Meeting was called to order at 7:01 p.m. by Mayor Thalhoffer.

1. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE, ROLL CALL, AGENDA UPDATE

Mayor Thalhoffer called on Councilor Kight to lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor Thalhoffer asked are there any agenda updates?

Kvarsten replied we have no changes to offer this evening.

MOTION: Councilor Daoust moved adoption of the consent agenda. Councilor Kight seconded the motion.

3. PUBLIC COMMENT: Please restrict comments to non-agenda items at this time.

Mayor Thalsofer called this item and asked is there was anyone here to speak to us on a non-agenda item.

Bob Akers stated I am president of the 40 Mile Loop land trust which is a recreational organization that promotes recreational trails all throughout the Portland Metropolitan area. I think there is great opportunity for new development of the trail here in Troutdale. We have to look at some safety issues. The 40 Mile Loop, the way it is on our maps now is it comes up Marine Drive from Blue Lake Park and follows Marine Drive on Frontage Road and comes under the bridge just west of the Sandy River and then comes into downtown Troutdale. That has changed in the past few years and it is dangerous and we have a proposal to change it starting it at Blue Lake Park along the dike around Reynolds Aluminum Plant coming in by I-84 bridge and into the future development of the treatment plant. We would like to be involved in that, because when we promote trails we promote areas also. The 40 Mile Loop Trail will bring into the City of Troutdale, when it is finished and safe, anywhere from 3,000 to 5,000 people and that is a conservative number. Plus when we get the other part of the trail finished that will tie in with the Springwater Trail, which ties in with downtown Portland. My main concern now is that it will be a project because of the issues that we are going to face with getting it up on the dike and around Reynolds. In the long run, for the citizens in East County, it will be something that we can be proud of and it will be a positive thing for the City of Troutdale.

Councilor Ripma asked is the dike by Reynolds is that partly a trail, is it a public right-of-way?

Akers replied it is not a public right-of-way now. It is owned by the water district. My understanding is the dike is owned by the water district, the area above the dike is owned by Reynolds Aluminum.

Councilor Ripma stated it is a wonderful idea.

Councilor Kight stated I like the idea. Marine Drive and S. Frontage Road for either walkers, hikers or bicyclists right now it is very dangerous. I think the property belongs to Reynolds Metals and does not belong to the water district.

Al Hayward stated in the not to distant future you will be looking at a new city hall and as I understand it there is no art fund attached to that. In some cities they require 10% or a percentage of the building has to go into art. I look at and read about the city of New York, they have a very generous art fund. When that time comes I hope you all have the courage to put in a very healthy art fund. I also hope that you suggest to the architect that the next City Council meeting room that you all we be below the level of your constituents and I won't have to look up to you. In the U.S Congress, in London, England and in most of the great governing bodies the people sit above those that they have elected to govern and not the other way around.

4. PRESENTATION: Riparian District Plan strategy for complying with Metro's Goal 5 program.

Mayor Thalsofer called this item.

Bob Groncznack, Director of Multnomah Drainage District, the largest of the four along the

Columbia. We have been managing Sandy and Peninsula District 1 and 2 by contract now for the last several years. I want to talk about an idea and a concept as a way to respond to Goal 5. (Groncznack passed out a handout, a copy of this is in the packet) What you see here is a strategy based upon the fact that we have some physical realities in the upper Columbia Slough Watershed and if you look at the map here of all four districts they are characterized by what is on page 2. They are separated from the river by levies. The levies are a special structure and they function and serve to protect the flood plain because they are certified annually by the Corp of Engineers, they meet FEMA standards as well as our pump station capacity. The flood protection system is a combination of the levies, which keeps the one-hundred year flood on the Columbia River from coming onto the properties. The levies are actually good up to a five-hundred year plus event, they are a significant structure. When you look at the question of cold water fish, salmon, we have no access for those fish today into the watersheds in the four districts. The question of reaching the levies or introducing fish is a major public policy question as well as a very expensive technical question. If we do a plan that Metro calls a special plan or riparian district plan, and if the cities in the districts want to participate, we would address that question. Concluding that, at least for decades to come, probably we would not be introducing fish, then the question comes up as to what species are you protecting along our waterways. When you do that work and go through a biological assessment of those species and what it takes to protect them, shade and bank stability, I think the chances are pretty good that instead of large 200' or 150' each side buffers which came out in the original documents in Goal 5, we would probably be talking protected strategies that are scaled down quite a bit. I have two pictures to show you of examples of this. Inside the districts it is fairly flat topography, and the old sloughs and the waterways channels are flat and wide. One of the problems we have in the summertime is low water and only an inch or two of water depth across the big wide flat slough bottom and it heats up and we would never have a chance of meeting the clean water act goals for temperature. What you see in the photograph is an existing slough where last summer we went in and did some in-water work in the flat section and actually created a smaller channel that is narrower and deeper, we took that material and deposited it on the sides. We have now created new land area for habitat within the waterway. That new land can be planted with wetland plants of scrub shrub which is the proper kind of habitat and we have gained a whole lot of water quality and habitat. We have miles of wider channels and sloughs where we have the potential of doing this in all four districts. We thought if we did a plan that captured a vision from all the districts and we did that as a local coalition and we worked to get Metro's planning and their rules that are adopted to recognize the districts and jurisdictions out here for this kind of locally based action and a coalition, that we would stand a good chance of doing the riparian plan beginning early 2001. The second photograph is a previous straight, narrow agricultural ditch for watering farm land. On the right side you can see the old bank, it is steep and covered with blackberries. On the left side you see that what we did is ditch back and create a low area still within that 50' environmental zone that they can not develop. We have 60 miles of channel where this potential improvement can be made. By participating in a plan like this you have the strength of the local coalition doing the plan and we can all share in the responsibilities to do that. What's happening right now is we have to work rapidly to get this proposal pulled together. I talked to the Columbia Corridor Association about a month and a half ago and convinced them that they ought to reach into their pockets and help the district, we have put a little bit of money from all four districts into developing these ideas. I have some consultant help working with me to work on this proposal. Tonight I am introducing the concept to you, there will be a lot more work done on it in the weeks ahead.

Councilor Kight stated you advocated that the setback would be considerably less than 200' that Metro is currently looking at, what is the number you are looking at?

Groncznack replied it would be speculation for me to give you a number tonight but my guess would be between 50' to 100'.

Councilor Kight asked obviously there is going to have to be some capital expenditures from the different cities, do you have any cost estimates on what it is going to cost the City of Troutdale?

Groncznack replied no, not at this time.

Councilor Kight asked do we have any fish in our sloughs?

Groncznack replied warm water fish.

Councilor Kight asked do you have any suggestions or ideas when people talk in terms of breaching the dikes along the Columbia?

Groncznack replied when you do that you don't get any flow through the channels, it is going to equalize with the river stage. There is not enough elevation drop, so if you bring the water in it will just sit there. You are not going to accomplish the primary objective of clean water flowing through. The dikes are miles of earth-filled dam and they need constant tending and if you breach them you are making all the properties nearby vulnerable to whatever the river is doing.

Councilor Kight asked what are your sources for funding for these kinds of projects?

Groncznack replied for this plan I think it is in the interest of everybody involved here in the corridor, the business community as well as the local governments and the districts to pull something like this together. I would say to be successful, we would want to reach out and include neighborhood associations and anyone else who is interested in the watershed.

Councilor Daoust stated I understand why Multnomah County Drainage District would want to make a riparian plan because you cross over multiple boundaries of districts and cities. Can you tell me how your plan would interact with what we as a city are going to be addressing in the same issues?

Groncznack replied when Metro adopts Goal 5 all of the local cities will be required to adopt implementing regulations. In Goal 5 there will be what is called the Safe Harbor, which are large buffers, or mechanisms to do more specific on-site planning and that is what this is. So for your streams that flow into the district for the Columbia Slough watershed portion of the City of Troutdale, by working with all of us in this strategy I think we have a great opportunity to reduce the land impact of those protective strategies and still protect the environment without compromise. Now for Beaver Creek that flows directly to the Sandy where you would have fish access, you would have to look at doing a plan for that.

Councilor Daoust asked so your plan would theoretically have a list of mitigating projects that would occur in Troutdale?

Groncznack replied my vision is certainly within the district area. It would not be a district plan, it would be our plan. We can't do it as a district without all the cities participating. You will be the ones that have to adopt the Goal 5 regulation and what I am proposing is a planning strategy to deal with it.

Councilor Ripma asked what exactly are you asking Troutdale to do, or the Council to do tonight?

Groncznack replied I only wanted to expose you to it tonight and hopefully get your interest and let you know that work is being done on this. I will be working with Mr. Faith and providing information to you.

Mayor Thalhofer asked have you seen the City of Portland's plan?

Groncznack replied yes.

Mayor Thalhofer asked is that generally in line with what you are talking about, with what you are proposing?

Groncznack replied I have shown this presentation to them. You are all in the watershed together and if we are going to do this we have to invent a table where we sit down and work on it. If we do that as a team I think we gain a lot of strength. They are very open and receptive.

Mayor Thalhofer stated it sounds to me like it is worth following and being involved in.

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Mayor Thalhofer read the resolution titles and opened the Public Hearing at 7:48pm.

Wiesinger reviewed the staff report contained in the packet.

Councilor Kight asked the rate is \$3.7652, has that gone up from last year?

Wiesinger replied no, it is the permanent rate that was set in 1997-98 and it will remain at that rate unless there is a change in the law.

Councilor Daoust asked could you tell me again what our total assessed value is?

Wiesinger asked the estimated amount or last years amount?

Councilor Daoust stated the estimated.

Wiesinger replied the estimated amount for fiscal year 2000 - 2001 budget is \$697,664,243.

Kvarsten stated as a note Councilor Daoust, you might recall after the passage of Measure 50 the real market value is different than the assessed value. The real market value would be considerably higher, Kyra do you know what that is approximately?

Wiesinger replied for 1999 - 2000 it was around \$780 million.

Mayor Thalhofer asked is there was anyone else who would like to speak to us on this matter?

No public testimony received.

Mayor Thalhofer closed the public hearing at 7:55pm.

Galloway stated this is the second hearing on a proposed ordinance which would modify our public contracting procedures. All of our changes indicated in the proposed ordinance are efforts to incorporate the recent changes from the 1999 legislature.

Council had no questions of Mr. Galloway.

Mayor Thalhofer asked is there was anyone here that would like to speak to us on this issue?

No public comment received.

Mayor Thalhofer closed the Public Hearing at 8:03pm.

7. PUBLIC HEARING / ORDINANCE (Introduced 6/13/00): An Ordinance vacating a portion of SW 4th Street.

Mayor Thalhoffer read the Ordinance title and opened the Public Hearing at 8:00pm.

Faith stated this Ordinance would vacate approximately 242 linear feet of SW 4th Street. This particular area of right-of-way has been used by the City's Public Works Department for approximately the last twenty-five years as part of its parking and circulation area and there are no plans for it to be extended to connect with 257th. The vacation was actually initiated by the City Council by a motion in March of this year and the matter was taken before the Planning Commission for a public hearing on May 17th. No members of the public attended or submitted any comment opposing this vacation. The recommendation of the Planning Commission is to vacate the right-of-way.

Councilor Kight asked the property to the north, is that owned by the city?

Faith replied the city owns the property on both sides of this proposed right-of-way vacation.

Mayor Thalhoffer asked is there was anyone else who would like to speak to us on this matter?

No public comment received.

Mayor Thalhoffer closed the Public Hearing at 8:03pm.

MOTION: Councilor Kight moved to adopt the Ordinance vacating a portion of SW 4th Street. Seconded by Councilor Daoust.

Councilor Kight stated I think it is very logical. The City Council in Troutdale does not have a history of a street vacation such as we are doing here tonight but this particular piece of property has been used historically by the City's Public Works Department for some twenty-five years. In this scenario it is very logical for the City to vacate this portion since there is no use for it and it will not access 257th.

Councilor Daoust stated anytime the City vacates a portion of a street we go through approval criteria and vacating this street meets all of those approval criteria and that is why I favor this motion.

Councilor Ripma stated in this particular case this street vacation involves no give away of public land. It is unlike other vacations that occasionally I have opposed in the past to adjacent private owners. If we vacate a street, in many cases we will never get it back, it doesn't any longer belong to the public and what was public land then becomes private and there is a net loss to the citizens. In this case we are vacating it to the City. I agree with Councilor Kight, it is a street that has no further use, it won't connect to 257th.

Mayor Thalhoffer stated it makes good common sense.

8. PUBLIC HEARING / ORDINANCE (Introduced 6/13/00): An Ordinance amending Chapters 3, 5, 7 and 8 of the Troutdale Development Code to comply with requirements of the Metro Urban Growth Management Functional Plan.

Mayor Thalhoffer read the Ordinance title and opened the Public Hearing at 8:06pm.

Faith stated I went over the history of these amendments to the Development Code at the last Council meeting so I won't repeat all of those. These changes are intended to bring our Code into compliance with various requirement of the Metro Functional Plan. If the Ordinance is adopted it will essentially accomplish four things. It will impose a minimum density standard of 80% of the maximum allowed density within those zoning districts that permit residential development. It will allow accessory dwelling units in association with an detached single-family dwelling subject to a multitude of standards and only in new subdivisions adopted after the effective date of this Ordinance. It adopts street design requirements and street connectivity standards, all of which are required under the Metro Functional Plan. The Planning Commission held a hearing and is forwarding this Ordinance to you with a recommendation for adoption.

Council had no questions of Mr. Faith.

Mayor Thalhoffer asked is there was anyone here that would like to speak to us on this issue?

No public comment received.

Mayor Thalhoffer closed the Public Hearing at 8:08pm.

MOTION: Councilor Daoust moved to adopt the Ordinance amending Chapters 3, 5, 7 and 8 of the Troutdale Development Code to comply with the requirements of the Metro Urban Growth Management Functional Plan. Seconded by Councilor Kight.

Councilor Daoust stated after months of working on this and setting it aside for awhile I think now that we have an Ordinance that is acceptable to the Council and it deals pretty effectively with the minimum density standards for housing and the accessory dwelling units, which would only be allowed in new subdivisions, and the street connectivity standards. Personally I feel a lot more comfortable about this as compared to when we first started discussing it. I do hope that Metro sees this as being in compliance and we can move forward.

Councilor Kight stated I wasn't willing to vote on this when it first came before the Council, there were a lot of details that needed to be hammered out. I think this is a good compromise as far as maintaining the livability of Troutdale. One of the areas that I was concerned about was the accessory dwellings and breaking faith with current home owners in subdivisions that are already built and allowing the accessory dwellings to be built on a neighbors property, that is not going to happen, it will only happen in new subdivisions and chances are there is not going to be that many of them. As we all know, accessory

dwelling is another name for a duplex. We are already at 83% density in Troutdale, it actually lowers the bar if you take it down to 80%. On the part of Mr. Faith, I want to credit him with doing the rounding down on the numbers.

Councilor Ripma stated I agree with what Councilor Daoust said that it is a much better proposal than what we first saw. I am in support of this.

Mayor Thalhoffer stated I would like to compliment Mr. Faith in his willingness to stick with this through many months.

9. PUBLIC HEARING / ORDINANCE (Introduction): An Ordinance amending section 2.08.240, Council Expenses, of the Troutdale Municipal Code.

Mayor Thalhoffer read the Ordinance title and opened the Public Hearing at 8:12pm.

Councilor Ripma stated this ordinance changes our Council Rules. The current rules were adopted in July 1994. When the rules were adopted the Mayor was not a voting member of the Council. Because of the changes in the Charter passing in November of 1994 the Council Rules do not explicitly provide procedures for reimbursing the Mayor for expenses that are incurred. This change in the Council Rules ensures that the Mayor is reimbursed in the same manner as Councilors and City Employees.

Council had no questions of Councilor Ripma.

Mayor Thalhoffer asked is there was anyone here that would like to speak to us on this issue?

No public comment received.

Mayor Thalhoffer closed the Public Hearing at 8:16pm.

10. COUNCIL CONCERNS AND INITIATIVES

Councilor Kight stated I would like to have the Council direct that the Parks Advisory Committee address the problem of amplified music in our parks. This last summer we had some musical groups at the Glenn Otto Park and I received calls from folks on Jackson Park Road complaining of the loud noise. I would like to see the Parks Advisory Committee take a look at the noise level and how we can maintain the livability around our city parks and still accommodate those folks that want to have the musical groups. The second issue for the Parks advisory Committee is the capacity issue. Last summer we had a group at the Glenn Otto Park for river safety and the numbers were up around 5,000 to 6,000 people. Clearly that park is not designed to handle that many people. There were major traffic problems, lack of sanitation facilities, parking was a major problem, streets were blocked off and people were unable to get into their homes. That is another issue we need to take

a look at, again it is not just Glenn Otto but also other parks within our system.

Councilor Daoust stated I would like to speak about the success of the River Safety Program. There have been some actual saves down at the beach at Glenn Otto Park and they have been documented by AMR. The first one was a medical response on a seizure patient. The second incident, not that these are the only three but the second most noteworthy was they assisted some teenage boys to shore. The subjects were wearing life jackets but became caught in the current and were swept towards the "chute". AMR was able to assist them with a line. I guess the one that catches my attention the most is this third one. AMR personnel down at the beach rescued a 25 year old female. The subject lost her ability to swim against the current and was swept into the "chute", one technician immediately entered the water and contacted the subject and placed her into a full contact rescue position while the second technician caught them in the boat. The woman definitely lost her ability to swim and she was in trouble. This just points to the success so far of the AMR group down at the river.

Councilor Smith stated I feel that river is dangerous and it always has been. The amount of people that are using it are making it even worse. I read the article in the paper about that woman. She said she was out there trying to get the rest of her friends to come out there, she was calling them chicken. I personally feel that the river should be closed to swimming just for this reason. The people who seem to frequent it are the ones that go out and do things that they shouldn't be doing. I wish people in Troutdale would take a little more pride in their houses as far as trash and stuff in the street and weeds.

Councilor Ripma stated I would like to remind everyone of SummerFest July 15th.

Mayor Thalhoffer stated I would like to deal with Councilor Kight's request to submit that matter to the Parks Advisory Committee. I think we can do that by consensus. Is anyone opposed to referring that matter to the Parks Advisory Committee?

City Council had no objection.

Mayor Thalhoffer stated for the record the City Council directs this matter to be taken up by the Parks Advisory Committee for review and recommendation.

Mayor Thalhoffer replied yes. There is a fund "special events" in the Community Services budget that could be used for this if the City Council so saw fit.

Councilor Kight asked would this be a Council Agenda item that we will discuss?

Mayor Thalhoffer stated actually it is for next year and we could put it on a future agenda.
