

Regular Session of the City Council.
Feb. 5, 1912.

Council Called to order at 8:00 P.M.
by Henry A. Dedman, Mayor.

Upon roll call the following were
found present; to wit:-

Minutes of the previous Council read,
approved and placed on record.

Communication from merchant at Port-
land desiring to put up a stand on
the street and engage in the sale
of dress goods, Motion made &
carried that a charge of \$2.00 per
day be asked for this privilege. Record
ed ordered to communicate this \$2.00 rate
per day for license to said party.

The following claims against the City
were then presented and upon
motion were allowed. (all claims
being allowed except the one presented
by Sanders & Co. in which it was
claimed that there was an overcharge)

Street Commissioner, Wilson Evans, reported Culvert having been put in at Hutchinson's Corner.

It was then reported that the Canby Canal Co. had paid the part they had agreed toward having street open on the West-end of Fair Grounds joining Canby Gardens to street leading to the Fair Grounds and upon motion it was unanimously carried that the City pay Mr. E. C. Shull the \$2000 to-wads same when Mr. Shull should give to City a Warranty deed covering same land to be used for street purposes.

An amendment was offered to Ordinance No. 84 after said ordinance ^{#84} was read, providing that taxes on dogs must be paid each year within thirty days after Jan. 1, except that until March 1st 1892 be the time be extended. Ordinance amending ordinance #84 was allowed. After the reading of said amendment upon motion it was unanimously carried and ordered posted at once.

The subject was then introduced by Councilman Graham that the Salary of the Chief of Police should be \$600 per month and after due consideration motion was made that the recorder request W. H. Shenefield, City Attorney to draw up ordinance covering peddlers license and providing for occupation tax.

Councilman H. C. Billmore, Chairman of Com. on Streets & Public Property offered for the good of the City that the improvements for the Streets of the City from now

one should be permanent, and main street at least should be paved. It was then announced that the Rail Road Co. ~~was~~ ready to have a direct road to the Barlow Bridge through the gravel pit opened. This matter was referred to the Committee on Streets and Public Property.

A motion made and carried that W. N. Shenefield be employed by the City as our Attorney, ^{whereupon the following resolution was presented by Councilman Gillmore & passed} "Be it resolved that steps be taken for the opening of C, South Second and Flanahan Streets and that the Recorder ^{notifying the City Engineer, F. W. Roth, to prepare map, plat, etc. and co-operate with the City Attorney,} Mr. Shenefield and draw up the three ordinances necessary and take such other steps as are necessary for opening same.

Messrs. Gillmore, Leiser and Graham ^{were} appointed to investigate the cost of hard surfacing streets.

The Chief of Police was instructed to arrange with the Aurora Electric Company to put lights in the Engine Room and also in the jail.

Our Editor, Mr. Bernette, was present at Council & during the discussion about the police service, suggested that he thought the business people would gladly help support both a day and night officer in this capacity.

Council adjourned until special meeting at the call of Mayor, when final action on the ordinance relative to dog tax should come up.
