

Meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Mayor Thalhofer.

1. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE, ROLL CALL, AGENDA UPDATE

Mayor Thalhofer called on Councilor Ripma to lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor Thalhofer asked for the roll to be called.

Mayor Thalhofer asked are there any agenda updates?

Kvarsten replied on agenda item 5, Lt. Nelson will be the presenter rather than Rodney Wilkerson.

Mayor Thalhofer called this item and read the consent agenda.

MOTION: Councilor Thompson moved adoption of the consent agenda. Councilor Kight seconded the motion.

3. PUBLIC COMMENT: Please restrict comments to non-agenda items at this time.

Mayor Thalhofer called this item and asked if there was anyone here who would like to speak to us on a non-agenda item.

The coach of the Troutdale Hawkeyes stated that this is the third year that we have had a Troutdale Hawkeye football team. This year we had problems with fund raising and we had to cut six kids. We have eighteen cheerleaders this year and thirty-one boys playing football this year. The football players and cheerleaders introduced themselves to the council. We are involving more and more kids in the program and we are trying to work with the Troutdale Police either in coaching or to come and speak to the boys and girls.

4. REPORT: A report concerning the co-mingling of recyclables.

Mayor Thalhofer called this item.

Morrow reviewed the staff report contained in the packet.

Councilor Kight asked as an additional incentive to get people to recycle besides co-mingling, would it help to educate people on the financial benefits of recycling?

Morrow replied currently in our Troutdale Spring Recycler that we put out, we do try to touch on that. We will also be touching on that in the brochure that we are putting out regarding the co-mingling and that recycling can allow you to reduce the size of garbage container you are using.

Councilor Rabe asked how much focus has been given to the schools?

Morrow replied commercial collection is different then residential, they have already had that opportunity to co-mingle some materials. I do plan to reach out to the schools and meet with the principals.

Councilor Rabe stated this can turn out to be a fund raiser, that is the approach that the school district I work for uses, and I would be happy to help you with finding the right person to contact.

Councilor Daoust asked when we say we have a recycling rate of 41%, does that mean that 41% of the households put out some kind of recycling?

Morrow replied no, this rate is based on tonnage.

Councilor Daoust asked when I look at peoples recycle box, it looks like people are co-mingling already, they just kind of put stuff in the curby all mixed up together. What would residents do differently?

Morrow replied technically that hasn't been the sort that we have administered through Troutdale but Waste Management is a larger company who has been accepting the recycling even though it has not been properly sorted. In some jurisdictions that have smaller haulers, who are not ready to accept co-mingled materials, they may not pick-up the recycled materials if they are not properly sorted.

5. PUBLIC HEARING / ORDINANCE (Introduction): An Ordinance repealing Chapter 8.24 (Noise Control) and adopting a new Chapter 8.24 (Noise Control) of the Troutdale Municipal Code.

Mayor Thalhofer called this item, closed the City Council meeting and opened the Public Hearing at 7:25pm.

Lt. Nelson introduced members of the C.O.P Team, Terry Smoke, Yvonne Levy, Terry Stitzel, Tracy Callan and myself. Other members on the team that are absent tonight are Barb Brower, Officer David Licht, Officer Rodney Wilkerson, Pastor David Brown and John Moore. We have been together for about one year and we are just starting to do some projects. Some of the projects include the parking and speed issues in down town Troutdale, public safety awareness issues in the community newspapers, trying to develop a better relationship between the schools and business community. We have been meeting about once a month. Some future issues that we are working on is to develop a Chief's quarterly forum and a child safety programs.

Lt. Nelson reviewed the staff report contained in the packet.

Councilor Ripma asked the noise complaints that I have heard about are often from concerts. How many noise complaints do we get and what are they related to?

Lt. Nelson replied the majority come from neighbors complaining about parties at residential houses. There are some problem homes within the city that we have not been able to deal with. We have not received any complaints about concerts that I am aware of.

Councilor Ripma stated I was thinking back to when Edgefield started to have outdoor concerts. I don't know if anyone called the police, but we at the City heard about it and Edgefield eventually adjusted the stage and turned things around and somehow that was resolved. As long as we are thinking about adopting an ordinance prohibiting people from doing things I want to see that it is well written. This looks pretty good but a couple of small details concern me, the section that deals with specific noises that are prohibited, 8.24.040 A 2, loading, unloading, opening, closing or handling boxes, crates, containers, building materials, garbage cans or similiar objects between the hours of 10pm and 7am. That is written as a prohibited activity during those hours. Garbage cans, my garbage is picked up before 7am. I don't know if that is a serious problem, I am concerned about that.

Lt. Nelson stated in the first draft we had there was some discussion about having an exception in there about this.

Councilor Ripma asked under exceptions, 8.24.050, there is an exception for noise created by an outdoor activity or community event that are conducted in public parks, playgrounds or public or private school grounds. So this wouldn't address noise made by anything that occurs in a park that is sanctioned. If someone was to have a very loud concert, under the way this is written, they wouldn't have to ask for a variance or permit, am I reading that right?

Lt. Nelson replied they would still have to go through the city process that they currently go through to hold an event in the park.

Councilor Ripma asked the way you would enforce this, if someone was holding a loud party and neighbors complained you could come and cite them?

Lt. Nelson replied yes. I may have to ask the City Attorney, but there is under 8.24.035 it talks about the definition of noise. If it lasts for five minutes or three times in a thirty minute period, maybe the garbage can is address there.

Councilor Ripma stated but if it is before 7am, which is one out of two and the other is if the noise is plainly audible within a noise sensitive unit, which would be a house. If you can hear it and it is between the hours of 10pm and 7am?

Allen stated I think that is accurate and is probably an oversight on our part in not drafting a clearer exception to garbage collection by a licensed hauler to the extent that it occurs in that time period. Maybe we would want to include another exception to cover that category.

Councilor Kight asked before we make any changes to the garbage hauling industry, we might want to keep in

mind that there is a lot of new commercial development going in. I am thinking of the Albertsons, Home Depot and the current new Safeway at Cherry Park. Often times they not only pick up these large steel bins, but they also run compactors and they often times do this late at night. We better be thinking twice before we give a pass to the garbage haulers and other commercial trucks that normally would be delivering services in the middle of the night to those stores, loading and unloading most of the night as they are stocking the shelves. The community events that happen at the park, which is next to my house, the person that has been receiving the calls is myself. My neighbors have been calling me. The sound level for the Latino Hispanic festival, where the police were present, was to the level that we actually had to leave our home. We need to address that, we want to have community events in the park. I enjoy music, but the sound level was unbelievable. I have an ordinance that Tracy Callan was able to procure from the City of Salem and they have addressed this same problem at the Oregon State Fair with some of the concerts that they have. I don't know how you want to address this, if you want to address the community events and how that should be handled as a separate issue or do you want to fold it into this particular ordinance?

Lt. Nelson replied I would prefer to deal with that on a separate issue.

Councilor Kight stated I have a question about the times. You have Monday through Friday 7am to 9pm and on Saturday 8am to 7pm and on Sunday 10am to 7pm. I was interested in why you came up with the differential in times?

Lt. Nelson replied those were the same times we have in the current ordinance.

Councilor Kight asked would you be able to run a lawn mower during that time. The reason I bring that up is during the summer it is light until 9 or 9:30 at night and people who work use the weekends to catch up on yard work.

Lt. Nelson replied if your neighbors complain about it then we would show up and make a decision about what to do.

Councilor Kight asked did you consider extending those hours on the weekend?

Lt. Nelson replied we have not but we could consider that.

Allen stated there is a general exception for domestic power tools which are blowers, lawn mowers in section 8.24.050 paragraph "C".

Councilor Kight asked Tracy, did you do some research about decibel meters?

Callan replied I checked into both the rental and purchase and I found out that there are digital readers which would eliminate some of the training that is required. Rental price is around \$24.00 a day, to purchase is about \$100.00.

Councilor Kight stated I would like your group to look at this ordinance from Salem.

Councilor Rabe asked most of this conversation has been regarding residential, I personally find the cars to be obnoxious, the stereos in specific. Do we have any enforcement for vehicular noise?

Lt. Nelson replied I believe that would fall under 8.24.040 "A" item 1 and 4.

Councilor Daoust stated I have some questions relating to specific things in the ordinance. In section 8.24.040 "A" item 8, I know what it means, but the way it reads is a little confusing. In particular Friday night, it says 9pm to 7am Monday through Friday, that is okay, but then the next part says 7pm to 8am on Saturday. I assume you are talking about 7pm on Friday night, that is the way I read it. So on Friday night is it 9pm or 7pm?

Lt. Nelson replied 9pm.

Councilor Daoust stated you might want to re-word that. When I was working with the neighbors that are going to be living next to the Albertsons store, one of their main concerns was the noise of the delivery trucks that will be coming in at midnight. I don't see anything that deals with delivery trucks or refrigerated vans that show up at midnight and are right next to people's back yards. Am I overlooking something?

Lt. Nelson replied 8.24.040 "A" item 2, loading, unloading, opening, closing or other handling of boxes, crates containers etc.

Councilor Daoust stated that would help. If it is a refrigerated truck just sitting there and running, what about the refrigeration noise itself?

Lt. Nelson replied it would fall under the same section item 4 which is vehicle noise.

Councilor Daoust stated okay, I can see some tools that we could use. What kind of things would people typically apply for a variance for?

Lt. Nelson replied neighborhood block parties.

Allen stated a community event that is not sponsored by the city and is not occurring on a public park or property, so it is not exempt under those exceptions.

Councilor Daoust stated maybe it was intentional to not be sending to many notices out, but you only have people within 100' of such a variance request. That is a short distance, noise travels a lot farther than 100 feet.

Allen stated I pulled this language out of other similar ordinances with variance processes and that was the typical distance. If you think people outside of the 100 feet would be most affected by these events then it makes sense to notify them also.

Councilor Daoust stated I was adding up all the days that it would take if you went through the variance procedure and it could take up to 70 days. Somebody wanting to go through the appeal process would have to plan on 2 ½ months to go through this process.

Lt. Nelson asked would you like the length of time shortened?

Councilor Daoust stated what do you think about that? Does it seem reasonable to the committee?

Allen replied it is just trying to build in enough time to give staff the opportunity to receive information and make decisions and get notices out and also give people a chance to receive the notice, put together their letter and get it mailed in. If you feel like it is not reasonable to require someone to plan 2 ½ or more months in advance if they want to take advantage of this, you can reduce some of the time. I would have to defer to staff in terms of how long they think they need to make decisions.

Councilor Daoust stated I don't want it to be too easy to get a variance. I am just pointing out that it does add up to a long time for this process.

Councilor Ripma asked at an outdoor activity or community event, if it is sponsored, it is in a park, it has entertainment, how do the generators fit in that if they are needed?

Allen replied that issue would have to be dealt with in the City's approval of the event, so you can impose a condition of approval.

Councilor Ripma stated I had raised the question on the garbage cans and commercial collection, just a thought, if you would just remove garbage cans from 8.24.040 "A" item 2 from that list, I think that will solve my problem.

Mayor Thalhoffer closed the public hearing and reconvened the City Council meeting at 8:15pm.

6. DEPARTMENT REPORTS:

Mayor Thalhoffer called this item.

Gazewood referred to page 2 item 2a of his report. We are nearly complete with the audit adjustments, prior to the audit, finalizing our revenues and expenses for the fiscal year ending June 30th. We are looking at this time for a projected July 1, 1999 carryover fund balance approximating \$1,417,000. This is down from the prior year by approximately \$269,000. The good news in relation to that is that we projected a beginning fund balance at July 1, 1999 of \$1,335,000 so we have a little cushion in relation to that fund balance. Property taxes for the fiscal year are approximating 94.5% of the actual amount that was levied by the County Assessor. This is about \$55,000 greater than what was actually projected due to the new year construction figures that were higher than what we had projected in that budget year. The hotel/motel tax is an area of concern. The receipts for the fiscal year, which includes revenues that we received in the month of July that is accrued back to the fiscal year ending June 30th, was in the neighborhood of \$291,000. We experienced a reduction of 2.25% in revenue. That is also reflective of an additional motel. As I indicated in my cover letter to you back in April in relation to transient lodging taxes when the Chamber was presenting that an additional motel would raise additional revenues, that is not necessarily the case. On item 3, is a reflection of the cash needs to carry the City from July 1st through the end of October which is that period where we have to make sure we have sufficient cash balance coming into the fiscal year in the General Fund to carry us until our tax receipts are received in November. For the two month period of July and August there is a reflection that cash disbursements exceed the revenues by \$440,000. With the estimated balance that was carried over of \$1,400,000 at the beginning of the fiscal year we have a positive balance at the current time of \$978,000. The last column on the right side of the page on schedule "B" reflects a comparison to where we were a year ago. One other special thing to note is that there are two differences in this statement that should be pointed out as a reminded. The Troutdale building permit related revenues are not reflected any longer in the General Fund, nor are the expenditures for the Troutdale portion of the building permit inspectors. They have been transferred to the new Code Specialties Fund. At the end of August that fund is carrying a cash balance of \$8,900.

Councilor Kight asked when it comes to the Columbia Gorge RV Park and your schedule "A-1", you list all the rooms for the hotels but when it comes to the spaces for the RV park it is blank. I also note with interest there is approximately 100 spaces in the RV Park and I question the numbers. Since they have 103 spaces that would be equivalent to Edgefield where they have \$80,000 in revenue the RV park is \$1,533. That is a large difference, are these people living there?

Gazewood replied I think that is the obvious conclusion or at the very least they are having renters there that are thirty days or greater. That is the provision on how the ordinance addresses the application of the transient lodging taxes is a thirty day residency situation.

Councilor Kight asked I wonder if we want to look at having it extended out to ninety or one-hundred and twenty days. It is by law that it can only be thirty days?

Gazewood replied when we address the issue of what qualifies, then if that gets extended beyond thirty days then we are going to get ourselves in a bind on apartments.

Councilor Kight stated that the City of Portland has there hand on our wallet specifically on the hotel/motel tax. Could you review the financial impact of the City of Portland imposing a tax in the City of Troutdale for the Oregon Convention Center for which the folks staying in our hotels and motels will be paying. The reason I bring

this to the attention of the Council is because there is still the opportunity to make comments at the Multnomah County level as well as at Metro. What I am concerned about is if we are going to be collecting this tax to go to the City of Portland then the City of Troutdale should be reimbursed for collecting those funds at the very minimum.

Gazewood replied there were three basic areas that were dealt with. One was the number of rooms available in the Troutdale City limits. Currently there are 441 rooms available. The Comfort Inn projects an opening date of April 1, 2000 and they will have 65 rooms so that will make a total of 506 rooms available. The current hotel/ motel lodging tax in Troutdale is 9.95%. 6.95% is the City lodging tax, .95% is allocated to the Troutdale Chamber of Commerce. The remaining 3% is for Multnomah County special convention center lodging tax. Currently the motels get to keep 5% of that 3% that they collect. All that money is a check that is cut and sent to the City of Troutdale which we then transmit to the County their share. The 2.5% proposed Portland tax would raise Troutdale area lodging tax to 12.45%. Looking at the amount of monies that will be generated, the tax itself that Troutdale has collected is on a base gross income or I should say an adjusted gross income of rents in the motels of \$4,859,376.00. This was the income reported in the year 1998/99 for Troutdale motels. If the 2.5% tax is applied to that dollar value then that would generate \$124,484.00 to the City of Portland. Applying a 1% incremental value to gross rents, if that did happen, then the City of Portland would then collect \$122,700.00. So that is what we generate in Troutdale for the City of Portland's tax.

Councilor Daoust asked then we would cut a check to the City of Portland?

Gazewood replied well I would hope that if it came through us that we would say we are not going to do this for nothing we are going to charge you for it. The option is that the motels send the City of Portland that money directly.

Councilor Daoust asked when Multnomah County transfers property taxes to us, do they take any overhead off?

Gazewood replied no, the law does not permit that.

Councilor Daoust asked so does the law permit us to take overhead off before we transmit tax dollars?

Gazewood replied I would defer that to our City Attorney, but I would think there would be a law that would allow us to do that. We can charge administrative fees. We can not make a profit on the fees but we can charge to recover our costs.

Chief Berrest stated there were several events that occurred in the city park this summer that from our perspective went well and I was not aware of any complaints from the noise. We did have some very serious situations this past summer involving our officers taking guns away from people. We are now experiencing some forgery cases involving computers where the suspects are using computers to generate checks and legal documents. It is becoming a problem because we do not have the expertise or the skill necessary to put together a good case. We are trying to improve in that area by sending officers to school, when we can, trying to figure out how to solve computer crimes. I am afraid this is going to continue to grow and it is something we are going to have a hard time dealing with. One of our proudest achievements is getting a School Resource Officer into Walt Morey Middle School. Rodney Wilkerson was selected for that position and he has been working towards that for about one year now. We will also continue the DARE Program in both of the elementary schools this year. The last thing I want to touch on is the River Rescue Program this summer. That is definitely more than what we ever anticipated. It has been very successful. Maybe this was not the best test year because of the whether and all the publicity of the dangers of the river, but maybe that is the key. Part of river safety is the publicity and making people aware of the hazards. The river rescue people have been doing a good job down there. I noticed on my first visit to the beach after the river rescue personnel were down there that eight or ten young people were wearing life vests from Jack's Snack and Tackle. I asked one of the river rescue people, "how did you get those kids to put those vests on," he replied we told them to put the vests on. Up until that point the

Police Officers were just recommending or advising people to wear them. I think generally the beach population is lower this year, I not sure if that is due to the whether or the publicity or a combination of the two.

Mayor Thalhofer asked did you find that the river rescue people were able to provide additional eyes and ears for the beach patrol?

Chief Berrest replied yes. They have been helpful in pointing out different problems on the beach.

Faith stated we are in the process of complying with Title 3 of the Metro Functional Plan and this is going to entail some extensive revisions to our development code. This matter will be coming before the Planning Commission this month for a hearing. These are portions of the code that deal with flood hazard areas, steep slopes, erosion control, water quality and things of that nature. Because this is a Metro requirement, they have been helping to provide the public notice and there has been notices sent out to all the properties that we have identified as having land within these areas of concern. The other item is the refinement plan for the Troutdale Sewage Treatment Plant site. We were informed last month that we are the recipient of a \$30,000 TGM Grant to undertake that study to look at the treatment plant site and the adjoining industrial properties to see how that can be best developed and integrated into our town center.

Councilor Ripma stated good job getting the grant. Troutdale has been very successful in getting grants and they help plan our City. We are kind of famous for getting these grants and I commend our staff for their work.

Mayor Thalhofer stated congratulations on the grant.

Councilor Kight stated the Planning Commission approved a Type III Site and Design Review for Home Depot. Some of the concerns raised with the Albertson's development, and the Home Depot which will be immediately to the west of this, relative to sound. Have you incorporated some sound buffering issues as part of the design review?

Faith replied there is a six foot screen wall and a berm that will be created for buffering from the adjoining future development to the north. Plus we also have a much greater separation between the Home Depot site and the residential property to the north because there will be a full street between the two. So it is quite a bit different then what we see in the Albertson's development.

Councilor Kight asked is it as good or better then Albertsons?

Faith replied I would say it is as good.

Councilor Daoust stated plus the row of trees on the east end of what will be Home Depot, most of them will remain in place.

Galloway stated we recently received a request from the National Weather Service to install a weather station at the sewage treatment plant. They currently have one at the BPA area that requires location in a place that is manned so that someone can take the readings daily and put them on a report and send it monthly to the weather service. I talked to our folks at the plant who are willing to do this which takes just a few minutes every day to record the information. We are probably one of the bigger users of that data. Unless you see some reason not to go along with that, I intend to respond positively to their request.

7. COUNCIL CONCERNS AND INITIATIVES

Mayor Thalhofer stated we were very fortunate to have cool weather this year and that combined with the work of the AMR, so far we have not had one drowning at the river this summer.

Councilor Kight updated the Council on the meetings that he has attended.

Councilor Daoust stated while they were draining the pond at Sunrise Park my wife and girls went down to help Val Lantz dig up some aquatic plants to transfer to a wetland area. Instead of plants, when the water was drained, there was hundreds of goldfish in the water. In the spirit of rescuing helpless wildlife my wife and girls rushed home and got buckets in which they rescued these hundreds of goldfish which ranged from 1" in size to just under a foot long. Val put an article in the Oregonian that was only a couple sentences long that said anyone wanting goldfish come get them at the Rail Depot Museum. The next day, before the morning had even passed by, all the goldfish had found new homes.

Councilor Smith stated we now have bus service on Saturday and Sunday on Troutdale Road, line 80.


