ORDINANCE NO. 602

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING AN EMERGENCY PURCHASE OF TWO (2) POLICE CARS WITHOUT FURTHER COMPETITIVE BIDDING; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the City of Canby has heretofore advertised for and received bids for its purchase of two (2) police patrol cars. The NOTICE OF CALL FOR BIDS was duly and regularly published for two (2) successive issues in The Canby Herald, a newspaper of general circulation printed and published in Canby, Oregon. Said publications were made on December 24, 1975, and December 31, 1975; and

WHEREAS, bids as advertised were publicly opened at the Canby City Hall at 2:00 o'clock p.m. on January 15, 1976, and four bids were received and later considered by the Canby City Council and as follows:

WHEREAS, the Canby City Council, as the City's Contract Review Board, has considered the bids and the recommendations of the City Administrator and also the recommendations of the Chief of the Police Department, and has determined that the lowest bid exceeded the availability of funds for such purchase and exceeded also other prices for comparable units with the required specifications and which are available from another supplier; and all bids were therefore rejected; and

WHEREAS, Carr Chevy of Beaverton, Oregon, has available for delivery in 30 to 45 days two police patrol cars (both new) and which meet the specifications specified and required for the City of Canby, and each unit is available at a cash price of \$4,289.15 and is less than the lowest bid which the City has been able to obtain from its advertisement for competitive bidding; and

WHEREAS, the Canby City Council, acting as a Contract Review Board as established by Ordinance No. 600 enacted January 5, 1976, determined at its meeting on January 26, 1976, that emergency conditions require prompt execution of a Contract for Purchase of two (2) police patrol cars; and the required equipment at a lower price is available only through Carr Chevrolet of Beaverton, Oregon, which was the successful bidder to furnish police cars to the City of Beaverton and has two (2) extra units avilable if purchased immediately; now, therefore,

THE CITY OF CANBY ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: An emergency is hereby declared to exist, and the Mayor and City Recorder are authorized and directed to make, execute and deliver in the name of the City of Canby and on its behalf a Contract for the immediate purchase from Carr Chevy of Beaverton, Oregon, of two (2) police patrol cars for \$4,347.65each and a total purchase price of \$8,695.30.

Section 2: The total purchase price for the two police patrol cars is to be paid on delivery of the equipment and receipt of the billing and approval of the City Administrator that both units conform to the City's specifications for said equipment, from budgeted funds now on hand in the Motor Pool Budget Line item.

Section 3: Because of the emergency herein declared to exist and the urgent need for two police patrol cars, this Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its enactment after final reading. Passed on first reading at a regular meeting of the Canby City Council on Monday, February 2, 1976; ordered posted in three (3) public and conspicuous places in the City of Canby for a period of two (2) full calendar weeks as required by the Canby City Charter; and to come up for final reading and action of the Canby City Council at a regular meeting thereof to be held on Monday, March 1, 1976, at the hour of 8:00 o'clock p.m. at the Canby City Hall.
