CONSENT CALENDAR:

The Consent Calendar was as follows:

- 1. Approve minutes of May 4, 1987 Regular Meeting.
- 2. Communication from George Fox College
- 3. Communication from Police Chief RE: Communication Levy.

Motion: Gano-Proctor to approve the Consent Calendar.

Councilman Grobey called attention to a misspelled name on Page 10 of the minutes.

Vote on the motion, with correction of minutes, carried unanimously.

APPOINTMENTS BY MAYOR:

The Mayor appointed Todd Hall to serve on the Cable Communications Commission.

Motion: Halstead-Rementeria to approve the Mayor's appointment of Todd Hall. Carried unanimously.

Mayor Hall reported the County has approved Marily Rementeria to serve on the Jail Task Force Committee, even though she has not yet been appointed.

<u>Motion:</u> Young-Grobey to approve the appointment of Marily Rementeria to the Jail Task Force Committee. Motion Carried.

REQUESTS FROM FLOOR AND COMMUNICATIONS:

1. Jean Harris, 3305 Vittoria Way, stated she is representing the Chehalem Valley Heritage Club regarding the Newberg Centennial celebration. The Club has appointed a committee to address this and the committee has recommended that the Mayor form a Newberg Centennial Celebration Committee similar to the committee that was formed for the Bi-centennial. The committee should be composed of representatives of various interested groups in the community. Two members that the Heritage Club committee recommends are Councilman Roger Gano and City Recorder Arvilla Page.

<u>Motion:</u> Rementeria-Grobey to appoint City Recorder Arvilla Page and Councilman Roger Gano to a committee to be formed for the centennial celebration. Carried unanimously.

Mayor Hall reported the City has sent for a book that will be of assistance in planning the celebration.

2. EID (Economic Improvement District) from Newberg Downtown Association.

Brad Berry, President of NDA, said they are proposing the creation of an EID. The Legislature permits this as a self help mechanism. He described the area involved, the benefits and what can and cannot be done. Mr. Berry stated this is not tax increment. The district would be taxing only itself. The EID tax has a sunset provision of three years.

Mr. Berry then gave the requirements for implementing the EID. All property owners must be notified and there must be approval by a two-thirds majority of the assessed value of the area. NDA does not expect more than 10 to 15 per cent opposition.

Mr. Berry said it is estimated the tax will be three cents per square foot of assessed value, varying to two cents. Public property and residential would be excluded. It is estimated that 10% of the assessment would be uncollectible.

Mr. Berry pointed out that funds requested from the City will be reduced. Timing is important as NDA is running out of money. NDA has pledged funds that will be returned if the EID does not go through. There are several funding options available while the EID is implemented. He listed the efforts NDA will take to inform the public and property owners and stated they will advise the Council of those that oppose the plan. He stated three things will occur:

- 1. Pass the ordinance and the first notice go out.
- 2. Second hearing, possibly in mid August.
- 3. Notices by the City of the tax would go out in November at the time of the other tax notices.

Mr. Berry said NDA will have a Town Hall informational meeting on June 8th. There will be representatives from McMinnville and Hillsboro, cities that have used this financing.

Councilor Rementeria asked what the expense to the City would be. The Planning Director responded there would be some staff time, advertising and cost of notices.

Councilman Grobey asked whether the budget will need to be amended to collect and disburse the funds. The Finance Director responded that it would not. A special resolution will be required though.

Councilman Grobey asked Mr. Berry what the percentage of absentee owners is in the area. Mr. Berry responded that this figure is not available. However, many leases have a pass through clause and the assessment will be tax deductible as a cost of doing business.

Councilman Gano asked whether there is any provision for the city to recover costs. The Planning Director stated this could be done and Mr. Berry again noted that NDA will be requesting less funding from the City.

Councilman Young asked the City Attorney if there is a disadvantage to starting the procedure without the ordinance in place. The City Attorney responded the the property owner is interested in facts, such as what it will cost him. This information is not available. He pointed out the difference between this and a regular assessment ordinance.

Councilor Rementeria asked whether NDA would have someone available to input the information into the City's computer. Mr. Berry responded that he did not know.

Gary Baldwin, member of board of Newberg Area Chamber of Commerce, reported the C of C Board has voted unanimous support of the EID.

<u>Motion:</u> Grobey-Rementeria to initiate action on part of staff to refer this ordinance proposal to the Ordinance Committee and initiate action to proceed with the notice requirements to establish an Economic Improvement District. First reading of the Ordinance at the next regular Council meeting. Carried unanimously.

Mayor Hall then excused those members of the audience that did not wish to remain for the rest of the meeting. Approximately 25 left the meeting.

PUBLIC HEARINGS:

1. Public Hearing on street vacation within the A-dec Industrial Park (continued from May meeting.)

The Planning Director described the property as 40 ft. by 894.5 ft. that was originally intended as an extension of Crestview Avenue. The extension is not designated in the Comprehensive Plan and other streets are now designated as through streets. He stated no objections have been received and the Planning Commission unanimously approved the request.

No proponents or opponents wished to be heard and the Mayor closed the public hearing.

Councilman Tucker asked whether there is any information from the County of a by pass location. The Planning Director responded that the County is changing. Councilman Tucker then stated he could not support this street vacation until the location of the by pass is settled. Property owners will be affected with any route.

The Planning Director obtained and showed a map of the area of the by pass routes. He stated he believed any by pass would connect with Mountainview instead of Crestview. He stated that the staff recommendation would be to approve the vacation.

<u>Motion:</u> Gano-Rementeria to read the ordinance by title only. Carried unanimously. The ordinance was then read by title, including a description of the property to be vacated. <u>Roll Call:</u> Aye 3. Gano, Halstead, Rementeria. Nay 5. Grobey, Probst, Proctor, Tucker, Young. The Mayor then declared the ordinance failed.

Councilman Gano noted that the Council has just shot down A-dec's plan for the treatment center. The Council should come up with some alternative to get the project under way again.

Councilman Grobey said the Public Works Committee should undertake negotiations to resolve the issues raised so this ordinance can be passed.

Councilman Tucker stated that if the ordinance is passed the City will lose bargaining power with the County. He said he is not willing to see the by pass shot down.

Councilman Halstead noted that we are holding A-dec at ransom.

Councilman Gano asked what attempt has been made to work this out with A-dec. The Planning Director responded that some discussion has been held.

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Councilman Gano stated that before we kill this completely, all effort should be made to resolve the issue. Get the County and A-dec and everybody involved. If no progress is made by July 6, then we have cause to deny the ordinance until progress is realized.

<u>Motion:</u> Grobey-Young to reconsider the vote on the ordinance vacating a portion of Crestview Street. Carried unanimously.

 $\underline{\text{Motion:}}$ Gano-Young to postpone consideration of the ordinance until July 6, 1987 at 7:30 p.m. and all effort to be made to get all parties involved to the negotiation table. Carried unanimously.

2. Public hearing on annexation of 10 acres by Sam Whitney located between the runway of the Sportsman Airport and the St. Paul Highway.

The Planning Director gave the Staff Report. He stated there was some concern at the Planning Commission about development along the highway before design criteria are set for this area. The Planning Commission did vote 4 to 2 in favor of the annexation.

<u>Proponent:</u> Sam Whitney, owner of the property, provided additional verbal description of the property. In response to the Planning Commission regarding design, he pointed out that Sportsman's Airpark has a long record of beautification and has even won awards. Mr. Whitney pointed out that he has played an active role in the community and supported city improvements.

No other proponents or opponents wished to be heard. The Planning Director noted the one letter in the Planning Commission record and no other. The Mayor then closed the public hearing.

Motion: Halstead-Gano to read Ordinance No. 2205, annexing 10 acres, by title only. Carried unanimously. The ordinance was then read by title only. Roll Call: Aye 8. Gano, Grobey, Halstead, Probst, Proctor, Rementeria, Tucker, Young. Nay 0. The Mayor then declared the ordinance passed.

3. Public Hearing on amendment to the Oak Hollow Subdivision Planned Unit Development.

The Planning Director gave the Staff Report. He noted that the number of housing units will be reduced from the original plan to 46. The original plan was for common wall units. The new plan is for individual units on substandard lots with a 10 ft. set back required between the units.

Ray Amsinger, 2212 Jodi Court, asked whether any of the units will be two story.

Millard Leslie, Newberg Realty, stated there will be no two story units. There will be a reduction of units from the previous plan. Some of the units in the previous plan were one and one half story. Each unit will be from 1,000 to 1,200 square feet in size.

No other proponents or opponents wished to be heard. No written remonstrance has been received. The Mayor closed the public hearing.

<u>Motion:</u> Grobey-Gano to read **Ordinance 2206**, amending the Oak Hollow subdivision PUD, by title only. Carried unanimously. The ordinance was then read.

Councilman Young asked whether under this set back an outdoor fireplace could encroach upon the neighboring property. The Planning Director responded that the standard conditions of the zoning ordinance would apply and this would not be allowed.

The Planning Director noted that the number "47" in the findings and the ordinance needs to be changed to "46".

Roll Call: Aye 8. Gano, Grobey, Halstead, Probst, Proctor, Rementeria, Tucker, Young. Nay 0. The Mayor then declared the ordinance passed.

4. **Public hearing** regarding PUD-2-87 located at 3777 Portland Road - Applicant David Abbott.

Councilman Young declared ex parte contact and stated he would not abstain from discussion and action on this matter.

The Planning Director gave the Staff Report stating the request is to eliminate the PUD on the front 600 feet of the property. He gave the three conditions that have been attached to the ordinance.

Proponent: David Abbott, owner of the property, stated he is requesting an additional change regarding the house. The house sits in the middle of the site on a high knoll. His plan to move it to property he owns in the Newall Addition met with opposition. He then proposed moving it to the Northwest corner of the property. Dr. Abbott presented a petition from property owners on Libra Street objecting to this location. He stated that he would now ask that the condition that the house be preserved be removed from the ordinance and findings. He stated he would also like to ask for removal of the C-2 designation on the front of the property.

No other proponents or opponents wished to be heard. No other written opposition has been received.

The Planning Director reported the Planning Commission spent considerable time on this and the house was not a primary concern.

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Public hearing closed.

Councilman Gano asked if the use restriction would be a concern to a lender. The Planning Director responded that it probably would not.

Mayor Hall pointed out that Staff will probably request a cul-de-sac on Libra for fire access. Dr. Abbott will have to go to some expense and should have the opportunity to get it back.

Councilman Grobey noted that other uses could occur before development of the property. He recommended changing Sec. 3 relating to the house.

The Planning Director gave new wording to Sec. 3 as follows: The existing residential house, commonly referred to as the Newall House, may be removed.

Councilman Young asked if there were a one foot reserve on Libra Street. The Planning Director stated he did not believe there was. Councilman Young pointed out that if there is a reserve strip, Dr. Abbott will have to make an additional request to have it vacated.

Motion: Grobey-Tucker to read Ordinance No. 2207 by title only with Sec. 3 amended. Carried unanimously. The ordinance was then read by title only and the amended Sec. 3. Roll Call: Aye 8. Gano, Grobey, Halstead, Probst, Proctor, Rementeria, Tucker, Young. Nay 0. The Mayor then declared the ordinance passed.

RESOLUTIONS:

Motion: Gano-Proctor to adopt Resolution No. 87-1259 authorizing budget transfers. Carried unanimously.

ORDINANCES:

Motion: Gano-Rementeria to read Ordinance NO. 2208, by title only, establishing the Public Lands Capital Improvement Fund as a Special Fund. Carried unanimously. The ordinance was then read by title only. ROLL CALL: Aye 8. Gano, Grobey, Halstead, Probst, Proctor, Rementeria, Tucker, Young. Nay 0. The Mayor then declared the ordinance passed.

Motion: Gano-Halstead to read Ordinance No. 2209, by title only, on sewer fees to allow for systems development charge to take into account multi-unit dwellings. Carried unanimously. The ordinance was then read by title only. ROLL CALL: Aye 8. Gano, Grobey, Halstead, Probst, Proctor, Rementeria, Tucker, Young. Nay 0. The Mayor then declared the ordinance passed.

Motion: Gano-Halstead to hold the ordinance adopting the 1987-88 budget over to June 22, 1987. Carried unanimously.

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Motion: Gano-Rementeria to adjourn to June 9, 1987 for an Executive Meeting relating to personnel, in Council Chambers. Carried unanimously.

The City Attorney reported the Ordinance Committee will meet at the Library on June 11 at 7:00 p.m.

1986-87 has been a productive time in the cable industry, and I'd like to share some of our accomplishments with you.

Attached is a resolution which would authorize the City Manager, Pro Tem to contract with City/County Insurance Services for our workers compensation insurance. We went with this service last year. The program has been changed somewhat this year. However, Bill Thomas, our agent of record, assures us that this is the lowest possible premium available.

I will be in contact with the Risk Manager for this program (Alexis Risk Management) and will have some answers to questions for you. Attached is the premium quotation page which shows you exactly what the premiums are.

This policy covers both the City and the Hospital. There will be a breakdown on who pays what amount. We are left with the one problem of the deduction. If we take a \$25,000 deduction and claims arise, what will be the breakdown on who pays what costs between the City and the Hospital? We have included in the resolution that you delegate the authority to enter into that arrangement to the Finance Committee. I think this is the most reasonable way to handle it. This will involve some details which the full Council need not consider.

If you have any specific questions, I will be glad to attempt to address them. Our premiums are higher this year than last year, but the overall industry raised their premiums. This is the best that is available.

An interesting fact is our experience mod. Because of a few bad claims, our experience mod has risen. The experience mod is the figure that is used in multiplying the base premiums in order to arrive at the individual institution's premium. My understanding is in previous years (two or three years ago) we enjoyed an experience mod in the 60's. There are a number of ways to attempt to keep your experience mod low. Some companies go into fitness programs so employees will not have injuries. Remember that one of our claims that arose at the Hospital was due a strain during lifting by a nurse. If there is some interest among the employees, we can look into doing something along those lines which will have benefits both in workers compensation and helps with sick leave.

THE CITY COUNCIL SITTING AS CONTRACT REVIEW BOARD AND AS COUNCIL WAIVES COMPETITIVE BIDDING AND ACCEPTS THE LOW QUOTE PROPOSAL FOR THE PURCHASE OF WORKERS COMPENSATION INSURANCE COVERAGE.

WHEREAS, the City of Newberg is required by state law to provide workers compensation insurance coverage for its employees; and

WHEREAS, the City's current contract for such coverage expires on July 1, 1987 and such coverage must be provided on a continuing basis; and

WHEREAS, calling for competitive bids would extend the time for renewal of coverage beyond the July 1, 1987 deadline for obtaining such coverage; and

WHEREAS, proposals for coverage have been submitted by the City's agent from numerous carriers of workers compensation coverage in the State of Oregon; and

WHEREAS, because of these factors the requirements of Ordinance No. 1793, Section 5(E & F) are satisfied and it is in the best interests of the public, favoritism is not encouraged, competition will remain undiminished and the conditions of emergency exist to justify the waiving of competitive bidding requirements for workers compensation insurance coverage and justify the prompt execution of this contract.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Newberg, Oregon, as follows, to-wit:

- 1. Pursuant to Ordinance No. 1793, Section 5(e & F) the Council of the City of Newberg, sitting as Contract Review Board finds that because of the necessity for workers compensation coverage, the July 1, 1987 deadline for obtaining such coverage, the fact that competition quotations have been received for this coverage, the City declares that the public interests would best be served, favoritism not encouraged and competition not diminished, and that emergency conditions require the prompt execution of this contract.
- 2. The City Council sitting as Contract Review Board and as Council hereby waives competitive bidding and authorizes the City Manager, Pro Tem to contract with the agency which provided the most favorable quote for workers compensation insurance coverage, the City/County Insurance Services.
- 3. The City Council authorizes the Finance Committee of the City to enter into the most reasonable interdepartmental agreement between Newberg Community Hospital and the rest of the City as to the handling of the payment of premiums, deductions and other financial arrangements due to the fact that the insurance policy is one policy covering all of the City, including the Hospital, but the Hospital pays separately because they operate on a segregated budget system.

AN ORDINANCE DECLARING THE CITY'S ELECTION TO RECEIVE STATE REVENUES FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 1987-1988.

WHEREAS, the Oregon State Legislature in 1977 established a State Revenue Sharing Program for the distribution of certain State proceeds to cities in the State of Oregon with payments being made to eligible cities in August, November, January and May of each fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, the City of Newberg is eligible to receive these revenues in the 1987-1988 budget year and has received these revenues in the past, particularly, pursuant to Ordinance No. 2004, passed and approved April 7, 1980, Ordinance No. 2050, passed and approved April 13, 1981, Ordinance No. 2087, passed and approved June 7, 1982, Ordinance No. 2123, passed and approved June 20, 1983, Ordinance No. 2144, passed and approved June 18, 1984, Ordinance No. 2168, passed and approved June 24, 1985, and Ordinance No. 2181, passed and approved June 9, 1986.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF NEWBERG ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Island Annexation - Annexation of Sewer Plant

There was a discussion at the Ordinance/Legislative Committee meeting on June 11, 1987, concerning pending bills before the Legislature which would change the method by which cities proceed with annexation matters. The result of the potential legislation could have been to eliminate our right to annex islands and might have affected our ability to annex the sewer treatment plant.

Clay Moorhead is following this legislation on behalf of the City. I had a conversation with Mr. Moorhead on Wednesday, June 17, 1987, in which he related that there has been a number of negotiated moves. He further indicated that the legislation is in a state of flux. The state of flux would result in either the City not being able to move forward on these annexations under the old legislation because of emergency clauses or in the bills being killed. It is very likely that the result will be that the bills are killed.

The recommendation as of today is to put the island annexation on the things to do list to discuss with the new Manager. As all of ya'll know, the comprehensive plan contains a policy concerning island annexations. The policy calls for immediate annexation of such islands. Some islands that we have are the Wilhousen Brothers, Newall Addition and a few more. We have so many islands within the City that we are becoming known as the "Hawaii of Small Cities". This may be beneficial if we adopt tourism as a strategy, but in the planning circles it is not looked on favorably. As you can imagine, these island annexations will have certain repercussions both in a public relations sense and in a public works sense as some of the areas have problems with septic and water. The timing might be crucial. A discussion with the new City Manager concerning timing and repercussions would be in order.

The suggestion to annex the sewer plant seems to be a good suggestion and a matter that should be discussed with the City Manager to give him an opportunity to coordinate projects within the City Staff so as not to overburden the staff in any particular time period. This would be my suggestion. Of course, you are free to immediately call for notices to be sent out. I thought this might be a more orderly process to follow. We will watch the legislation closely.
