

Regu' : Monthly Meeting
Monday, Febr. 5-1951

The Council met in regular session on Monday, Febr. 5 and was called to order at 8.15 P.M.

Present: Mayor Irwin, Atty. Zimmerman, the Recorder, Supt. Raines, Chief of Police Hudson and Councilmen Cutsforth, Girod, Hill, Kraft and Rupp.

The minutes of the previous regular meeting of January 2 were read and approved.

Mayor Irwin then announced that the regular order of business would be suspended in order to listen to Mr. Chas. Dunn of the Bonneville Power Administration, who had prepared and submitted a new contract between the B.P.A. and Canby.

Mr. Dunn explained some of the features of the contract and suggested that it be given some study and bro't up at a later meeting for action.

The Recorder then read to the Council the proposed "Agreement" between the Portland General Electric Co. and Canby, which seemed to be agreeable to the members, subject to a few changes suggested by Mr. Dunn. Whereupon the Recorder was instructed to re-write the "Agreement", making the changes and ask for the inclusion of "Exhibit A" mentioned, but which had not been presented. This matter also would then be taken up at a future meeting.

Communications.

The following communications were then read:

From the State Welfare Commission office relative to the new social security law as it applies to employees of political subdivisions of the State, it first being necessary for the legislature to pass enabling act.

From the State Civil Defense Agency to the Chief of the Fire Department and enclosing booklet relative to defense plans.

From the State Highway Commission in regard to proposed light at intersection of 99E and Molalla Avenue.

From Thomas & Telford as to insurance coverage for operation of ambulance.

From Howard Palmer of Woodburn stating that he would be interested in securing Canby's garbage disposal business.

Discussion concerning the proposed light at the Highway intersection with Molalla Avenue then ensued and the Recorder was requested to write Senator Belton and Rep. Lloyd Crosby for information as to the financial arrangements with the Highway Commission where similar lights had been installed, particularly those between Gladstone and Milwaukie.

Former City Treasurer John Eid then presented and read his report covering the last quarter of 1950, the same being accepted, subject to audit and approval of the Finance Committee.

Whereupon it appearing that a piece of legislation important to the cities of Oregon was about to be introduced in the House of Representatives now in session, the Recorder was instructed to write all members of the committee having it in charge, urging the passage of the same. This bill provides for allocation to towns and cities, on a per capita basis, of 10% of the net liquor revenues collected by the Oregon Liquor Control Commission in addition to the cities' share of license receipts.

Civil Defense

Mayor Irwin announced that Ralph Hulbert had been contacted and in all probability would take over the job of chairman of the Civil Defense organization.

The following claims against the city were then presented and on motion, seconded and carried, ordered paid and warrants drawn:

Reports of Officers

Chief of Police Hudson presented his usual monthly report covering his various activities, which included a list of property owners who had been contacted and who had abolished outside toilets or who had agreed to do so.

Fire Chief reported but one call- a chimney fire at the Berge store at Macksburg. No damage. Also ambulance made five runs during month.

The Recorder reported 12 cases in his Court in January, resulting in fines of \$ 135.00, costs \$ 35.00. Also nine building permits issued to date.

Supt. Raines stated that he had had more or less wire trouble during the month and also reported the accident to Don Stajgr. Furthermore said he needed an experienced lineman.

At this point Mayor Irwin bro't up the matter of the Sather will and asked Atty. Zimmerman what he knew about it.

Mr. Zimmerman explained that in the suit bro't by Mrs. Sather vs. C.E. Johnson, the executor of the will, the Court had ordered the money drawn out of a joint account by Mr. Sather to be returned to that account. Therefore these funds going to Mrs. Sather plus the \$ 300 per month, previously allowed Mrs. Sather for one year, would not leave much to cover the other bequests in the will.

Atty. Zimmerman was then asked to check into the matter again and find out it's present status.

The Mayor then called for a report from the wage adjustment special committee composed of Messrs. Girod, Anderson and Hill, who presented the following recommendations:

Councilman Kraft then stated that, in his opinion, the allotment now allowed the Fire Dept. and Chief Yoder of \$ 20.00 each should be raised to \$ 40.00 each.

Whereupon on motion, seconded and carried, it was voted to accept the committee's recommendations, including that of Mr. Kraft's, all retroactive from January 1-1951.

Fire Chief Yoder then reported that 500 feet of 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " hose had been purchased at 1.78 per foot; also that ten firemen's suits were needed and which would cost about \$ 350.00. This was left to Councilman Kraft, with power to act.

Councilman Rupp then stated that a new mower was badly needed for the Cemetery and he was instructed to act in the matter.

No other business appearing, the meeting adjourned.
