

ORDINANCE NO. 165.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR A GENERAL ELECTION TO BE HELD FROM 9 A.M. TO 7 P. M. ON DECEMBER 15, 1915; NAMING THE POLLING PLACE; DESIGNATING THE JUDGES AND THE CLERKS OF ELECTION; STATING THE FORM OF BALLOT TO BE USED, AND THE DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS IN CONNECTION WITH THE ELECTION.

THE CITY OF WARRENTON DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That there shall be held a general election in the City of Warrenton, Oregon, on Wednesday, the 15th day of December, A.D. 1915, at which time all the elective officers of the City shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof.

Section 2. That said election shall be held at, and the voting or polling place shall be in, the City Hall of said City of Warrenton.

Section 3. That the three following named persons be, and they hereby are, designated and appointed judges of said election: C. J. Vermont, John Bruce and J. L. Tucker.

and if any of such judges shall fail to attend and serve at the proper time, the voters then present at the voting place may elect another, or others, accordingly as there shall be one or more of them so absent, to serve in his, or their, place or places; and if either ^{or both of the clerks of} election hereinafter ^{(named} shall fail to attend and serve at the proper time, the judges may appoint some elector, or electors, to serve in his, her or their place or ^{two} places; and that the ^{two} following named persons be, and they hereby are, designated and appointed clerks of said election: John S. Myers, and Phil Coffey; and the Auditor and Police Judge is hereby directed to notify said judges and clerks of election, in writing, not later than ten days prior to the date of said election aforesaid.

Section 4. That said election shall be by ballot, which shall be substantially in the following form, to-wit:

Section 5. That said election shall commence at 9 o'clock A. M. and close at 7 o'clock P. M. on the said 15th day of December, 1915, but the judges of election, may, in their discretion, close the polls at noon for one hour.

Section 6. That the Auditor and Police Judge, being ex-officio recorder of said city, shall give a ten days' notice of said election by posting typewritten or printed notices at three public places in said City, which shall plainly state the time and the place of the holding of said election, and the officers to be elected.

Section 7. That on or before the second day immediately following said election, the returns thereof must be filed with the said Recorder, and on the said second day, or sooner if such returns are in sooner, the said Recorder shall call to his assistance the Mayor of said City, and they shall then canvass the returns of said election.

Section 8. That said Recorder shall thereupon issue certificates of election to the successful candidates, respectively, the same to be under his hand, as Auditor and Police Judge, and the seal of said City, and the original poll books and the returns must be filed with said Recorder in his office, to be by him preserved.

Section 9. That all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.
