

Special Meeting
Thursday, July 2-1953

A special meeting of the City Council was held on Thursday, July 2 and called to order at 8.15 P.M.

Present: Mayor Eversole, Atty. Zimmerman, Supt. Tatone, the Recorder and the following Councilmen: Anderson, Hill, Hulbert and Kraft. Absent, Beck and Girod.

The Mayor announced the meeting had been called as follows, a notice of which had been mailed to each member of the Council, on June 30-1953.

" For the purpose of consulting with Mr. Raymond C. Coulter of the League of Oregon Cities and other business that might appear, the Mayor is calling a special meeting of the City Council for Thursday, July 2nd., at 8 o'clock P.M."

Mr. Coulter sat in with the Council for a couple of hours, stating his opinions on various matters and enlightening the members on different subjects.

With reference to doing business at special meetings, other than that for which it had been primarily called, it was his opinion, that operating under "Home Rule" procedure, as Canby is, the legality of such could not be questioned, except for major measures vitally affecting the public.

Mr. Aleck Collins then presented a petition signed by the large majority of property owners affected, for the oiling, graveling and grading North Ivy street from 6th. Avenue to Virginia. In this connection, the City Attorney was requested to draw up the necessary ordinance.

Mayor Eversole then announced that the American Legion post desired to install certain playground equipment in Wait Park, which matter to be considered later.

The Recorder then read a letter from W.E. Trommershausen, Manager of the S.W. Area of the B.P.A. stating that he would be glad to meet with the City Council at some later date, to discuss the questions which come up from time to time on the use of surplus revenues from the City's Light Department. The letter included various comments, which the writer stated might be given some consideration in the meantime.

Councilman Kraft then stated that he had received several complaints of speeding on the Cemetery Road and suggested placing some speed limit signs. Left to street Com.

The Recorder was then instructed to mail ex-Supt. Raines a warrant covering payment for a four weeks vacation period.

It was then announced that the new Ferry would have it's official trial run on Saturday forenoon, July 3, and all city officials were invited.

No other business appearing, the meeting adjourned.
