CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Lawrence at 5:30 p.m.

ROLL CALL

Roll call was conducted by City Clerk Grossman, all Councilors present.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mayor Lawrence invited the audience to join in the Pledge of Allegiance.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

It was moved by Elliott and seconded by Miller to approve the agenda as submitted. The motion

carried unanimously.

PRESENTATIONS/PROCLAMATIONS

Recognition of School District 21 Volunteer – Mike Elston

Mayor Lawrence presented Mike Elston with a Certificate of Appreciation and a City of The Dalles mug for his dedication to the Alumni Association. He said Mr. Elston was a 1965 graduate of The Dalles High School who had raised thousands of dollars for technology needs of the high school, shepherded the Alumni website, and was a valued, if unofficial, lobbyist for education.

Mr. Elston thanked everyone for their assistance and asked the Council to please sign up on the Alumni website.

School District 21 Enterprise Zone Annual Report – Randy Anderson

Randy Anderson, Finance Director for School District 21 reviewed the annual report and request for funds, with the assistance of Superintendent Candy Armstrong. Anderson distributed information on the window treatments they are proposing for the high school. He said they anticipated the project taking two years to complete.

<u>Distracted Driver Project – Larry Fairclo</u>

Larry Fairclo presented the Distracted Driver Project. See attachments.

Mr. Fairclo said that April was Distracted Driver Month. He said he was planning an awareness campaign that would include:

- A float in the Cherry Festival Parade.
- Billboard display.
- May 14 "Sign Project" along Second and Third Streets with texts and messages from law enforcement.

Fairclo said educating the youth of the addictive nature of technology and the consequences of texting and driving was the goal of the project. He said he also had programs that were peer to peer education programs.

AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION

Jim Winterbottom, Manager of The Dalles Disposal reported on winter weather issues. He said he believed that they did a good job. He said there were some complaints. He said safety was his

top priority, it was important that his employees made it home safe. He said there had been good communication through messages left on residents' phones, and through the media. He reported that The Dalles Disposal had chains on the trucks from December 7 until February 13.

Winterbottom said some credits had been issued to customers, and several residents had brought their garbage and their neighbors' garbage to the transfer station. He said he personally pick up garbage in his own vehicle.

CITY MANAGER REPORT

City Manager Julie Krueger reported that the City's Best Practices survey with City County Insurance Services results were 89% last year and up to 96% this year. She said it would three years before the City had to complete the questionnaire again. See attachments.

Krueger asked for Council approval to spend safety funds on new vest panels for the Police Department. It was moved by Brown and seconded by Curtiss-Long to approve spending \$14,386 of safety funds for new vest panels for the Police Department. The motion carried unanimously.

CITY ATTORNEY REPORT

City Attorney Parker reported he drafted an agreement with Wasco County to create a Special District for the Fort Dalles Museum. He said it was the recommendation of our insurance carrier to create the special district.

Mayor Lawrence asked for confirmation from the County that the development of the special district would not change the level of support from both the County and City. He said he would like to see the level of support continue.

CITY COUNCIL REPORTS

Councilor Brown reported he was one of the pedestrian volunteers for the Police Department Pedestrian Awareness program.

Councilor Long-Curtiss reported attending the Blossom Festival in Salem with the Chamber President promoting tourism. She said she met with the consultant for QLife and represented the City on the Community Outreach Team trip to Washington DC.Councilor McGlothlin reported that the Airport flex hangar project was moving along. He said he spoke with Oregon Cherry Growers about a strong odor and found they had a wastewater system breakdown. He said they were working with CH2M to develop a solution.

McGlothlin said the NEAT Officer was doing a great job and he would like to see that position be year round. He said the City was able to clean up a homeless camp by Hattenhauer's property. He also reported that Northern Wasco County Parks and Recreation had been asked to close the Mill Creek area dusk to sunrise.

Councilor Elliott reported meeting with the QLife consultant; being a part of the Municipal Court Judge interviews; and the Urban Renewal Agency Meeting.

Elliott read the following definition of Economic Development:

"The process by which a nation improves the economic, political and social well-being of its people."

He said he felt it was important for people to understand the meaning, especially as it pertains to the Urban Renewal District.

Councilor Miller reported on attending the Sister City Board meeting; Urban Renewal Agency meeting; toured the Granada Block properties and the Tony's building; a story telling event at the Civic; the Public Works appreciation lunch; Municipal Court Judge interviews; the farewell event for Judge Peachey; the Handing Over of the Keys event at the Granada; the Granada Open House; and the Mid-Columbia Concert Series.

Mayor Lawrence reported that Mid Columbia Council of Governments (MCCOG) had hired Dave Meriwether as the interim director. He said part of Meriwether's job would be to evaluate the future of MCCOG. He said he attended the job fair at the Readiness Center; had a high school student shadow him for a day; helped Doug Rigdon make a presentation to CAP for purchase of a facility that would be perfect for his fish smoking business. Lawrence said Rigdon would pay the fisherman more per pound, and that would help the local economy.

Mayor Lawrence said he also attended the Granada Key Hand off and the story telling event at the Civic. He said he met with Scott McKay regarding the Area Agency on Aging; read to kids; and attended the HAVEN fundraising event.

CONSENT AGENDA

Long- Curtiss noted a scrivener's error in the minutes. She said the word "hours" was missing on page two toward the end of the second paragraph after "countless". It was moved by Long-Curtiss and seconded by McGlothlin to approve the Consent Agenda as amended. The motion carried unanimously.

Items approved by Consent Agenda were: 1) Approval of March 13, 2017 Regular City Council Meeting Minutes; and 2) Resolution No. 17-010 Concurring with the Mayor's Appointments to Various Committees.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

General Ordinance No. 17-1353 Pertaining to Adoption of an Updated Transportation System Plan (TSP) and Amendments to the Comprehensive Plan and LUDO

City Engineer Dale McCabe and Consultant Susie Wright of Kittelson & Associates reviewed the staff report. See attached PowerPoint presentation.

Mayor Lawrence said he was concerned about 19th Street and Riverfront trail being a high priority. He said it could over shadow immediate needs down the road, when the current Council would no longer be serving.

Ms. Wright said Riverfront Trail and Mill Creek Greenway were identified as Urban Renewal Projects without funds from the City. She said being a high priority didn't mean the funds were allocated.

Councilor Brown said he hoped the Thompson Street improvement included the intersection at 10th Street and Thompson. Ms. Wright said that intersection was addressed in the TSP.

Mayor Lawrence asked if there was any testimony from the audience.

Candy Armstrong, Superintendent of Northern Wasco County School District 21 said the safety of the Freemont/Hwy 197 intersection was a high concern for the school district. She said the 19th Street extension cut into district property at the Thompson Street Track and that would make space for building an elementary school there limited. She said she appreciated the inclusion of pedestrian and bicycle lanes in the plan.

Jim Bryant from Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) said the TSP was a way for the City to convey priorities to ODOT. He said conversations would happen regarding which projects would move forward. He said he was very pleased with the process. Bob McNary, 1525 East Ninth Street, voiced a concern about the traffic back up at the Boat Basin Exit.

Mayor Lawrence voiced a concern that this Council had been discussing the TSP since 2010 and he wanted to make sure the history went along with the plan.

Mayor Lawrence said great work had been done by all.

It was moved by Long-Curtiss and seconded by McGlothlin to adopt General Ordinance No. 17-1353 Pertaining to Adoption of an updated Transportation System Plan and Amendments to the Comprehensive Plan and General Ordinance No. 98-1222 by title only. The motion carried unanimously.

MEETING RECESSED at 7:40 p.m.

RECONVENED at 7:50 p.m.

CONTRACT REVIEW BOARD ACTIONS

Authorization to Purchase Asphalt to be used for Street Maintenance Projects March 28 through June 30, 2017

Public Works Director Dave Anderson reviewed the staff report.

It was moved by Elliott and seconded by Brown to authorize the purchase of hot-mix asphalt as needed for street maintenance from the lowest-cost supplier available at the time of the projects in an amount not to exceed \$463,351. The motion carried unanimously.

ACTION ITEMS

Authorization to Enter Into a Cost Recovery Agreement with US Forest Service for
Environmental Studies in Support of Permitting Related to the Dog River Pipeline Replacement
Project

Public Works Director Dave Anderson reviewed the staff report.

In response to a question Anderson said these were the last two studies he was aware of at this time. He said he was hoping for a decision this fall. He said he hoped work would begin in the 2019 construction season.

It was moved by Elliott and seconded by Miller to authorize the City Manager to sign the Cost Recovery Agreement with the US Forest Service for completion of studies needed in support of the environmental permitting for the Dog River Diversion Pipeline Replacement Project for a cost not to exceed \$65,318. The motion carried unanimously.

Adopt Special Ordinance No. 17-575 Granting a Non-Exclusive Franchise to Zayo Group, LLC to Construct a Fiber Based Service Facility

City Attorney Gene Parker reviewed the staff report. James Cooker from Zayo said he had been working on this project for a while. He said the current fiber was coming to the end of the 20 year life span and Zayo was doing an underground solution, instead of overhead.

In response to a question he said they weren't planning residential service. He said there would be interconnections with existing cell towers.

Cooker said the CEO of Zayo was an ex-founder of Level 3, and a number of employees came with him to Zayo.

Public Works Director Anderson said he had worked with Zayo to minimize street disturbance. City Engineer McCabe said they would be doing mostly boring not trenching.

Councilor Long-Curtiss said she had asked County Commissioner Hege if he thought the Zayo franchise would affect QLife and he had told her he did not.

It was moved by McGlothlin and seconded by Miller to adopt Special Ordinance No. 17-575 Granting a Non-Exclusive Franchise to Zayo Group, LLC to Construct a Fiber Based Service Facility by title only. The motion carried unanimously.

Maintenance Work on West 7th Street

Public Works Director Dave Anderson reviewed the staff report.

Councilor Brown said the report was good and any one of the options would work well, however, he felt the money would be better spent on 10th Street. He said basic maintenance was the Council policy for three years.

Councilor Miller asked if the development in 2 to 3 years would just tear up the street. Public Works Director Anderson said they were planning on installing utility taps to avoid that issue.

Mayor Lawrence asked if it was the will of Council to extend the meeting past 8:30 p.m.

It was moved by Elliott and seconded by Long- Curtiss to extend the meeting past 8:30 p.m. The motion carried unanimously.

It was moved by Elliott and seconded by Brown to proceed with maintenance of the 75' x 26'

section of West 7th Street by removing the broken pieces, patching and applying thin mix over the top at a cost not to exceed \$6,000.

After some discussion, Elliott amended the motion to read ... "cost not to exceed \$10,000".

Long-Curtiss said she felt Council was micro managing the staff. She said a second hotel was coming into that area and visitors would judge the City. She said she was not in favor of slapping thin mix over the street.

The motion carried, Long- Curtiss opposed.

EXCUTIVE SESSION

Mayor Lawrence recessed to Executive Session in accordance with ORS 192.660 (2) (a) to Consider the Employment of a Public Officer, Employee, Staff Member or Individual Agent.

And, ORS 192.660(2)(f) to Consider Information or Records that are Exempt by Law from Public Inspection and 192.660(2)(h) to Consult with Counsel Concerning the Legal Rights and Duties of a Public Body with Regard to Current Litigation or Litigation likely to be filed.

Reconvene to Open Session at 9:16 p.m.

It was moved by Brown and seconded by Long-Curtiss to direct staff to make an offer to Jason Corey for the position of Municipal Court Judge. The motion carried unanimously.

ADJOURNMENT

Being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 9:18 p.m.



On behalf of the Department of Land Conservation and Development (DLCD), I'd like to say it has been a privilege to work with the city of The Dalles in its recent planning efforts. We are currently participating in the housing needs analysis/buildable lands inventory through our Technical Assistance Grant program and the TSP update in the joint ODOT-DLCD Transportation and Growth Management (TGM) grant. Your staff and consultants have been doing excellent work and we are looking forward to continuing to partner with you on important planning projects in the future.

The purpose of this letter is to support the efforts of the city to provide walkable, bikeable streets by ensuring sidewalk and street improvement standards cannot be avoided through the use of serial partitions. The language being proposed by staff and your consultant is consistent with the Transportation Planning Rule (Oregon Revised Statute 660, division 12). Subsection 045(3) states the purpose of this rule:

"... to provide for safe and convenient pedestrian, bicycle and vehicular circulation consistent with access management standards and the function of affected streets, to ensure that new development provides on-site streets and accessways that provide reasonably direct routes for pedestrian and bicycle travel in areas where pedestrian and bicycle travel is likely if connections are provided, and which avoids wherever possible levels of automobile traffic which might interfere with or discourage pedestrian or bicycle travel.

The proposed language is also consistent with the mission of the TGM program:






- Figure 6-1 Page 152






Interchange Area Management Plan (IAMP)





Transit Analysis Findings

- Fixed-Route Transit Feasible in The Dalles
 - Current LINK ridership is apx. 19,000 rides per year.
 - 2-bus system on 1-hour headways could provide service to most areas of the City
 - Estimated ridership = 86,000 annual rides





LUDO 0.303.040 - Partition Application Review

Language Included in packet:

A. Review Procedure. Partition applications shall be processed as administrative actions, per the provisions of *Section 3.020.040*: *Administrative Actions*. Where the Director determines that continuous partitioning of a tract of land may occur in subsequent years, potentially resulting in the need for new road(s), utilities, or stormwater drainage facilities to be constructed and unmitigated impacts to City services and surrounding property, the application shall be referred to the Planning Commission, pursuant to *Section 3.020.050 Quasi-Judicial Actions* for a determination as to the applicability of the LUDO subdivision requirements.

Planning commission supported intent and recommended that the City Council consider language with more "teeth" that was clear and objective.

LUDO 0.303.040 - Partition Application Review

Alternative Language for Consideration:

A. Review Procedure.

- 1. Partition applications shall be processed as administrative actions, per the provisions of Section 3.020.040: Administrative Actions, where approval will result in parcels that are not able to be subsequently partitioned pursuant to the requirements of the underlying zoning. Applications that will result in a parcel or parcels of sufficient size to permit a future partition under the provisions of the current zone district will be subject to 9.030.040(A)(2).
- 2. Any division of land resulting in a parcel or parcels of sufficient size to permit future partitions under the provisions of the current zone district that could be subdivided or further partitioned into 3 or more lots shall be considered a "series partition" and subject to subdivision requirements unless otherwise granted an exception from the Planning Commission.
