Chris Damgen, Community Development Director, introduced assistant Planner, Alex Lopez, and Norm Thomas, Historic Landmarks Commission Vice Chair and gave a brief overview of the staff report. The Historic Landmarks Commission (HLC) is a city board and is a standing committee. It has been in effect for a little over 10 years now and came about through a periodic review assessment. The HLC designates historic landmarks and when changes are proposed, such as, additions, modifications or even potential removal, it is in the HLC's wheelhouse to make decisions based on criteria. The enabling language in the municipal code allows them to do other things as well or to service a voice of historic preservation in the community. Part of the concern the HLC has articulated to staff is if they're doing enough or if they could be doing more.

Norm Thomas stated there were a couple of structures recently that were torn down. One was close to 100 years old and another one was a fairly old building. There's nothing in the code that notifies the HLC when something is happening. The HLC is asking for some kind of notification process when these things are about to happen on buildings that are 50 years old or older, at least to document the properties. The HLC has recently designated Hungry Hill as a historic landmark area, but signage is needed for buildings to be recognized as historic.

Mayor Lauer stated this is a great idea. There's a lot of history in downtown Troutdale and around Hungry Hill.

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Sharon Nesbit, Historic Landmarks Commission member, stated Hungry Hill was the original plat of the City of Troutdale and was put in at almost the same time the railroad came in. The lots were small, intended to be working people's houses. There is still a considerable number of those original houses up the hill.

Councilor Moon stated he very much appreciates the time Alison has spent on this. He thinks it's a shame that ODSL isn't putting this kind of time and resources into it. It makes him mad that this is even happening on government land, and no one is fixing it. Citizens are picking up the slack for what's going on. He fully supports the proposal.

Councilor Caswell replied maybe. The Joint Office of Homeless Services work out different kinds of structures. There could be some kind of benefit but probably not a huge benefit.

Councilor Kranz stated there's a lot of money coming in from the County. Maybe that's something that can be applied for.

Ray Young stated Thursday morning he'll be having another meeting with the Joint Office of Homeless Services and Multnomah County to talk about homelessness. With all of the millions of dollars that are being funneled through Metro to Multnomah County, apparently not a dime of it gets to Troutdale, Fairview or Wood Village and very little gets to Gresham. December 14, 2021 Council Meeting Minutes

Mayor and Councilors,

I don't know how many Council members regularly travel 257th, so some of you may have not been aware of what I'm reporting. In early November there was a single car crash northbound that ended up in the open field south of the medical offices at the southeast corner of 257th and Cherry Park/16th. It remained there for over a week. Sometime after that a second crashed car was reported in the same general area, although I never saw that one.

When asked why they had not been removed as abandoned vehicles, city staff's explanation was that because they were on private property that it was that property owner's responsibility to remove them.

When abandoned items are left on private property without the property owner's knowledge or permission, it shouldn't be their legal or financial responsibility to have them removed. In the case of a vehicle, local government and/or law enforcement can much more easily determine the responsible party, and if necessary seek reimbursement for removal costs. Also, leaving an abandoned vehicle sitting for an extended period risks it being stripped of parts, and if the wheels in particular are taken can make it much more difficult to remove without damaging the property.

I also understand that the drivers of those two vehicles ran from the scene, as well as one later in the same month that occurred in the intersection. That's at least three crashes that I know of in one month on 257th between Hensley and Cherry Park.

THE PRIVATE SECTOR: SANCTIONED CAMPING SITE

A private property owner has demonstrated willingness to allow his property, located at 2077 W Historic Columbia River Highway, to be a potential site for sanctioned camping.

- Not in a scenic area
- Easier to monitor for fire danger
- Provides improved access to services
- Provides fast access for outreach workers
- .5 miles from bus stop 77 at SW Halsey & Edgefield Meadows
- 3.1 miles from Legacy Mt Hood Medical Center
- Pet friendly
- No zoning restrictions
- 2.6 miles from the Sandy River Delta
- Potential 2-4 year term from owner and possible option to renew





Helping people find home, regain health and move toward long-term stability and success.

Central City Concern has committed to provide clean up services at the sanctioned camping location. Here is a list of what they have outlined:

- One day of service a week
- The team will be able to remove any trash that is already bagged up from the area
- They can also walk around the area and pick up any loose trash that is found
- They will remove sharps



SOCIAL SERVICES

OUTREACH WORKERS LEADING WITH COMPASSION

















An outreach worker is somebody who knows how to build trust, and understands their clients' needs. They have the assets to navigate finding employment, housing, vital document sourcing, connection to medical services, and providing drug and alcohol counseling. They are trauma informed professionals who walk the journey alongside those who need their help.

Currently, there is inadequate outreach work at Thousand Acres, and none at Sundial Island.

With funding from the Joint Office of Homeless Services, and with easy access to the sanctioned camping site, outreach workers would begin the important work of changing lives.






"Committed to Building Kinship, Land Stewardship and Green Enterprises"

The goal of the project would be placemaking and community building through farming with the folks that live on-site. All food grown will be for the community benefit on the land.

Mudbone Grown would:

- Help to build the farm, provide basic infrastructure, plant starts, seeds, amendments, tools, volunteer opportunities, educational materials, training and workshops.
- Strategize with partners to create economic development opportunities and provide linkages to ongling agricultural education and opportunities.
- Be operating a 3.5 incubator farm called C.R.O.P.S. next to proposed site and will be able to provide ongoing technical support.





THOUSAND ACRES ASSESSMENT AND CAMP MAP


Based on an extensive assessment of Thousand Acres and Sundial Island conducted by Kevin Dahlgren, an experienced outreach worker, the entire area has now been documented.

At Thousand Acres, there are <u>64 major camps</u>. At almost every camp, there was evidence of active residence; however, to estimate a conservative number of homeless people camping, Kevin assumed 10 camps were abandoned.

Since at most camps there appeared to be more than one person, Kevin calculated that there are 1.75 people per camp. This is also a conservative estimate.

Based on this information, there are approximately **94 people living at Thousand Acres**.

On Sundial Island, there are at least 3 major camp sites. Based on the same calculation, there are approximately **5 people living on Sundial Island.**



RECENT EVENTS:

FIRE & MOTORIZED VEHICLES IN CAMPS

On September 13, 2021 there was a fire started by a homeless man in Thousand Acres. The flames reached over 14 ft high in the trees, and if we were not there as a boots-on-the-ground force, the fire could have been much worse.

- It took Corbett Fire 38 minutes to respond because Thousand Acres is difficult to reach.
- Many of the camps are within 30 yards from where the fire started, including a camp where there are children.
- There is concern this may happen again due to open fires and stoves in almost all the camps in Thousand Acres.
- This poses a great risk for loss of human life and forest destruction.

On Sunday September 26, Friends of the Sandy River Delta received a message on Facebook that a blue Subaru was spotted driving through the Sandy River Delta, and parked at a camp with an open fire.

We found the camp and noted car tire tracks on the pedestrian trails.

- This poses obvious danger to visitors to the Delta.
- Driving a motorized vehicle in Thousand Acres is illegal.
- Driving off road in a protected scenic area poses environmental hazards.










