Mayor Thalhofer called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and called on Councilor Lloyd to lead the Pledge of Allegiance.

City Recorder Martinez called the roll.

Mayor Thalhofer called this item and read the consent agenda.

MOTION: Councilor Thompson moved to approve the consent agenda. Councilor Kight seconded the motion.

PUBLIC COMMENT:

Mayor Thalhofer called this.

Lorne Mitchell, 767 S.W. 12th, voiced concerns regarding traffic using the bike lane on East bound Columbia to make a right turn onto 257th, this is very hazardous to traffic that is obeying the law.

Mayor Thalhofer directed staff to look into this issue.

 DISCUSSION: A Request by Friends of the Columbia Gorge for Approval of a Special Event Permit for an Outdoor Concert.

Mayor Thalhofer called this.

Faith reviewed the staff report contained in the packet.

The Council discussed this issue, including; security, clean-up, and sound levels.

Councilor Ripma stated that in the future McMenamin's should apply for the permit when it is on their property.

Councilor Kight requested that a sound shell, to project the music North, be a condition of approval.

Kim Brater and Lauri Aunan, Friends of Columbia River Gorge, stated that if it is cost effective the would look into it but did not believe it could be done, all of the speakers are facing North to project the sound toward the freeway. Also requested that the permit be adjusted to allow for the music to be stopped by 8:00 p.m. just incase something happens and they go a little late.

Faith suggested that it be a condition of the permit that the music be projected North.

MOTION: Councilor Thompson moved to approve the permit with additional conditions that; all sound be projected North, and that all music be finished by 8:00 p.m. Councilor Kight seconded the Motion.

Councilor Burger-Kimber made a friendly amendment to waive the permit fee.

Councilor Thompson rejected the friendly amendment.

MOTION TO AMEND:

Councilor Burger-Kimber moved to amend the motion to include waiver of the permit fee. Mayor Thalhofer seconded the motion.

Councilor Thompson stated that he felt the fee is minor, it is a fund raising event, there is a cost to the city in the time that we have police at the event.

Councilor Burger-Kimber stated that the Council has set a precedent on waiving fees for non-profits, such as the Historical Society, Lions Club, and others.

Councilor Ripma stated that the precedent is that we always waive the fee, this is for profit and not non-profit, McMenamin's will make a profit off this.

Kim Brater stated that McMenamin's is donating a percentage of the food and beverage sales to The Friends of the Columbia Gorge.

Councilor Ripma stated this is a good cause, and we waive the fees almost any time they ask, will support because it is such a good cause.

Councilor Lloyd stated he will oppose the amendment, this is not like the others, Historical Society and others have a direct benefit to the city, McMenamin's is going to make money off this, it is a fair fee.

Mayor Thalhofer stated that there is a policy to waive fees for non-profit groups, maybe we need to revisit the policy in the future, it may not be written but it still is a policy. This is a good cause, McMenamin's will make a profit but they are doing a service to the community by letting the Friends of the Gorge use their facility. Staff should look into revising the policy for waiving fees for non-profits.

Councilor Smith stated that this is not a lot, they will make a lot off this event, the city can not afford to give everything away, will support but need to look into policy.
