

## Council Chamber, Lebanon Pa.

August 18, 1896

Present Hon. Chas E. Peugh Mayor and Councilmen Baker, Umphrey, Smith, Beaumont and Wallace. Absent Councilman Dalgrish.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The Marshal then reported that all parties notified to clean up their premises had complied with the request. Also that there is still two cases of diphtheria under quarantine.

Report of the Marshal was followed by a lengthy discussion of the diphtheria plague.

The Health committee was instructed to investigate the sanitary condition of the Academy building and to have the same thoroughly fumigated before school opens this fall.

Motion carried that when we adjourn that we adjourn to meet tomorrow evening at 8 o'clock and that the Health committee give a special invitation to all the Doctors of the town to meet with the council.

Motion carried that the rules be suspended the following bills be allowed and warrants, ordered drawn on the treasurer for the several amounts

The Mayor then stated that this is an adjourned meeting and the object of the meeting.

Drs. Lamberson and Booth were present. Chairman Baker of the Health Committee reported that Dr. Foley had been invited to be present.

Dr. Booth asked that the minutes of the last meeting be read.

The minutes were then read and approved without objection.

After the reading of the minutes the doctors present each made short addresses in which they set forth their ideas regarding the nature of diphtheria and the necessary amount of precaution required to stamp out the disease.

In order that the doctors might more thoroughly understand the City laws governing contagious diseases the Recorder read parts of the Health Ordinance.

The doctors present expressed themselves to the effect that the law was strict enough to wipe out the disease, if properly enforced.

The doctors present agreed to hereafter superintend all fumigations of all
