

A REGULAR MEETING OF THE NEWBERG CITY COUNCIL

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Elvern Hall.

Motion: Halstead-Rementeria to approve the Consent Calendar which contained the following four items:

- 1. Approve Minutes of December 5, 1983 Council Meeting.
- 2. Old Fashioned Festival Assistance Request.
- 3. Approval of Long-range Fiscal Projections.
- 4. Report on Library Overdue Policy.

Councilman Tucker asked the Librarian whether the new overdue policy was cost effective. The Librarian stated that it was not a matter that could be assessed presently, but it was better to have a policy in place that does give control. She added that they are using the regular staff and volunteer help.

Vote on the motion to approve the Consent Calendar carried unanimously.

Mayor Hall then introduced the new Police Chief, David Bishop, administered the oath of office and presented him with the badge of the Chief of Police.

Appointments by the Mayor:

On the matter of appointments to the Review Board, the City Manager stated that a contractor can appeal a staff decision. The Fire Chief stated that the appeal under consideration is on a parapet on a nearby building. The State Fire Marshal's Office has stated they doubted if it was a matter that could be appealed locally, but must be done through the State, either the Department of Commerce or the State Fire Marshal. Councilman Gano asked the amount of the filing fee and whether it would be refunded if the City does not hear the appeal. The City Manager stated that a refund would be recommended in that case and he also recommended that the review board be appointed and that they meet.

The Mayor then appointed to the Review Board the following: Hal Roth, Beaverton Fire Inspector; James Kenworthy, Tualatin Rural Fire Protection District; and Len McKibben, Engineer from Salem.

Mayor Hall reappointed to the Planning Commission the following: Joe Young, Roger Veatch, and Jane Parisi-Mosher.

Motion: Gano-McIntosh to accept the appointments made by the Mayor. Carried with two nays, Tucker, Halstead.

Mayor Hall then presented his State of the City Address. He stated that at the beginning of 1983, the year began with a goal setting seminar that produced 43 objectives for the departments of City Hall. By the end of the year, already half of the goals have been reached, and the balance will be completed in the future months. Past objectives developed by the community to the Mayor's Task Force include Revitalization of the Downtown Area, a new sewer plant, resolving the traffic problem and expansion of the Library. Newberg Centennial Redevelopment Commission began officially on January 1, 1983. The sewer treatment plant issue is organized and construction is to begin within the next two years. The traffic problem is not an easy one to solve, but some progress is being made. The State Department of Transportation is listening to the City now and the Villa Road Extension has been included in the six year project for 1985. The Library Expansion Bond Issue was voted on two months ago and the support from the community was significant. Plans are already underway to sell bonds to prepare for construction. Future plans of the City are to continue the projects begun, continue our sound planning process, and make every effort to keep our community's identity and attractiveness.

Recognition of Police Officer Rick Dutton. The City Manager reported there was a fire in a trailer in a mobile trailer park. Officer Dutton heard noises from within the trailer and went in and undoubtably saved the life of the woman that was in the trailer. The Council should recognize Officer Dutton and a further award will be presented to Officer Dutton at the Employees' Award Dinner on January 20, 1984.

Jean Nellis, of Farm Gro Supply, stated she would like to speak and commend the entire Police Department. She stated they have had three breakins and two times out of the three, the Police Department has caught the burglars. She added that they had also had a fire and the Police Department was right on the job.

Public Hearing:

Public hearing on appeal of decision of the Planning Commission to approve a conditional use permit authorizing mobile vaccination clinic (Pet Prevent-a-Care). The appeal is filed by three local veterinarians as follows: R. D. Kimball, D. S. Shubin, and R. K. Holveck.

The appeal procedure was explained to the Council by the City Attorney and the action that the Council may take was outlined. He referred the Council to the Planning Commission minutes and the findings and conditions from the Planning Commission decision. A complete set of materials on the matter as heard before the Planning Commission has been provided to the Council. The Council would need to find a divergence from land use planning criteria in the Planning Commission's record.

Councilman Gano asked whether he could make a decision on any other than land use. The City Attorney responded that the Council must either uphold or deny the Planning Commission action and must find that the Planning Commission made an error.

There were no objections from those present to the Council hearing the matter, no member of the Council asked to abstain from hearing the matter and the Mayor asked that the speakers on the matter condense their comments as the full record is before the Council.

Proponent: Sharon Roberts, General Manager, Pet Prevent-A-Care, Inc., 10010 S.W. Beaverton Hillsdale Highway, Beaverton, Oregon, Miss Roberts stated that Pet Prevent-A-Care is operating in over 450 cities in five different states. She stated that the matter is not a planning issue. PPC has held four clinics in the past in Newberg under a peddlers permit.

It became a land use matter because of pressure from local veterinarians. Their main objection to PPC is that it is not available for emergency care. PPC does recommend follow-up care at local veterinarians. PPC does have overhead costs, the same as any other business.

Opponents:

Jean Nellis, Farm Gro Supply, stated that the argument and concern is that PCC calls themselves a temporary business. Four times a year is not temporary. The business does have an impact upon the community. The community is encouraged to rely on a transient business with a permanent style that does not benefit local economy. The local veterinarians are here all the time and support the city all the time. The concern is the kind of business and style of business. A business should contribute more than \$10.00 four times a year.

Richard Kimball, DVM, Rt. 2, Box 326A, Newberg, Dr. Kimball stated that the City should be concerned not only with the people with the mobile vaccination clinic, but also with other businesses of a similar, temporary nature. There is plenty of space in Newberg to set up permanent businesses. Dr. Kimball referred to the Planning Commission minutes and Dr. Roberts motion which failed that made the observation that granting a conditional use permit sets a precedent for use of temporary structures on a permanent basis and tends to bypass the purposes of the zoning ordinance.

Mike Douglas, pharmacist, 203 Villa Road, Newberg. Mr. Douglas stated that there is a glut of professional people today. This glut encourages mobile and temporary businesses. Any business should make a permanent commitment to any community in which they plan to operate.

Richard Benham, 304 Foothills Drive, Newberg. Mr. Benham stated he is concerned about the vacant business buildings in Newberg. He is concerned about the whole economical structure in Newberg. The local businesses deserve and require support. There is a new wave of doing business out of a van. Approving this type of business sets a dangerous precedent which threatens the economy and the community. This type of business can operate in large cities where the impact is hardly felt, but it can be devastating to smaller communities.

Robert Holveck, DVM, Rt. 1, Box 133, Newberg. Dr. Holveck stated that he agreed with all the other opponents statements. He stated that for the past

ten years the local veterinarians have held low-cost vaccination clinics and have held rabies clinics. Also, until recently the veterinarians have not been allowed to advertise their services, but this is not changing.

Proponent Rebuttal:

Miss Roberts stated that PPC has gone through the City Planner, City Attorney, and the Planning Commission. They do not feel that their business is a temporary business. They will come back to Newberg two times a year. They are not trying to bypass any ordinances and have agreed to the conditions placed on them by the Planning Commission.

Opponent Rebuttal:

Dr. Kimball pointed out that the vote of the Planning Commission was a tie vote the first time and five to three on the last time. This is certainly not a unanimous decision of the Planning Commission to grant a conditional use permit.

Staff Recommendation:

The City Manager, in the absence of the Planning Director, gave the staff report as outlined in the Planning Director's memorandum dated December 21, 1983 to the City Manager. The Council can approve, deny or modify the Planning Commission decision, but must base the decision on the three conditional use permit criteria. In the staff report to the Planning Commission dated October 20, 1983, staff noted that the operation of a mobile vaccination clinic would substantially conform to the criteria for a conditional use permit. The staff, at that time, also recommended four conditions which were adopted in the Planning Commission findings.

The City Manager stated that his recommendation would be to abide by the Planning Commission approval and to stay within the criteria, but that the Council should listen to the opponents. There will be more of these kind of businesses wishing to operate in Newberg. The local veterinarians have been cooperating with the City in a low-cost spaying program for low-income and elderly people. He stated he would further recommend that the Council should consider changing the ordinances covering peddlers as it is outdated now that the community has grown.

The City Attorney noted that this is a temporary/permanent use that is not dealt with in any of the ordinances. Only the conditional use criteria can be used at present. It does not meet the criteria of the peddlers ordinance. A veterinary clinic is a permitted outright use in the zoning where this clinic will be located. A conditional use permit is required because of the impact on existing parking and other permitted uses within that zone. The Council needs to review the ordinances.

Motion: Halstead-Rementeria to close the public hearing. Carried unanimously. The public hearing was then closed.

Motion: Halstead-McIntosh that Pet Prevent-A-Care, Inc. meets the criteria of the conditional use and that the Council must uphold the Planning Commission decision.

The Council then discussed an amendment to the original motion which would

change the time that the conditional use permit would be in effect.

Motion: Gano-Tucker to amend the main motion that the conditional use be in effect for two months, from November 17, 1983. Aye - 4, Gano, Halstead, Probst, Tucker; Nay - 4, DeMay, McIntosh, Poet, Rementeria. The Mayor voted nay and the amendment failed.

Motion to amend the main motion: Rementeria-Gano that the conditional use be in effect for six months from January 3, 1984 with no option for renewal and to delete condition number 5 of the Planning Commission which gave an additional two year extension. Motion to amend the main motion carried with one nay, Poet.

Vote on the original motion as amended: Aye - 7; Nay 1 - Poet.

Motion: Halstead-Gano that the City staff take immediate action on amendments for revision of the ordinances which would control transient/temporary business. Carried unanimously.

City Manager's Report:

The City Manager reported that the annual Employee Awards Dinner would be held on January 20, 1984. A committee is needed to select a recepient of the George Layman Award. The Mayor then appointed the City Manager, Councilman Gano and himself as the George Layman Award Committee. The City Manager also called the Council's attention to the retirement dinner for Police Chief Hawkins which will be held on January 7, 1984.

The City Manager reported that Greg DiLoreto, City Engineer, is a member of the Local Officials Advisory Committee and asked Mr. DiLoreto to report on the activities of that Committee. Mr. DiLoreto stated that the Committee is a state-wide committee that is able to transmit the concerns of the Council to the State. As a member of the Committee, he has testified before the Legislature on the conditions of the streets in cities of Oregon. Several members of the Council stated concerns that they have to Mr. DiLoreto to take to the Local Officials Advisory Committee.

The City Manager reported on the Six Year Highway Program. The City has for many years been trying to get Villa Road put through to Highway 240. Traffic entering Highway 99W from 240 have a very dangerous intersection. The City has received word that the project is in the Six Year Program and scheduled for the 1985 fiscal year under the Hazard Elimination Category. The City needs to buy one more piece of property. Action will proceed on property purchase as soon as drawings are received from the State to specify the exact property needs.

Old Business:

Recommendation of Public Works Committee regarding transfer station. The City Manager reported that the Public Works Committee has approved and adopted the report of the Newberg/Dundee Disposal Alternatives Committee and has recommended it to the Council.

Motion: Tucker-Halstead to accept the report of the Newberg/Dundee Disposal Alternatives Committee.

Russ Petral, Salem, Engineer representing Angus McPhee, stated that the Newberg/Dundee Disposal Alternatives Committee requested proposals for a transfer station and received two proposals. They recommended the proposal submitted by McPhee. Is it the Council's intent to use the criteria proposed by McPhee and permit anyone else to use that criteria? Councilman Gano responded that the City has no way to legally prevent others from using the criteria. Mr. Petral asked the Council to instruct the staff to investigate legal means to control the flow of solid waste. Councilman Rementeria pointed out that the City cannot require Newberg Garbage Service to use a facility built by any other party.

Robin Hamblet, County Commissioner, stated that the County will not institute a flow control on solid wastes.

Marvin Schneider, Newberg Garbage Service, stated that they are just looking for the most economical way to dispose of garbage. He added that they are now starting to haul part of the material they collect to River Bend as they can haul it to River Bend cheaper than to the Newberg Landfill. Newberg Garbage Service needs the ability to go to the cheapest means of disposal for the benefit of all of the customers.

Roll Call vote on the motion of Tucker-Halstead to accept the report of the Newberg/Dundee Disposal Alternatives Committee. Aye - 7, DeMay, Gano, Halstead, McIntosh, Poet, Probst, Tucker; Nay - 1, Rementeria. The motion was declared passed.

New Business:

Motion: Gano-Rementeria to approve the December Accounts Payable. Carried unanimously.

Motion: Gano-Probst to adopt Resolution No. 84-1017, authorizing modification of the agreement for professional services for additions to and rennovation of Newberg Carnegie Library. Carried unanimously.

Motion: Gano-Poet to adopt Resolution No. 84-1018, authorizing an additional method of investment of City funds, repurchase agreements. Carried unanimously.

The City Attorney read a resolution prepared concerning the Pet Prevent-A-Care conditional use. Motion: Poet-Rementeria to adopt Resolution No. 84-1019, granting a conditional use permit to Pet Prevent-A-Care. Carried unanimously.

Motion: Gano-DeMay to adopt Resolution No. 84-1020, transfer of funds from the General Fund Contingency Account to personal service accounts. Carried unanimously.

Ordinances:

Motion: Rementeria-Probst to read by title only Ordinance No. 2138 to change the fee for nonpayment of sewer charges. Carried unanimously. The ordinance was then read. Roll Call: Aye - 8, DeMay, Gano, Halstead, McIntosh, Poet, Probst, Rementeria, Tucker; Nay - 0. The Mayor then declared the ordinance passed.

Motion: Gano-Poet to adjourn. Carried unanimously.

FACTS ABOUT PEDESTRIANS

- 1. The first recorded traffic fatality in the United States occurred in 1899 in New York City the victim was a pedestrian.
- 2. Since 1937, when the AAA was developing the Pedestrian Protection Program, pedestrian fatalities have dropped from 15,500 to 8,700 in 1982. This represents a reduction of 44 percent. During this same period, motor vehicle registration increased 455 percent (30 to 166.5 million); population grew by 80 percent (128 to 231 million); motor vehicle travel jumped 479 percent (271 billion to 1,570 billion miles of travel); and non-pedestrian fatalities have increased 56 percent (24,143 to 37,600).
- 3. It is estimated that the economic loss resulting from pedestrian accidents is over 200 million dollars annually.
- 4. Of the adult pedestrians killed in accidents nearly one fourth had been drinking.
- 5. More than one half of all pedestrian traffic fatalities occur during hours of darkness, although pedestrian and vehicle traffic is significantly less at night.
- 6. The majority of pedestrians killed in traffic violated a traffic law or committed an obviously unsafe act.
- 7. Ninety-three percent of all children injured enroute to or from school were struck at locations where no type of special school crossing protection such as Safety Patrols, Adult Guards, or Police Officers were in use.
- 8. The total number of pedestrian deaths during 1982 was 8,700. This represents a 3 percent decrease over the 1982 figure. Seventy-two percent of all pedestrian deaths occur in urban areas, while only 29 percent of all motor vehicle deaths occur in urban areas.
- 9. Pedestrians below the age of 15 and those over 64 account for 40 percent of all pedestrian fatalities. 20 percent of all pedestrians killed are under 15, and approximately 41 percent of all pedestrians injured are under 15. Older adults account for approximately 21 percent of all pedestrians killed, and over 8 percent of all pedestrians injured.
- Since 1928, when national statistics first became available, nearly one half million pedestrians have died in traffic accidents.
- 11. The pedestrian death toll exceeds combined air, marine and rail transport deaths by three times.
- 12. Pedestrian fatalities account for 16 percent of all highway fatalities and 4 percent of all traffic injuries.
- 13. Although more than twice as many pedestrians are killed in urban than rural areas, the chance of death compared with injury is much higher in rural areas. Lower vehicle speeds, better and more extensive police traffic enforcement and superior emergency medical services account for the better chance of survival in urban areas.

- 14. The national pedestrian death rate in 1982 was 3.1 per 100,000 population. The national injury rate was 51 per 100,000 population. These rates vary in different parts of the country, as they are affected by many factors, including the number and size of cities and their relative population densities; per capita vehicle ownership; deviation of population age groups from the national proportions of accident-prone age groups (senior citizens, for example); ethnic compositions; and importantly, the effectiveness of pedestrian safety programs.
- 15. Preschool children from two to six years of age are estimated to be involved in from 18 to 25 percent of all pedestrian accidents -- yet this age group represents only about 6 percent of the total population. More than two out of three preschool pedestrian accident victims are male.
- 16. It is estimated that over 300 children are killed playing in their own driveways each year.
- 17. The national pedestrian death rate per 100,000 population decreased substantially from 4.4 in 1972 to 3.1 in 1982. During that same period the national pedestrian injury rate per 100,000 population fell from 81 to 51.

SUBJECT: PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT FOR PHASE II OF THE NEW SEWER

TREATMENT PLANT

In October of 1983 the Council approved Resolution 83-1000 authorizing the City Manager to contract with Kramer, Chin & Mayo for professional services for the new sewer treatment plant. The first phase of the engineering work was authorized on November 21, 1983 in the amount of \$178,894. The first phase of the engineering services dealt predominantly with the rate increases and the planning for the new sewer plant.

Kramer, Chin & Mayo is now ready to launch into the next phase, the design. In order to meet the projected schedule, the design phase would be starting in February, and would be completed around the middle of May. The proposed engineering costs for this phase is \$504,613. The scope of work identified for this amount of money involves the complete design of the new sewage treatment plant, conversion of the existing plant into a flow equalization facility and lift station, design of over 10,000 lineal feet of main trunk line sewer pipe and outfall line, and upgrading the Hess Creek pump station to handle 16 mgd of flow.

In the current budget, a contingency line item of \$1,000,000 was set up for sewer plant improvements during this fiscal year. In addition to this amount there were several other line items identified for engineering services and capital improvements to deal with continuing capacity at the existing plant. There is also a line item for land purchase.

In preparation of the financial management plan, I identified spending \$500,000 of the contingency reserve on engineering services, and \$500,000 towards the construction of the new plant. This identification of costs was done prior to bringing KCM on board, and prior to having an idea of the project cost.

It appears that authorizing Phase II of KCM's contract will commit approximately \$680,000 to be expended from the current budget. For the remaining amount I have gone back through my budget and identified items which can be moved to professional services to cover this phase of the design. Below is a disting of the line items and dollar amounts that can be transferred to professional services.

It appears that I will need about another \$15,000 from the contingency reserve to cover the Phase II contract. I will need to work with the Finance Director to prepare the contingency transfer to cover this contract.

In addition to the engineering costs, we are looking at what is available for land purchase. In line item 6-490.625 I have budgeted, for the current fiscal year, \$25,000 for a down payment on land purchase, with the financial management plan projecting a \$30,000 annual payment against the land for a total purchase price of approximately \$250,000.

The City Attorney and I have reviewed Resolution No. 83-1000, passed by the Council on October 3, 1983 which authorizes the City Manager to enter into a contract with KCM for professional services on the new wastewater treatment facility. At the time this resolution was prepared, the scope of the work that was to be performed by KCM identified the total project which was split up into smaller contract phases to better identify the scope of work and the timing. The first phase has already been authorized as stated above, and the second phase is currently under consideration. A third phase of the work will deal with project administration, construction inspection, preparation of operation and maintenance manuals, plant start-up and as-built drawings. It appears that no further resolution is needed to authorize Phase II of the contract in that it appears there is sufficient funds available in the current budget to authorize this contract.

Phase III of the engineering services will come in next fiscal year so the funds for that contract can be addressed in next year's budget. I would recommend that we authorize Kramer, Chin & Mayo to proceed with Phase II of the engineering services so that we might be able to continue with our schedule and reach our ultimate goal of obtaining federal funds. A contingency transfer, as stated above, will also be needed to obtain sufficient funds in the operating budget to cover this contract.

A RESOLUTION APPROVING AN AGREEMENT FOR GEOTECHNICAL PROFESSIONAL SERVICES FOR THE PUBLIC LIBRARY EXPANSION PROJECT.

WHEREAS, the City of Newberg must retain specialized geotechnical services relating to the Newberg Carnegie Public Library expansion project to provide a soil analysis to define the structural requirements of the expanded library's foundation; and

WHEREAS, due to the potential savings to the City in completing this construction project as soon as possible, due to reduced construction costs, it is important that professional services be retained to provide a soil analysis as quickly as possible.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Newberg, Oregon, as follows, to-wit:

- 1. The agreement to employ a specialized engineering firm to provide geotechnical services and soil analysis is an agreement for personal services and not subject to the public contracting and purchasing laws. To avoid any delay, due to the necessity of beginning construction as soon as possible, as stated in the whereas clauses above, the City Council, acting as Contract Review Board, does hereby declare an emergency and waive competitive bidding to forestall any possibility of challenge.
- 2. The City Manager is hereby authorized to execute the agreement on behalf of the City to employ the firm of L. R. Squire, Inc. to provide geotechnical services for the Newberg Carnegie Public Library expansion project.
- 3. The cost for geotechnical services under the agreement with L. R. Squire, Inc. shall be at the most reasonable rate, not to exceed the sum of \$

With the passage of the resolution authorizing the issue at the February 6th Council meeting the sale with be advertised on or before February 15, 1984 and the sale will actually take place on Tuesday, March 6, 1984. Bid opening will be set for the afternoon of March 6th, with a special Council meeting to approve the winning bid by resolution at 5 or 6 o'clock Tuesday, March 6, 1984.

The resolution for employement of bond consultant is necessary as the bond consultant will be handling the official statement and numerous aspects regarding the sale of the bonds.

The resolution authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds will not be finalized until later this week. However, any changes made to it will be minor in nature. Copies of the final resolution will be made available at the Council meeting.

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF NEWBERG, OREGON AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION LIBRARY BONDS, SERIES 1984

The City of Newberg resolves as follows:

Section 1. <u>Issue</u>. The City shall issue its General Obligation Library Bonds, Series 1984, in the amount of Nine Hundred Sixty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$965,000) to be dated March 1, 1984, to be in denominations of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or integral multiples thereof, and to mature serially on the 1st day of March of each year as follows:

Sewer/Water Clean-up Resolution

Attached is a report from Kramer, Chin & Mayo and a resolution implementing some clean-up items that have not been taken care of to date by the City Council.

The first part of the report discusses the sewer systems development charge that would change the current charge of \$500. plus a \$525. tap fee to a total of \$1,100. plus whatever the cost is for installation. The \$1,100. to hook-up to the sewer is for payment on necessary future development of the system to handle the new construction or to assist with payments on the construction that was necessary to accommodate the growth. The difference in the change will not be great for most new construction because the tap fee or the cost to hook-up to the sewer will be less than \$525. for much of the construction that will be done.

The second part of the report establishes a systems development charge for outside users to be twice what the rate is inside the City. This is very customary for cities and has been a practice in the past for Newberg. Also, since the City is not encouraging hook-ups, I doubt whether this would be much of a problem.

The third part of the report discusses a systems development charge for water where there is a facility in place. The systems development charge will be based on the meter equivalent and will be treated like any other hook-up inside the city.

The last part of the report discusses the change in outside use and uses the formula of 1.2 or 20% more for use outside the city on water. The Public Works Committee has recommended that we not go through a complicated formula, but simply double the cost for users outside the city on our water system. We will bring this item back after our new computer becomes on-line and we are able to do that with very little difficulty. It should represent very little change to the outside users since the formula also comes very close to doubling the cost for outside users.

The Public Works Committee has reviewed these items in their discussions and have concurred.

RE: Water and Sewer Housekeeping Changes

As indicated in December, several ordinance and resolution revisions have been suggested for action by the City Council at the February meeting. Following is a listing of these items as discussed with the Public Works Committee on January 24, 1984. Following this overview, we have developed draft ordinance and resolution revisions.

1. Revision of Sewer Systems Development Charge

This fee was not changed during the November revisions as was the water SDC.

Current Sewer SDC:

SDC = \$500

Tapping Fee = 525 (4-inch service)

Total Fee = \$1,025 per dwelling unit

The tapping fee is charged even if the lot already has a service line (unless previous structure was demolished).

Recommended Change:

- 1.1 Increase SDC to \$1,100 per EDU.
- 1.2 Charge only actual cost of providing the tap (same as water).
- 1.3 Establish a fund separate from the operating fund for SDC charges (sewer and water).

Impact:

- o \$75 increase in total fees paid for subdivision lots constructed since 1980.
- o No change to older subdivision lots with services where the lots are undeveloped and existing agreements establish the costs.

- o Increase costs by \$75 plus actual cost of tap for properties where no tap now exists. This effects about 10 percent of new developments.
- o About 10 to 15 percent increase in revenue from SDC. This may well be an interim increase depending upon the results of further funding studies underway.
- o Improved accounting of funds.

2. Establishing a SDC Surcharge for Outside Users

Current: The current policy has been to charge outside users twice the SDC charged to inside users.

Recommendation:

2.1 Adopt resolution establishing outside user SDC at double inside rate.

Impact:

- o Formalizes existing practice.
- 3. Establishing a Water SDC Rate for an Addition to a Complex which will Continue to be Served by an Existing Meter

Current: The existing revised ordinance does not address this situation.

Recommendation:

3.1 If a larger meter is required, the SDC will be determined by the difference in size between the existing meter and the new meter. Where no change in meter size is required, the meter equivalents will be determined by the minimum size of meter that would have been required had the addition been served by a separate metered service.

Impact:

- o New development will be paying a proper development cost.
- o Formalizes current policy.
- o Applies only to SDC, not to monthly billing.

4. Modification of the Outside Users Water Rate Surcharge from 2.0 times Inside Rate to 1.2.

Current: The existing resolution states that outside users shall pay a monthly (or bimonthly) rate determined by computing the billing as though the property were within the city, times a surcharge of 2.0 plus a property tax offset which is currently \$7.03 per month or \$14.06 bimonthly.

Recommendation:

4.1 Establish outside users water rate at 1.2 times the inside users rate plus property tax offset.

Impact:

- o Outside users will pay approximately double inside users rate.
- o Considering tax payment by inside users, an outside user will pay a 20 percent premium for living outside the City.
- o Staff is currently using the 1.2 figure in billing outside users; therefore, this resolution will confirm existing practice. This rate is currently programmed into the Burroughs billing machine. It can be changed when billings shift to the new computer.
- o This procedure can be evaluated and changed if desired by the Council in July when major ordinance revisions are planned for water and sewer.

Following are suggested revisions to existing ordinances and resolutions to implement the four major changes discussed above.

1. Revision to Sewer Systems Development Charge

The following revisions to Ordinance 2108, Section 203F.1, "Sewer Connection Procedures," are suggested:

F.1 The sewer connection fee shall be calculated based on estimates of actual costs incurred by the City in conjunction with the connection of said service and shall be payable with the application for service. Costs in excess of the estimate shall be due upon completion and any excess shall be promptly refunded.

In addition, the sewer systems development charge shall be \$1,100 per dwelling unit (or for commercial or industrial users, dwelling unit equivalency thereof). Any premises which shall add additional dwelling unit equivalents to a structure served by an existing service shall be subject to the above sewer systems development charge for the dwelling unit equivalents added.

A dwelling unit equivalency shall be defined as:

- A. For residential purposes, any individual dwelling unit within a multi-dwelling unit structure such as, but not limited to, duplexes, multi-family residential complexes, apartment houses, trailer courts and mobile home parks.
- B. For non-residential purposes, each ten (10) sewer openings as defined herein, or any portion thereof, shall be deemed and considered a dwelling unit equivalency.

All sewer connection and development fees shall be paid at the time the application for service is made. No building permits shall be issued or connections be made unless full payment is received; except as provided in Section 203.F6.

Standard connection and development fees shall be paid in advance at the completion; and a statement shall be signed by the applicant agreeing to pay the additional costs of extension within thirty (30) days of the completion of work by the city.

For properties located outside the city limits, a factor of two (2) shall be multiplied times the system development charge computed for the property or project if it were located within the city limits.

The following revisions to Ordinance 2108, Section F.7 are suggested:

7. Revenue from connection fees as defined in Subsection Fl hereof shall be paid into the sewer fund to defray the cost of the service line constructed. Revenue from system development charges shall be identified by special accounting such that the funds can be used to defray the cost of future sewage facilities improvements.

2. Establishing a System Development Charge for Outside Users

The following revisions to Resolution ___ (water rates resolution), Section 5(B) is recommended.

(B) The water system development charge shall be based on the meter size of the service connection and is set at \$850 per meter equivalent, as defined in Section 4(C) of this resolution. Any premises on which a water connection has been made prior to the effective date of this resolution shall upon adding additional meter equivalents thereof, pay such additional system development charges that are in effect upon the date of issuance of the appropriate building permits.

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For properties located outside the city limits, a factor of two (2) shall be multiplied times the system development charge computed for the property or project if it were located within the city limits.

Any premises, which shall expand and add additional dwelling unit equivalents (dwelling unit equivalents defined in Ordinance 2108, Section 203.F.l as amended February 6, 1984), to a structure served by an existing service, shall be subject to the above systems development charge for each meter equivalent required to serve the addition assuming it had been served by a separate meter.

3. Establishing a Water SDC Rate for an Addition to a Complex which will Continue to be Served by an Existing Meter

This was included in item 2 above.

4. Modification to Outside User Surcharge

The following revisions to Resolution ____ (water rates resolution), Section 4 is recommended:

Section 4. The water rates for all customers outside the city limits shall be calculated in the same manner as in Section 3, times a factor of 1.2, plus a surcharge derived as payment of lieu of property tax. The surcharge is calculated based on the outside customers percentage of the total city's prior year's water usage multiplied by the current year's estimated city property tax payments attributed to the water system. The surcharge shall be stated and collected on a per meter equivalent basis, as defined in Section 5(C) of this resolution.

This concludes the planned amendments to the water and sewer ordinances and resolutions. We will, of course, assist in developing changes if they are found to be needed. A major reworking of the water and sewer ordinances is currently scheduled for council action on July 2, 1984. Drafts will be developed for review by June 1, 1984.

A RESOLUTION AMENDING SECTIONS 4 AND 5 OF RESOLUTION NO. 83-1003, ADOPTED NOVEMBER 7, 1983, AS AMENDED TO MODIFY OUTSIDE CITY LIMITS OUTSIDE WATER USER SURCHARGE AND ESTABLISH A SYSTEMS DEVELOPMENT CHARGE FOR OUTSIDE WATER USERS OF THE CITY OF NEWBERG WATER SYSTEM, IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTIONS 4 AND 7 OF ORDINANCE NO. 1040, AS AMENDED.

WHEREAS, there is a need to modify the established fees, rates and charges for water services; as originally established in Resolution No. 83-1003, as amended, pursuant to Sections 4 and 7 of Ordinance No. 1940.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Newberg, Oregon, as follows, to-wit:

Section 1. That Section 4 of Resolution No. 83-1003, adopted November 7, 1983, as amended, shall be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. The water rates for all customers outside the city limits shall be calculated in the same manner as in Section 3, times a factor of 1.2, plus a surcharge derived as payment in lieu of property tax. The surcharge is calculated based on the outside customers percentage of the total city's prior year's water usage multiplied by the current year's estimated city property tax payments attributed to the water system. The surcharge shall be stated and collected on a per meter equivalent basis, as defined in Section 5(C) of this resolution."

Section 2. That Section 5(B) of Resolution No. 83-1003 adopted November 7, 1983, as amended, shall be amended to read as follows:

"(B) The water system development charge shall be based on the meter size of the service connection and is set at \$850. per meter equivalent, as defined in Section 5(C) of this resolution. Any premises on which a water connection has been made prior to the effective date of this resolution shall, upon adding additional meter equivalents thereof, pay such additional system development charges that are in effect upon the date of issuance of the appropriate building permits.

For properties located outside the city mimits, a factor of two (2) shall be multiplied times the systems development charge computed for the property or project if it were located within the city limits.

Any premises, which shall expand and additional dwelling unit equivalents (dwelling unit equivalents defined in Ordinance No. 2108, Section 203.F.1 as amended, February 6, 1984), to a structure served by an existing service, shall be subject to the above systems development charge for each meter equivalent required to serve the addition assuming it had been served by a separate meter."

ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 2108, PASSED FEBRUARY 7, 1983, AS AMENDED, TO REVISE CERTAIN PROVISIONS RELATING TO SEWER CONNECTION PROCEDURES, FEES AND SYSTEMS DEVELOPMENT CHARGES OF THE CITY OF NEWBERG.

WHEREAS, after extensive review by City Staff, City Consultants and the Public Works Committee of the City Council, it has been determined that the City sewer tap fee should be revised to allow charging for the actual costs of a tap, that the systems development charge be revised and that other procedures be revised relating to sewer connection to the municipal sewer system of the City of Newberg.

THE CITY OF NEWBERG ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That paragraph number 1, subsection F, section 203 of Ordinance No. 2108, passed February 7, 1983, as amended, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"F.1 The sewer connection fee shall be calculated based on estimates of actual costs incurred by the City in conjunction with the connection of said service and shall be payable with the application for service. Costs in excess of the estimate shall be due upon completion of the connection work by the City and any excess shall be promptly refunded.

In addition, the sewer systems development charge shall be \$1,100. per dwelling unit (or for commercial or industrial users, dwelling unit equivalency thereof). Any premises which shall add additional dwelling unit equivalents to a structure served by an existing service shall be subject to the above sewer systems development charge for the dwelling unit equivalents added.

A dwelling unit equivalency shall be defined as:

- A. For residential purposes, any individual dwelling unit within a multi-dwelling unit structure such as, but not limited to, duplexes, multi-family residential complexes, apartment houses, trailer courts and mobile home parks.
- B. For non-residential purposes, each ten (10) sewer openings as defined herein, or any portion thereof, shall be deemed and considered a dwelling unit equivalency.

All estimated sewer connection costs and systems development charges shall be paid at the time the application for service is made. No building permits shall be issued or connections be made unless full payment is received; except as provided in Section 203.F6.

For properties located outside the city limits, a factor of two (2) shall be multiplied times the systems development charge computed for the property or project if it were located within the city limits."

Section 2. That paragraph number 7, subsection F, section 203 of Ordinance No. 2108, passed February 7, 1983, as amended, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"7. Revenue from connection fees as defined in subsection F1 hereof shall be paid into the sewer fund to defray the cost of the service line constructed. Revenue from system development charges shall be identified by special accounting such that the funds can be used to defray the cost of future sewage facilities improvements."
