

MINUTES OF THE "BIG FOUR " MEETING OF JULY 15, 1958

Meeting was called to order by Chair amn Goetz, at 8;30 P.M.

Those present were: Messrs. Davis, Basich, Clark, Campbell, Hagen, Hein, Breuer, Twohy, Gulley, Bullock, Molina, McVay, Loring, Flynn, Stanhurst, Goetz, Spencer, and the press represented by Connie Bordwell and Joe Murphy.

Minutes of the previous meeting read and approved.

Mr. Goetz reported that no objections had been filed at the school re-zoning hearing and that the City council was taking the necessary steps to complete the legal proceedings. He pointed out the zone areas recommended by the commission to be up-zoned.

He mentioned other recommendations made by the Commission to the City Council regarding streets.

Mr. Gulley reported that the State Park Commission had notified the State Highway Commission that it had taken over Loeb park and it would soon be developed. The first step had been taken as State Officials had been down and looked the park over. He said there was still no report on Mill Beach.

Mr. Davis reported that the Port Commission had been blasting rocks out of the mouth of the Chetco. He said the picnic area was a big drawing card as it was the first time any picnic facilities had been provided in this area.

Mr. Davis reported having obtained \$1500 for the Chamber of Commerce for a brochure publicizing Curry County, from the County Court.

He reported appearing on the Pappy Coleman show at Coos Bay to advertise fishing conditions on the Chetco River. He also said the Chamber of Commerce was going all out to encourage travel up 101. He mentioned that Gold Beach was advertising over the Eureka radio station Cadenz. He said the County Court had taken a wide-awake outlook on publicizing the county.

Mr. Flynn said all the County Court was not opposed to a County Planning Commission but that the majority of them were. He mentioned that Mr. DeVoe was very much interested in such an organization. Mr. Flynn cited examples of the need for a County Planning Commission. He also explained that no city taxpayer was paying for the county's road paving, and that the Harbor district being the heaviest populated was the recipient of such paving.

Mr. Spencer reported that Mr. Echols would be in the city to help with the final preparation of the sewer areas. He also reported that the city was waiting for word from Portland regarding the oil to be used on the streets-- American Bitumal favored.

Mr. Goetz reported on Salmon Unlimited. This method of fish farming started in 1947 in Japan with a return of 89%. He explained membership plan and cites success of "Ducks Unlimited" which featured the same idea.



He reported that the State Fish Commission looks over site for Salmon Unlimited and arranges lease etc. Mr. Goetz said Gold Beach had already started their "Salmon Unlimited." He said two good sites were being considered.

Mayor Campbell reported that the City Council had called a meeting for July 23rd. to consider cold oil paving and requested representation from organizations represented at this meeting.

Mr. Twohy wanted to know how long this proposed oiling would last and was told that it would last from 5 to 10 years.

Mr. Hagen said he and Mr. Spencer had looked over Oak St. and believes the members of the Planning Commission should also study it with Mr. Spencer.

Mr. Clark asked where the funds, created by the \$10.00 membership fee of Salmon Unlimited, would go to and was told the funds would stay here to be expended on the pond.

On motion meeting adjourned.
