Police Chief Hudson presented his usual monthly report in detail, listing number of arrests made, property reported stolen and recovered, assistance given state police and sheriff's office and various other matters.

The Recorder reported 32 cases handled in Court during October, with resulting fines of \$ 360.00-Costs 82.50

Fire Chief Yoder reported five fires in October, the most serious ones at the Mary Thompson place, damages estimated at \$ 3000 and that of Elsie Garnall's -damage \$ 400.

The department also aided at the Donald Brick & Tile Co. fire on the 25t The City Treasurer's report for the quarter ending Sept. 30 was read and accepted subject to audit by the

Finance Committee.

supt. Raines in his verbal report stated that for the street lighting the City should have (1) of the Mercury Vapor lights instead of the 10 previously allowed.

Also said that three recording meters were quite necessary. (this was left to com.)

Also reported that street from the Wilkinson mill to city dump had been graded and graveled.

It was then moved, seconded and carried that the (11) lights be ordered from the General Electric Supply Corp. at a cost of \$ 986.15.

The following report relative to the new ambulance and it's activities was then made by Bud Kraft.

Ambulance Report by and Kraft

The complete cost of Ambulance, including the Ambulance, cost of transporting, equipment, and servicing is \$5300. To date the amount of donations received is \$4800 and of this amount \$4400 has been paid out. Thus leaving a balance of \$1300 to be paid for completion of full amount. The Volunteer Firemen have paid the unpaid balance from their own treasury thus leaving the unpaid balance to be paid to them. The balance in the Ambulance fund is \$400 so therefore there is \$800 left to be raised in order to clear the complete debt on the Ambulance.

The Ambulance to date has answered 18 calls, and of these four have paid donations toward their services. As the present method of receiving donations is not proving satisfactory, a letter head is in the making explaining the exact organisation and operation of the ambulance. A letter will be sent to each patient that is carried to a destination in which this letter will explain that they aren't being charged, but that a donation of what ever they felt the service was worth would be greatly appreciated. The letter will be a block letter so that every letter mailed out will be the same.

Armain factor to be irone out is the obtaining a donation from the calls that are govered by insurance. Since the patient that is carried does not feel like paying for a call that is covered by insurance, and the insurance companies aren't in the practise of paying calls unless they are billed for them, so our next plan is that in case the insurance companies don't acknowledge the letters from us, the patient can pay us a donation for which they will receive a receipt and in turn present the receipt to the issurance company for reimbursement.

November 7-continued

It was then moved, seconded and carried that the Mayor and Recorder be authorized to sign the new Southern Pacific lease on their property used as the city dump.

Whereupon on motion, seconded and carried, it was voted to approve the 1950 beer licenses issued by the State Liquor Control Commission to the Hi-Way Market and the Rose Cafe.

It was then moved by Porter, seconded by Anderson and carried, that the Recorder be instructed to write to the State Corn Show committee inviting them to hold the 1950 meeting in Canby.

Whereupon on motion by Beck, seconded by Rupp and carried, it was voted to request the city attorney to prepare an ordinance fixing a certain amount to be added to the consumer's monthly water bill, for the purpose of creating a sewer system sinking fund.

The matter of housing one of the fire trucks and ambulance then was discussed at some length, but with no results.

No other business appearing , the meeting adjourned.
