# Minutes: 413<sup>th</sup> Oregon Environmental Quality Commission meeting

March 25-26 2021: Teleconference (Zoom and telephone)

# Thursday, March 25: 12:30 to 4 p.m.

  - Vice-chair Baraso left the meeting at approximately 12:50 p.m., and was not present for the vote on Item C.

## Welcome and meeting open

Chair George convened the meeting at approximately 12:35 p.m. Commissioners reviewed the agenda and Director Whitman noted that Item B had been rescheduled to the May 2021 regular meeting. No other changes were made to the agenda.

# A. Action: Meeting minutes

The commissioners reviewed the draft meeting minutes from the Jan. 21-22, 2021, regular EQC meeting.

# C. Action: 1200Z Industrial Stormwater General Permit rulemaking

Justin Green, Water Quality Division Administrator, introduced this item and provided background on the action to bring this general permit for commission action. Christine Svetkovich, Water Quality Manager, described the history of industrial stormwater regulations in Oregon, described the different types of facilities, and their geographic distribution across the state, required to have a 1200Z general permit, and the current obligations of the permit.

Svetkovich noted the legal background, including settlement provisions, associated with the 1200Z general permit rulemaking proposal. She outlined the proposed changes, including those DEQ made

in response to public comment. Commissioners asked clarifying and informational questions throughout the presentation.

Krista Ratliff, Senior Water Quality Permit Writer, provided additional technical detail and clarifications for some commissioner questions. Director Whitman discussed a significant policy change proposed in the rulemaking, related to water quality-based effluent limits. Commissioners discussed the proposed policy change and specifics of the rulemaking.

**Action:** Adopt the proposed rule amendments seen in Attachment A of the report for this item as part of Chapter 340 of the Oregon Administrative Rules.

The commission unanimously approved the action as presented.

Following the commission's vote, Chair George and Director Whitman provided closing comments and thanks to the staff for their work, and to all people who participated in the rulemaking and provided comments during its development process.

## **G.** Informational: Commissioner reports

Director Whitman noted that Chair George and Vice-chair Baraso received Senate confirmation for their reappointment to second terms on the commission.

Commissioner Mosby asked Director Whitman for an update related to wastewater system issues, due to power outages, as a result of the February ice storms. Director Whitman reported no major pollution to Oregon's waters from wastewater systems that suffered storm-related power outages.

Commissioner Kile reported out on her role on OWEB, including recent grant funds disbursed for watershed improvement projects, and OWEB support for the removal of the Klamath Dam.

Chair George noted that, during travel along the Santiam Corridor, she observed a lot of tree-removal activity and recovery in the area, noting that salvage logging provides Oregon the opportunity to use the downed trees to increase stream complexity and provide refugia for fish in the state's rivers.

# D. Informational: Cleaner Air Oregon updates

Ali Mirzakhalili, Air Quality Division Administrator, introduced this item. Gabriela Goldfarb, Oregon Health Authority Manager, provided introductory comments regarding the Cleaner Air Oregon Program, including the close collaborative relationships developed and ongoing between DEQ and OHA.

Keith Johnson, Cleaner Air Oregon Program Manager, outlined the program's successes over the past two years of implementation. Johnson described the health-based risk assessment elements of March 25-26, 2021, EQC meeting minutes

CAO and provided a summary of the process steps required for CAO permitting. Johnson noted some key lessons learned by the CAO staff and ways staff have implemented program improvements.

J.R. Giska, CAO Program Engineer, presented case studies and summary information about new and existing facilities statewide and representing a variety of types of facilities subject to the CAO regulations. For each case study, he outlined the types of air toxics emitted by the sources, general program status and lessons learned by DEQ staff for the facility type.

Johnson summarized the program's work, noting the important connections across Air Quality programs for successful protection of Oregon's air. He outlined the next steps for CAO, including rulemakings to be presented for commission consideration over the next several years.

Director Whitman provided summary comments about the program and noted the exemplary work of J.R. Giska in his role as CAO Program Engineer. Chair George noted her thanks to the staff and all people who have participated in the program development and progress to-date. Commissioner Kile asked for clarification of current status for some facilities in the program, in reference to Table 2 of the staff report. DEQ provided detail on the process steps and some newer requirements in CAO.

Following the staff presentation, Chair George opened a comment opportunity specific to the information presented during the Cleaner Air Oregon Program update. # I. Informational: Greenhouse Gas Programs update

Colin McConnaha, Office of Greenhouse Gas Programs Manager, introduced the item and described the proposed structure of DEQ's Climate Protection Program. Nicole Singh, Senior Climate Analyst, outlined the development timeline of the Climate Protection Program, including the agency's considerations and program goals for development. Singh described the advisory committee process to-date, and summarized the key agency considerations of equity, emissions reductions and cost containment being used by DEQ in the development of the proposed program and its associated rules.

Singh described the CPP framework, and ways the program could be implemented under several different policy scenarios for greenhouse gas emissions reductions, and noted key decisions about what sectors are and are not proposed for inclusion in the program at this time. Director Whitman provided additional detail on ways DEQ could help Oregon's electrical utilities move to 100 percent clean energy, since they are outside the scope of the CPP regulatory structure at this time.

Director Whitman introduced the landfill methane emissions reduction work, and proposed rulemaking in development, and the Every Mile Counts program. Michael Orman, Air Quality Manager, described the rule development for landfill methane emissions, noting that the proposed rules would be presented for EQC consideration later this year. He described the Every Mile Counts program, a multi-agency program under the Statewide Transportation Strategy. Commissioners asked clarifying and informational questions throughout the presentation.

Following the staff presentation, the commission opened a comment opportunity specific to the Greenhouse Gas Programs update. Twenty seven people presented comment to the commission. Their names, and affiliations as provided, are below. Comments varied in specific content, but all were related to the Climate Protection Program development, landfill methane issues and greenhouse gas emissions reduction efforts by DEQ.

Commissioners asked clarifying questions and noted their interests in specific legislation throughout the presentation.
