AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 1 OF ORDINANCE NO. 545,
PASSED BY THE COUNCIL AND APPROVED BY THE MAYOR ON THE
20TH DAY OF MAY, 1941.

The people of the City of Lebanon do ordain as
follows:

SECTION 1. That Section 1 of Ordinance No. 545,
passed by the Council and approved by the Mayor on the
20th day of May, 1941, be amended to provide as follows:

SECTION 1. The following shall be and are
hereby declared to be the fire limits of and for
the City of Lebanon, Linn County, Oregon, to-wit:

Beginning at the intersection of Grove
and Isabella Streets in said city;
running thence West on Isabella Street
to Second Street; thence South on
Second Street to Rose Street; thence
West on Rose Street to Third Street;
thence South on Third Street to Oak
Street; thence East on Oak Street to
Second Street; thence South on Second
Street to A Street; thence East on A
Street to a point 150 feet West of Main
Street; thence South parallel with and
at a distance of 150 feet West of Main
Street to Milton Street; thence East on
Milton Street to a point 150 feet East
of Main Street; thence North parallel
with and at a distance of 150 feet from
Main Street to the center of the Lebanon
and Santiam Canal; thence down the center
of the Lebanon and Santiam Canal to Grove
Street; thence North on Grove Street to
Isabella Street.

SECTION 2. Inasmuch as there will be construction
of buildings in accordance herewith which would create
a great and continuing danger to persons and property
within said City, and particularly within the congested
portion thereof which should be restricted, this ordinance
is necessary for the preservation of the public peace,
health and safety of said city and an emergency is hereby
declared to exist, and this ordinance shall be in full
force and effect from and after its passage by the council
and approval by the mayor of said city.

Passed by the Council and approved by the Mayor this
6th day of November, 1945.
