Teen Fridays

Fun Facts about Leaks

Almost everyone has had a leaky toilet, sink or bathtub faucet. According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, if we add up all of the water leaking in homes right now it would fill a trillion one-gallon milk jugs per year. That's more than enough water to supply all of the people living in the entire state of Oregon for a whole year!

A leaking faucet that drips at a rate of one drip per second can use more than 3,000 gallons in a year; nearly the amount of water used by a two-person household in one month.

Toilet leaks are the most common leak found in homes and the easiest to fix. A leaky toilet can use up to 200 gallons per day; enough water for five loads of laundry.

Fixing Leaks

Worn washers are usually the cause of sink and bathtub faucet leaks. If someone in your household is handy, these parts are easy to replace and cost less than five dollars.

Most toilet leaks are caused because the "flapper" is worn. Sometimes the flush valve needs to be replaced. Toilet repair parts cost less than \$10 dollars. Replacing worn toilet parts takes only a few minutes and only one tool, an adjustable wrench.

Your local hardware store is a good place to find how-to fix-it guides for toilets, sinks and bathtub faucets.

New Opportunity Zone Program


In 2018, the U.S. Treasury made opportunity zone designations across the country to encourage long-term investments through a **federal** tax incentive. Governor Brown's nominations resulted in 86 qualified opportunity zones in Oregon.

"Opportunity Zones can deliver significant tax savings on medium- to longterm investments in economically disadvantaged communities. This new tax incentive pertains to both the capital gains invested initially through a qualified opportunity fund, as well as capital gains earned for the investor from businesses or projects in a zone." (Business Oregon)

Opportunity Zones follow census tracts and the designations are in effect until December 31, 2028.

The areas highlighted in blue in the below map denote the Opportunity Zones for The Dalles/ Wasco County.

We Love Our Trees

Trees in the city provide many benefits. According to the Oregon Department of Forestry, trees lower levels of noise and dust, reduce temperature, provide shade and increase property value. A healthy urban tree canopy provides measurable economic benefits and makes our city a beautiful place to live. But sometimes, trees near streets and sidewalks can grow into too much of a good thing and create a safety hazard.

Trees in The Dalles are cared for by citizens, not City staff, except in the Downtown Area. It is the

owner's or occupant's responsibility to reduce the hazard when a tree on their property or on the right-of-way next to their property blocks public walkways and streets.

Plan Proper Pruning for Safe Streets

your trees and shrubs. The City of The Dalles Municipal Code 11.20.020 regulating street trees requires all trees growing near a sidewalk street or alley to be trimmed so that the limbs and branches are not less than nine (9) feet above the sidewalk and not less than fourteen (14) feet above the street. These trim requirements allow safe passage for pedestrians on sidewalks as well as garbage trucks and school buses traveling on streets and alleys.

City of The Dalles Municipal Code 5.24.020 requires vegetation that impairs the view of a public street or impairs the view of any traffic control device to be controlled or removed. These trim The Arbor Day Foundation requirements allow vehicles to see oncoming traffic and obey traffic signs.

Safe Trimming Tips

According to the Occupational Safety and Health Administration the most common tree trimming accidents are electrocution, falling from a tree or being struck by trees or limbs.

Take control of your own safety. Learn all you can. Then purchase pruning and safety equipment before trimming trees or large shrubs.

If your trees or shrubs are growing into powerlines, do not attempt to prune or remove them yourself. Report the hazard tree to North Wasco County PUD. Fill out the tree trimming permit form available on their website. Trees can conduct electricity; so wait until the upper branches of the tree have been trimmed away from overhead power lines before pruning low branches.

When in doubt about trimming trees, hire a professional arborist.

Tour Boat Coordinator Report - by Bunny Henningsen

A lot happens behind the scenes, we thought you might like a glimpse



The cruise season for this year was a busy one! September 20th The Dalles had 4 riverboats here all at the same time! What a great sight to see in our river.

Each boat is greeted by The Dalles Tour Boat Coordinator and the Floozies. The passengers love that they are made to feel welcome and comment up and down the river at other stops about how friendly The Dalles is.

The Dalles saw over 14,000 passengers disembark between the City dock and the Port Marina. Passengers enjoyed our museums, hiking and biking trails, and wineries along with strolling downtown.

The American Empress has a hop-on-hop-off bus that goes from the Discovery Center to other museums here in town. After a year of marketing to another boat company that stops here, they too will be doing a hop-on-hop-off bus for both of their boats. This is a big plus for our local museums.

I continue to let the boat companies know about all great places they are missing with hopes they will add them to their schedules. The hop-on-hop-off busses make it easy for passengers to get to places they might not be able to walk to, like the Fort Dalles Museum. Typical age of their passengers is 60 to 90 years-old.

The Dalles is one of the boat's favorite places to dock as we offer many services to the boats as well. Most boats get fuel and other supplies here. The S. S. Legacy fills up with about \$20,000 worth of fuel when they are here and they are one of the smaller ships.

The Dalles offers personal services to the boats as well. Onboard chefs have needed a grocery trip almost every time they dock. The National Geographic Quest need 12 boxes of 5 dozen eggs this season. Amazingly enough the crew gets tired of meals on board and love a junk food trip as well.

Trips to the hardware store, pharmacy, and lots of trips for coffee are common. I don't think there has been a morning at the City Dock we didn't see crew members coming back with coffee and donuts.

It really becomes obvious after a year helping them here in town how much money goes into our community.

One boat this year had a large amount of excess unopened food on their last pass through and asked if there was anywhere that could use it. Thanks to a wonderful chain of ladies (Corliss Marsh, Klea Espy



and Janeal Booren) in the know, and my truck filled to capacity, food was delivered to the Saint Vincent De Paul kitchens. Donated were muffin mixes, various fruit juices, dry cereal, and yeast for baking, along with 25 lbs. of sugar and flour, plus so much more.
