WHEREAS, the plan as submitted meets the requirements of ORS 459.095 as well as Metro requirements.

INTRODUCTION

SECOND ANNUAL WASTE REDUCTION PLAN FOR THE CITY OF TROUTDALE

The Waste Reduction Chapter of the Regional Solid Waste Plan adopted by Metro, November 1989, establishes a Five-Year Work Program for Metro and local governments. Local governments are required to adopt Annual Work Programs which include specific activities outlined by Metro to accomplish waste reduction goals consistent with state law and Metro's Regional Solid Waste Management Plan. Local governments must submit their Second Annual Waste Reduction Plans to Metro by July 1, 1991 for the FY 1991-1992. An updated plan is to be submitted annually.

The first year's plan, which has been completed, included the following activities:

1. Identify revenue sources to fund the program;
2. Implement weekly recycling collection in residential neighborhoods;
3. Prepare and schedule the implementation of a recycling container collection system;
4. Implement by ordinance, resolution, or administrative rule, an institutional purchasing policy;
5. Cooperate in reaching other regional goals as they are developed in yard debris collection, material recovery, and other resource recovery activities; and
6. Hire or designate staff to serve as a waste reduction coordinator.

The activities outlined by Metro for the Second Annual Waste Reduction Plan For Local Governments are as follows:

1. Regulate residential garbage collection through franchise, license, or other means that will enable the local government to fully implement a uniform and comprehensive weekly curbside recycling program with containers.
2. Regulate commercial garbage collection through franchise, license, or other means that will enable the local government to implement a uniform commercial waste reduction and recycling program that includes collection standards, waste audits, and economic incentives.
3. Regulate multi-family garbage collection through franchise, license, or other means that will enable local government to implement a multi-family recycling program that gives apartment owners/managers an economic incentive to promote recycling while allowing hauler to recover the costs of providing recycling services.
4. Implement in-house recycling programs to include as many materials as practical at all city and county facilities.
5. Expand local expertise on the part of haulers, recyclers, and/or recycling coordinators to perform commercial waste audits for a variety of different kinds of businesses (ie. offices supermarket, hospitals.) Document the completion of, at a minimum, ten commercial waste audits or waste audits for one percent of the businesses in the commercial sector, whichever is less. Develop a plan for a more comprehensive commercial waste audit program to implemented in year three.
6. Provide schools with the opportunity to participate in waste audits and encourage them to implement waste reduction and recycling plans.
7. Begin developing language to insert into design review and/or site plan review procedures to facilitate the incorporation of recycling at commercial facilities and multi-family dwelling units.
8. Develop a plan to install recycling container systems in multi-family residential units.

9. Plan and implement a yard debris collection program that meets at least the minimum requirements of the regional yard debris recycling plan.
10. Complete an Annual Report Worksheet for year one of the Program. Submit this worksheet to Metro by September 30, 1991.

- I. Regulate residential garbage collection through franchise, license, or other means that will enable the local government to fully implement a uniform and comprehensive curbside recycling program with containers.**

- II. Regulate commercial garbage collection through franchise, license, or other means that will enable the local government to implement a uniform commercial waste reduction and recycling program that includes collection standards, waste audits, and economic incentives.**

- III. Regulate multi-family garbage collection through franchise, license, or other means that will enable local government to implement a multi-family recycling program that gives apartment owners\managers an economic incentive to promote recycling while allowing haulers to recover the costs of providing recycling services.**

The City of Troutdale exclusively franchises Edwin O. Ege Sanitary Service, Inc. for all solid waste collection within Troutdale City limits. This franchise is in accordance to Troutdale Municipal Code Chapter 13.36 (see appendix). Chapter 13.36 is Troutdale's Solid Waste Management Ordinance which allows the city to regulate all aspects of solid waste collection.

October, 1990 the City of Troutdale fully implemented a uniform and comprehensive weekly curbside recycling program with containers.

Edwin O. Ege Sanitary Service presently collects green, white and brown glass, tin, cardboard, and office paper at commercial sites. The City of Troutdale will begin developing a uniform commercial recycling program to include waste reduction, recycling, waste audits and economic incentives.

The City of Troutdale is developing a multi-family recycling program in a cooperative effort with the cities of Gresham, Fairview and Wood Village.

IV. Implement in-house recycling programs to include as many items as practical at all city and county facilities.

The City of Troutdale recycles the following material:

- office paper, computer paper, newspaper, printer ribbons, laser printer cartridges, motor oil, tires

The City of Troutdale uses the following recycled materials or products made of recycled materials:

- office paper, city stationery, envelopes, and computer paper.

The City of Troutdale purchases many items at the Federal/State Surplus property center. The City has saved a large amount of money by buying used and surplus property. The following is a sample of the wide range of items that have been purchased.

- automobiles, typewriters, surveying equipment, dictaphones, office furniture, tools, computer equipment, and miscellaneous hardware.

V. Expand local expertise on the part of haulers, recyclers, and/or recycling coordinators to perform commercial waste audits for a variety of different kinds of businesses (ie. offices, supermarkets, hospitals.) Document the completion of, at a minimum, ten commercial waste audits or waste audits for one percent of the businesses in the commercial, sector whichever is less. Develop a plan for a more comprehensive commercial waste audit program to be implemented in year three.

- The City of Troutdale will complete waste audits for one percent of the businesses in the commercial sector of the City. The City of Troutdale's only hauler Edwin O. Ege Sanitary, Inc. and the City of Troutdale's recycling coordinator, Tony Norris will utilize any workshops, seminars, or other means necessary to develop a program for waste audits. The City of Troutdale will begin to develop a more comprehensive plan for year three.

VI. Provide schools with the opportunity to participate in waste audits and encourage them to implement waste reduction and recycling programs.

- The City of Troutdale will develop a program directed toward schools to encourage them to participate in waste reduction activities.

VII. Begin developing language to insert into design review and/or site plan review procedures to facilitate the incorporation of recycling at commercial facilities and multi-family dwelling units.

- The City of Troutdale will begin to develop a system for the review process to accommodate commercial and multi-family recycling at appropriate facilities.

VIII. Develop a plan to install recycling container systems in multi-family residential units.

- The City of Troutdale has been cooperatively planning a multi-family recycling pilot project and program with the Cities of Gresham and Fairview.

IX. Plan and implement a yard debris collection program that meets at least the minimum requirements of the regional yard debris recycling plan.

- The City of Troutdale has been cooperatively planning a yard debris program with the cities of Gresham, Fairview, and Wood Village. The program when finished, will be in place during the latter half of year two.

X. Complete an Annual Report Worksheet for year one of the program. Submit this worksheet to Metro by September 30, 1991.

- The City of Troutdale will submit an Annual Report Worksheet for year one of the program to Metro by September 30, 1991.
