5. UPDATE: An update from Representative Zach Hudson and introduction of the new Community Outreach Coordinator Sarah Carlberg.

Representative Zach Hudson stated he wants to take time specifically to introduce Sarah Carlberg as the Community Outreach Coordinator and give some background on what's been discussed. During the legislative session it became clear that there were things to focus on in the district. Some of the subjects being looked into are increasing affordable housing and decreasing prevalence of and the need for unauthorized camping in places like Thousand Acres and along Marine Drive. As the session wound down and they started to work toward the interim they started to look for ways to reach out and make sure that District 49 and the communities that it includes had an additional voice advocating for them and helping coordinate needs along with the cities, county, Metro and other local leaders. They started looking for a community outreach coordinator and found Sarah Carlberg. His idea for the position is that it's someone from his office who can be really responsive and collaborative with local leaders, Mayors, City Councils, Metro Councilors, County Commissioners and working on things as they arise. The big thing they're focusing on is helping the houseless members of the community and finding solutions which will help them, and the members of the community stay safe, reduce the environmental and neighborhood impact of unauthorized camping and help transition people to a stable and safe housing situation.

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Sarah Carlberg stated she is excited to join Representative Hudson's office in the Community Outreach Coordinator position. She comes from a background of program development, evaluation and implementation, as well as community organizing. She approaches the work from a perspective of listening to community members and hearing the issues impacting them and then working with local governments and jurisdictions to increase capacity and information sharing. She stated they hit the ground running with the role in placing the indirect relation with the Joint Office of Homeless Services and Commissioner Stegmann's office in helping to conceptualize and roll out the Supportive Housing Services East County Service expansion. She's excited to see how that unfolds and how increased collaboration between municipal leaders and jurisdictions will increase capacity and service providers.

6. UPDATE: An update from the Sandy Drainage Improvement Company.

Tanney Staffenson, SDIC Board Member, introduced himself and Tom Hansell, SDIC Board President. He stated he is checking in and will be bringing Council up to speed on what's going on. He explained that SDIC has been in flood protection since 1915. They've been maintaining and updating the infrastructure that moves the water, not only from the managed floodplain, but they also take care of 28 million gallons of water that comes down the hill. SDIC and Troutdale's partnership goes back a long way. Recently the partnership included a weir. It really changed the landscape and gave the ability to use 88 acres of flood storage that was created

when the TRIP property was developed. It allowed for the development of a number of properties including Amazon, C&S Wholesale and Pacific Power, just to name a few. Troutdale also partnered with SDIC on the Drainage Master Plan which directs efforts going forward. Part of SDIC's work is keeping levees accredited and allowing for properties to have the ability to purchase flood insurance. After Hurricane Katrina the federal regulations became much higher and created a situation where drainage districts really were unable to meet standards and that's where the legislation has changed, and a new entity is being formed to handle the new standards. Until the new entity takes responsibility, not only for the capital needs but for the operation maintenance of the system, SDIC is operating and maintaining the drainage main system. Approval of funding was received for an Army Corps study of the system on the 4 drainage districts. 65% federal funding is being requested for all the projects that need to be done which is around \$160 million, which would leave 35% to be responsible for. That funding can come from a lot of places. The study that SDIC has put together is really moving well. It's one of 24 studies that have moved forward in Washington by the Corp of Engineers. They have \$16 billion in funding to go on these studies, but the bad news is there's \$109 billion in projects. That's before the infrastructure bill came into play. With the project in the pipeline, there's a pretty good shot of getting at least the 65% funding on it. There are going to be some costs associated with the 35% portion. SDIC is budgeting and planning for those costs and setting up for the costs of engineering and the design.

Tom Hansell stated he sits on the Sandy Board as a Multnomah County representative. Multnomah County has an interest in the whole system and an interest in the investment in the legislation that enacted and created the new urban district. The County is very supportive of it and supportive of the pursuit of the Army Corp funding, which was critical to start knocking down some of the accreditation projects as well as some of the exposed risks that the districts are all facing, like climate change and water levels rising. SDIC is fully committed to the outcomes that the new urban district is tackling, and they will be successful.

Councilor Ripma stated he will be making a report next month on the formation of the new district. Tanney has been doing a great job of representing Troutdale on the formation board. The funding for levees and flood control in the entire Columbia south shore area will not be paid for entirely by the property owners in the 4 districts but will be spread much more widely in the county based on how much they benefit from avoiding floods in the future. It should be a fair system and shouldn't be too burdensome. There are still a lot of details to figure out.

No Parking Placement - ... VI MB

Hi Nick,

After some consideration, Public Works has concluded that a No-Parking zone demarcation is worthwhile at this fairly unique location.

It's a fairly unique situation and I went back and forth on it to some degree. It mostly comes down to whether you consider that corner merely a sharp bend in the road, or an intersection of two streets. It's geometric configuration, particularly with the "knuckle" on the west side at the corner, makes it like act like a sharp bend, particularly from the motorists point of view. However, the two streets are at right angles and have differing designations, arguing that it's an intersection, particularly from the pedestrian's point of view. This is important in considering whether there are statutory crosswalks at the corner. In Oregon, there are legal crosswalks at every public street intersection whether marked or not. The existence of crosswalks (or lack thereof) plays a substantial role on whether marked no parking zones are needed near corners. If crosswalks exist, no-parking signs aren't needed at a location like this because there is already no-parking within 20 feet of the crosswalk by statute. However, given the configuration of the street and lack of markings or other visual cues, many motorists would not intuitively recognize this as an intersection where there are crosswalks with a 20 foot parking setback. And by your own account and as is apparent form the street layout, pedestrians do treat it as an intersection crossing point, creating a potential safety conflict – motorists don't think its an intersection with unmarked crosswalks, pedestrians do, and the parked cars make it hard to see those pedestrians. Add to that the effect corner parking on a 90 degree bend can have on vehicle maneuvering and sight distance to opposing traffic streams and it lends additional weight to keeping that corner clear of parking.

So, that's a somewhat long-winded explanation of how I arrived at the conclusion that No-Parking signs are advisable at this location. Our streets crew anticipates installing them in the next couple of weeks. Imagery of the planned sign placement is attached for your info.
