of the 75% that B.O.R. will give to the City which is \$7,000.00 plus and should be receiving this shortly. Along with this we have been advised by the Park and Recreation Commission that we should plan to install watering facilities underground prior to laying the sod down. This was something that was not planned for in the project.

The monies that the various clubs have donated for this project can be used for that purpose and upon researching would be more than enough to pay for this piping.

If you have suggestions on this I would appreciate them. It seems wrong to lay sod down with the idea of an on-surface volunteer watering operation as has been the policy up to now.

ITEM -THE INDUSTRIAL PARK & WATER SUTDY

This application is now being finalized by the Economic Development Administration at Seattle for final submission to the Federal authorities in Washington.

The program work element was increased at Seattle Region 10 request from \$13,500 to \$15,000 for their reasons which were that they felt we needed the additional \$1,500 in Federal grant to actually obtain the quality of study the project demands.

The City's match will be \$5,000 and will be based upon the staff time that will accrue on this project in assisting the consultant in the study process.

The program treats this personnel time as a cash match.

ITEM - THE PUBLIC WORKS PROJECT (UPPER LEVEL WATER)

This final application in the amount of \$517,762.00.

This project carries a 47.2% labor cost and the criteria of the Public Works Act related to projects that would incur high degrees of labor cost. A 25% - 30% labor factor was considered a borderline project and could result in not being considered.

December 3 was cut off day on all applications and we feel that Brookings stands a good chance to be approved.

The project includes 10,000 lineal feet of water transmission lines, a 150,000 gallon water storage facility, 2 pumping stations, and a fire flow station in the Park View area near Dodge Avenue.

We will receive word on this project in 3 - 4 weeks.

ITEM - THE LOC CONVENTION IN PORTLAND

This conference began on November 14, Sunday at 12:00 noon with a City Managers' luncheon.

Presiding - Eldon Mills, City Mgr. Hillsboro Topic - Coping with a changing Council

Speaker - Hugh McKinley, City Mgr. San Diego

Hugh is an old friend of mine having started his career in Sutherlin, Oregon; then Grants Pass, Eugene, and now San Diego.

His experiences in San Diego are of very real interest to many managers here in Oregon.

2:00 P.M. - Workshop for City Managers

Topic: Group Insurance - LOC program.

Changes in the insurance program were discussed with additional variations being suggested. The League staff will compile this material and send out to all cities.

A series of Round Table discussions then took place with the following topics discussed:

Communications between Manager and Council Special problems of the Manager in Small Cities "In House" staff training and development Employment agreements for Manager. Conducting a lawful employment interview Making the best use of assistants Labor Relations and Bargaining agreements Council-Manager Plan under Fire

4:00 P.M. - Workshop - Safe Drinking Water Act

Presiding - Al R. Hooten, City Manager, Brookings

Topic - What the Safe Drinking Water Act means for Oregon Cities.

Speakers were: Art Goodman - Ass't. Administrator, Oregon State Health Division.

Richard Hatchard, Chief, Protective Health Services, Oregon State Health Division.

Al Smythe, Manager, Water Supply Section, Oregon State Health Division.

These Staff people actually gave the audience a great deal of hope in that the new Director of the Health Division believes that the citizenry of the State will be cooperated with instead of "setting forth the law!".

The State is beginning to realize that economics must be considered when a community is forced to meet State requirements.

Monday, Nov. 15 - 9:00 A.M. - General Session
Topic: Public Planning and Control of Urban and Land Development

This was a very interesting and provocative session with some of the presentation being now implemented in the Brookings Planning Commission.

This has to do with having some local High School representatives (students) become involved in the planning process. I have talked to the student council on this and now have a request from the Planning Commission members to identify students and have them officially appointed by the Mayor.

A workshop session on "Managing Conflict" took place during Monday which Bob Babb attended and occurred from 9:00 A.M. - 4:00 P.M.

2:00 P.M. - Small City Workshop

I attended this session and brought back materials that will be used in evaluating the Department Heads and helping them to discover things about themselves and their talents.

This intensive session focused upon a person's style of leadership and instructed those participants in ways to work more effectively with one another and with groups of people.

This was a high priority session, well attended and well received. It finished at 5:00 P.M. and that concluded the Conference.

ITEM - LABOR RELATIONS WORKSHOP

Herb Herzog and I will be attending in Eugene on December 16 and 17 a Local Government Personnel Institute workshop on Labor Relations. We are registered in the Section of Management working without Unions.

The 4 main topics are:

- (1) Legal framework for employee relations
- (2) Bargaining Process and Strategy
- (3) Contract and Grievance Administration
- (4) Personnel Policy and Administration

Labor relations is now being considered at the State Legislative level as something that should be administered by the State thus taking local Home Rule out of the picture.

I believe we must keep entirely abreast of this situation as it develops.
