ORDINANCE NO. 800

A BILL FOR AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING THE OFFICE OF RECORDER, TREASURER, CITY ATTORNEY, STREET SUPERINTENDENT AND MARSHAL, AND PROVIDING THE MANNER OF APPOINTMENT, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY:

The People of the City of Lebanon Do Ordain as follows:

Section I. That there is hereby created and established, in addition to the officesprovided for by Section 33 of the Charter of the City of Lebanon as amended on the 19th day of April, 1950, the offices of Recorder, Treasurer, ^City Attorney, Street Superintendent, and Marshal, the Marshal to be known as the Chief of Police. It shall be hawful for the city Council to appoint one person only to perform the duties of the offices of City Recorder and Treasumer, and such appointment shall have the affect of filling both of said offices, and the officer so appointed shall be known as the recorder-treasurer of the City of Lebanon. Provided, however, that the City Council may by Resolution at any time, notwithstanding a prior appointment of one officer to perform the duties of the recorder and treasurer, appoint a city treasurer, and the former recorder-treasurer shall thereafter perform only the duties of and be known as the ^City Recorder.

Section II. The officers selected to fill the offices created by this ordinance shall be appointed by the ^Council, such appointments to be for a period of not Mess than one year and to be made by Resolution. The term of office of each officer so appointed by the Council shall commence on the day set forth in the Resolution making such appointment, and shall terminate upon the date set in the Resolution of appointment or upon the date of the removal by the council, resignation or death of such officer.

Section III. The officers appointed to fill the offices created by this ordinance shall hold their office at the will of the Council and shall be subject to removal for cause at any time. The City Council shall have the authority to employ a person to perform any of the duties of the offices created by this ordinance and to postpone the appointment of such person to such office for such probationary period as the Council deems advisable in order to determine the qualifications of such person for such position. Provided, however, that no offices created by this ordinance shall remain **fac**ant for a period of longer than ninety days.

Section IV. No one is eligible for any office created by this ordinance who at the time of his or her appointment is not entitled to the privileges of an elector according to the laws of the State of Oregon and who has not been a resident within the City of Lebanon for. three months next preceeding his or her appointment. If at any time during the incumbancy of any person appointed to fill an office created by this ordinance he or she shall move out of the city and no longer maintain his or her home therein such persons term of office at may at the will of the Council forthwith , or/any time after such officer has moved out of the city be terminated.

Section V. Each and every person appointed by the Council pursuant to this ordinance shall within ten days after such appointment file an oath of office and give such official bond or undertaking as may be required by the Mayor or he or she shall be deemed to have declined the office, and thereafter such office shall be considered vacant.

Section VI. The provisions of Section 39, 40, 41 42 and 135 of the City Charter of the City of Lebanon so far as the same relate to appointive officers created by this ordinance are by reference made a part hereof as fully as if the same were set out in full herein.

Section VII. Because the offices provided for in this ordinance were abolished by Charter amendment this ordinance is required for the peace, health and safety of the City of Lebanon, therefore an emergency is hereby declared and said ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage by the Council and approval by the Mayor.
