

# **Canby Land Needs Study**

Summary of key findings and policy recommendations

- Discussion of our Assumptions
- Question: Many downtown commercial lots have older homes on them and no commercial facility. Should we assume they will all redevelop within the 20 yr planning horizon? Alternatively we could look at house to land value and make a determination, or?
- ❖ FYI-Willamette Valley Country Club is zoned R-1, but is designated private recreation on our Comprehensive Plan. We have no such zone, so if they wished to develop the golf course as single family homes it would be allowed. The site is large (over 150 acres) and it could absorb 700-800 dwelling units. Our R-1 available land inventory included that land for future development.
- ❖ Population projections: Required to use coordinated projections if available. We used the Clackamas County Rural Cities Population Forecasts, and we participated in the process.
- ❖ We have no coordinated retail service, government or industrial growth projections available to us. Our 2010 TSP Update projected employment based on full buildout, not need. We propose to use the Clackamas County Non-Retail Employment Land Demand Analysis (2014) for our industrial projections. We capture a percentage of County growth by sector, and will assume we will continue to do so.

The County study does include retail, service and government projections as well. We will use that document as our base and will review historic trends; review the FCS Group 2012 Canby Clusters Analysis & FCS Group 2015 Clackamas County Economic Emerging Trends Update report, and the Canby Retial Market Analysis Update from Marketek (2012) to adjust our projections if necessary.

# Question: Does the Council support this approach?


Projecting future industrial, retail & service land needs is often calculated using Metro's Employee per Square Foot Density Study in conjunction with Floor Area Ratios. Canby does not have FAR requirements. We propose to use employee per square foot to project future need. We have our data for the PIP, which on average is 15 employees per acre which is consistent with other similarly sized communities. We do not have local date for retail services or government. We could use the Metro study to determine employees per acre or we could use the averages common to other similarly sized communities. That would be 20 employees per acre for government and retail services. We propose to use these averages.

# Does the Council support this approach?

- Staff shall make code recommendations if necessary. We already know that we have an aging population on one hand and Gen Yers aka Millennials on the other hand. Both are growing segments of our population and often prefer smaller homes with easy access to downtown amenities. Should staff draft code alternatives for Council consideration that would encourage/accommodate small homes?
- Since we will be submitting the report as a Comprehensive Plan amendment, and will most likely be proposing some code changes to reflect the results from the study, it is an opportune time to include any rezoning of interest to the City. Staff discussed possibilities with our Planning Director and our Economic Development Director, and has included maps of the proposed changes for your consideration and comment.
- Question: Shall we move forward with the proposed zone changes? If so, shall we propose the changes as part of the Land Needs Study CPA amendment of a separate process?

Urban Gowth Boundary



  - We honor the Stewardship of the prior board and the carryover funds which are part of tonight's donation

RE: Requests for Support from the Friends of the Library

Below are the requests to the Friends of the Library for library support for FY 16-17.

- Family cultural passes: \$890. This purchases family passes from:
  - The Evergreen Aviation Museum (\$100.00)
  - Lan Su Chinese Garden (\$200)
  - o Portland Japanese Garden (\$75)
  - o Crystal Springs Rhododendron Garden (\$30)
  - o Pittock Mansion (\$85)
  - o Portland Art Museum (\$100.00)
  - The End of the Oregon Trail Interpretive Center (in Oregon City) (\$15)
  - o The Gilbert House Children's Museum Salem (\$85)
  - o The World of Speed (\$200)
- Book Page: \$480. A book-focused publication offered for free to library patrons (100 copies a month)
- Music in the Stacks: \$3,500. This will fund approximately seven concerts from September May.
- Family programming: \$3,300. This funds our Thursday night events for children and families through the school year and includes 12 family programs (12 @\$275 per month or \$3,300)
- **Monthly movie nights: \$313.** By covering the movie licensing fee, this grant allows the library to show two free family focused movies each month—one in English and one in Spanish.
- Adult programming. \$2,000. This will fund ongoing programs for adults from September May.
- Outreach/Programming to Spanish speakers: \$2,000. This funding will provide a year-round roster of programs for Latino audiences, including Hispanic Heritage Month (Sept./Oct.), Day of the Dead (November), Noche de Cuentos/A Night of Stories (a family literacy initiative)(March) and Dia de los Ninos/Dia de los Libros (April).
- Teen programming: \$600. This will fund special teen events from September through May.
- **Children's Summer Reading: \$2,500**. This funding will help provide performers, materials and incentives that make Summer Reading a success each year.
- Adult Summer Reading incentives: \$300

The total for these requests is \$15,883. It is recommended that this grant be paid in two installments on the following payment schedule: December 2016 - \$7,941.15; June 2017 - \$7,941.15

As always, we thank the Friends for making it possible for the library to offer enriching and entertaining programs and services to our community!
