While my letter is critical of your department, I have the utmost respect for the hard work you are doing on behalf of Oregonians. Thank you for your service.

I am deeply concerned that the Department of Environmental Quality has allowed levels of toxins into the water of Oregon based on a very low estimation of fish consumption per a person. Given that indigenous people in Oregon probably consume a larger amount of fish than the average settler, setting a threshold based on settler-consumption levels can easily be shown to be an act of ethnic-cleansing. This is deeply offensive to me; there is no place in a civilized society for this type of childish and underhanded behaviour.

I support the quick adoption of proposed new toxic standards. Please apply the new limits to polluted storm water. Please do not include loopholes for polluters—we don't need to issue variances; polluters can follow the rules.

Toxic standards must accurately reflect the maximum amount of fish consumed by Oregonians. To allow toxic levels which harm a few while protecting most is not democratic, and bespeaks a lack of true care for human life and well-being. While the proposed 175 grams per a day may be sufficient, I suggest an assumption that Oregonians consume 500 grams of fish per a day.

Storm water is filled with toxic pollutants and needs to be regulated as well.
