

CALL TO ORDER/FLAG SALUTE

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Smith at 7:30 p.m. in the Lebanon School District Offices, Board Room, 485 S. 5th Street.

1. City Attorney McHill swore in newly-elected City Councilors Ron Miller Jr., Diane Branson, and Jim Mills.

ROLL CALL

Roll call was taken, Councilor Lyle Winters and City Administrator Joseph Windell were absent.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

- 2. Minutes of the December 30, 1992 City Council meeting were approved as submitted.
- 3. Mayor Smith opened the floor for the election of a Council President to act as Pro-Tem Mayor in the Mayor's absence.
 - Councilor Toombs nominated Councilor Miller for Council President. Councilor Rieskamp seconded the nomination. The nomination passed unanimously.
- 4. Committee appointments were discussed as per attached list. The Budget Committee has three vacant positions. Ward III has two vacancies, Al Hutchinson and Bob Brannon's terms have expired. Ward II has one vacancy, Darryl Dukes will soon be moving out of city limits.

LEGISLATIVE ACTION

5. County Roads Transfer of Jurisdiction

Director of Public Works Ruef addressed the Council regarding two recent agreements with Linn County requiring us to accept jurisdiction of County Roads. The East Grant Street agreement requires the City, upon completion, to accept jurisdiction of Grant Street from Main Street to the Santiam River Bridge. The agreement for distribution of Linn County Forest

Receipts requires the City to accept jurisdiction for county roads lying within areas annexed to the City during the term of the agreement. He recommends the City Council approve the resolution requesting transfer of jurisdiction for these streets.

RESOLUTION NO. 30; A RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF LINN COUNTY TO SURRENDER JURISDICTION OF CERTAIN COUNTY ROADS LOCATED WITHIN THE CITY OF LEBANON. Motion by Councilor Rieskamp, seconded by Councilor Miller to adopt the resolution as submitted. Motion passed unanimously.

OTHER MATTERS

6. Report on Hydro-Electric Potential on the Canal

Director of Public Works Ruef discussed the hydro-power potential of the Santiam Canal as it flows through Lebanon. Two locations on the Canal, which show the most possibility, are the old hydro-electric plant located at the Lebanon Water Treatment Plant and the other site is at the Santiam Canal Industrial Park.

The City of Albany is looking into the possibility of rebuilding their facility and if they decide to proceed with any of their reconstruction options, the potential for Lebanon to utilize either the SCIP or the WTP site becomes more attractive.

Staff requests approval of City Council to pursue this matter further.

There was consensus among Council members to instruct staff to continue investigating and bring back any further facts and information.

There being no further business to come before the Council, the meeting was adjourned at 7:56 p.m.

Proposed Amendments to Lebanon Municipal Code,

SUBJECT: Rotating Community Members for Senior and

Disabled Services Advisory Board

LouAnn Grosch has requested that I prepare an Ordinance that indicates a change in the term of office for rotating community members of the Senior and Disabled Services Advisory Board. According to LouAnn, experience has shown the Advisory Board that a single six-month term is not enough for representatives serving as rotating members to make as good a contribution to the Board as those members would like to see made. Accordingly, LouAnn and the Board have requested that the Municipal Code Ordinance determining the terms of office be changed to allow for members, including current members, to serve two consecutive full terms before they must wait two years before reappointment.

Accordingly, I have prepared the attached amendments to Section 2.28.045 of the Lebanon Municipal Code. The changed portions of the Code section are in bold print in this proposed Ordinance.

LouAnn has requested that this amendment be placed upon the agenda for the City Council meeting for January 27, 1993.

A BILL FOR AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 2.28.045 OF THE LEBANON MUNICIPAL CODE, SENIOR AND DISABLED SERVICES ADVISORY BOARD ORDINANCE BILL NO POR 1993 ORDINANCE NO)
THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF LEBANON DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:
Section 1. Section 2.28.045 of the Lebanon Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:
The Senior and Disabled Services Advisory Board, in addition to the nine (9) members appointed by the Mayor, will include two (2) Rotating Community Positions. These positions will be comprised of local business representatives. The Rotating Community Positions will be for a term of six (6) months. The Rotating Community members will be selected and recruited by consensus of the Advisory Board. Individuals serving as a Rotating Member may not serve more than two full complete consecutive terms nor may be reappointed within two (2) years of the end of their last term. This section shall apply to those Rotating Community members who are in office as of January 1, 1993 or selected after that date. Passed by a vote of for and against and

Proposed Revision to the Articles of Agreement

You will find attached proposed revisions to Article VIII (a) of the COG's Articles of Agreement. The proposed revisions were approved by a majority of the COG Board at their meeting of November 12, 1992.

To amend the Articles of Agreement as proposed, each member government must formally vote to ratify the change. If the proposed amendment is ratified by two-thirds plus one of its members, it is adopted.

The amendment changes the quorum requirement for Board meetings. Presently, a quorum consists of a simple majority of the members of COG. The change would allow a quorum to be 25% of the membership. If a special meeting was called, a quorum would be a simple majority.

The lack of a quorum at our meetings is a serious issue. It makes it very difficult, if not impossible for the COG staff to conduct business. Furthermore, there is a liability issue for each member of the Board when action must be taken and we lack a quorum. My preference would be for all members to be represented at our meetings. There is value in learning from each other. But the reality is that all members do not attend. I urge your approval of the amendment by motion and/or resolution.

Proposed Amendment to the Cascades West Council of Governments Articles of Agreement

Article VIII. Organizational Procedures

- (A) The Board shall meet every other month. A calendar of meetings for the year shall be distributed in January of each year. Regular meetings shall be held on a rotating basis in Benton, Lincoln, and Linn Counties. A quorum must consist of 25% of the members of the Board required for official action at any regularly scheduled meeting;
- (B) Special meetings may be called by the Chair or by three members of the Board. At least seven (7) calendar days' notice shall be given to the membership for special meetings.

 A quorum, consisting of a simple majority of the members of the Board, shall be required for official action to be taken at a special meeting;
- (E) A quorum shall consist of a simple majority of the members of the Board;

LIBRARY ADVISORY BOARD MINUTES

The November 18, 1992 meeting of the Lebanon Public Library Advisory Board was called to order at 7:03 P.M. by Chairperson Pat Dunn. Also present were board members Blanche Canaday, Shirley Foulds, and Kathleen Gillis; and City Council representative John Richard. Marge Lowe and Shirley Kilborn were unable to attend.

The minutes of the October 21, 1992 meeting were approved as written.

Future Use of LSCA Funds

Susan discussed with the board a recent memo from Oregon State Librarian Jim Schepke which outlines the State Library's proposed plan for future use of LSCA Title I and III funds in Oregon. The State Advisory Council on Libraries is recommending that LSCA funds be used to support interlibrary loan net lender reimbursement and to establish regional reference referral centers. Susan told the board that if these programs are established, they will help to alleviate the interlibrary loan, subject and reference requests that will no longer be accepted by the State Library after June 30, 1993. After that date the only interlibrary loan requests that will be handled by the State Library will be for items that are in their collection and appear in Orcat.

O.M.I. Donation/Automation Project

Susan reported that the cooperative project with Albany Public Library to store the MARC records of our collection is proceeding on schedule. It is expected that barcode labels will be placed on the library's books beginning in January 1993 using volunteer labor. Storage of MARC records will start after the barcode labels have been attached, again with volunteer labor.

Proposed Policy Changes

Susan proposed the following policy changes:

- 1. The Friends of the Library representative be placed on the Advisory Board for a two year term. It is currently a one year appointment. The two year term would correspond with the Friends' two year term of office.
- Establish a library card for temporary residents, such as visitors to the area or those who are on short term job assignments.
- 3. More strictly limit what is considered acceptable identification for those persons wishing to obtain a library card.

- 4. Issue library cards for businesses for one year, renewable annually. Business cards are currently issued for three years.
- 5. Require all adults applying for a library card to sign her/her own registration card. Currently an adult may sign for his/her spouse.

After some discussion the board agreed to the policy changes, directing Susan to present the revised policies at the December board meeting.

Food for Fines

Susan informed the board that the library would once again be soliciting patrons with overdue fines to donate food in lieu of fines between the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays. All donations will be given to the Lebanon Fish for distribution.

Friends of the Library

Blanche Canaday reported that Friends member Nancy Eaton has agreed to publish the Friends newsletter. The publication has not been issued on a regular basis for some time due to lack of volunteers.

Discussion of the possibility of future formation of a library district was tabled until the December meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:18 P.M. by Chairperson Dunn.

Susan distributed the December issue of "Letter to Libraries Online" to the board. She explained that this is the State Library's monthly newsletter to libraries that is now supplied only through their public access catalog. Susan told the board that a copy of the current newsletter will be included in monthly agenda packets.

Christmas Party

The library's annual Christmas party will be held at the First Methodist Church's Fireside Room at 6:00 P.M. on December 21, 1992, according to Messersmith. Board members were encouraged to attend. This event is always well attended and is one of the ways the library staff says "thank you" to all its volunteers.

CIRCULATION

Susan reported that a circulation of 37,272 through the first five months of the 1992-93 fiscal year is nearly even with that of one year ago. She stressed, however, that the daily and hourly average circulation increased to 376/day and 58/hour due to the two weeklong closures necessitated by budget restrictions.

POLICY CHANGES

Susan announced that the proposed policy changes will be submitted for board approval once she has the opportunity to discuss them with library staff.

RETIREMENT OF JOHN RICHARD

The board expressed its appreciation of John's four years of service on the library board, noting the support and advice he has given through those years. Cake and coffee were served in his honor.

The next Advisory Board meeting was set for January 20, 1993.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:30 P.M. by chairperson Dunn.

City Liability for Medical Expenses (Stires)

Attached to this Memo is a packet I received on 1/15/93 from the Oregon Health Sciences University demanding payment from the City for medical expenses incurred by Mr. Stires in the amount of \$14,126.89. This is in addition to the previous billing submitted by the Lebanon Community Hospital for the amount of \$2,633.74. The LCH billing was submitted to Chief Richmend with a letter dated December 28, 1992.

As you know, our firm represents the Lebanon Community Hospital and I am its general counsel. Accordingly, even though I have not been contacted by LCH regarding their billing, I would not become involved in any disputes between the City and the Hospital. My analysis, therefore, is limited to questions of responsibility for the payment of the bills to the Oregon Health Sciences University (OHSU).

As I mentioned to you in my Memo of 12/4/92, there are many unanswered questions in this area of Oregon law. Supreme Court has recently issued several opinions in this area indicating that there would be liability found in the statutes for the City in this case. However, to make matters more confusing, the 1991 Oregon Legislature enacted Senate Bill 1142, which "sunsets" on July 1, 1993, which confuses me in a couple of respects. Unfortunately, the recent Supreme Court rulings specifically reserve ruling on the new law's application to the cases ruled upon by the Court. In this memo, I want to review the facts of this case, and suggest a couple of approaches the City may want to take with respect to the billing submitted by OHSU. Ouite frankly, I find myself "chasing my own tail" as I review these statutes, but I hope this will be of some assistance to you in deciding your approach to this matter.

FACTS

As you know, Mr. Stires was arrested by officers of the Lebanon Police Department on September 16, 1992. The arrest was based upon notification to the Department from Jackson County that Mr. Stires had two valid Jackson County warrants for failing to appear in that county on two criminal charges. The warrant confirmation was teletyped to LPD on September 16th at 7:07 PM.

The arrest was made at approximately 6:25 PM by Lebanon Police Officers at 275 Rose St. (I understand that the information of the warrants was based upon facts confirmed by the later teletype). Prior to the actual arrest, Mr. Stires had attempted to flee the residence by going out the back door. He was detained by an officer stationed there, and the arrest was completed for the outstanding warrants.

Subsequent to the arrest of Mr. Stires, other facts developed which would support an arrest for criminal activity for state crimes committed within this jurisdiction: Resisting the arrest, Possession of a Controlled Substance, and Criminal Mischief for damage received by the LPD patrol car. He was subsequently indicted by the Linn County Grand Jury on the possession charge and the Criminal Mischief charge.

After being lodged into the Lebanon Lockup facility to await transport to the Linn County Jail, Mr. Stires' attempted suicide was discovered at approximately 7:08 PM. He was transported by Lebanon Ambulance to LCH and subsequently transported to OHSU. These medical billings result. At 11:06 am on September 17, 1992, Jackson County released its hold on Mr. Stires.

LEGAL ANALYSIS

As I have mentioned to you before, there are several ORS provisions, as well as the recent Supreme Court cases, which may have application in this case. Unfortunately for my analysis, these cases do not seem to exactly "dovetail" so that a clear answer is apparent about the responsibility for these medical bills. On the whole, it appears that the strongest arguments, legal and policy, probably exist to make the bills <u>probably</u> the responsibility of the City of Lebanon.

We have previously determined that the "guts" of SB 1142, the Prisoner Medical Expense provisions do not apply in this case. This bill provided for a state fund out of which claims could be made by medical providers for payment of expenses incurred for injuries suffered by suspects which occur during the arrest or booking of the suspect. Additionally, Chief Richmond contacted the Redmond Chief of Police, Jim Carlson, who was the Oregon Association of Chiefs of Police legislative representative during the enactment of SB 1142. Chief Carlson also reports that it was not the intent of the Legislature to provide coverage for self-inflicted injuries. Therefore, we must look to the statutes themselves, as also amended by SB 1142, to determine potential liability.

Throughout this analysis I think it is important to remember that Mr. Stires was <u>never</u> in the actual custody of the County. Also, while it could be argued that Jackson County had <u>constructive</u> custody through LPD, he was never in the actual custody of Jackson

County. The City had actual custody of the prisoner up until he was transported to the Hospital, and had constructive custody of him until his release from OHSU.

ORS 169.140 and 169.150 discuss the responsibility of Linn County for prisoners lodged in a local correctional facility pending trial or after sentencing. ORS 169.005(3) says that a local correctional facility means a jail which is operated by a county or city to hold persons for more that 36 hours. Subsection 4 defines a "lockup" as a facility for the temporary detention of persons held up to 36 hours, but in no event, for longer than 96 hours after booking. The City's facility has been classified by the state as a lockup. Therefore, for the purpose of ORS 169.150, the county is not responsible for the payment of expenses for keeping prisoners, and would not be liable for these bills under this statute.

Notwithstanding these above cited provisions, ORS 169.152 provides that when a person is confined in a county local correctional facility for violation of a city ordinance, for nonpayment of a fine imposed by a municipal court, or as a result of a warrant of arrest issued by a magistrate in another county, the county in which the warrant was issued or the city shall be liable for the costs of medical care provided to the person while confined in the county local correctional facility. Furthermore, the keeper of the local correctional facility shall bill the other county for the actual cost of the medical care provided, and the other shall pay within 60 days after receiving the cost statement from the keeper.

I think that the problem, again, in applying this statute to our facts is that the City's facility is not a county local correctional facility under ORS 169.005. However, since Stires was in the city facility because of the Jackson County warrant, it may be advisable to bill Jackson County for the expenses and see what position they take on this matter. It appears that this statute presupposes that the local keeper has already paid the billing, but it may be advisable to submit the bill directly to them.

Perhaps a statute which is more directly on point is found at ORS 169.165, Liability for costs of emergency medical services. This statute provides, as amended, that notwithstanding ORS 169.140 and 169.150, an individual who receives medical services not provided by the county while in the custody of a local correctional facility, is responsible for those costs. However, if the medical provider has made reasonable efforts to collect from the person and has not been able to collect within 45 days, the provider may bill the keeper of the facility who shall pay the account. ORS 169.155, for the specific purpose of this statute, defines a local correctional facility as including lockups and temporary hold facilities. Therefore, if Stires was in the custody

of the Lebanon facility, it would appear that the City would be legally responsible for the costs. The City would retain the right to recover from the provider any of the bill paid to the provider by the person.

The part of this statute which has me confused is Subsection 4 of the 1991 Act. This subsection provides as follows:

Except as otherwise provided by ORS 30.260 to 30.300 (the State Tort Claims Act) and federal civil rights laws, upon release of the individual from the actual physical custody of the local correctional facility, the keeper of the local correctional facility is not liable for the payment of charges and expenses for medical services provided to the individual. (emphasis added)

This part of the statute is new and has no cases which help us to determine why the Legislature specifically limited the responsibility for medical expenses only where the person is in "actual" physical custody of the facility. It could certainly be argued that Stires was not in the actual physical custody of anyone after he was transported to LCH. The Supreme Court cases discuss the custody issues where there was no guarding of the suspect's hospital bed and the cases hold that the person is still in the custody of the police. However, I think it noteworthy that the legislature has apparently distinguished "custody" from "actual physical custody."

The real problem with this analysis is twofold: First, I think such an interpretation would be contrary to the policy adopted by the Supreme Court in the Emmanuel Hospital case where the court found that the policy of finding liability with the City of Hermiston was consistent with public policy to provided treatment for the prisoner without the hospital worrying about whether or not it was going to be paid; Secondly, the only way to find out the answer will be to litigate the question. This second problem could be expensive and time consuming.

Analysis of these questions must also mention the provisions of ORS 30.795. This statute was the one employed by the Oregon Supreme Court in <u>Emmanuel</u> to find liability with Hermiston. This statute is, basically, the mirror image of ORS 169.165, except that it covers persons who receive emergency medical services "while in the custody of a law enforcement officer...." Again, it is the responsibility of the provider to attempt to recover from the prisoner, and, if not, the provider must submit the bill to the public agency who shall pay the amount. The provider must not have been paid by the prisoner within 45 days, and must demonstrate to the public agency the efforts to collect.

Analysis under ORS 30.795 carries with it the questions raised

by the 1991 Act: was the prisoner in the custody of LPD and have the medical providers demonstrated "reasonable" efforts to collect. Again, the ultimate issues might have to be resolved by litigation; what are reasonable efforts for the provider may not be reasonable for a jury (e.g. Does the hospital have to sue and not collect a judgement? Does the hospital have to do an asset search to determine whether or not a judgment would be collectable? Is it enough that the hospital contact the person and determine that he is not working?, etc.)

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. These issues should be addressed to the City Council to determine how to proceed. This can be done under executive session because it is reasonably likely that litigation could result.
- 2. Having determined the Council's position and ideas as to how to proceed, I think that submitting the billings to Jackson County would be appropriate under the provisions of ORS 169.152. As mentioned above, I think an adequate argument could be made by Jackson County that, since this is not a county facility, that this statute does not apply. However, there may be enough of a valid argument on our part to perhaps negotiate some sort of split on the billings. To be sure, if the City gets sued, we will want to join Jackson County and this may be enough to get some participation.
- 3. We could fashion the arguments raised above, particularly the subsection 4 of the 1991 Act, to deny the claims. Undoubtedly, this would result in litigation.
- 4. The City could also deny the claims on the basis that the medical provider has failed to show that it has made reasonable efforts to recover the costs from Stires. The statute does not give us any objective standard as to the meaning of "reasonable efforts." Therefore, the resolution to this question would ultimately be decided by a jury.
- 5. The City could pay the bills and then hope to recoup the expenses from Stires (doubtful of success) or to approach Jackson County for contribution. The problem with paying one or both of the bills is that payment could release others from responsibility on the expenses. This would be particularly true if one provider was paid and not the other. One could then argue that the payment was an acknowledgement of the debt.
- $\,$ 6. The City could simply pay the bills and avoid the issues addressed above.

Once you have had an opportunity to review this analysis, I welcome discussion of these matters with you.



In 1989, the Linn County Tourism Coalition received a grant from the Northwest Area Foundation and the Wilderness Society to develop ways of diversifying our regional economy. With the assistance of private consultants (McKeever/Morris, Inc.), we developed a comprehensive recreation master plan for Linn County (Phase I).

Having received a second grant from the Northwest Area Foundation, we are now ready to begin Phase II. This phase will focus on:

- * strengthening and expanding our network of members;
- * developing community-specific tourism committees;
- * selecting and prioritizing a list of community tourism projects;
- * packaging those projects into a county-wide proposal; and
- * seeking funds for implementation.

There will be three primary participants for Phase II: the Linn County Tourism Coalition, McKeever/Morris, Inc. and our local communities. It is for this reason that Mandy Cole Schmidt and I would appreciate having a few minutes at the January 13 City Council meeting to describe the importance of this project to those of us who live and work in Linn County. Our goal is to have every community actively supporting our efforts.

Attached is a copy of the Final Project Report for Phase I. It may be helpful for each councilor to receive a copy before the meeting.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, it is important for Linn County to have a sustainable and diverse economy to assure the long-term well being of its citizens, and

WHEREAS, the Linn County Tourism Coalition, consisting of local, regional, and federal agencies, was established with the goal of:

Enhancing Linn County's economy and quality of life by promoting year-round regional tourism and recreation and enhancing facilities, events and attractions through a cooperative approach.

WHEREAS, the Coalition developed the following eight project principles to guide the planning effort.

Primary user activities to be pursued by the Linn County Tourism/Recreation Plan shall include outdoor recreation, special events, and significant historical resource interpretation. The strategy to promote and enhance these resources shall include:

- 1) A program to encourage year-round recreation activities that focus on the needs and unique seasonal nature of different user groups;
- 2) The optimum use of existing recreational facilities and resources;
- 3) Emphasis on outdoor recreational activities;
- 4) Historical tours and special events throughout the year with particular emphasis to maintain or expand these activities during the off season;
- 5) Partnerships which complement and are coordinated with plans and objectives of other relevant public and private agencies and organizations in the County, State, and region;
- 6) The development of facilities and activities which are managed to maximize the response (in order of priority) to local, regional, national and international needs.

Special consideration shall be given toward development of visitor information services (eg. visitor centers), education, facility, and attraction needs of unique local significance;

- 7) The retention of existing revenue generating recreational activities and the establishment of similar activities. Revenue generating activities include uses which will create local jobs and produce income through user fees and/or through indirect expenditures such as lodging and retail purchases; and
- 8) The identification of a management structure to direct the long-term coordination and implementation of the project.



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

BACKGROUND

Timber dependent communities in Oregon face major challenges to their local economies as a result of recent changes in the timber market, timber harvesting limitation, and technological change.

In order for these communities to successfully deal with these challenges, the residents must become actively involved in the planning for their future. They need to work together to implement a plan of action. In some communities plans are made and local leaders are attempting to find the necessary resources to effectively implement key provisions in the plan. In other communities there is a need for local consensus in developing a plan for action.

The Northwest Area Foundation funded a project to provide assistance to timber dependent communities. This document is the final report for that project. The Community Involvement Program for Timber Dependent Communities was designed to:

- provide economic data that examines the impact on local economies of reduced timber harvesting and other changes in the wood products industry;
- increase communication and cooperative action amongst timber dependent communities, the timber industry and environmental interests, and for timber dependent communities in Oregon and to share useful information;
- help selected timber dependent communities to develop local plans of action aimed at economic diversification; and
- develop consensus at the local level and within the environmental community for needed model programs to assist timber dependent communities.

The Northwest Area Foundation provided a grant to The Wilderness Society to conduct this project. The Wilderness Society contracted with an independent firm, McKeever/Morris, Inc., a Portland-based firm specializing in public involvement, consensus building, planning and design, to conduct the work.

This report is organized into two sections.

- Section I explains the projects initial scoping activities and how the final work program was developed.
- Section II is the Recreation Plan which was developed for Linn County, Oregon.

PROGRAM FOR TIMBER DEPENDENT COMMUNITIES

PROJECT SCOPING PHASE

This section of the report describes scoping activities which were conducted to identify the final work program for theoverall project.

A. Regional Advisory Committee

A project Advisory Committee was established to provide guidance to the project. The Advisory Committee was comprised of broadly representative people from public, private, non-profit and academic sectors. A list of Advisory Committee members is included in Appendix 1A. The Advisory Committee met twice; in January, 1991 in Seattle, Washington and in April, 1991 in Sweet Home, Oregon. Agendas are included in Appendix 1B.

B. Scoping Meetings

Several scoping meetings were held with timber dependent communities, state agency staff, and representatives from private industry, including forest products. A list of these meetings is included in Appendix 1C. The purpose of the meetings was to identify the needs of timber dependent communities and determine how best to target project resources to serve those needs.

Early in the project it was decided to focus many of the project's resources on planning activities in two timber dependent areas: Linn County, Oregon and Grays Harbor County, Washington. This meant that several timber communities interested in participating in the project could not receive direct project services. However, project staff, the Advisory Committee, and several of the parties included in the scoping interviews believed it was better to commit enough resources to make a positive difference in a few communities than to risk spreading resources too thinly to make an impact anywhere.

Several meetings were held with local leaders in Linn County and Grays Harbor County to identify appropriate activities for this project to conduct in their communities. The project had originally planned to help communities develop a local consensus on general goals and priority setting for community develop-

ment. However, an early project finding was that many communities had already completed these types of goal setting exercises with assistance from the state or private utilities; they were ready to move on to more specific types of planning activities.


Project staff told the local leaders that the project wanted to be flexible and respond to their needs. The only criterion which had to be met was that the project have a reasonable chance of having a positive impact on the local economy and building of long-term capability for economic diversification. Among the ideas discussed were promoting secondary wood products, agriforestry, recreation, tourism, retirement living, job re-training for timber workers, and expansion of the industrial land base through developing a strategy to deal with wetlands regulations.

C. Linn County Project

In Linn County a group comprised of representatives from the County Commission, Council of Governments, cities of Sweet Home and Lebanon, and the U.S. Forest Service decided that the most useful strategy was to develop a Recreation Plan for the County. Earlier planning efforts in the area had provided a strong foundation for promoting recreation. These included:

- Two of the eight items on the Action Agenda for the Linn County Strategic Assessment Task Force called for creation of "a destination tourism complex at Foster Lake/Greenpeter Lake" and "the state to add Highway 34 Improvements and a four-lane highway between Foster Lake and I-5 to the Oregon Department of Transportation sixyear plan."
- Strategy II of the Sweet Home economic development strategy called for increasing "recreation opportunities", including developing a marina, supporting activities of the Cascades Forest Resource Center, and developing a recreational vehicle park in the Sweet Home area.



 The Lebanon Action Plan contained elements which indirectly relate to the recreation theme; for example, one of four priority goals calls for Highway 34 improvements, which would improve access to recreational opportunities in the area.

After targetting recreation, the local leaders in Linn County determined the existing Linn County Tourism Coalition (LCTC) would be the appropriate body to oversee project work. Many of the leaders served on the LCTC. Project staff made a presentation to the LCTC, which accepted the request. The development of the Recreation Plan, which is set forth in the next section of this report, was overseen by the LCTC.





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LINN COUNTY AREA TOURISM RECREATION PLANNING PROJECT

I. INTRODUCTION

The following information is provided by McKeever/Morris, Inc. (M/M) on behalf of the Linn County (Oregon) Tourism Coalition (LCTC). Over the past nine months M/M has been working with the LCTC under a grant from the Northwest Area Foundation and The Wilderness Society to develop methods to diversify the local economy.

The LCTC was selected by the Timber Towns regional task force to serve as the community assistance project's steering committee. The LCTC, which comprises a broad based representation from private industry, the public, and local, state and federal agencies, is an organization dedicated to the goal of:

"Enhancing Linn County's economy and quality of life by promoting year-round regional tourism and recreation and enhancing facilities, events and attractions through a cooperative approach."

In order to promote tourism and related economic development in Linn County, the LCTC was formed and began meeting in late 1989. The Coalition membership includes the following organizations:

- Linn County;
- · City of Albany;
- · City of Brownsville;
- City of Harrisburg;
- City of Lebanon;
- · City of Scio:
- · City of Sweet Home;
- · Brownsville Chamber of Commerc;
- · Lebanon Area Chamber of Commerce;

This fundamental goal of the LCTC has served as the benchmark of this community assistance project. M/M has worked with the LCTC to conduct a planning process which comprised a comprehensive research effort to:

- Develop a thorough understanding of the resources for regional tourism based on three specific areas of interest: recreation, history and events:
- Conduct an analysis of the opportunities and constraints for developing a tourism strategy around the recreation and history theme; and
- Prepare a strategic plan for refinement and implementation.

The remainder of this report describes the details and results of that planning process.

2 COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT PROGRAM FOR TIMBER DEPENDENT COMMUNITIES

II. PLANNING PROCESS

In early 1991, the LCTC initiated the first elements of the planning process consisting of research, inventory and analysis. Following the results of these efforts, the LCTC adopted a recreation/history theme as the foundation for the regional tourism strategy. The LCTC reviewed and evaluated substantial documentation on the prospects for and merits of this approach to tourism including looking at the potential for increased economic benefits to local communities and identifying the primary contributing groups to this economic growth strategy. The results of two research papers prepared for this effort are found in the appendix. They conclude that tourism, as a regional strategy, has its benefits and limitations and should not be seen as the singular panacea to create economic stability for the region. However, there is strong consensus that a cohesive regional economic strategy must include a major tourism component which focuses on the combined value of a rich base of local resources and responds to the interests and needs of those who predominantly pursue tourism through recreation and history - the active outdoor enthusiasts and the retired and/or seniors in our society.

To ensure a balanced solution for any tourism strategy, the LCTC adopted eight principles to direct their decision-making process. The project principles included the following:

PROJECT PRINCIPLES

Primary user activities to be pursued by the Linn County Tourism Plan shall include outdoor recreation, special events, and significant historical resource interpretation. The strategy to promote and enhance these resources shall include:

 A program to encourage year-round recreation activities that focus on the needs and unique seasonal nature of different user groups;

- 2) The optimum use of existing recreational facilities and resources:
- 3) Emphasis on outdoor recreational activities;
- 4) Historical tours and special events throughout the year with particular emphasis to maintain or expand these activities during the off season:
- Partnerships which complement and are coordinated with plans and objectives of other relevant public and private agencies and organizations in the County, State, and region;
- 6) The development of facilities and activities which are managed to maximize the response (in order of priority) to local, regional, national and international needs. Special consideration shall be given toward development of visitor information services (eg., visitor centers), education, facility, and attraction needs of unique local significance;
- 7) The retention of existing revenue generating recreational activities and the establishment of similar activities. Revenue generating activities include uses which will create local jobs and produce income through user fees and/or through indirect expenditures such as lodging and retail purchases; and
- 8) The identification of a management structure to direct the long-term coordination and implementation of the project.

III. RECREATION AND HISTORIC RESOURCES INVENTORY

It was important at the beginning of the project to define a clear study area boundary in order to manage the collection of background data and information. The LCTC decided on the Linn County boundary for this purpose. The research and inventory effort was intended to focus the direction of the project by identifying and locating unique resources of regional significance.

As an initial special project, the LCTC directed WM to refine the results of the resource inventory into a comprehensive database of resources along with accompanying graphic illustrations. This product would then be available to assist the LCTC and other participants in future planning, communication, marketing and promotional efforts.

The final Resource Inventory, which is included here, itemizes the type of resource along with a description and its location in the county. The information is assembled into three basic categories of tourist-related resources.

- 1) Outdoor recreation (both summer and winter)
 - · Parks and open space;
 - · Trails (winter and summer); and
 - · Waterways.
- 2) Historic (sites, structures and districts)
 - Covered bridges;
 - · Historic buildings, sites and districts; and
 - Museums.
- 3) Events (county fair, celebrations, etc.).

The Resource Inventory also lists the user groups who would most commonly visit the County for available activities. Examples of activities include hiking,

skiing, sailing, pleasure boating, scenic drives, and visitation to historical sites.

User groups were cross-referenced with the identified resources to determine which facilities/events would be of interest to different groups. The Resource Inventory database and corresponding maps, which illustrate the distribution of resources, are contained along with more specific explanations on the following pages of this report.



The Resource Inventory for the Linn County Tourism Recreation Plan is intended to provide a comprehensive list of the recreation resources available in the County. To be of maximum utility for on-going planning purposes, the inventory should be revised periodically so that the County and other agencies and organizations have a clear picture of the number, range and location of recreational opportunities that are available.

EXPLANATION OF THE INVENTORY MATRIX

General Resource Type and Number

Recreation resources are grouped into three categories - Outdoor recreation (R), Historic significance (H), and Events (E). The first column of the matrix indicates the type of resource. The next column assigns a number for the resource. These numbers (eg., R1, H23, or E3) can be used to find the location of the resource on the inventory map.

Resource Description

The next two columns of the matrix (Name and Description) indicate the name of the resource and a general description including size, significance, or time of year in the case of events. Campground and park facilities include a listing of the facilities that are available.

Location

The next three columns for Township (T), Range (R), and Section (SEC), identify the specific location of the resource.

User Groups

Anticipated user groups were identified by the LCTC and are shown at the top of the remaining columns. The user groups are: mountain bicyclists (trail use), hiking, snowmobiling, snow skiing (cross-country and alpine), information and education (eg., for tourists interested in learning about local history), fishing, swimming, kayaking and rafting, drift boating, sailboating and sailboarding, pleasure boating (motorized craft), water skiing, hunting, scenic loop (pleasure drive or bicycle touring), off highway vehicle use, recreational vehicles, camping (tent), day use (picnicing), organized sports (baseball, soccer), equestrian use, and fair attendees (special events such as the County Fair). These columns show which resources are expected to attract these different user groups.


IV. RESOURCE ANALYSIS AND STRATEGIC PLAN

THE ANALYSIS

After reviewing the relationships between the inventory of existing user groups and resources, M/M prepared a graphic illustration of Linn County depicting the development Opportunities and Constraints analysis of physical features, resource areas, tendencies and trends. The results of the analysis were used by the LCTC to organize and clarify the basic elements of the Recreation and History Theme as it related to the local community structure. The analysis map is provided on the following page and illustrates several significant components, including:

- The identification of three distinct land mass zones in the county, each of which influences varying opportunities and constraints relating to the recreation and history theme. They include:
 - The western valley:
 - · The central foothills; and
 - · The eastern high mountains.
- 2. The definition of the two basic resource areas with some differential overlap.
 - Significant Cultural history resources (buildings, sites, and districts) located predominantly in the private lands of the western valley zone with overlap into the central foothills zone for a number of isolated cultural and natural history resources; and
 - Outdoor recreation resources located predominantly in the public lands of the central foothills and eastern high mountain zones with some overlap for community-based recreation (sports fields, parks, recreational facilities) into local communities of the western valley zone.

- 3) The prioritization of several community nodes and resources landmarks:
 - Albany-the County's northern gateway, urban center and primary cultural history destination;
 - Brownsville, Scio and Lebanon key destinations and activity staging locations for the Pioneer Tour Loop of historic agricultural towns;
 - Sweet Home and Mill City-gateways, hubs and staging areas for the "Three Rivers" outdoor recreation trail area of the eastern high mountains;
 - The three reservoirs & Cascade mountain primary destintions and base resources of the eastern county outdoor recreation; and
 - The Santiam and Willamette rivers primary waterway areas.
- 4) The alignment of critical touring routes for travel through and to key historic and recreation resource activity areas:
 - The covered bridge loops;
 - · The historic pioneer towns;
 - The natural wilderness and scenic areas; and
 - The rivers, reservoirs, creeks and high mountain lakes.

THE PLAN

Based on the adoption of the Project Goasl and Principles and the consideration of findings in the Resource Inventory and Analysis, the LCTC worked systematically to prepare a consensus Strategic Plan for promoting, enhancing and expanding tourism in Linn County.

They focused their plan on the substantial base of existing natural and cultural resource opportunities for outdoor recreation and historical interpretation with current and future planned activities and events to serve as a catalyst for promotion and marketing of this unique network of resources to visitors.

The fundamental features of the Strategic Plan:

- Identify natural existing corridors that link commonly shared recreation and historic activities or themes;
- Provide a sound technical basis for promoting recreation and historic opportunities in different zones of the County;
- Identify key entry points and gateways to be developed for informing and directing tourists into the County; and
- Provide a means for creating a plan that involves a coordinated effort by all relevant agencies and organizations with a vested interest or concern in the County.

The Strategic Plan is conceptually separates the county into two regions based on the influence of the valley and the high mountain zones. The western valley zone pursues combined promotion and expansion of local historical sites, structures, and districts as its central theme with priority development of three components:

· A "covered bridge" touring loop in the north with historic Scio at its

center;

- A "Pioneer" touring loop of the historical communities to the east, west and south with Albany as the northern gateway and Brownsville as the southern gateway; and
- Albany as the northern County gateway HUB Historical Center (the greatest diversity of resources) and the site of a future Tourism Resource Information Center.

The eastern high mountain zone pursues a balance of conservation, enhancement and expansion of recreation in natural areas, open space and waterways on the public lands. The central foothills provide a limited support role for offseason recreational activity and accommodations. Priority development of several components in the High Mountain zone, include:

- Sweet Home as the western gateway HUB to the "Three Rivers Recreation Area" with the future Cascade Forest Resource Center (history to future of Logging, Mining, etc. in the northwest) providing a destination attraction and staging location for interpretation of natural history of the region and access to the key recreation sites;
- A comprehensive system of road and trail linkages offering varied experience, improvement and connection to all significant recreation sites and areas;
- A diversity and balance of day-use and overnight accommodations offering a wide range of experiences (primitive, semi-primitive and urban); and
- Foster, Greenpeter and Detroit reservoirs and the Mt. Jefferson Wilderness/Santiam Pass as the key destinations for regional recreational pursuits with Mill City as the Northwestern gateway.

The Strategic Plan includes several projects which will have direct impact and economic benefit to the local communities of Linn County.

The Strategic Plan organizes recreation and historic resources of regional significance into three levels of priority based on a system of two functional elements: "destinations" and "linkages."

Destinations are defined as places tourists will seek out in order to visit/view/experience either natural or cultural resources and/or partake in events. They include:

- Sites:
- · District/Areas: and
- Staging locations.

Linkages are defined as routes used for traveling to, through and between key destinations. They include:

- · Roads (auto/bike travel routes);
- · Semi-primitive roaded (truck/bike/hike); and
- · Primitive (bike/hike).

Both functional elements are integral to the success of the plan, serve different basic needs of the tourist/recreationist and provide continuity between isolated resources within the history or recreation system. The two following matrices illustrate a framework of the layered priority for each of the major plan resources as they relate to the functional destination and linkage elements.

The three levels of priority across the top row of each matrix compare the relative value of each resource. This organization will assist the LCTC in identifying appropriate phasing of future implementation of projects and programs.





V. IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGY

Phase I of the planning process is complete. Efforts to secure funding for the development of the detailed Master Plan and Implementation program have been conducted and are continuing to be sought.

Substantial local progress has been achieved through the first phase efforts of this project. However, the real work must now begin to reach full and complete implementation so that the cooperation that has been fostered and the progress that has been reached through this initial planning process is not lost or diminished.

The next phase of work will culminate in an array of specific implementation projects which expand, develop and redevelop recreation and historic sites and areas of Linn County. Historic resources will be complemented by new development. Recreation resources will be protected and enhanced to strengthen the quality of life in the region. New businesses will be realized which focus on the unique character of each local community, while emphasizing the combined richness of the two distinct areas of Linn County.

The success of the LCTC Tourism Recreation Plan will be predicated on the acknowledgement and acceptance of the wealth of unique natural and cultural resources which now exist.

The LCTC has guided the preparation of the Tourism Recreation Plan through an open and broad-based public participation process to establish clear principles for decision making. They have reached consensus on a technically sound tourism objective and strategy. They endorse a strong overall regional strategy for the county which provides diversity and sustainability into the future and they believe that recreation and tourism must play major roles in that strategy.

Small rural communities must work together to reach cohesive and unified regional consensus in order to competitively pursue assistance and funding for economic development. Without regional agreement and support, these communities have been and will continue to be left behind in the funding equation.

The Linn County Tourism Recreation Plan, while promoting tourist and recreation at its crux, goes beyond looking outward for enhancement of economies; it promotes quality sustainable local communities.

Following the preparation of the Strategic Plan, the LCTC now plans to develop a detailed implementation strategy to ensure successful execution of the plan. The basic elements of the implementation program should include:

- 1) Clearly identified projects and roles of LCTC members in their implementation.
- Design and preparation of cost estimates for the Phase I projects to assist in refining project priorities and identifying appropriate funding sources.
- A phasing review strategy and plan to ensure continued long-term coordination and communication between LCTC members and to ensure the logical timing for implementation of projects.
- 4) Acquisiton of funding for Phase I projects and a program for their successful completion in a timely and effective manner.

Ongoing and continued expansion of the current political and financial base of local, state and federal agency and foundation support stands as the highest of all priorities.

Problem Opportunity Statement:

One of Oregon's most economically distressed areas, Linn County is on the cusp of tremendous economic reconstruction. External factors have forced the communities in Linn County to move away from timber dependency to more diversified economies. Rural communities across the county have re-designed their economic strategies to include tourism development as a foundation stone of stable, revitalized economies.

To maximize the potential return from a tourism industry and to consider long range needs and impacts from increasing the numbers of visitors, communities in Linn County have pursued a cooperative approach. The Linn County Tourism Coalition was formed as a parent organization for the coordination of tourism planning and product development. The Coalition has completed Phase 1 of the Linn County Recreation Master Plan (LCRMP) and is just now undertaking the second phase. Phase 2 consists of developing a list of public tourism projects to implement in each community, prioritizing the list, and implementing the highest priority projects. Funds are requested here for implementating high-priority tourism projects in Linn County communities.

Linn County is one of the most heavily timber-dependent counties in Oregon. About 15 percent of the workforce is employed in the timber industry, compared to 6 percent for the state as a whole. Between 1980 and 1988, timber employment in the county declined by 8 percent, while the county's total work force grew by 4 percent. Between 1980 and 1990, a total of 1015 jobs were lost in the timber products industry. The impact of job losses in the timber industry has fallen hardest on communities farthest from the I-5 corridor, such as Sweet Home and Mill City. The timber industry in these communities has relied on the Willamette National Forest to supply raw materials (From Dreams to Realities: Diversifying Rural Economies in the Pacific Northwest. The Wilderness Society, October 1992).

Timber receipts to Linn County from timber sales, comprising about 80% of total timber dollars, have shown a marked decline in recent years. Since 1989 receipts to the county have decreased from nearly \$11.5 million to \$9.4 million. Returns from 0&C lands have followed similar trends. Local county officials are projecting that, "The public timber supply will virtually run out in the next 12 months" resulting in a "serious effect on the county's ability to provide our communities with critical services". Essentially, all of Linn County's communities are timber-dependent.

Because of the county's clear dependency on the timber industry, four communities were included in OEDD's Community Initiatives Program: Harrisburg, Lebanon, Sweet Home, and Mill City. Following the initial SWOT analyses in 1989, all four communities developed Community Response Teams and strategic plans which included tourism development and promotion as important goals.

All of Linn County's rural communities have recognized that the key to stable, vital local economies lies in a diversified economic base. Tourism product development and promotion are primary strategies in county-wide rural diversification efforts.

Long-term Consequences of No Action

Tourism product development is a high priority strategy in Linn County's rural communities, however, there is a distinct need to prime the financial pump. Due to Ballot Measure 5 and reduced budgets in Linn County's small rural communities, our local governments are strapped for funds. Scarce existing funds are allocated to infrastructure, human services, and law enforcement rather than to developing tourism industries. Local Chambers of Commerce and economic development groups do not have budgets large enough to dedicate to tourism projects. OEDD Rural Diversification funds will provide necessary seed money for matching additional external funds.

Funds are requested here to provide "seed" money to Linn County's communities for product development. "Seed" funds will be distributed proportionally to the nine participating communities based on anticipated cost of the selected project and economic need of the community.

County-wide Cooperative Approach to Tourism

In order to deal with a growing need for a county-wide comprehensive, cooperative approach to tourism/recreation, the Linn County Tourism Coalition (LCTC) was formed in 1989. The LCTC is a public, non-profit organization composed of community tourism advocates, non-profit economic development organizations, and local, state, and federal agencies and government leaders. The Coalition's mission is to enhance Linn County's economy and quality of life by developing and promoting year-round regional tourism and recreation.

In 1991, the Coalition began the first phase of a county-wide tourism plan...the Linn County Recreation Master Plan (LCRMP). Professional staff, McKeever/Morris, Inc. of Portland, was hired with funds available from the Northwest Area Foundation to guide and facilitate the planning process. Phase 1 of the LCRMP included inventorying all heritage tourism sites, outdoor recreation opportunities, and community events. The database listed over 300+ recreation/tourism opportunities or sites in Linn County as well as identifying user groups.

Phase 1 also included mapping the distribution patterns of rec/tourism sites across the county and developing a preliminary strategy for enhancement and promotion based on the data. In early 1993, the Tourism Coalition will embark on Phase 2 of the LCRMP. Funding for this phase has again been provided by the Northwest Area Foundation with professional guidance supplied by McKeever/Morris, Inc. During the Phase 2 process, each Linn County community will generate a list of tourism projects, prioritize the projects, and implement/construct the highest priority project.

Funding through the Rural Economic Diversification Program of high priority tourism products in Linn County will allow our rural communities to stabilize and diversify economies, create new jobs, and secure new wealth.

Project Overview

V.

Through the Recreation Master Plan Phase 2 process, each of Linn County's communities will pull together a list of preferred tourism products to be implemented in 1993. In order to determine the priority of each project, our communities must measure product worth. Funds are requested here for a Trends and Gaps Analysis which will provide decision-making tools for this important step.

A Trends Analysis will identify crucial economic, social, and demographic trends that will effect the near and long term visitor industry in western Oregon. What effect will aging populations have on the types of recreation/sightseeing activities preferred in the future? From where will future visitors originate and how will origin influence recreational choices? A Trends Analysis will answer questions such as these and allow Linn County communities to prioritize tourism product development with accuracy and confidence.

A Gaps Analysis will identify the gaps in product distribution across Linn County, in visitors information and comfort services, in signage and promotional needs, in support services, and tourism product development. Based on identified gaps, communities will be able to prioritize projects based on the most logical fit.

By applying the data collected through the Trends and Gaps analysis, Linn communities will prioritize tourism projects, identifying the highest priority to be implemented. Funds are requested here to act as seed money for leveraging additional dollars for project implementation.

Project Goals

The primary goal of this county-wide tourism approach is to enhance economic diversification efforts of Linn County's small timber-dependent communities through the development of a year-round tourism industry.

Timeline

January 11, 1993

Phase 2 of the Linn County Recreation Master Plan process begins. Participant communities begin to develop a list of potential tourism products for implementation.

Upon award of OEDD grant funds, the LCTC will

Develop a RFP for the Trends and Gaps Analysis; generate a list of appropriate consultants; distribute RFP.

February 26, 1993

Consultant chosen to compile the Trends and Gaps Analysis.

April 1, 1993

Trends and Gaps Analysis completed. Linn County communities have compiled their lists of tourism products and begin to prioritize by applying data from the Analysis and other pertinent criteria.

April 30, 1993

LCTC staff begins to package prioritized tourism projects, including providing preliminary cost estimates for priority projects in each community for land acquisition, design and engineering, permitting and construction; identifying additional funding sources; determining implementation schedule.

July 1, 1993

Packaging of prioritized tourism projects completed. Additional funding pursued with OEDD "seed" money used as match or direct grants to Linn County communities.

August 31, 1993

Funding for prioritized tourism projects identified. Initiation of tourism projects begins.

Evaluation Process

Nine communities in timber-dependent Linn County will identify and initiate construction of their highest priority tourism projects. Projects will be consonant with the goals of the Linn County Recreation Master Plan, local strategic plans, and will enhance community diversification programs.
