2019-3611, Initiation of Comprehensive Plan text amendment for Water Management and Conservation Plan.

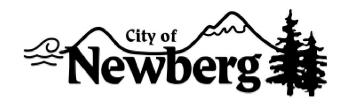
In other business.

RECOMMENDATION: The fund financial statements represent the City's ongoing commitment at all levels of the organization to monitor financial status and make adjustments on a monthly basis. These are provided for your information and review, as well as an opportunity for you to ask questions and keep abreast of the financial health of the City. As you review these statements, please feel free to contact me directly in advance of the meeting with questions or comments. This will provide me with an opportunity to come to the Council Work Sessions with sufficient information to answer your questions. No formal action is required at the meeting.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Included with this report are the fund financial statements for August 2019. As a reminder, most revenue is not recognized in an equal amount every month. Property taxes are received primarily in November, February, and May. Water revenue tends to trend higher in the summer months. Community Development revenue, such as building and planning fees as well as system development charges, is harder to predict. Transient Lodging Tax and Marijuana Tax is received quarterly. 9-1-1 Fund tax revenue is paid on a quarterly basis but delayed by up to three months after the close of the quarter, which at times puts the ending fund balance in a negative position, although the budget is managed so that the fund remains positive once the full fiscal year revenue is received. The point is that while 16% of the fiscal year has transpired through August, the year-to-date revenue received may reflect less or more depending on the revenue cycle.

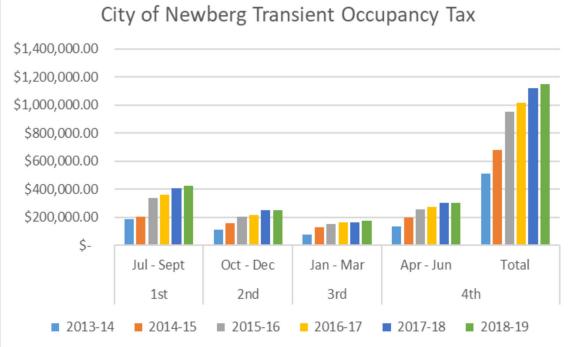

Adopt Resolution No. 2019-3605 authorizing the City Manager to enter into a professional services agreement (PSA) with HDR Engineering, Inc. (HDR) to complete the design of the City's Oxidation Ditch Rehabilitation Project. The project includes detailed structural evaluation, engineering design, bid and construction phase services for Oxidation Ditch No. 1 at the Wastewater Treatment Plant in the amount of \$197,840.00.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

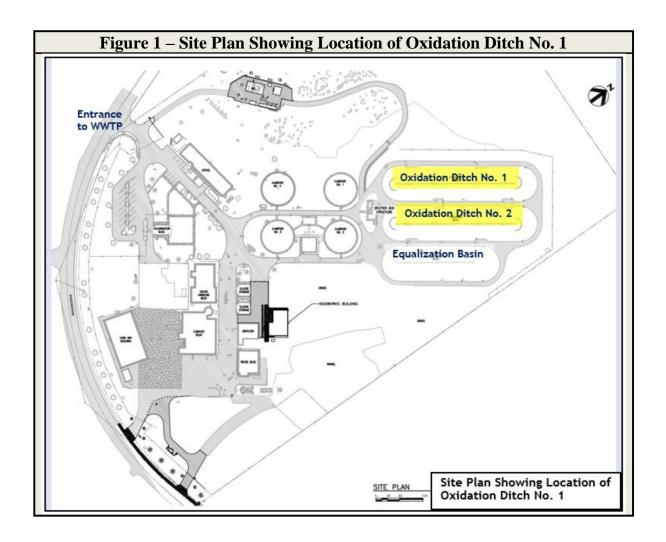
The City's Wastewater Treatment Plant has two oxidation ditches and one equalization basin, all constructed in 1985 (refer to Figure 1 on the next page). The oxidation ditches provide an essential role in aerobic digestion for year-round wastewater treatment.

The City's Oxidation Ditch No. 2 was rehabilitated in 2017 with a combination of replaced concrete panels and a sprayed layer of concrete known as shotcrete to treat the cracks that had developed at the inclined slabs of the oxidation ditch. HDR provided the engineering rehabilitation design for Oxidation Ditch No.2 in 2016.

Concrete settlement and severe concrete cracks are noted in Oxidation Ditch No. 1. Evaluation of Oxidation Ditch No. 1 was first performed on October 18, 2011. The evaluation reports indicated that "the ditch is in functional condition" but "it is important to repair and seal the cracked areas to address the deterioration" that is occurring over time. A similar or more advanced repair is anticipated for the rehabilitation of Oxidation Ditch No. 1. The objective of the project is to provide a detailed structural evaluation, rehabilitation plan, bidding, and the subsequent construction of the repairs for Oxidation Ditch No. 1.

On August 26, 2019, the City advertised the Request for Proposals (RFP) in the Daily Journal of Commerce and the City's website. City staff received one qualified proposal from HDR Engineering, Inc. (HDR) on September 12, 2019.

HDR submitted a detailed proposal with a scope of work and cost breakdown for the City's consideration (refer to Exhibit "A" that includes the proposed PSA). HDR's proposal addresses all aspects of rehabilitation for Oxidation Ditch No. 1. The consultant cost at \$197,840.00 is in line with the proposed scope of work for this oxidation ditch rehabilitation project.



FISCAL IMPACT:

HDR will complete detailed structural evaluation, and provide design and bid phase support for this project. HDR will also provide construction phase services to the City for a total consultant fee of \$197,840.00, which has been appropriated in the current fiscal year budget for design phase.

Remaining construction budget will be appropriated for fiscal year 2020/2021. The total project cost over two fiscal years is estimated to be just under \$900,000.00. The project anticipates construction in calendar year 2020. Funding will be through account number 04-5150-706310.

STRATEGIC ASSESSMENT:

The current wastewater treatment volumes do not warrant the design and construction for another new oxidation ditch. The rehabilitation of Oxidation Ditch No. 1 will extend its service life for another 20 years.



RESOLUTION NO. 2019-3605

RECITALS:

- 1. The City of Newberg Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) has two oxidation ditches, constructed in 1985, that provide an essential role in aerobic digestion for year-round wastewater treatment.
- 2. Cracks in concrete have developed at the floor, inclined slabs and divider walls of Oxidation Ditch No. 1 and this project will address the needed repairs to Oxidation Ditch No. 1.
- 3. City staff received one qualified proposal from HDR Engineering, Inc. (HDR) on September 12, 2019 after advertising the Request for Proposals (RFP) in the Daily Journal of Commerce and the City's website on August 26, 2019.
- 4. HDR submitted a detailed proposal outlining the scope of work with a phase-by-phase cost breakdown in line with the scope of work included in Exhibit "A" (with the professional services agreement) and by this reference incorporated.

THE CITY OF NEWBERG RESOLVES AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The City Council, acting as contract review board for the City, does hereby authorize the City Manager to enter into a Professional Services Agreement with HDR Engineering, Inc. to complete the City's Oxidation Ditch Rehabilitation Project that includes detailed structural evaluation, engineering design, bid and construction phase services for Oxidation Ditch No. 1 in the amount of \$197,840.00.
- 2. The City Attorney will modify and approve all contracts and agreements as to form and content.
- 3. The City Manager is authorized to amend the Professional Services Agreement up to ten (10) percent of the original contract amount.
- EFFECTIVE DATE of this resolution is the day after the adoption date, which is: October 22, 2019.

AGREEMENT WITH HDR ENGINEERING, INC. TO PROVIDE DESIGN & CONSULTING SERVICES TO THE CITY OF NEWBERG

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into this _____day of November, 2019 by and between the City of Newberg, a municipal corporation of the State of Oregon, hereinafter called **City**, and

hereinafter called Consultant.

RECITALS:

- City has need for the services of a Consultant to complete the City's Oxidation Ditch No. 1 Rehabilitation Project that includes structural evaluation, engineering design, bid and construction phase services, hereinafter called Project.
- 2. By authority of ORS 279C.110, and through the Request for Proposals (RFP) process, **City** received one qualified proposal and entered into Agreement with the **Consultant** based on their particular training, ability, knowledge, expertise and experience. The Agreement was approved by the City Council on October 21, 2019 per Resolution No. 2019-3605.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of mutual promises, covenants and agreements of the parties, it is agreed as follows:

1. <u>Effective Date and Duration</u>: This Agreement shall become effective on the date that this Agreement has been signed by every party hereto.

Unless, terminated or extended, this Agreement shall expire when the **City** accepts **Consultant's** completed performance or on <u>March 1, 2021</u>, whichever date occurs first. This fact notwithstanding, the services of **Consultant** shall be authorized and paid on a task by task basis as described in Exhibit "A".

Expiration shall not extinguish or prejudice **City's** right to enforce this Agreement with respect to any breach of a **Consultant** warranty or any fault or defect in **Consultant's** performance that has not been cured.

2. <u>Termination</u>: This Agreement may be terminated at any time by mutual, written consent of the parties. The **City** may, at its sole discretion terminate this Agreement in whole or part upon a 30-day written notice to **Consultant**. The **City** may terminate immediately upon notice to the **Consultant** that the **City** does not have funding, appropriations, or other necessary expenditure authority to pay for **Consultant's** Work. The **City** may terminate Agreement at any time for material breach, unless

Consultant has cured such defect or deficiency within a reasonable period of time following notice of such claim.

- 3. <u>Scope of Work</u>: The Consultant agrees to provide the services provided in the Scope of Work, which is Exhibit "A" and is attached hereto and incorporated by this reference. The Consultant represents and warrants to the City that the Consultant can perform the Work outlined in the Scope of Work for the fee proposal amount.
- 4. <u>Compensation</u>: The <u>Consultant</u> agrees to perform the Work for a not-to-exceed fee as indicated in their professional fee proposal included in the Scope of Work. The not-to-exceed figure is:

\$197,840.00

The Consultant shall not exceed the fee for any task included in the fee proposal amount. If the Consultant foresees that the fee is going to exceed the not-to-exceed figure because the task has changed or is outside the scope, the Consultant shall notify the City in writing of the circumstances with an estimated amount that the fee is to be exceeded. The Consultant shall obtain written permission from the City before exceeding the not-to-exceed fee amount. If the

Consultant does Work that exceeds the maximum fee amount prior to obtaining the written permission, the Consultant waives any right to collect that fee amount.

- 5. Additional Work Not Shown within the Scope of Work: If City requests or requires Work to be done not within the Scope of Work of this Project, the Consultant shall notify the City of such Work, provide an estimated fee amount, and obtain written instructions to proceed with Work in the form of an Agreement amendment prior to proceeding with Work and incurring any costs on behalf of the City. If Consultant proceeds with Work prior to obtaining permission and/or Agreement amendment, the Consultant waives any right to collect fees for Work performed.
- 6. <u>Agreement Documents</u>: This Agreement consists of the following documents which are listed in descending order of preference: This Agreement, and Attached Exhibits. Work is under the sole control of **Consultant**; however, the Work contemplated herein must meet the approval of the **City** and shall be subject to **City's** general right of inspection and supervision to secure the satisfactory performance thereof.
- 7. <u>Benefits</u>: Consultant will not be eligible for any federal social security, state workers compensation, unemployment insurance, or public employees' retirement system benefits from the Agreement payment except as a self-employed individual.
- 8. <u>Federal Employment Status</u>: In the event any payment made pursuant to this Agreement is to be charged against federal funds, **Consultant** certifies that he or she is not currently employed by the federal government and the amount charged does not exceed his or her normal charge for the type of services provided.
- 9. <u>Consultant's Warranties</u>: The Work to be performed by Consultant includes services generally performed by Consultant in his/her usual line of business. The Work performed by the Consultant under this Agreement shall be performed in a good and businesses-like manner in accordance with the generally accepted professional standards. The Consultant shall, at all times, during the term of this Agreement, be qualified, be professionally competent, and duly licensed to perform the Work.
- 10. <u>Indemnity</u>: With regard to the Consultant's performance in connection with or incidental to the Work, but excluding its performance of professional services and the indemnification and hold harmless aspects thereto as set forth below in this Section, the Consultant shall defend, indemnify, protect and hold the City, its officials, employees, agents and volunteers harmless from and against any and all claims, suits, actions, losses, costs or judgments of any nature for damages or injuries to any person or property, including injury to the Consultant and/or its employees, agents or subconsultants, which arise from or are connected with or are caused or claimed to be

caused by the negligent, reckless or willful acts or omissions of the **Consultant** and/or its employees, agents or subconsultants, in performing Work herein, and all expenses of investigating and defending against same, including reasonable attorney fees and costs at trial and on appeal; provided, however, that the **Consultant's** duty to indemnify and hold harmless shall not include any claims or liability arising from the established sole negligence or willful misconduct of the **City**, its officials, employees, agents and volunteers.

With regard to the **Consultant's** performance of professional services, **Consultant** shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the **City**, its officials, employees, agents and volunteers from and against any and all claims, costs, suits, actions, losses, expenses and damages, including reasonable attorney's fees and costs at trial and on appeal, arising from the willful misconduct or negligent acts, errors or omissions of the **Consultant** and/or its employees, agents or subconsultants associated with the Work.

- 11. Independent Contractor: Consultant is not currently employed by the City. The parties to this Agreement intend that the Consultant perform all Work as an Independent Contractor. No agent, employee, or servant of Consultant shall be or shall be deemed to be the employee, agent or servant of City. City is interested only in the results obtained under this Agreement; the manner and means of conducting the Work are under the sole control of Consultant, however, the Work contemplated herein must meet the approval of the City and shall be subject to City's general right of inspection and supervision to secure the satisfactory performance thereof.
- 12. <u>Taxes</u>: Consultant will be responsible for any federal or state taxes applicable to payments received under this Agreement. City will report the total of all payments to Consultant, including any expenses, in accordance with the Federal Internal Revenue Service and the State of Oregon Department of Revenue regulations.

13. Insurance:

- a) **Consultant**, its subconsultants, if any, and all employers working under this agreement are subject employers under the Oregon Workers Compensation Law and shall comply with ORS 656.017, which requires them to provide workers compensation coverage for all their subject workers; or by signing this Agreement, **Consultant** represents that he or she is a sole proprietor and is exempt from the laws requiring workers compensation coverage.
- b) **Consultant** will, at all times, carry a Commercial General Liability insurance policy for at least \$2,000,000.00 combined single limits per occurrence for Bodily Injury, Property Damage, and Personal Injury. The **City**, its agents, employees and officials all while acting within their official capacity as such, shall be named as an additional insured on the insurance specified in this paragraph.
- c) Consultant will, at all times, carry a Professional Liability/Errors and Omission type policy with limits of

at least \$2,000,000.00. If this policy is a "claims made" type policy, the policy type and company shall be approved by the City Manager prior to commencement of any Work under this Agreement.

- d) **Consultant** shall furnish the **City** with Certificates of Insurance upon execution of Agreement. Such Certificates of Insurance evidencing any policies required by this Agreement shall be delivered to the **City** prior to the commencement of any Work. A 30-day notice of cancellation clause shall be included in said certificate. The **City** has the right to reject any certificate for unacceptable coverage and/or companies.
- 14. Assignment: The parties hereto each bind themselves, their partners, successors, assigns and legal representatives of such other party in respect to all terms of this Agreement. Neither party shall assign the Agreement as a whole without written consent of the other.
- 15. Ownership of Work Product: All original documents prepared by Consultant in performance of this Agreement, including but not limited to original maps, plans, drawings and specifications are the property of City unless otherwise agreed in writing. Quality reproducible records copies of final Work

- product, including digital files of text and drawings shall be provided to **City** at the conclusion or termination of this Agreement. **City** shall indemnify and hold harmless **Consultant** and **Consultant's** independent professional associates or subconsultants from all claims, damages, losses and expenses including attorney fees arising out of the **City's** use of any instruments of professional service for purposes outside the scope of this Agreement.
- 16. <u>Entire Agreement</u>: This Agreement constitutes the entire Agreement between the parties and supersedes all prior agreements, written and oral, courses of dealing, or other understanding between the parties. No modification of this Agreement shall be binding unless in writing and signed by both parties.
- 17. <u>Notification:</u> All correspondence and notices related to this Agreement shall be directed to the project manager for the party to whom the correspondence or notice is intended. If directed to the **City**: City of Newberg, P.O. Box 970, Newberg, Oregon 97132, Attn: Paul Chiu, PE, Project Manager. If directed to the **Consultant**: Consultant, Inc. Attn: Karen Bill, PE, Project Manager at the address listed above. Each party shall be responsible for notifying the other of any changes in project manager designation.

The oxidation ditches provide an essential role in aerobic digestion of year-round wastewater treatment. The treatment plant operates both oxidation ditches in the winter. During summer, only one oxidation ditch is needed and the other one is emptied for maintenance.

These structures are now 30+ years old and over time have developed concrete cracks and exhibit signs of localized settlement and leakage. Replacement or expansion of the oxidation ditches has been delayed based on plant optimizations and cost analysis therefore structural repairs are needed to extend the service life of the structures by 20 years. The repairs for Oxidation Ditch No. 2 were designed by HDR and completed in 2017. It is now time to implement similar repairs for Oxidation Ditch No. 1.

Structural inspection and evaluation of Oxidation Ditch No. 1 was performed on October 18, 2011. The objective of this project is to provide an updated structural evaluation of Oxidation Ditch No. 1 and to prepare a complete set of bid plans, specifications and rehab cost estimates that will extend the service life of Oxidation Ditch No. 1 for another 20 years.

This scope includes the following tasks:

TASK 1 PROJECT MANAGEMENT

Activities

- Prepare an internal project management plan to include schedule, budget, roles, project team contact information, and procedures.
- Prepare monthly invoices.
- Prepare monthly progress reports to advise City project manager of project status.
- Conduct internal team meetings to review progress, coordinate disciplines, and identify information needs.
- Participate in a kickoff meeting to achieve the following:
 - Define project goals
 - Outline project and management approach
 - Identify roles and responsibilities
 - Confirm scope and schedule
 - Request data

- Project deliverables will be submitted in electronic, pdf format unless otherwise indicated.
 Final work products will also be provided in working format of MS Word, CAD, shapefiles, etc.

- Kickoff meeting agenda and minutes.
- Data request(s).

TASK 2 ALTERNATIVES ANALYSIS

Activities

- Compile and review existing information on facilities, including record drawings, plant data and geotechnical information.
- Development of Solutions: Review photos and condition information and prepare a matrix of
 potential solutions to be considered for rehabilitation of Oxidation Ditch No. 1. The matrix will
 include a list of the different types of anticipated damage as well as a list of different repair
 methods for consideration.
- Constructability and Cost Review: Review matrix of potential solutions. Prepare a cost opinion
 and constructability review for each repair method. Cost opinions will be provided in the form
 of unit price. The constructability review will include a contractor's opinion on the suitability of
 a particular repair method for a particular type of damage.
- Develop approach options for incorporating information to be gathered during the field testing (TASK 4) after selection of contractor.  - Input the hand-written field logs into computer gINT software and review the soil samples and soil descriptions in the laboratory.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Background

On September 18, 2017 City Council established priority 12: Complete community visioning process and communications plan to engage Newberg residents. On September 10, 2018 staff initiated the project by conducting background research by engaging the University Oregon through the Resource Assistance for Rural Environments (Rare) program.

On December 17, 2018 City Council approved the Mayor's nominations for Ad Hoc Community Visioning Advisory Committee member. The Advisory Committee held biweekly meetings from December 2019, to July 24, 2019, to plan for public forums, discuss community feedback and edit project documents. Three public forums took place on February 5, April 16, June 18, and August 15. The first three were designed to solicit feedback. The last forum was to celebrate the completion of the project. Volunteers and staff organized the forums and attended workshops during which they drafted the documents. The workshops were held on the following dates: March 5, May 16, and July 10. Updates were presented to City Council on the following dates: February 4, March 1, June 18, and August 5.

Adoption

On August 19, City staff presented the final Community Profile, Community Vision, and Action Plan to City Council for acceptance which adopted Resolution No. 2019-3585.

Next Steps

A. Staffing

The Community Development Department, Planning Division, staffed all of the activities in the Community Visioning program with support from the Planning Team (City staff), Community Visioning Advisory Committee, and Community Corps (community members). The Planning Division staffing came through a contract with the University of Oregon through the RARE program hiring Mr. Bayo Ware, which provided staff support in overseeing the development of the visioning program documents. The RARE contract expired at the end of July 2019. The City hired Mr. Ware for a short-term duration to complete the project until August 19, 2019.

The Community Development Director has been evaluating the capacity of the Community Development Department to address the next steps in implementing the Community Visioning program and has identified staff capacity deficiencies to take on the implementation responsibilities. With work program items in process that consist of: Urban Growth Boundary Expansion (Economic Opportunities Analysis), refresh of the Housing Needs Analysis Buildable Lands Inventory in winter/spring 2020, Downtown Improvement Plan implementation (Vertical Housing Development Zone, Residential Parking, Commercial regulations on Second Street, and West End Mill District), Certified Local Government historic grant implementation, Riverfront Master Plan implementation (infrastructure master plan updates; comprehensive plan, zone change, and Development Code regulation implementation), affordable housing initiatives (35 identified items), urban renewal feasibility and plan development, Construction Excise Tax evaluation, planning activities for the City of Dundee, economic development activities, and current planning applications, there are limited staff resources.

The City Manager's Office presently has a vacant Community Engagement Specialist position which is being recruited for.

Options to provide staffing to implement the Community Visioning program include:

- 1. Utilize the Community Engagement Specialist in the City Manager's Office to lead the implementation with support from the Planning Division.
- 2. Hire a new position in the Community Development Department, Planning Division (estimated cost of \$122,000 +/-).
- 3. Contract with an outside party to manage the Community Visioning program.
- 4. Outreach to one of the lead partners to take on the role of managing the Community Visioning program.
- 5. Don't implement the Community Visioning program.

B. Organization Outreach

One of the activities that Mr. Ware was engaged in up to the end of his contract was outreach to identified lead and support partners for their engagement in the programs implementation. Since the departure of Mr. Ware minimal outreach efforts have occurred. Outreach has taken place with Portland Community College, George Fox University and the Future Focus group headed by the Chehalem Park and Recreation District.

C. Establishing a Commission

The City Council could determine to establish a permanent Commission to oversee implementation of the Community Visioning Program. The establishment of the Commission would be similar to other Commissions established by the City through Newberg Municipal Code, Title 2 Administration and Personnel, 2.15 Department, Boards and Commissions. If City Council desires to go forward with this path staff would prepare a proposal to be brought back for consideration and adoption by ordinance. It would include elements such as Establishment, Purpose, Membership, Term of office, Vacancies and removal, Presiding members, Staff services, Meetings, Powers and duties, Application for membership, and Conflict of interest.

Establishment of a Commission would additionally require identifying possible Commission

members which may consist of a member from each topic area (Community Engagement, Community Leadership, Cultural Assets, Economic Development, and Livability & Development), a Council Liaison and Student Representative. The Mayor could be an Ex Officio member of the commission. It is anticipated the commission would meet on at least a quarterly basis and provide an annual report to City Council on implementation activities.

An alternative is an Ad Hoc Committee (reminder an ad hoc committee is for a short term duration). This approach may be possible as a starting point until a permanent commission is established, or as a filler if an alternative to contract with an outside party to manage the Community Visioning program. An Ad Hoc Committee on an interim basis may also be possible if a lead partner manages the Community Visioning program.

D. Plan Updates

Updates to the Community Visioning documents are anticipated to occur every 3-5 years with year 10 being a major revision process.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Funds for the Community Engagement Specialist are budgeted in Fund 31: Admin/Support Services Fund-City Manager Office 12XX, 31-1210-410000. Hiring a staff person in the Community Development Department is not budgeted for FY 2019/20 but would be estimated to cost \$122,000 +/-. Hiring an outside consultant is not budgeted for FY 2019/20 and would need to have scope for services developed and the appropriate fund identified for the expenditure.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The City of Newberg Engineering Services Department has been working since April 2018 to update the Water Management and Conservation Plan (WMCP) which is a subset of the Water Master Plan. The last WMCP was updated in January 2009. GSI Water Solutions, Inc. is the consultant on the project and has been working with City staff on compiling the required information to update the plan. A copy of the plan was sent to the Water Resources Department in March 2019 who issued a Final Order September 4, 2019.

The Water Management and Conservation Plan is required to comply with OAR Chapter 690, Division 86. With issuance of the Final Order that plan has been determined to be in compliance with the OAR by the Water Resources Department. The WMCP will remain in effect until September 3, 2029. The limitation of the diversion of water under Permit G-17583 (formerly G-13876) established in the Final Order approving the City's previous WMCP issued on January 26, 2009 remains unchanged. Subject to other limitations or conditions of the permit, therefore, the City of Newberg remains authorized to divert only up to 17.64 cfs (out of the total permitted 20.0 cfs) of water under Permit G-17583. The City of Newberg shall submit an updated plan meeting the requirements of OAR Chapter 690, Division 086 within 10 years and no later than March 3, 2029. The City of Newberg is also required to submit a progress report containing the information required under OAR 690-086-0120(4) by September 3, 2024. Finally, the City of Newberg must submit an updated Water Management and Conservation Plan to the Department by March 3, 2029.

The City Council is not asked to make a decision on the proposal at this time; only to initiate the amendment so that incorporation of the WMCP into the comprehensive plan can be studied through the public hearing process. If the Council initiates the amendment then staff will prepare the specifics for a proposal. Staff will then schedule the item for a Planning Commission public hearing anticipated to occur in December 2019 to make a recommendation. The Planning Commission recommendation would then be brought to the City Council for a public hearing and final decision which is anticipated to occur in January 2019.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Funds were budgeted in FY 2018/19 and 2019/20 within the Engineering Department, Professional Services (04-5150-707557) for consultant services to support the development of the plan. In FY 2018/19 \$100,000 was budgeted with \$30,000 re-budgeted (carried over) to FY 2019/20. The GSI Water Solutions, Inc.

contract amount was for a not to exceed amount of \$69,600.

Authority

OAR Chapter 690, Division 086, establishes the process and criteria for approving water management and conservation plans required under the conditions of permits, permit extensions and other orders of the Department. An approved water management and conservation plan may authorize the diversion and use of water under a permit extended pursuant to OAR Chapter 690, Division 315.

Findings of Fact

- 1. The City of Newberg (City) submitted a Water Management and Conservation Plan (Plan) to the Water Resources Department (Department) on March 25, 2019. The Plan was required by a condition set forth under the City's previously approved Plan (Sp. Or. Vol. 77, Pg. 136 issued on January 26, 2009.
- 2. The Department published notice of receipt of the Plan on April 2, 2019, as required under OAR Chapter 690, Division 086. No comments were received.
- 3. The Department provided written comments on the Plan to the City on May 13, 2019. In response, the City submitted a revised Plan on August 21, 2019.
- 4. The Department reviewed the revised Plan and finds that it contains all of the elements required under OAR 690-086-0125 and OAR 690-086-0130.

Conclusion of Law

The Water Management and Conservation Plan submitted by the City of Newberg is consistent with the criteria in OAR Chapter 690, Division 086.

This is a final order in other than a contested case. This order is subject to judicial review under ORS 183.484. Any petition for judicial review must be filed within the 60-day time period specified by ORS 183.484(2). Pursuant to ORS 536.075 and OAR 137-004-0080, you may petition for judicial review or petition the Director for reconsideration of this order. A petition for reconsideration may be granted or denied by the Director, and if no action is taken within 60 days following the date the petition was filed, the petition shall be deemed denied.

Now, therefore, it is ORDERED:

Duration of Plan Approval:

1. The City of Newberg Water Management and Conservation Plan is approved and shall remain in effect until **September 3, 2029**, unless this approval is rescinded pursuant to OAR 690-086-0920.

Development Limitation:

2. The limitation of the diversion of water under Permit G-17583 (formerly G-13876) established in the Final Order approving the City's previous WMCP issued on January 26, 2009 remains unchanged. Subject to other limitations or conditions of the permit, therefore, the City of Newberg remains authorized to divert only up to 17.64 cfs (out of the total permitted 20.0 cfs) of water under Permit G-17583.

Plan Update Schedule:

3. The City of Newberg shall submit an updated plan meeting the requirements of OAR Chapter 690, Division 086 within 10 years and no later than March 3, 2029.

Progress Report Schedule:

4. The City of Newberg shall submit a progress report containing the information required under OAR 690-086-0120(4) by **September 3, 2024**.

Other Requirements for Plan Submittal:

5. The deadline established herein for the submittal of an updated Water Management and Conservation Plan (consistent with OAR Chapter 690, Division 086) shall not relieve the City of Newberg from any existing or future requirement(s) for submittal of a Water Management and Conservation Plan at an earlier date as established through other final orders of the Department.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The Friendsview Retirement Community and the Cadd Living Trust have requested the right-of-way vacation. The purpose is to redevelop the area east of N Center Street and north of E Fulton Street with an expansion of the Friendsview University Village. N Center Street dead ends into the access for Friendsview University Village. This access was constructed in previously vacated right-of-way for E Cherry Street. Friendsview owns all of the properties abutting the proposed vacation, except the site at the NW corner of N Center Street and E Fulton Street. This property is owned by the Cadd Living Trust. Vacating the N Center Street right-of-way would allow Friendsview more flexibility to develop the University Village site.

The initiation of the right-of-way vacation would not make a decision for or against the proposal. It would schedule a public hearing, provide public notice, and provide an opportunity for public comment on the proposed vacation. The tentative hearing date is December 9, 2019.

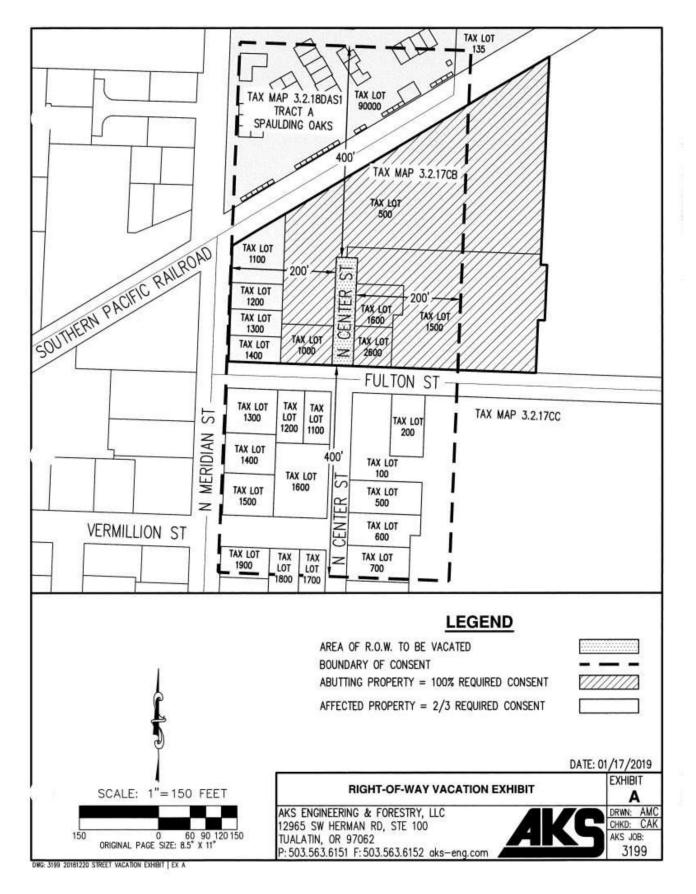

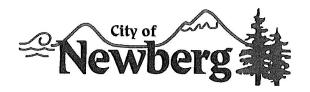
