Mr · Bates requested that the water committee work out a lower schedule for the water users, this was ordered to be taken under advicement and be reported on later.

Mr Hornig now recomemded that provissions be made to secure auxillary power to operate the pump in case of fire or broken power lines. Mr.Lent stated that the necessary belt pulley could be attatched at a small

expense. No deffenate action was taken.

There being no other business, on motion, seconded and carried,

the Council now adjourned.

REGULAR MEETING April 3,1933.

A regular meeting of the City Council held April 3,1933, at 8 oclock P.M. On roll call there were present Mayor Dedman, City Attorney Wait, Chief of Police Lent, Recorder Fosmark, and Councilmen Bates, Cutsforth, Dimick, Hornig, Meeks, Porter, and Thompson. Graham reported later.

Minutes of the last regular meeting were read and approved. Communications.

A letter from the Southern Pacific Co.regarding the warehouse on their property, stating Mr. Stefani had charge of the building and would make the necessary repairs to put it in a safe condition. An inquirey from E.O.Bone of Corvallis about Electric light rates was read. A letter was now read from L.A. McMary of Portland Inquireing if this City has now in force any ordinance which prohibits the manufacture, sale or advertising of intoxicating liquors or beer. A letter from Molalla Electric Co.was now read, in reply to the Resoloution adopted by the City Council on March 6th calling for a lump sum bid on furnishing electric energy for the City. This letter stated that their officers questioned the practicability of such form of rate expression and that the form of rate under which the City is now purchasing energy is generally recognized by Regulatory Bodies as theoretically correct and has long been established in this State, and that their officers prefered not to experiment with an untried rate expression.

Special Meeting April 13,1933.

A specil meeting of the Council was called on April 13,1933. at 8 o'clock P.M. On roll call there were present Mayor Dedman, City attorney Wait, Chief of Police Lent, Recorder Fosmark, and Councilmen Bates, Graham, Hornig, Meeks, and Porter, absent Cutsforth, Dimick and Thompson.

The Mayor announced that the meeting was being held for the purpose of transferring money from the Water & Light Sinking Fund to the Road Fund, Whereupon the following Ordenance was introduced, and on motion, seconded and carried was passed on its first reading and ordered published:

Ordenance No. 55

An Ordenance providing for the transfer of the sum of Four Hundred Dollars, from the Water & Light Sinking Fund of the City of Canby, to the General Road Fund of Canby, and directing the City Treasurer of Canby to make the transfer.

That the sum of Four Hundred Dollars be transferred from the Water & Light Sinking Fund of Canby, to the General Road Fund of Canby. SECTION 3- WHEREAS, it is deemed to be best, for the immediate preservation of the pease, health and safety of Canby, an emergency is hereby declaired, and this Ordenance shall become immediately in force and operation upon it's passage by the Council and it's approval by the Mayor.
