They qualified by providing jobs. They could do this in the Urban Renewal District. It would be a competitive process.

Mayor Thompson thought things were moving in the industrial area and was not sure if it was needed. She thought maybe putting it on an undeveloped area or one not annexed yet however that would take away money from the general fund.

Councilor Daniels thought there was a lot of competition. Mayor Thompson thought the ones who were applying for these zones were not their competition.

Councilor Carson wondered if they were losing companies because they did not have it.

Councilor Helbling said they were far ahead of other communities. They could not be selective about who came in if they created the zone, and the pace of the growth in the industrial park was going well.

CONSENT AGENDA: **Councilor Blackwell moved to approve Accounts Payable of \$680,909.69; Minutes of the June 21, 2006 City Council Meeting and Executive Session; and reappointment of Laurie Sandsness to the Traffic Safety Commission for a term to expire on June 30, 2009. Motion was seconded by Councilor Carson and passed 6-0.

STAFF REPORT: Kevin Cook, Associate Planner, said the applicant was requesting to annex 73.35 acres. The site was south of Township Road, west of Mulino Road, east of the Molalla Forest Road., and north of SW 13th. If annexed, the property would be zoned M1, light industrial. The Planning Commission recommended approval. This was priority C, but there were no more A or B parcels. Special consideration should be given to these parcels as they represented rail accessible industrial land which was non-existent in the City. Providers indicated services would be available.

Mayor Thompson opened the public hearing at 7:42 p.m.

PUBLIC TESTIMONY

APPLICANT: Pat Sisul of Sisul Engineering said the properties were originally included in a 300 acre annexation that was previously denied by the voters. The site was well served by transportation. When developed, Sequoia Parkway would be extended. This development would help form a large diameter water line loop connecting 13th to Sequoia. A sewer pump station would be added which would also serve 13th and Township. This would increase the industrial land base and would economically impact the City substantially in bringing in jobs. All the land was outside the urban renewal district. The annexation area was identified as Priority C, but there was no longer any A or B land. Of the 151 acres in the Pioneer Industrial Park, about 75 acres had been purchased. There were only four parcels left that were shovel ready. This annexation would replace the land that had been purchased. Special consideration should be given for large parcel, rail accessible land because it was not existent in the City. There was a demand for this type of property. Canby was in competition for industrial users, and this annexation would help them stay ahead. It met all other criteria.

DISCUSSION: Councilor Daniels said an email had been received that was in opposition because there was more than a five year supply. Mr. Cook said they also had to look at shovel ready, which was significantly less and this was a unique parcel. Councilor Daniels said they needed a variety of products to bring in different businesses.

Councilor Helbling said that throughout the application process City agencies were asked to give feedback, and all of those had responded positively. Annexing this property would help solve

the perceived imbalance of needing a larger economic base before annexing more residential land.

Councilor Harris said the Planning Commission was unanimously in favor of the application. It was a logical and reasonable next step that benefited the community. It had been planned for this use for a long time.

**Councilor Harris moved to approve ANN 06-01 and request that the City Attorney return with ballot title and language appropriate to forward the final decision to Canby voters in the General Election on November 7, 2006. Motion was seconded by Councilor Blackwell and passed 6-0.

STAFF REPORT: Mr. Cook said the applicant was seeking to annex 1.7 acres. The property was located south of NE Territorial, east of Pine Street, and west of the Logging Road Trail. If annexed, it would be zoned R2 and could be subdivided into 23 townhouse units. It was previously approved by the Planning Commission and City Council, but not approved by the City voters. It was Priority A land. Utilities could serve the site. There was a 2.62 year supply of high density, and this would increase it to 3.06 years. The property was surrounded by City limits. The development would look similar to the Pine Station subdivision.

Mayor Thompson opened the public hearing at 8:06 p.m.

PUBLIC TESTIMONY

APPLICANT: Mr. Sisul said they had seen this application a year ago. It was islanded by the City, it had utilities in Territorial Road and Territorial provided good access. It would be 23 single family attached townhomes. The Planning Commission had approved it twice, and he hoped they would approve it again.

<u>Tom Scott</u> of S.T.J., LLC said that he thought this was the right thing to do with the property. It was surrounded by the City and would be zoned high density which was in great demand.

Councilor Helbling said he had personally visited with the Wastewater Treatment Plant and the School District and they felt services were available. They had a balance of economics and they needed to start passing annexations.

STAFF REPORT: Mr. Cook said the applicant was seeking to annex a 1.03 acre tax lot. There were currently no development plans for the property. It would be zoned R1. The property currently contained one single family residence. It was surrounded by the City limits and was Priority A land. All utilities could serve the site. The property owner would be responsible for extending the sewer line from Territorial. There was a 2.31 year supply of low density, and this would increase it to 2.36 years. They would also require right of way dedication and half street improvements.

She attended the METRO policy advisor meeting regarding growth and urbanization. They wanted them to develop their own vision but they needed to be more regionally involved.

Ordinance 1212 - **Councilor Daniels moved to approve Ordinance 1212, AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND CITY ADMINISTRATOR TO EXECUTE A CONTRACT WITH WESTERN BUS SALES, INC. OF BORING, OREGON FOR THE LEASE/PURCHASE OF THREE (3) 2006 FREIGHTLINER CHAMPION BLUEBIRDS FOR CANBY AREA TRANSIT; AND DECLARING AN EMERGECY. Motion was seconded by Councilor Blackwell and passed 6-0 by roll call vote.

Ordinance 1214 – **Councilor Helbling moved to approve Ordinance 1214, AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR TO EXECUTE A CONTRACT FOR THE PURCHASE OF REAL PROPERTY FOR A FUTURE MUNICIPAL POLICE/COURT BUILDING; AND DECELARING AN EMERGENCY.
