

Regular Monthly Meeting
Mond , November 1-1948

The City Council met in regular session on Monday, November 1, 1948 and was called to order at about 8.30 P.M.

Present: Mayor Markee, Atty. Zimmerman, Chief of Police Hudson, Supt. Raines, the Recorder and Councilmen Cutsforth, Eversole, Johnson, Kraft Krueger and Monahan. Absent Makin.

The minutes of the last regular meeting of October 4 and those of the special meeting of October 25 were read and approved.

The Recorder then read a communication from the Department of Vocational Education addressed to the Fire Dept. chief and relative to a study course for the firemen. It was stated that the cost of the course had been kept at a minimum and copies could be obtained for \$ 2.15, consisting of technical instructions for firemen.

Whereupon it appearing that the balance in the Water Fund had become depleted on account of the many new extensions necessary and the high cost of material, it was moved by Eversole, seconded by Cutsforth and carried, that a warrant for \$ 4000 be drawn, the same to be registered by the City Treasurer for "lack of funds" and payable to the Canby Union Bank, the bank to advance the funds at an interest rate of 4% per annum.

Reports of Officers

Chief of Police Hudson submitted in detail his report for the month, showing arrests made, warnings given to motorists, complaints investigated, etc.; also stated that there had been some rowdyism and drinking at the skating rink, which situation he was trying to correct. He also thought that traffic conditions had been very much improved.

The Recorder reported having handled 28 cases in his court during the month, with fines assessed in the sum of \$ 270.00-Costs \$ 70.00.

Fire Chief Yoder reported three calls in October-to W.P. Leek dwelling, Pearson's Tavern and Wm. Gabert's.

Yoder also stated that the members of the Department had voted to take advantage of the study course offered by the Board of Education, but asked that the City defray the expenses.

Whereupon on motion by Eversole, seconded by Cutsforth and carried, it was voted to stand the expense of 20 copies of instruction books, to be used in connection with the educational course as above mentioned, at a cost of \$ 2.15 per copy.

Floyd Galbraith, caretaker of the cemetery then bro't up the matter of Fred Larson's burial and on motion of Cutsforth, seconded by Kraft and carried, it was voted to waive all burial expenses on account of the past services of the deceased in organizing and working in behalf of the fire department.

Supt. Raines reported having contacted the Browns relative to the action of the Council in furnishing water and electric power for their new addition.

Also stated that North Ivy street had been graded and graveled according to specifications, but should be approved by Ralph Miln before accepting.

Mr. Raines then presented a map of the City showing the proposed method of numbering the houses and stated that Mr. Miln had suggested that notices be sent to each property owner indicating the number to be installed; also that the City should purchase the plates and attend to the installation of same.

It was then moved by Johnson, seconded by Krueger and carried, that the committee in charge be authorized to purchase the necessary numbers and make arrangements for their installation.

It was then moved by Eversole, seconded by Monahan that a committee of three be appointed to contact Messrs. Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merrifield with the idea of selecting a site for a disposal plant for city sewage. So voted and the Mayor appointed Councilmen Johnson, Eversole and Cutsforth to serve.

Whereupon Ordinance No. 354, being an ordinance to levy a tax for the improvement of Wait Park and to be voted on at the special election to be held on Dec. 6, was placed on final passage and passed-On roll call-Yeas 6-nays 0.

It was then moved to adjourn to Thursday, Nov. 4-at 8.15 P.M.
