## CITY OF BROOKINGS COUNCIL MEETING MAY 13, 1969

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M. by Mayor Harold R. Young.

Councilmen present were Gil Batty, Alden Loring, Scott Sheppard and Bill Higham. Also present was City Attorney Cameron C. Thom.

Reporters present were Marge Barrett, Ruth Brewer and Dick Keusink.

Mayor Young opened the meeting with the flag salute. Devotions were given by Reverend Richard Glidden.

MOTION was made by Scott Sheppard and seconded by Alden Loring that the minutes of the April 8th meeting be accepted as posted. Motion carried.

Bids that were opened at the April 8th meeting for a tractor with loader and mower for the street department, were to be acted upon at this meeting, but had to be rejected delto a typographical error This tractor had been put in the 1969-70 budget but due to the lack of resources this item was removed from the budget. These bids will be readvertised again when the City is in the position to purchase this tractor.

The Lease Agreement with Azalea Bowling Lanes expires on June 30, 1969. This is a sign lease and is located at the corner of Hwy 101 and Oak St. The City Recorder was instructed to contact the present owner of Azalea Bowling Lanes to find out if this lease agreement is to be renewed.

Request from Elmer Bankus, Brookings Water Co., that they be permit to furnish the City with a surety bond in the amount of \$5,000 in lieu of cash deposits for pavement and sidewalk cut permits. City Attorney Cameron C. Thom was instructed by the Council to proceed with an ammendment to Ordinance 181 and it will be presented at the next Council meeting on June/8th for approval.

MOTION was made by Bill Higham and seconded by Gil Batty that Lee Fountain be given permission to issue to the Chamber of Commerce a permit to erect and maintain two banners, not to exceed 30 feet in length and 4 feet in width, and painted thereon, "Welcome-Azales Festival, May 30, 31 and June 1, over and across the right of way of the Oregon Coast Highway at Brookings, and more particularly as being at milepost 356.7 and 358.1. This permit for the year 1969. Motion carried.

MOTION was made by Scott Sheppard and seconded by Bill Higham that Lee Fountain, Building Inspector, be authorized to subscribe to the International Congress of Building Officials literature for one year The fee for this is \$50.00. Motion carried.

Lee Fountain had corresponded with Allen Smith, DBA as Brookside Azalea Greenhouse, in regards to having the debris cleaned up around his place of business by May 15, 1969. As of this date ther has been no response. MOTION was made by Scott Sheppard and seconded by Gil Batty that Mr. Fountain once again contact Mr. Alle on May 14th and he be given 48 hours to clean up the debris and if i not cleaned up by then the City is to take action. Motion carried.

Preliminary set of plans for the 1969 Special City Allotment project on Fern Ave. with the Oregon State Highway Department was presented The approval of this plan was tabled until the Special Council meet to be held on May 27, 1969 at 8:00 P.M. Engineer is to be present at this meeting to also go over the plans.

MOTION was made by Gil Batty and seconded by Bill Higham that Resolution No. 137, establishing one hour legal parking in described parking areas be accepted. Motion carried.

A letter from Edward W. Riley, Professional Engineer, concerning a retainer fee for the Engineering for the City of Brookings was read. This letter of information is to be tabled until the Special Council meeting to be held on May 27, 1969.

Mayor Harold Young brought it to the attention of the audience that the proposed budget for the year 1969-70 is within the 6% limitatio. The next Budget Committee meeting is to be held on May 19th at 8:00

It was announced by Mayor Young that in the future the City of Brookings will hold their regular Council meeting on the 2nd Tuesda of each month and that a special Council meeting will be held on th 4th Tuesday of each month at 8:00 P.M. The City Attorney will be present at the regular Council meeting but not at the special meeting are open to the public.

MOTION was made by Bill Higham and seconded by Alden Loring that Mr. Oliver Moody, Sewer Operator, be given permission to attend and take the State Examination for Sewer Operator in Medford . This meeting is in the month of May and Mr. Moody will spend two nights and one day there. The expenses are to be paid by the City. Motio carried.

A letter to Mayor Harold Young and Brookings City Council was read and is attached hereto. This letter was signed by property owners who are opposed to the suggestions of a trailer park, mobile home location, trailer site, mobile estate plan or any other like attemp to alter the basic beauty of the general area which lies east of Ol County Road and North and West of Bankus (pipeline) Road in the northeast Brookings area.

MOTION was made by Alden Loring and seconded by Scott Sheppard that the vouchers in the amount of \$9,289.28 be paid. Motion carried.

MOTION was made by Gil Batty and seconded by Scott Sheppard that th meeting be adjourned. Motion carried. Meeting was adjourned at 9:3 Personel session was held per request of one City Patrolman.

We, the undersigned property owners, taxpayers and citizens are unalterably opposed to the suggestions of a trailer park, mobile home location, trailer site, mobile estate plan or any other like attempt to alter the basic beauty of the general area which lies east of Old County Road and north and west of Bankus (Pipeline) Road in the northeast Brookings area.

The location is among the last of prime, high value, homesites in Brookings which offer so

much to the home builder who appreciates the asthetic beauty of a hillside residence.

The topography of this hillside property is such that it best lends itself to construction of split level, or two-story, homes. The high-class development that this property could attract under the right type of planning would also be a stimulant to other areas of the city outside the immediate surroundings.

We believe that any proposals to designate the area for any type of mobile home location would down-grade property values, despoil the land and be against the best interests of community planning. It would lower the potential assessed evaluation of the property, creating an extra

burden of taxation on other taxpayers.

In deference to those who seek the sale of their property to offset the rising advance of taxes we are in sympathy with their plight; however the land should be worth even more if sold as

large homesites.

We do not feel that any suggestion that the establishment of such a trailer park, mobile estate, mobile home site or similar trailer plan in that area is the city's answer to those who advocate that a trailer location is necessary in the City of Brookings.

What you do now determines the future of Brookings.
