Mayor Ryan called the meeting to order at 7:00pm.

2. **PUBLIC COMMENT:** Public comment on non-agenda and consent agenda items is welcome at this time.

Erin Janssens, Historic Landmarks Commission Chair, shared the news the Historic Landmarks Commission is excited to put forth a resolution the Council will be voting on December 12th on the consent agenda for the City to officially apply to become a certified local government. (A handout was distributed, a copy can be found in the meeting packet). Many cities in Oregon are and have been certified local governments for a long time. It opens opportunities for the city to apply for and administer grants for citizens with historic properties and do improvements.

Chris Edwards, Troutdale resident, stated Troutdale Road is a very heavily trafficked street. Parents and people in the community have been talking about trying to get speed cameras put on Troutdale Road to reduce speeding during school drop offs and pickups. He gave the Council a handout with information on research he has done regarding speed cameras (a copy can be found in the meeting packet).

Rich Allen, Troutdale resident, stated he wants to continue with what he said at the last council meeting during public comment concerning the property at 234 Kendall Court. The County talked about expanding emergency services on the property, which is what he spoke to at the

last meeting and about the need for future increase in emergency services. He believes that when the decision was made for the police facility to become a regional policing facility, it would bring more emergency traffic up and down the cul-de-sac and mixed with kids, he's concerned with vehicles going up and down that street that there could be a child getting run over.

Tanney Staffenson, Troutdale resident, explained he serves on the Troutdale Town Center Committee and they've had a few discussions about the property. Primarily what is going on now is the committee is doing a state mandated housing needs analysis which is nearing completion. The committee is going through data and analyzing the needs. He would like to see them get through that process and get more information of what potentially could go on some sites and what wouldn't.

Councilor Hudson mentioned the idea behind the proposal is a possible solution and the best option that he's seen to fix the scenario when more than 2 people run for a seat and someone could win with 33% of the vote.

Councilor Ripma asked who is funding the effort.

Clay Shentrup replied in Oregon that hasn't been any single, large consolidated source of grants or foundations. Mark Frohnmayer, an entrepreneur in Eugene, has been a large contributor.

Councilor Ripma stated the Andrew and Edith slide of the PowerPoint worries him. If the voter had voted for Chris, Frank and Desi, and not for Andrew and Edith, that voter would not have participated in the runoff.

Clay Shentrup stated the point of the runoff is to give you an incentive to cast sincere scores. The definition of "vote for" is a little different here.

Councilor Hudson explained, for example, if a person preferred Chris, Desi and Frank as their top choices, but they still rated Andrew and Edith. They didn't really like Andrew or Edith, but they gave Andrew a 2 and Edith a 1. They're not their favorites but because none of their favorites made the cut, they still get a say.

Councilor Ripma stated it's very confusing and it needs more study.

Councilor Kranz asked if elected officials or members of the community are opting in for this.

Annie Kallen replied she is seeing it all levels. The majority of the Eugene Council is supportive. The Democratic Party of Oregon voted to use it for their elections.

Councilor Kranz asked if it's been brought to the League of Oregon Cities.

Annie Kallen replied no.

Councilor Moon stated a lot of voting now is polarized and turnout is poor. He asked if the STAR data has shown a better voter turnout.

Councilor White stated he tends to disagree with the slide with 3 candidates. He thinks something like that is going to happen based more on issues. In his opinion, the best overall candidate is going to win, especially in a small town.

Councilor Ripma stated he doesn't know if he wants Troutdale to be the leader of the charge on this until he knows more about it. Targeting the May ballot would be too soon. He thinks referring it to the Citizens Advisory Committee is an option while more information is gathered.

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Response to STAR voting presentation

The first thing to be aware of with STAR voting is that it only applies if there are three or more candidates for an individual Council Position. Based on that limitation, I checked my records to see what the incidence of multicandidate elections had been. Since 1978, when elect-by-position first went into effect, there have been only 7 elections out of 21 in which there were three or more candidates for any one Position, I will acknowledge that 4 of those 7 have occurred in the last 5 elections. I have no idea what would account for that except that in 3 of those 4 there was no incumbent running. On the other hand, there have been 13 elections in which there was anywhere from one to three candidates running unopposed for a Position, and a total of 25 unopposed candidates over those 13 elections. In my opinion, nothing undermines representative democracy more than uncontested elections. Troutdale has a more fundamental problem in that regard than simply refining how votes are tallied in multiple-candidate races. Applying it to the office of Mayor, there's only been one election in the last 40 years that had more than two candidates for Mayor, while there have been several elections in which the Mayor ran unopposed, especially when it was a two-year term.

STAR voting proponents talk about the "spoiler effect", of similar candidates diluting each other's votes, thereby allowing a less popular candidate to win. In that scenario, I doubt that votes would be so evenly divided into thirds in a 3-way race, for example, that one of the more popular candidates wouldn't prevail. If a dissimilar candidate were to win over two similar candidates that doesn't change the fact that some voters preferred one of the similar candidates over the other. There's also the other scenario of the less popular candidate "siphoning off" votes from one of the two more popular, tipping the scale, so to speak. I haven't seen any evidence of that in past multi-candidate elections. I also don't have any problem whatsoever with the winner having received less than a majority, whether that's 34% in a 3-way race, or 21% in a 5-way race. Councilor Hudson referred to the 2010 election when the winner in the 5-way race only had a plurality of 24%. In that same election, another of the Positions only had one candidate. Why didn't any of those five run for that Position?

Not to belabor the point, but I see that uncontested Position as a much larger problem than someone winning with less than a majority of the votes. Also, the losing candidate in the third Position 2-way race received nearly as many votes as the top two candidates in the 5-way race. One could argue that that candidate had more public support than the 5-way race winner.

Another concern I would have with STAR voting is that voters would simply find it too cumbersome, and just not bother. Under-voting, or returning blank ballots, is already approaching 25% in Council elections. I also feel that STAR voting's rating system would tend to dilute one's first choice preference by providing support for the voter's second and third choices. If voters were to be offered a system that better expresses their preferences across all the candidates, I believe Ranked Choice voting would be a more accurate and reliable method. However, I would strongly caution that as we have seen in recent elections an unintended consequence could be that new candidates in particular will flock to the Positions where there is no incumbent, or where there are already two candidates. This could be especially attractive since under these alternative voting methods it's possible for the candidate with the most first choice votes to still not win. However, some voters might find that hard to accept.

At least as far as Troutdale is concerned, I believe that STAR voting is a solution in search of a problem.
