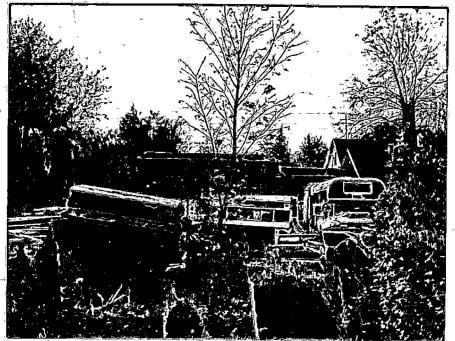












THOMPSON BEDROOM VIEW

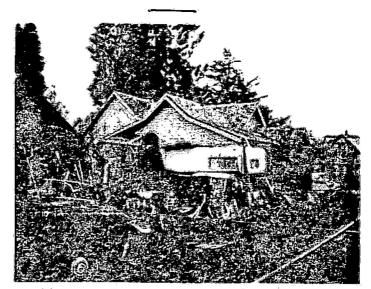

#### CONSENT CALENDAR:

Motion: Gano-Grobey to approve the Consent Calendar as follows:

- Approve minutes of September 3 and September 13 Council meetings.
- 2. Resolution thanking Angus MacPhee for his assistance with the sewage treatment plant.
- 3. Letter from Liquor Control Commission RE: Status of Eden Gate Restuarant.
- 4. Letter form Portland Limousine Service thanking City for assistance with High School limousine ride.

Motion carried unanimously by those present.

The City Attorney read aloud Resolution No.85-1166 thanking Angus MacPhee for his assistance with the sewage treatment plant.

#### APPOINTMENTS BY THE MAYOR:

Mayor Hall stated he had no appointments to make at this time.

#### REQUESTS FROM FLOOR AND COMMUINICATIONS:

There were no requests from the floor or communications that were not already on the agenda.

#### PUBLIC HEARING:

1. Public hearing on vacation of eastern 100 feet of the alley located between 8th and 9th streets, College and Meridian streets.

III-1

The Staff Report was given by the Planning Director. He directed the Council's attention to the material in the Council Packet. He stated the Planning Commission had reviewed the request and unanimously recommended denial of the request. The Planning Director explained the origin of platted alleys and the procedure to vacate a platted alley or street. The applicant, through the Council, is Pete Champagne, 815 S. Meridian Street. Petitions both for and against the vacation have been received. The petitioners against the vacation have given the following six reasons for denial:

- The alley vacation would not be in the long range best interest of the City and could compound the problem of the usage of the alleyway.
- The alleyways should be unobstructed with suitable provisons for access to each lot.
- 3. A portion of the alleyway should not be vacated, creating a deadend situation where vehicles might have to back out of the alley.
- 4. Access to the rear of their building lots would be permanently impaired.
- 5. The alleyway would be used more if it were improved.
- 6. There may be a future need to use the alley.

Oregon Revised Statutes state that if a vacation is granted which would affect the market value of abuting property, the city would be liable to pay damages to the affected property owner.

<u>Proponent:</u> Pete Champagne, 815 S. Meridian, stated there is extensive foot traffic in the alley, kids in gardens and vandalism. There is no access from the street on his end of the alley; there is a curb. A water meter and a gas line would be endangered if the alley were used.

<u>Proponent:</u> Joe Murphy, 805 E. Ninth, stated his property is adjacent to the Champagne's. There is no useful purpose to have the alley open. It has actually been closed all the time he has lived there. Mr. Burnside has control of 400 feet of the alley. Mr. Champagne wants it closed so that he can park a camper there. If the alley is opened, someone will have to redo the curb and there will be increased policing problems.

Opponent: George Burnside, 803 E. Ninth, stated six reasons have been given why the alley should be open. He stated he is in the process of building a carport with access from the alley. If the alley were opened and graveled, it would change the amount of traffic in the alley. He stated he would like to see something done about the curb with the people to share the cost.

<u>Rebuttal:</u> Joe Murphy stated the little gravel done has been by Mr. Burnside and people will now have a tendency to come down the alley. When word gets around that it is open, there will be more traffic. It would be simple to put up a 'Dead End' sign on College Street.

No others wished to speak and Mayor Hall closed the public hearing.

<u>Staff Recommendation:</u> The Planning Director stated the staff would recommend denial of the request because of ORS. The alley can remain as is, even though open, without improvement.

Carol Burnside asked who owns the entranceway to the alley. The Planning Director responded that the public is the owner.

The Council asked Staff whether the City has a policy on maintenance of alleys, used or unused; what do the standards require the City to do when they come to an alley on a street improvement; is the reason known why this curb was not cut; could the City erect a sign indicating this alley is not a through street and would that alleviate the problem? Staff responded that alleys are not maintained as a general rule unless already graveled, police using, commonly used, and we get a request. The street construction standards would require that the curb be cut and an approach made; it is unknown why this curb was not cut, it may have been because the alley is very narrow.

Councilman Tucker suggested the matter be tabled until Staff comes up with a policy on who maintains alleys, why the curb was not cut, signage, etc.

The City Attorney read that portion of DRS relating to the City's liability if the vacation is granted. He also stated the alternate in this matter would be for the property owner wishing the vaction to petition the City directly. The vacation could be granted with 2/3 of the property owners agreeing to the vacation.

<u>Motion:</u> Grobey-Poet to deny the alley vacation based on the findings and recommendation of Staff. Carried unanimously.

<u>Motion:</u> Poet-Tucker that the Ordinance and Public Works committies meet and review to make recommendations on policy on maintenance, etc. on alleys. Carried unanimously.

#### REPORTS FROM CITY MANAGER:

- 1. Report on status of application for grant funds under Federal Justice Assistance Act. Chief Bishop reported they received a grant in the amount of \$8,790. It was the fourth largest grant received in the tri-county area. The City Manager noted that the application from the Fire Department also placed well. This indicates good applications for grants are being written by these two departments.
- 2. Report on International City Manager's Association Board of Directors. The City Manager stated he has been asked to serve on the ICMA state board of directors. It will require attendence at five meetings during the year. He would like to have the Council's approval to accept this appointment.

<u>Motion:</u> Halstead-Grobey to allow the City Manager to accept the position on the state ICMA Board of Directors. Carried unanimously.

3. Report on County Communication Program. Chief Bishop stated that at his last report they were hoping to go to the voters in November.

Instead of three companies responding to the RFP as expected, only one responded. The proposal, from Motorola, was in the 3 million dollar area. Negotiation has reduced this down to 2.4 million. The Committee will now delay the levy election and attempt to get more RFP's and a reduction in cost.

- 4. Revolving Loan Funds from IRD. The City Manager stated a loan has been approved to Sub Terra in the amount of \$25,000. Bill Humphreys, a member of the review committee, stated the loan is well collateralized and will be used to purchase a rock borer. The company needs some help to get started and they have a good chance to succeed. There will be four new jobs developed over a reasonable period of time. Mayor Hall described Sub Terra's product as similar to a heat pump, except the heat is taken from the ground instead of the air.
- 5. Fire Hall Construction Report. Chief Christensen reported that some of the fire equipment has had to sit out during the winter. In cooperation with the Rural Fire District, an addition is being added to the firehall. The Rural District offered to buy a new tanker that is needed if the City would provide housing. A lot of the work on the addition is being done by volunteer of labor and materials. We have a budgeted item of \$35,000 for this, on which we are probably saving 10,000 to 15,000 thousand. The new tanker will probably be delivered in February or March, 1986. The construction is progressing and an open house will be held when it is completed.

#### REPORTS FROM YAMHILL COUNTY COMMISSIONER:

Commissioner Don Porter reported there will be a 10 million dollar road levy on the ballot in March of 1986. He asked for the support of Newberg and the north end of the County. Commissioner Porter reported he is a member of the advisory committee for the dispersal of lottary funds for economic development. He also noted that the County is involved in a revolving fund to bring growth and jobs to the County.

#### OLD BUSINESS:

Councilman Gano reported that he and Commissioner Porter are members of a study group for the Tualatin, Phase II Project. This would be a second lake, like Haag Lake west of Gaston. The Committee has been in existance for a number of years. Any project will be 15 to 20 years in the future. The City's water resource needs at that time are unknown, but it is important that Newberg be represented in the planning.

#### NEW BUSINESS:

- 1. <u>Motion:</u> Halstead-Poet to approve the Accounts Payable for September, 1986. Carried unanimously.
- 2. Report on canvas of votes of initiative petition to deactivate Urban Renewal Agency. The canvas of votes shows 2,397 Yes; 1,006 No to deactivate the urban renewal agency. The proposed ordinance becomes Ordinance No. 2172 of the City of Newberg.

Motion: Halstead-Grobey to accept the canvas of votes. Carried unanimously.

Mayor Hall excused all those present that were not interested in the next item on the agenda. He then called the meeting back to order.

3. Council discussion on Downtown Traffic/Market Study.

Mayor Hall surveyed the possible speakers and placed a limit of five minutes for each speaker.

Allyn Brown, 501 E. First Street, stated that as an owner of property in the downtown area, he would ask the council to continue the study. He also would ask the Council to use the traffic study as a step in down- town redevelopment. The Council should not consider the vote as a vote against redevelopment or tax increment financing. Use the traffic plan to tell where we are going, scale down the projects and ask for a vote of the people.

<u>Janet Ker</u>, Chamber of Commerce Manager, stated the Chamber will offer its resources to come up with a plan to revitalize downtown. She urged the Council to continue; don't stop now.

Sam Zanghi, President of Newberg Downtown Association, stated a vote of the people must be honored, but the downtown problems are still with us. Complete the market and traffic study now underway. It will be a foundation and place to start to solve the problems. He suggested the Council name a committee of Chamber of Commerce, NDA, and general citizens to get thoughts from all factions. The committee could review all options and advise the Council.

<u>Kathleen Sullivan</u>, 2300 E. Third, offered the point of view of just another citizen that did not understand how government and financing works. She stated she wants to not be another sprawling Beaverton or a bedroom community. Maybe there were flaws in the plan, but in the long run we will want something for a better Newberg.

LeRoy Benham, Rt. 3, a property owner in Newberg and former Chair of the redevelopment commission, stated a great deal of progress had been made over the past two and one-half years. The study underway will be of great value for plans in the future. The redevelopment plan will be implemented sometime in the future because it is needed. The establishment of the Newberg Downtown Association is a step forward. The Main Street program is in place and this is a step in the right direction. We have not lost everything, just some time.

<u>Dennis Hagen</u>, Rt. 2, Box 162, stated some people work as private businesses redeveloping downtowns with private money. He read a note from one private business offering joint venture redevelopment.

<u>Sam Whitney</u>, Director for the Newberg Chamber of Commerce, described the trip made to Seaside by a number of people from Newberg. There were no empty stores and the streets were clean. Their Chamber of Commerce does not have to solicit and has 98% membership. The money they spent was inconsequental. The time spent on Newberg redevelopment

so far is astronomical. Keep the market study going and get back on our feet.

Joe Brugato, 301 Donald Lane, stated the vote was 71% for deactivation. He stated he resented some of the comments made that people were confused and misinformed. The Council should get out and listen to people. He stated he disagrees about the Seaside information. Seaside is much different from Newberg. Main Street Program has only 35% of the downtown people supporting it. You need to go out and get 50% of the people supporting a plan before implementing a plan. Increment financing is dead in the state of Oregon. In 1987 there will probably be an initiative state wide to abolish increment financing state wide.

Mayor Hall asked Mr. Brugato if he would be willing to work on a committee on the traffic study if there is such a committee. Mr. Brugoto stated he was not prepared at this time to answer that question. There are plenty of people willing to get involved.

Councilman Poet asked Mr. Brugato whether he thought the traffic study should be continued. Mr. Brugato stated that a great deal of money has been spent already. He stated he would not want to go on record to approve or disapprove. Mr. Brugato said that he as an individual not speaking for any group of people, would probably say yes, continue the study, then take the issue to the people.

Councilman Gano stated that last Monday at a meeting Mr. Brugato had stated that he had a plan. He asked Mr. Brugato when he would reveal his plan. Mr. Brugato stated his plan would be similar to that given by Mr. Zanghi this evening. Watering the plan down; getting the businessmen downtown involved; having committees that are made up citizens of Newberg get involved; making a plan that has dollars and cents value; decide how you are going to implement the plan. Then have it go to the poeple for approval.

Jim Burres, 819 Sierra Vista, stated you have to establish your credibility before asking us to pick up the pieces. The Council should review the vote in detail. The vote did not match the sales tax vote. Of our residents, 16% or more commute to Portland to work and a lot of them never see downtown Newberg by choice. Badgering one individual to join a committee is in poor taste. We believe the traffic study is probably going to do us some good. You need to begin to believe in democracy and put major money issues before the voters. Urban renewal is dead. It was killed by a legal vote of the people. If you have something new or different, bring it up and let's talk about it.

Mayor Hall asked Mr. Burres what his plans for Newberg were now and whether there was a petition out now to get rid of tax increment financing state wide. Mr. Burrus stated there was no petition out now. Mr. Burres was asked whether he felt the traffic/market study contract should be completed. Mr. Burres replied that we have a moral obligation to Mr. Buttke to finish the contract for the traffic study.

Mikki Snell, stated she lives in Dundee and has a business in downtown Newberg. She agreed that tax increment financing is dead in Newberg,

but stated she felt the traffic study should be completed. She stated to Mr. Brugato that the plan was to do something for the community. He had taken that away and we are now asking for his help.

Jane Parisi-Moser, 109 N. Meridian, stated she did not feel it was a fair fight. This town is only as good as the people who work for it. If the people who work for it are going to be intimidated and shot down when they try to take a stand, then they will not want to work for it at all. People that want to be part of the democratic process will have to come and take part in the process. There were three years of opportunity when people did not come and speak. People that have knocked things down have the responsibility to build them up.

Martin McIntosh, 2504 Portland Road, stated we have a potential for greatness. That has been shown over the past few years. Maybe there is some misunderstanding and confusion, but there is enough support here that we can get to where we want to go.

Mayor Hall then asked the Council whether the traffic study should be continued.

The Council asked questions of the Staff on what the status was of the funding, how much of the study is completed, what the revenue will be from the outstanding loans, what will be the disposition of those funds.

Mayor Hall stated this was the first election in Oregon to do away with tax increment financing while projects were in progress. The County tax assessor has asked the Attorney General for an opinion of some of the questions that have been raised.

<u>Motion:</u> Gano-Halstead to continue the contract with Buttke and have representatives from NDA, the Chamber and opponents to the plan form a committee to review the traffic study and bring a recommendation back to the Council, with the committee to be no more than nine members.

After discussion of the motion by the Council, Councilman Gano withdrew the committee portion of the motion. Councilman Halstead concurred.

Vote on the original motion to continue the contract with Buttke carried unanimously.

<u>Motion:</u> Gano-Halstead that a committee of no more than nine people be formed to advise the Council on the traffic study, that it be formed by representatives from NDA, Chamber of Commerce and those people that opposed redevelopment.

The Council then discussed the motion in detail. Should just these three groups be represented, should the Council be represented on the committee, should the committee be the committee that has been working with Buttke, and should the committee be formed with the goal of continuety. Also discussed was the amount of time the committee would have to review and a present recommendation to the Council.

0

The City Manager noted that eventually it will go to a vote of the people for any funding. It would be best to form the committee from other than the Council and include people from the opposition. The City Council does not have the time to spend on the numerous meetings involved.

Mayor Hall noted there was a motion on the floor and called for a roll call vote. Roll Call: Aye 2. Gano, Grobey. Nay 5. Halstead, Poet, Proctor, Tucker, Young. Motion failed.

<u>Motion:</u> Poet-Grobey that the committee be composed of the Council with the Mayor acting as Chair and a voting member.

Motion Amendment: Young-Tucker to include a maximum of 12 volunteers on the committee to help us arrive at a plan that will be compatible to the community. Motion carried 4 aye; Grobey, Proctor, Tucker, Young. 3 Nay; Gano, Halstead, Poet.

Roll Call on the main motion as amended. Aye. Grobey, Proctor, Tucker, Young. Nay 3. Gano, Halstead, Poet. Motion carried.

Mayor Hall advised that any who wished to serve on the committee must have their names to the Recorder by October 11, 1985. The Recorder will date and time stamp the applications. Members of the committee will be notified after the Council meeting on October 21.

- 4. Report on League of Oregon Cities 60th annual conference. Nov. 9-12, 1985. The City Manager reminded the Council to return their registration information to the Recorder.
- 5. Report on Historic Inventory Project. Jane Altier distributed to the Council a sample of the 'Historic Resource Survey Form' used in conducting the inventory of historic properties and the draft of the recommendations that will be made to the Council. She stated there have been about 4,000 hours of volunteer work on the inventory.
- 6. Report on Main Street Program activities. The City Manager noted that some of the activities and events planned in the downtown area conflict with the City ordinances. He asked that the Council give their approval to allow variation from strict ordinance application to occur. Peggy Campbell, former Downtown Interim Manager, reported merchants are taking part in training on promotion and design with several attending a conference on parking.

#### REQUESTS AND PETITIONS FROM FLOOR:

There were no requests or petitions from the floor.

#### NEW BUSINESS:

Mayor Hall stated all presentors on the first agenda item were not yet present and the first item would be the last item under New Business.

D. Discussion of Newberg Tax Rate Decline. The City Manager stated he would like to explain further the information that was presented in the newspaper on the City's declining tax rate. The decline will be about \$2.24 per thousand from than last year's tax rate; or a 23% drop. Why? \$1.45 will no longer be needed because of the grant received for the new sewage treatment plant, some old bonds will be paid off, and a reserve account required for the library is a one-time item that will not be needed. Will the tax rate increase in the future? Probably not unless we go for another bond. The rate will probably continue to decline for three years. If there is growth in the community, it will decline further.

Mayor Hall and Councilmembers asked questions regarding the valuations in the City and their effect on the tax rate. The Manager responded that the valuation had increased from \$255 million to \$262 million. The new construction, Burgerville and McDonalds, will not be on the tax roll until 1986. Redevelopment will have no affect until in the future. The 23% drop in taxes this year was not due to the abolishment of redevelopment. Property will not be physically reassessed until 1989. Because Publishers Paper Company is only a small part within the

City, their assessment reduction will have little affect on the City tax rate.

C. Metro Sports League Discussion. The City Manager stated the OSAA has revised the league competition and has put Newberg, McMinnville, and Forest Grove in District 2 which is composed of much larger schools with students drawn from a much larger population base. The teams from the three schools will possibly have to play against larger and heavier players with the increased possibility of injury.

Jim Burres, local realtor and highschool sports supporter, explained the possibility of injury because of school size disparity. The reclassification has been appealed, but OSAA has refused to make a decision. He asked that the Council take a position on the matter in support of the school district against the classification. OSAA stated their reason for the reclassification was a concern about the time the students would be absent from school for the longer distances required by the previous classification.

<u>Motion:</u> Grobey-Young to draft a letter to OSAA in support of the position of the School Board. Carried unanimously by those present.

- B. Presentation of Newberg Downtown Association (Main Street) Programs for 1985-1986. The City Manager advised the Council to skip this item as Carol Berkley could not be here to make the presentation.
- A. Presentation of Information on Regional Automated Library Service. The City Manager reported the Council has allocated \$7,500 each year for the past two years for computerization of library services. With the computerization, the library will not have to use long-distance phone calls to locate books in other libraries.

The Library Director introduced Neil Hunter, Regional Administrator of the cooperative of 17 libraries, located in Marion, Polk, and Yamhill counties. Mr. Hunter described the services now provided by the Chemeketa Cooperative Regional Library Service and a history of the Cooperative.

Mr. Hunter introduced Joanne Aebischer from the Salem library. She described the information that can be gained by use of a computer linking the libraries. The Salem and Chemeketa Community College libraries will be linked initially. The smaller libraries will then be brought into the system. Patrons will no longer have to look up books in the card catalog and will be able to locate a wanted book if it is anywhere in the system. It is hoped the Newberg library will be linked by one year from December.

The Library Director then described some of the other benefits of the system. There will be no staff cuts because we anticipate higher usage of the library with the new expansion. The computer will speed up service, control collections and identify abusers of library services.

The City Manager asked the Library Director to describe the staffing at the library. She responded there are two full-time persons and the equivalency of five positions in part-time employees. Volunteers are very important, contributing over 1,500 hours last year. The initial cost of the computerization will be about \$15,000 for quipment with a little over \$200 per month thereafter.

#### OLD BUSINESS:

A. Final Appointment of Traffic/Market Study Committee.

Motion: Young-Gano to reconsider motion made at the previous (October 7) Council meeting establishing a committee of 12 volunteers and 9 Councilmembers. Carried unanimously.

<u>Motion:</u> Halstead-Probst to accept the ll volunteers as the Committee. Carried unanimously.

Motion: Poet-Young that the Mayor be allowed to appoint one more member to the Committee.

Councilman Poet stated that a committee of 12 would allow the Committee to have a Chairman and still have ll to act. Councilman Young noted that the City Manager has been able to get the time extended on the traffic/market study contract allowing more time for the Committee to review before making a recommendation to the Council.

MOtion to Amend the Motion: Gano-Young that the member appointed by the Mayor be Councilman Harold Grobey.

The Council then discussed the advantages and disadvantages of having a Councilmember on the Committee.

Vote on the motion to amend carried. One nay, Halstead.

Vote on the amended motion carried. Two nay, Halstead and Proctor.

#### Other Business:

The Fire Chief reported on the progress of the addition to the Fire Hall. The addition, although incomplete, will be in use for the Annual Turkey Carnival on November 15-16. He noted that the volunteers are also very important the the Fire Department with over 9,000 hours contributed last year.

Mayor Hall described the effects the Garcia Decision would have on the City. This court decision would require the City to pay wages and even overtime to volunteers. Its impact would be very heavy on the Fire and Police departments. Congress is on the verge of excluding local governments from these requirements.

Members of the audience asked about the siren schedule and the date of the extension of Villa Road. Staff members responded to each question. One member of the audience asked what could be done about raising a sign which blocks the view of traffic at Hwy. 219 and Second Street.

Meeting adjourned at 8:55 p.m.

in order to induce Bank to issue it credit cards and extend credit to it, agrees with Bank as follows:

- 1. REQUEST FOR CARDS—Company will from time to time request in writing that Bank issue Visa cards ("Visa card" or "card") to and in the name of Company. Each Visa card issued at Company's request will bear the Company's name, either alone or together with the initials of the individual who Company authorizes to use the Visa card, and will represent an account of the Company only.
- 2. LIMITED BUSINESS USE ONLY—Company is responsible for seeing that Company Visa cards will be used only to pay for normal business expenses for transportation, meals, lodgings and entertainment, and will not be used to obtain cash advances. However, Company will repay any credit extended on the basis of the Company Visa accounts, including but not limited to cash advances.
- 3. TERMS DIFFERENT FROM CONSUMER VISA ACCOUNTS—

The terms of the Bank's usual application, billing statements, and advertising pertain to consumer use of the Visa account, but Company transactions are for business purposes. Therefore, each Company Visa account, whether issued in the past or in the future, and the rights and responsibilities of Bank and Company with respect to the card and the account it represents shall be governed by this Company Visa Card Agreement, and shall not be affected by the terms of the billing statement or other Visa agreements or advertisements which relate to consumer use of Visa cards.

4. DESIGNATION OF AUTHORIZED USERS—Only employees and officers or partners of the Company are to be given a Visa card. When the Company requests Company Visa cards, it will list the individuals by name who are to be authorized to use the cards requested. Upon receiving the cards, the Company will authorize such individuals to use the Company Visa card by delivering a card to each one. Company is responsible for ensuring that each authorized individual signs the card in the presence of a Company officer at the time the individual receives the Visa card.

Bank and any Visa merchant or bank may rely upon any named individual's possession of the Company card, signed by the individual, as its sole evidence of the user's authorization, and shall have no duty to question the purpose or nature of the use by such individual.

5. TERMINATING EMPLOYEES' AUTHORIZATION—The Company shall be liable for charges made on the Company Visa account, by an individual to whom Company gave the card before Bank has received from Company either (1) the Visa card which was signed by the individual who was the authorized user, or (2) notice that the individual who signed it is no longer an authorized user of the Visa card. Until receipt of the card or

on the individual's continuing apparent authority to use the Company card.

- 6. CREDIT LIMIT-CHARGE FOR EXCEEDING THE CREDIT LIMIT—Company will be responsible for seeing that the aggregate charges made on the Company Visa cards do not exceed the credit limit or limits established for the Company by Bank. Notwithstanding the terms of the billing statement and advertising, which relate to consumer use of the Visa card or extended payment plans, the Company hereby promises to pay for all purchases in full within 25 days of the date of the statement on which they first appear and to pay for all cash advances upon demand, or if no demand is made, within 25 days of the date of the statement on which they first appear. If the entire balance is not paid when due, the company accounts shall be delinquent, and the Bank may institute appropriate collection measures. The Bank may apply payments and credits to the amounts owed on the account in any order that the Bank establishes.
- 8. FINANCE CHARGE AND LATE CHARGES ON DELINQUENT PAYMENTS—All cash advances shall bear a finance charge from the date of the advance at the rate of 21.00% per annum. All purchases shall bear a finance charge from the date the purchase is posted to the account at the rate of 21.00% per annum; however, finance charge will not be imposed on purchases if payments and credits sufficient to pay the entire account balance are received within 25 days of the closing date of billing cycle shown on the face of billing statements. In addition, for payments late 15 days or more. Company shall pay Bank a late charge of 5 percent per month of the balance past due, with a \$5 maximum, and shall also pay all expenses of collection incurred by Bank, including reasonable attorneys' fees in any litigation or on appeal. 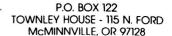

As you know, the City staff attempts to work with individuals in the community or entire neighborhoods when there appears to be a violation of a state or local law. In the case of Mr. Molineux, the Building Official has communicated with Mr. Molineux about his property over the past six months to a year. I have asked the Building Official not to take any action against Mr. Molineux in hopes that the neighbors contacting Mr. Molineux would have some positive effect on the situation.

Earlier this year, the neighbors of Mr. Molineux asked the City to attend a neighborhood meeting. At that meeting, the City Attorney, Building Official, City Planner and City Manager were present. I stressed the fact to the neighbors that a situation such as this was best handled, if possible, by the neighbors themselves. The neighbors have tried to talk to Mr. Molineux about cleaning up the property. The neighbors have pointed out that they are just as concerned about some of the safety hazards that exist as they are about the looks of the property.

I once again asked the Building Official not to take action even though I was told by the neighbors that their efforts proved to be fruitless. It was my hope that Mr. Molineux would at least curtail the accumulation of his "inventory" for the sake of his neighbors' requests.

Given the fact that the neighbors have asked the City to enforce health and safety ordinances, I would suggest that we turn the matter over to the Building Official, City Planner and City Attorney for the proper abatement procedures. At this point, knowing that there are hazards and having the request of the neighbors on file, it behooves the City to move ahead to protect the community.

Lights On For Peace

Next month, at their Geneva summit, President Reagan and General Secretary Gorbachev share a tremendous opportunity to reduce the threat of nuclear war by reaching an agreement on the framework of an arms control treaty. Into these meetings, they carry the single, unifying hope of people around the world that we all will be allowed to live our lives at peace.

As the summit approaches, we have a chance to take a simple, eloquent step that demonstrates this hope. Following the leadership of the National Council of Churches, the World Council of Churches and the United States Catholic Conference, I am introducing in Congress, along with Senators Mark Hatfield and Paul Simon and Congressman Silvio Conte a resolution calling upon Americans to join together by lighting porchlights, candles, and other lights on November 19th and 20th, 1985 from dusk until dawn. This nationwide effort will demonstrate our yearning for world peace and for a summit that genuinely produces greater understanding and cooperation between the U.S. and the U.S.S.R.

I'm writing to you today because with your help, this undertaking can indeed symbolize the hopes and expectations of the entire nation. Specifically, I urge you to (1) issue a local version of the attached resolution in the form of a mayoral proclamation or, as an alternative, submit it for approval by your city council; (2) promote and publicize this project throughout your community; and (3) take the lead in your community by lighting your own porchlight during the two nights of the summit.

Since time is short, I urge you to contact Stephen Anderson in my Portland, Oregon office (by mail at 1716 Federal Building, 1220 S.W. Third, Portland, Oregon 97204 or by phone at 503-221-2901) to keep me informed of your progress. I greatly appreciate your support. Your cooperation in bringing this drive to the attention of the people of your city will be a significant contribution.

## RESOLUTION NO.

A RESOLUTION INVITING CITIZENS TO LIGHT PORCHLIGHTS, CANDLES OR OTHER LIGHTS FROM DUSK TO DAWN ON NOVEMBER 19 AND 20, 1985 TO SHOW OUR LIGHTS ARE ON FOR PEACE IN NEWBERG, OREGON.

WHEREAS, the United States and the Soviet Union among all nations lead in the development and accumulation of weapons with the ability to devastate and possibly end human life on Earth; and

WHEREAS, the increased speed and accuracy of nuclear weapons on both sides greatly increase the danger that nuclear war will occur; and

WHEREAS, scientific evidence suggests that the detonation of even a small number of nuclear weapons already in existence would result in dramatic climatic changes which likely would end human life; and

WHEREAS, President of the United States Ronald Reagan and General Secretary of the Soviet Union Mikhail Gorbachev share responsibility for the avoidance of nuclear war, the peaceful resolution of global conflict and the instigation of joint cooperation projects; and

WHEREAS, leaders of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the USA, the World Council of Churches and the United States Catholic Conference have called upon citizens everywhere to light porchlights, candles and other lights on November 19 and 20, 1985 from dusk to dawn to openly display their desire for world peace.

NOW, THEREFORE IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Newberg, Oregon that the City Council invites all citizens to light porchlights, candles or other lights from dusk to dawn on November 19 and 20, 1985 while President Reagan and General Secretary Gorbachev meet in summit in order to openly express their deepest hope that President Reagan and General Secretary Gorbachev will heed the desire of people around the world to work, raise children, build communities and pursue a quality of life free from the threat of war -- by reaching an understanding on an arms control agreement which significantly cuts nuclear stockpiles and makes strides toward halting the arms race between the United States and the Soviet Union.

SUBJECT: Public Hearing on sale of Flightways Property

The City Attorney has arranged for a publication of notice of this sale in the Newberg Graphic. The publication was in the October 16 issue, October 23 issue and October 30 issue. Attached to this memo is a copy of that notice. Also attached is a copy of the abbreviated hearing procedure and a copy of the draft resolution approving the sale.

The purpose of the hearing tonight is to have the City Council publicly consider the sale of the property to Mr. Alexander on the terms described. Mr. Alexander should act as the proponent of the sale during the hearing and obviously, any opponents of the sale would have an opportunity to make their statements at the same public hearing.

During the course of the hearing, the following procedures should occur:

- 1. The abbreviated hearing procedure should be followed.
- 2. The City should disclose all the terms of the sale as set forth in the notice. In this particular incidence, the terms are simple. This will be a cash sale to Mr. Alexander.
- 3. The appraisal amount and the appraisal itself should be disclosed. It is adequate to indicate what the appraisal amount is and also to indicate that a copy of the appraisal is available for anyone's inspection.
- 4. The City Council should be advised that there is no public need or use for the property.
- 5. At the outset of the hearing, the property should be located on a map for clarification purposes.
- 6. The reasons for the City Council considering this sale should be enumerated, i.e. it will result in a favorable financial outcome for the City and promote development in an industrial park in the City. Both these items should be explained fully and the fact that we will be receiving all of the money up front and will be able to earn additional monies on interest that we would not otherwise have been able to accumulate.
- 7. If the City Council, at the end of the hearing, decides that it should sell the property, they can pass the resolution submitted with these materials and after they pass it, the City Manager and Mr. Alexander can sign the earnest money receipt.

8. If the City Council, for whatever reasons, chooses not to sell Mr. Alexander the property under the terms set forth in the notice you may simply indicate that you do not desire to sell at this particular time and we will need to have a new hearing on any other proposed sale, changes in terms, etc. If someone appears and offers a higher price, we will need to set up another public hearing to consider that offer or consider an alternative bidding process.

The City Attorney has recommended the above procedure and has emphasized that the procedure that we are using is the same procedure that is set out in state statute (ORS 221.725) which is the process whereby a City may dispose of city-owned real property. The competitive bidding process is normally utilized when the City conducts a foreclosure sale of property it has obtained for non-payment of assessments.
