

REGULAR MEETING OF THE COUNCIL
CITY OF BROOKINGS
MAY 14, 1968

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 P. M. by Mayor Bruce J. Manley.

Councilmen present were Gilbert Batty, Lloyd Mosier, Henry Kerr, and Alden Loring.

Reporters present were Ruth Brewer, Marge Barrett, and Dick Keusink.

Minutes of the regular meeting held April 9 and special meetings held April 12 and May 10 were approved as posted.

No bids had been received on three pieces of foreclosed property which had previously been advertised to be opened at this time. It was indicated that the properties would be readvertised at a future date.

B. A. Martin, Consulting Engineer, gave a report on the water intake structure bids which were opened on May 10. He pointed out that approximately six sets of plans went out to prospective bidders, but only two of them placed bids with the City, none of them being local contractors. The bids, both in excess of \$56,000, were considerably above the engineering estimates. This being the case, Mr. Martin pointed out, it is quite possible that we are apparently low on our estimate on the rest of the system. He recommended that we recheck our original figures and re-evaluate the entire proposed system before proceeding any further. He said that these computations could be completed in approximately one to one and one half weeks. Lloyd Mosier made a MOTION that the Council table the award of the bid on the water intake structure until consulting engineer B. A. Martin can re-evaluate the costs of the system. Gilbert Batty seconded the motion which was un-animously passed.


City Recorder Robert Dimmick, Jr. reported that he had checked with the City of Gold Beach pertaining to their limited parking procedures as was requested by the Budget Committee at their May 13 meeting. The Gold Beach City Recorder pointed out that their limited parking seems to "work fine!" Revenue from their overtime parking fines is approximately \$45 to \$50 per year. She also pointed out that their Council has considered reinstalling the parking meters. This has been placed to the vote of the people seven times and defeated seven times. Three local business people appeared in protest to removing the parking meters in Brookings. They questioned the seriousness of the objections to the parking meters and pointed out that meters were the best way to control the parking problem which now exists. They also felt that it would be extremely short-sighted to omit any potential source of revenue for the city. Following lengthy further discussion on the meters, Mayor Manley suggested that the item be set aside until the next meeting and that an impartial report on the feeling of the local merchants should be undertaken.

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

Vouchers totaling \$5,965.61 were presented for payment. Alden Loring made a MOTION that the vouchers be paid. Gilbert Batty seconded the motion which was unanimously approved.
