Captain Travis Gullberg, Multnomah County Sheriff's Office (MCSO), introduced himself, Chief Deputy Nicole Morrisey O'Donnell and Sheriff Reese and showed the Council a PowerPoint presentation about MCSO updates and their semi-annual report (attached as Exhibit A to these minutes).

Deputy Doug Asboe, Multnomah County Sheriff's Office, continued the PowerPoint presentation on the School Resource Officer and HOPE Team statistics.

Captain Gullberg introduced the new Troutdale Community Resource Deputy, Nick Bohrer, and explained his history and duties with MCSO.

Deputy Nick Bohrer went over some projects and goals he's currently working on within the City of Troutdale and working with Troutdale's Code Enforcement Officer, Joe Storagee.

6. INTRODUCTION: Introduction of potential changes to Troutdale Municipal Code Title 10 – Vehicle and Traffic

Chris Damgen, Community Development Director, gave a brief overview of the staff report and showed Council a PowerPoint presentation on potential changes to TMC Title 10 – Vehicle and Traffic (attached as Exhibit B to these minutes).

Councilor Kranz suggested the City possibly draft up some type of overnight parking lease for residence about a business.

Ed Trompke, City Attorney, stated streets are dedicated rights-of-way for the public. He doesn't know that it's allowed but he doesn't know that it's disallowed either.

Councilor Moon stated he is opposed to designated parking due to the lack of parking in Troutdale as it is.

Councilor White stated he thinks people are dropping off a car and then going up the Gorge on their bikes and leaving their car all day.

7. DISCUSSION: East County Flagship Library bond proposal

Lori Stegmann, Multnomah County Commissioner, introduced herself and Vailey Oehlke, Director of Libraries for Multnomah County, Rebecca Stavenjord, Chief of Staff and Alene Davis, Library Facilities Manager and explained that the 6100 sq. ft. Troutdale Library location is leased space. The current lease is through March 31st of 2025 with two 3-year extensions. The requirements for a flagship library location are, one, adequate acreage to support 95,000 sq. ft. Two, critical, it must be central to the population based in the east zone as shown in the framework library document. Lastly, there must be access to frequent public transportation like MAX and bus service.

Vailey Oehlke reviewed the PowerPoint presentation (attached as Exhibit C to these minutes).

Mayor Ryan stated he likes where the Troutdale library is right now. He stated when he saw the bond coming up, he was negative, but the presentation showed him things that the library doesn't offer but could.

Councilor Kranz stated the Fairview library is packed for story times and she's hoping things go well for this bond. Meeting spaces are in such high demand that people get turned away regularly.

Councilor Lauer stated when he saw the bond, he was negative about it, but he was only thinking books. The other services the library could offer are huge and lacking in the Troutdale area.

Vailey Oehlke expressed one of the biggest challenges is to change the way people think about what libraries could offer that is normal in other states.

Mayor Ryan stated the citizens are getting tax and bond fatigue and it all adds up. He doesn't want the fatigue to take away from the library.

Councilor White asked if a location has been picked out yet.

Vailey Oehlke replied not yet but Gresham has been looked at.

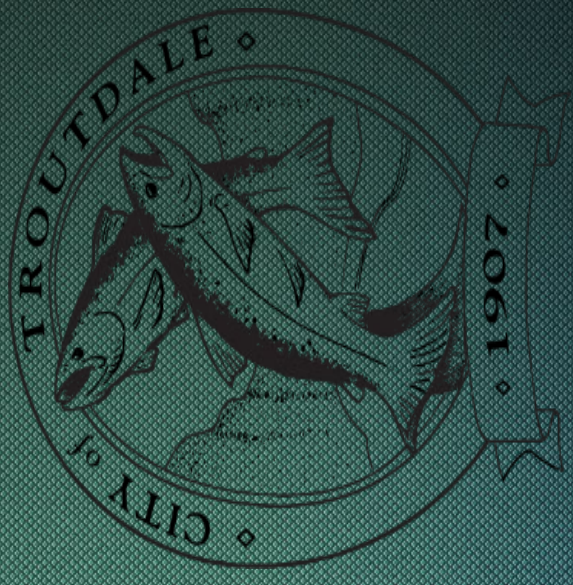

Potential Amendments to Title 10 (Vehicles & Traffic)

Troutdale City Council

March 10, 2020

Why changes are being considered

- Citizen feedback and concerns on recent Title 10 changes
- Code officer interpretation and citation concerns
- Eventual comprehensive update to Title 8
- Economic and downtown development interests

Calendar for considering changes

- May 12: first reading
- May 26: second reading and approval

Summary of Proposed Changes

1. Eliminating multiple discrepancies between Title 10 and Title 8, which deals with nuisances
2. Revisiting time limits for vehicle parking in the right-of-way (RVs)
3. Considering changes to overnight parking restrictions
4. Restricting commercial vehicle parking on streets in non-residential areas of the city

1. Discrepancies between Title 8 and Title 10

- Title 8 – Nuisances section (primarily private property)
- Title 10 – Vehicles and traffic (primarily rights-of-way)
- Over time, both titles have crossed the (property) line
- Examples:
 - Abandoned Vehicle definition and abatement procedure
 - Parking duration in public rights-of-way
 - Parking allowances on public property
 - Impound & notification procedures
- Solution: consolidate auto-oriented issues into one title and provide cross references in other Title as needed

2. Revisiting time limits for ROW parking

- Recreational Vehicles
 - Currently limited to 4 hour limit
 - Consistent concerns from public on ability to maintain compliance
 - Concerns from code officer on how to monitor enforcement
- Other Vehicles
 - Conflicting code standards (72 hours in one title, 7 days in another)
- Solution
 - Consolidate standards for all types of vehicles (72 hours? 96 hours?)
 - Have permit procedure for lengthier stays if needed/warranted

3. Changes to overnight parking restrictions

- Currently do not allow for overnight parking on city-owned property
- Concerns:
 - Downtown residents who do not have a designated parking space on property have nowhere to park
 - Prospective businesses looking to have overnight guests (or parking for guests for outdoor excursions)
- Solution:
 - Allow overnight parking through a permit process
 - Designate certain spaces as overnight parking areas

4. Restricting commercial vehicle ROW parking

- Currently, restrictions on commercial vehicle parking in residential areas are in effect
- Consistent issues of commercial vehicles creating safety hazards on commercial and industrial streets
- Solutions: extend restrictions to all streets;
 - allow provision that a commercial vehicle can be parked temporarily provided the operator is in proximity
 - Does not affect loading/unloading issues
 - Consider expanded loading/unloading zone in downtown Troutdale

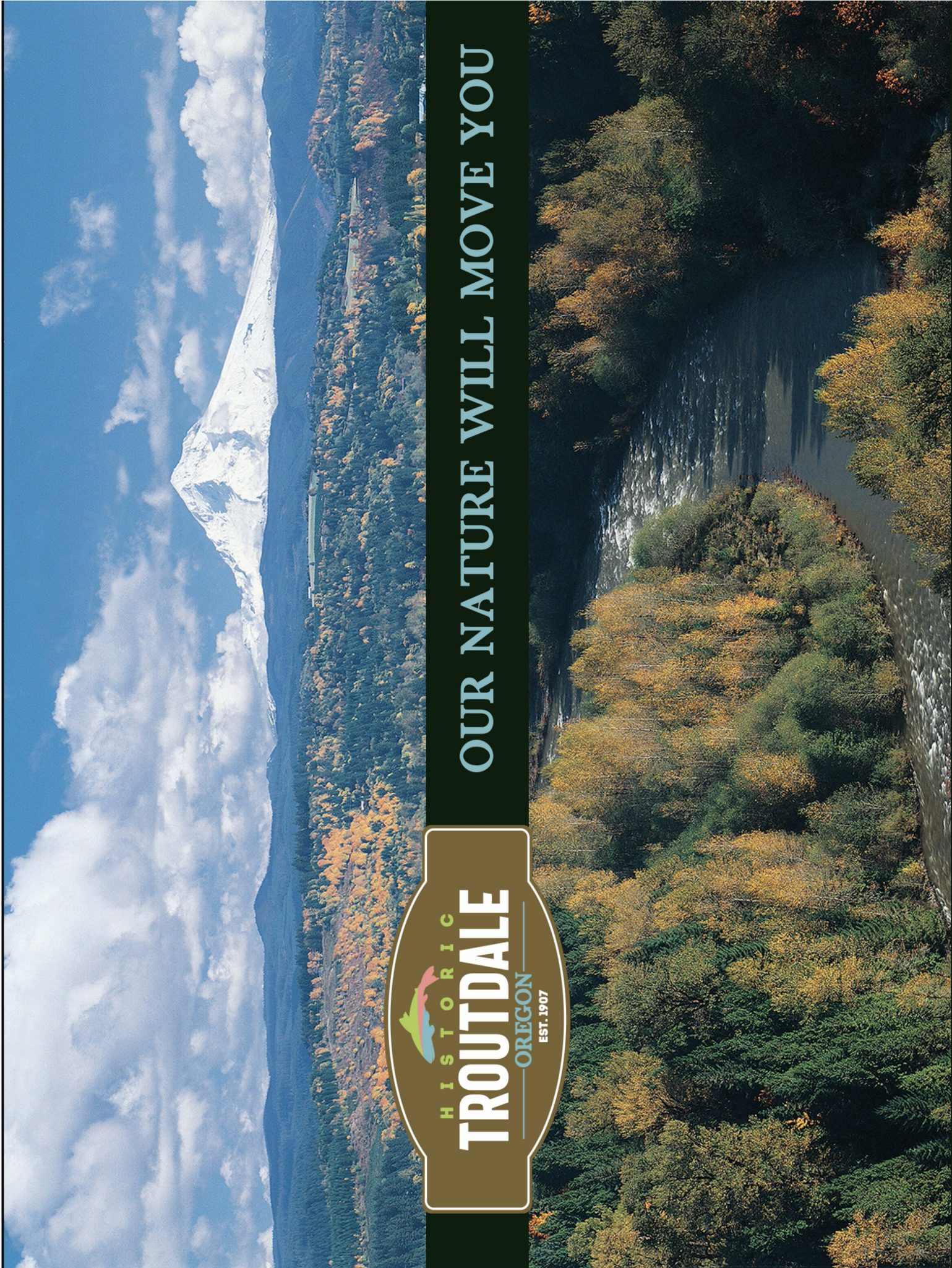
GROUNDED
