Exhibit "A"

AGREEMENT

The following agreement is between the CITY OF NEWBERG, OREGON, a municipal corporation, hereinafter called the "City", and the OREGON CONFERENCE OF THE FREE METHODIST CHURCH, hereinafter called the "Conference". This agreement is for modification of earlier agreements concerning the development of the Crestview Manor Project, more fully described in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and by reference incorporated herein. Except as altered in this agreement, all earlier agreements between the parties concerning this subdivision shall remain in full force and effect.

WHEREAS, the parties recognize that the economy of the State of Oregon and the City of Newberg has been in a depressed state in recent years and that due to that depressed state, the project known as "Crestview Manor" has sold and developed slower than would have otherwise been the case.

WHEREAS, the parties recognize that the developers of Crestview Manor Project have developed said project in a professional and workmanlike manner; therefore, the parties agree to modify their earlier agreements as follows:

The requirement that all public and common improvements including streets, sewer, water and utilities be completed by March 1, 1984, is hereby extended to allow completion of those facilities on chasing as described later herein as follows:

PHASE I - The improvements shall be completed by June 20. 1984.

PHASE II - The improvements shall be completed no later than June 20, 1985.

PHASE III - The improvements shall be completed no later than June 20, 1986.

The Phases of this Project are more fully described in the color-coded map attached hereto, marked Exhibit "B", and by this reference incorporated herein.

The definition of public and common facilities within this agreement does not include sidewalks and landscaping. The sidewalks shall be completed, housing unit by housing unit, with occupancy permits for a particular housing unit only when the sidewalk for that unit has been completed. It is understood between the parties that sidewalks will not be completed for an entire PHASE at one time for the reason that if they were completed prior to the construction of a housing unit, they would have to be redone because of damage to them.

Landscaping of trees shall be completed for each housing unit within six (6) months of the date of completion of that particular unit adjacent to the tree or trees to be planted. No occupancy permit shall be issued on any subsequent unit if any earlier unit has not had installation of trees within six (6) months of an occupancy permit for that earlier unit.

Further, it is hereby committed by the City that building permits will be issued upon request on any Phase of the project at this time. In addition, it is agreed that occupancy permits (after final building inspection) for each Phase of the project will be granted at such time as the improvements hereinabove mentioned for that Phase have been completed and accepted by the City Engineer for the entire Phase, and other terms and conditions of this agreement and earlier agreements have been complied with.

The phasing for this project shall be as follows:

PHASE I shall include all of the area fronting on Alderscate Street from its entrance from Crestview Drive to the southern end of Lots 9 and 42. The development of PHASE I would include occupancy permits for Lots 9 through 18. Lot 52. and Lots 42 through 47. It is acknowledged by the City that PHASE I public improvements have been completed and occupancy permits can be applied for at this time.

PHASE II would include the improvements on Johnson Drive from its access on the northern end of Aldersaate through the southern end of Lot 59 and the northern end of Lot 30 for electrical service, and the southern end of Lot 30 for streets, water and sewer. Lots 19 through 30. 48 through 51, and 53 through 59 would be considered a portion of PHASE II, and occupancy permits on those units would be allowed when the public and common improvements have been completed for that PHASE, and sewer, water and storm drains have been completed for the entire Crestview Manor Project.

Finally, PHASE III would include improvements on the remainder of Johnson Drive, and would include Lots 1 through 8, 31 through 41, and 60 through 62, with the understanding and agreement that when the public and common improvements are completed on that PHASE III, that occupancy permits would be available.

recognized that this agreement modifies the Ιt is Subdivision Agreement of March 29, 1982, paragraphs 2 and 5. is further recognized that this agreement modifies that agreement the parties of March. 1982. and that in lieu of a bond being required posted for development of this project. that City of Newberg continues to accept as an alternative to and lieu of bond, good and other valuable consideration. As a part of this consideration, the Conference covenants and binds itself, through its Board of Administration, that this is an approved project of the OREGON CONFERENCE OF THE FREE METHODIST CHURCH and that the Board of Administration of said Church Conference stands fully behind this project and this agreement.

The Conference further acknowledges that the City has no obligation to issue any party an occupancy permit prior to the time-frame provided in the terms of this agreement, or until bonding is posted or another alternative security satisfactory to the City. In the event any third party would sue the City for failure to issue an occupancy permit during the specified period, the Conference shall fully defend, hold harmless, and indemnify the City if such claim was due to the terms of this agreement.

A map showing the phasing of this project and marked Exhibit "B" is attached hereto and by this reference incorporated herein.

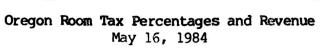

:

DIRECT SERVICE INDUSTRIAL CUSTOMERS' EMERGENCY MOTION FOR REHEARING

Pursuant to Rule 713 of the Commission's Rules of Practice, 18 C.F.R. § 385.713, the Direct Service Industrial Customers ("DSIs") of the Bonneville Power Administration ("Bonneville") request an emergency rehearing and reconsideration of the Commission's decision of June 28, 1984 denying Bonneville's request for interim approval of its revised average system cost ("ASC") methodology. The DSIs understand that the Commission's usual practice is to reconsider only issued orders. However, the June 28, 1984 decision is part of a process leading to the issuance of an order, and its devastating impact on the DSIs and BPA requires immediate reconsideration.

By vote of June 28, 1984, the Commission failed to give interim approval of the revised methodology which Bonneville has labored over since last October. Bonneville had asked that the revised methodology be made effective on

an interim basis, subject to refund, as of July 1, 1984--an admittedly short timetable.

The Commission's action at the June 28, 1984 meeting may have reflected a belief that Bonneville had not demonstrated the sort of emergency that that would justify interim approval by July 1, 1984. The ten major industrial corporations that purchase power directly from Bonneville who are parties to this docket respectfully suggest that the Commission erred in denying Bonneville's request. This request for rehearing focuses on three issues:

- Conservation Act, 16 U.S.C. §§ 839, et seq. ("Northwest Power Act"), any delay in interim approval will cause irreparable harm to the DSIs. For each week of delay, the DSIs will pay current rates more than \$1 million higher than those they would pay under the revised methodology, with no possibility of refund. Further, under the investor-owned utilities' view of the "floor rate" provision of the Northwest Power Act, after July 1, 1984 the effect of paying those unjustified higher rates resulting from a faulty ASC methodology will be perpetuated and multiplied into the indefinite future.
- (2) Any adverse effect on the investor-owned utilities from interim approval of the revised ASC methodology would be temporary and can be remedied by later refund or adjustment, if necessary. Yet, if interim approval of the revised methodology is delayed, the DSIs will pay higher

rates with no possibility of refund. This imbalance and the prospect of irreparable harm to the DSIs makes immediate interim approval essential.

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(3) Any delay in interim (or final) approval has the potential for severely reducing the revenues available to Bonneville to repay its obligations to the U.S. Treasury. High DSI rates, caused in large part by the existing methodology, have forced three DSIs within the last month to announce major curtailments which will reduce Bonneville's annual revenues by \$42-\$45 million, or about \$12 million between the requested interim approval date and the date of Bonneville's next scheduled payment. This foreshadows further reductions in DSI load during the summer of 1984 if there is no rate relief.

1. The DSIs Will Be Irreparably Harmed If Interim Approval Is Denied.

The DSIs and most of Bonneville's other customers pay rates which are calculated to recover the net costs of the ASC exchange subsidy. The revised methodology proposed by BPA would reduce the subsidy by \$126 million in 1985. $\frac{1}{2}$

This excludes the effect of the proposed "phase-in" of the methodology by BPA. The DSIs, in their substantive comments to be filed on July 16, 1984, will address the "phase-in" approach.

The DSI's share of this reduction would be approximately \$60 million. Thus, the rates of the DSIs would be reduced by more than \$1 million per week if the revised methodology were put into effect. 2/ These customers have no possibility of obtaining any refund of the higher rates they will continue to pay due to any delay in implementation of the new methodology. Thus, by denying interim approval, the Commission is creating an irretrievable loss to the DSIs of over \$1 million per week, and the Commission is denying them the benefits of a revised methodology that Bonneville has determined to be necessary to the proper function of the exchange contracts under the Northwest Power Act.

The harm to the DSIs threatens to be multiplied many fold by operation of the "floor rate" provision of the Northwest Power Act. Under the Act, rates charged the DSIs after July 1, 1985 are subject to a "floor" that will be based on "the rates in effect for the contract year ending June 30, 1985." Section 7(c)(2), 16 U.S.C. § 839e(c)(2). The Pacific Northwest investor-owned utilities interpret this provision to mean that the floor rate in effect after July 1, 1985 must reflect the higher rates actually paid by

This level of revenue is equal to the production power costs of a major aluminum smelter in the Pacific Northwest. In other words, Alcoa's power bill for its Vancouver, Washington facility, at full operation, is \$1 million per week.

the DSIs during the preceding twelve months. Thus, under the view advanced by the investor-owned utilities, a delay in approving the revised ASC methodology will cause two types of irreparable harm. Not only will the DSIs lose more than \$1 million for each week of delay in putting the revised ASC methodology in effect, but the floor rate that becomes effective after July 1, 1985 will reflect the higher rates caused by the delay. Thus, the economic harm resulting from delay will not be a one-time event, but will be reflected in the DSI floor rate into perpetuity.

If the Commission follows its own precedent, it will probably conclude that it lacks the power to correct this indefinite perpetuation and multiplication of the deleterious effect of delay. Pursuant to prior Commission orders and the directives of Section 7(c)(2) of the Act, the role of the Commission to review Bonneville rate determinations is limited in scope and appellate in nature.

See, e.g., Rules of Electric Power to Bonneville Power

Administration, 48 Fed. Reg. 46970 (October 17, 1983). If the Administrator's determination of the floor rate is characterized as a "rate design" issue, the Commission would lack review authority. Even assuming the floor rate was subject to Commission review, the Commission, as an appellate body, would appear to be limited to blanket approval or disapproval of the floor rate.

Accordingly, there is no guarantee that the Commission will have the power to "fine tune" the floor rate to eliminate the effect of today's delay in approving the revised ASC methodology.

2. Refund Provisions Completely Protect Exchanging Utilities From Any Adverse Effect Of Interim Approval Later Determined To Be Improper.

Other parties--primarily the investor-owned utilities and their residential customers--do not face any risk of loss if interim approval is granted. As the Commission observed in its June 8, 1984 Notice of Proposed Interim Rule, rates determined under the interim revised methodology would be subject to refund or adjustment. This provision completely protects the utilities from any adverse effect associated with interim approval. The utilities face no risk and suffer no harm if the Commission later disapproves some or all of the revised methodology.

The DSIs and Bonneville are <u>not</u> protected by the similar prospect of refund or adjustment. Each day of delay results in higher, but nonrefundable, rates and has a potentially irrevocable impact on post-1985 rates for the DSIs. Denying interim approval harms the DSIs (and, of course, Bonneville and the U. S. Treasury) without hope of remedy. Conversely, granting interim approval does not significantly harm the investor-owned utilities, as the provisions for

refund and adjustment protect them from loss. This gross imbalance of hardships plainly requires interim approval of the revised methodology.

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3. Interim Approval Is Absolutely Critical To Bonneville's Repayment Plans.

Bonneville's timely repayment of its obligation to the U.S. Treasury was a primary reason for revision of the methodology. The excessive size of the exchange subsidy increases BPA's overall revenue requirement, thereby taxing Bonneville's ability to repay the Treasury and driving up DSI rates to the point where DSI loads dropped, thus reducing Bonneville's revenues. Within the last month high rates have forced three DSIs to curtail their operations, with an immediate and permanent loss of revenues to Bonneville of almost \$4 million each month. There has been virtually no reduction in operating costs to offset the lost revenues. Nor, in the present market, is BPA able to sell its surplus power at fully allocated cost.

Each day of delay in approving the revised ASC methodology carries with it the potential for causing further loss of DSI load and the loss of millions of dollars of revenue that would go directly to the repayment of BPA's overall obligations to the Treasury. Congress, the General Accounting Office, the Treasury Department, and the Grace Commission have all expressed concern about BPA's repayment ability. See 130 Cong. Rec. S7935 (daily ed. June 21,

1984). Bonneville is attempting to put its financial house in order, and keeping load on the BPA system is crucial to achieving that goal. The Commission should help rather than hinder BPA's efforts.

The DSIs urge the Commission to reconsider its decision of June 28, 1984, and to grant the interim approval requested by Bonneville.

Knowing of your interest in quality education, I am writing to bring you up to date on the status of this matter.

Congress is considering a number of proposals but two bills stand out as potential vehicles for helping improve education.

H.R. 881 and its companion Senate bill, S. 553 are more commonly known as the American Defense Education Act. These measures were developed by Congressman Perkins and Senator Hart in consultation with the National Education Association.

The major thrust of the bills is to provide \$2 billion in federal funds the first year, to state and local school officials to strengthen their ability to meet the new demands of our public education system. This figure would increase to \$4 billion in subsequent years. The bill is patterned after the National Defense Education Act, which was passed in the late fifties as a response to the Sputnik-created concern over our math, science and engineering education.

I have decided to cosponsor this legislation, however, I do have concern over the cost of the measure in fiscal years with deficits nearing \$200 billion. I am committed to a strong federal role in education, as I believe firmly that education is the foundation of a free society. We have a clear national interest in providing a quality education for our children. Our security depends upon it.

I hope this information will be helpful.

Yesterday, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission voted not to grant the Bonneville Power Administration's request for interim approval to reduce the benefits our customers receive under the Regional Power Act. Instead of a rate increase in July, PGE's residential and farm customers will see their rates go down about 4 percent. This great news is in large part a result of the concern expressed in the resolution adopted by the City of Newberg. Your constituents and our customers owe you their sincerest thanks.

Resolutions opposing BPA's action were adopted by 35 city councils, five county commissions and more than 40 social service agencies. Another 23,000 Oregonians signed petitions asking FERC to prevent BPA from making its planned changes without a full hearing before an independent body. If not for the tremendous amount of opposition, it is quite possible FERC would have made a different decision.

Next we must prove to FERC that BPA's proposal is without merit. To ensure an independent review, we have asked FERC to immediately appoint a Joint State Board with representatives from the four Northwest states. It is important the Board begin gathering information as soon as possible so it can make a complete report to the Commission.

As we continue our efforts to prevent this unwarranted rate increase we may again ask for your support. For now, however, please accept our thanks and gratitude for all you have done.

Enclosed you will find a copy of the bid tabulation of the bids received for the addition and remodeling of the Newberg Public Library. You will notice in the bid tab that we show the basic bid followed by alternates 1 through 7. Copies of the bid forms that were submitted are also enclosed.

Alternate number 1 is for the lower level extension which would allow future expansion of the Library at a later date, and would also allow currently for storage area for records.

Alternate 2 is for the audio booth in the upper level.

Alternate 3 is the finishing of the meeting room in the lower level.

Alternate 4 is for the landscaping and irrigation system.

Alternate 5 is for the cabinets in the Library.

Alternate 6 is for the dumbwaiter.

Alternate 7 is for construction of the amphitheater.

At this time the Librarian, myself, and the architect are recommending to you and in turn the City Council, that we award the base bid and alternates number 1, 3, 5, and 7 to McGinnis-Mills Construction Co. for a low bid of \$1,037,611.

We are recommending the inclusion of alternates 1, 3, 5, and 7 at this time because they are an integral part of the Library. This will be the only time that we could construct alternate number 1, the lower level extension. Once the Library is constructed that option will never be open to us again.

Alternate number 3 is the meeting room area, and this area can be used in helping the City meet its handicap requirements for access to public meeting places. In addition, this was a room whose versatility was pointed out to members of the public and was strongly supported by the public in the passage of the bond issue.

Alternate number 5 is the cabinets and they are, again, an integral part of the Library building itself.

Alternate number 7 is the amphitheater, and the concrete and brick construction of it make it an integral part of the Library. This coupled with the low price received for that construction makes it an element we feel should be included.

Therefore, we recommend that we award the bid to McGinnis-Mills with alternates 1, 3, 5, and 7 for an amount of \$1,037,611. The City Attorney has enclosed a resolution which is in your Council packets for the approval of this bid.

3. CITY MANAGER EVALUATION: Pursuant to our agreement, the City Manager is evaluated each July. The purpose of the evaluation is to provide both written and oral comments to the City Manager so that he may perform his job in the manner that is desirable by the City Council. I have found this communication to be very helpful and constructive.

Traditionally, the Executive Session has only lasted a short while so the City Council may want to consider combining this meeting with one of the meetings mentioned above \mathcal{A}

AGREEMENT

The following agreement is between the CITY OF NEWBERG, OREGON, a municipal corporation, hereinafter called the "City", and the OREGON CONFERENCE OF THE FREE METHODIST CHURCH, hereinafter called the "Conference". This agreement is for modification of earlier agreements concerning the development of the Crestview Manor Project, more fully described in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and by reference incorporated herein. Except as altered in this agreement, all earlier agreements between the parties concerning this subdivision shall remain in full force and effect.

WHEREAS, the parties recognize that the economy of the State of Oregon and the City of Newberg has been in a depressed state in recent years and that due to that depressed state, the project known as "Crestview Manor" has sold and developed slower than would have otherwise been the case.

WHEREAS, the parties recognize that the developers of Crestview Manor Project have developed said project in a professional and workmanlike manner; therefore, the parties agree to modify their earlier agreements as follows:

The requirement that all public improvements including streets, sewer, water and utilities be completed by March 1, 1984, is hereby extended to allow completion of those facilities on phasing as described later herein as follows:

PHASE I - The improvements shall be completed by June 20, 1984.

PHASE II - The improvements shall be completed no later than June 20, 1985.

PHASE III - The improvements shall be completed no later than June 20, 1986.

Further, it is hereby committed by the City that building permits will be issued upon request on any Phase of the project

at this time. In addition, it is agreed that occupancy permits (after final building inspection) for each Phase of the project will be granted at such time as the improvements hereinabove mentioned for that Phase have been completed and accepted by the City Engineer for the entire Phase, and other terms and conditions of this agreement and earlier agreements have been complied with.

The phasing for this project shall be as follows:

PHASE I shall include all of the area fronting on Aldersgate Street from its entrance from Crestview Drive to the southern end of Lots 9 and 42. The development of PHASE I would include occupancy permits for Lots 9 through 18, Lot 52, and Lots 42 through 47. It is acknowledged by the City that PHASE I public improvements have been completed and occupancy permits can be applied for at this time.

PHASE II would include the improvements on Johnson Drive from its access on the northern end of Aldersgate through the southern end of Lot 59 and the northern end of Lot 30 for electrical service, and the southern end of Lot 30 for streets, water and sewer. Lots 19 through 30, 48 through 51, and 53 through 59 would be considered a portion of PHASE II, and occupancy permits on those units would be allowed when the public improvements have been completed for that PHASE.

Finally, PHASE III would include improvements on the remainder of Johnson Drive, and would include Lots 1 through 8, 31 through 41, and 54 through 62, with the understanding and agreement that when the public improvements are completed on that PHASE III, that occupancy permits would be available.

It is recognized that this agreement modifies the Subdivision Agreement of March 29, 1982, paragraphs 2 and 5. It is further recognized that this agreement modifies that agreement between the parties of March, 1982, and that in lieu of a bond being required posted for development of this project, that the City of Newberg continues to accept as an alternative to and in lieu of bond, good and other valuable consideration. As a part of this consideration, the Conference covenants and binds itself, through its Board of Administration, that this is an approved project of the OREGON CONFERENCE OF THE FREE METHODIST CHURCH and that the Board of Administration of said Church Conference stands fully behind this project and this agreement.

The Conference further acknowledges that the City has no obligation to issue any party an occupancy permit prior to the time-frame provided in the terms of this agreement, or until bonding is posted or another alternative security satisfactory to the City. In the event any third party would sue the City for failure to issue an occupancy permit during the specified period, the Conference shall fully defend the City if such denial was due to the terms of this agreement.

A map showing the phasing of this project and marked Exhibit "B" is attached hereto and by this reference incorporated herein.

Adult Entertainment Ordinance

For the past several months, the Newberg Planning Commission has been reviewing issues associated with the adoption of an adult entertainment ordinance. This ordinance, if passed by the City Council, would limit the locations where adult entertainment businesses could be established within the community. The ordinance is very similar to the adult entertainment ordinance that the Multnomah County Commissioners recently approved.

Currently, under the Newberg Zoning Ordinance, it would appear that a request for the establishment of an adult entertainment business would need to go through a conditional use permit; however, these businesses could potentially be established within any C-2 (Community Commercial), C-3 (Central Business District), M-1 (Limited Industrial) and M-2 (Light Industrial) zoning districts.

This ordinance will restrict the siting of adult entertainment businesses. Essentially the controlling requirement is that no adult entertainment business may be established within 650 feet of those items listed under Section 758. With this requirement, it will help to insure that the blighting influences created from the clustering of such businesses will not adversely affect any residential areas within the community.

I have also enclosed a copy of the minutes of the Planning Commission, a letter from Chief Dave Bishop regarding the topic and a recent article that appeared in the Family Circle magazine on June 19, 1984.

- 2. An article entitled "Pornography Invades the Suburbs," from the issue of Family Circle magazine dated 6-19-84 was read into the record. Contents of the article covered the effects of an adult bookstore on a residential neighborhood.

Mr. Moorhead briefly reviewed the proposed ordinance requirements. With the use of several maps, he pointed out the areas identified by a 1000 foot limitation, a 700 foot limitation and a 650 foot limitation from certain types of uses. He indicated that the area contained by the 650

foot limitation allowed for approximately 11 sites that could be potential locations of adult entertainment type businesses. He further pointed out that the area under discussion contained no highway frontage and also eliminated locations which were either uptown or in the commercial strip area along Highway 99W. He indicated that the ordinance would effectively control the blighting influences which are caused by the clustering of adult businesses in our community and still uphold the State and federal constitutional requirements regarding freedom of speech.

Mr. Moorhead reviewed the six findings listed in the ordinance under Section $1-\frac{754}{}$ Intent, Purpose and Findings. He indicated Finding 4 should read "...within the Newberg Comprehensive Plan policies" not "framework."

No proponents or opponents wished to speak. A communication from Chehalem Park and Recreation District requested that "Community Centers" be included as a land uses under item 758 - Requirements. No communications or letters have been received other than those already entered into the record.

City Attorney Faus stated that if an ordinance were passed based on land use and it were so restrictive as to not allow establishment of any adult business, that ordinance would probably not be upheld in court. He commented that a 1000 foot restriction could possibly be considered too restrictive but that a 650 foot restriction would allow at least 11 potential sites for such a business.

Mr. Faus indicated that the figures of 1000 ft. and 650 ft. came from the Multnomah County ordinance currently under review.

Further discussion regarding school bus stops and the yearly revision of their locations followed. It was the consensus of the Commissioners that school bus stops should be eliminated as a location listed under 758 Requirements.

Mr. Faus indicated that this ordinance deals with land use restrictions, not with the censorship of the type of material sold or displayed. He further indicated that the 650 ft. restriction would still provide a "choice in the market place" for adult businesses.

Hearing Closed.

The Commission deliberated on the issues in the ordinance. A discussion of the terms "substantial or significant portion of the establishment's activities or merchandise" followed with City Attorney Faus commenting that "substantial" usually indicated more than 50% and that similar language has been upheld in court. Impacts of parking for these facilities was also discussed. It was the consensus of the Commission to include under section 758 - Requirements, item (b.) boundary of a residential zone and areas designated on the Newberg Comprehensive Plan for residential uses, item (f.) kindergartens, colleges or universities, to add (q.) community centers and to delete (o.) school bus stops. In addition, a distance of 650 ft. was recommended for the ordinance instead of the 1000 ft. requirement in order to help insure the ordinance could be upheld if challenged.

<u>Staff Recommendation</u>: Planning Director Moorhead stated that the staff recommends the adoption of the ordinance as revised.

Motion: Young-Englebrecht to recommend to City Council that they adopt the proposed ordinance as revised based on Findings 1-6 under Section 754 of the ordinance. Vote on Motion: Aye: Englebrecht, Erickson, Harris, Kriz, Lyda, Young. Nay: None. Motion carried unanimously by those present.

Motion: Lyda-Englebrecht to recommend to the Yamhill County Commissioners that they enact a similar ordinance for the County. Motion carried unanimously.

Commissioner Englebrecht asked that a copy of the revised ordinance be sent to the City of Dundee Planning Commission at their request.

Mr. Moorhead indicated that the City Council would have a public hearing on the matter at a later date.

Agenda Item 5 - Staff informed the Commission that the 45 day notice period required for a public hearing on mobile street vendors would be enacted. He asked for some direction from the Planning Commission as to what kind of ordinance they would prefer to review. Briefly discussed were current ordinances regarding peddling, vending, etc. Staff was asked to develop several options for presentation to the Planning Commission at their next regular meeting.

Old Business. None

<u>New Business</u>. Staff informed the Commission of new developments in commercial construction and also provided information on current grant applications awarded the City.

He presented the resignation of David Richards from the Planning Commission effective immediately.

Staff was asked about what kind of sign controls Newberg currently had. Mr. Moorhead commented on the past policies of the City regarding sign control. Further discussions regarding sign controls will be considered at a future Planning Commission meeting.

Motion: Kriz-Englebrecht to adjourn. Motion carried unanimously.

PORNOGRAPHY INVADES THE SUBURBS

When an "adult bookstore" moved into their quiet neighborhood, Sue and Ed Nickson discovered how hard-core porn and its influence can destroy the streets you live on.

Nickson would have laughed at the idea that a new bookstore on their block could make them leave the house and neighborhood they had come to love. That time was before Village Books and News took over the vacant store on their corner in a small suburb of Buffalo, New York.

The "bookstore," you see, was not the nice little shop Sue had envisioned when its sign first went up in the fall of 1979. It was, as the Nicksons and their neighbors were to learn, an "adult" bookstore, specializing in hard-core pornography, a complete line of sexual "aids" and a room full of booths in which K-rated films could be viewed.

When Sue and Ed were ready to buy their first home in 1973, Kenmore seemed like the ideal choice of towns. It was close to Buffalo, where they had both grown up, and as the realtor pointed out, it was a nice place to raise a family. It was also conveniently close to Ed's job at a local bank. The neighborhood they settled in seemed ideal, too—a quiet side street within walking distance of the shops, restaurants and small businesses that lined the main street of the village. Sue came to know it well as she prished first Chris's and then Tim's stroller to the grocery store.

"When you live in a neighborhood," Sue says, "you get to know the sounds of your neighbors—their voices, their kids, their cars." But after the bookstore

opened, the sounds—and appearance of the neighborhood began to change. Unfamiliar cars were parked in front of their home, and strangers loitered near the bookstore.

From the main street, Village Books and News looked like any small-town newspaper store. Daily papers, cigarettes, candy and general interest magazines lined the racks of its front room. Its real business, though, was conducted in a backroom, behind a door with a sign reading, "You must be 21 to enter." And unlike most small bookshops, this store remained open 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

When Ed Nickson learned at a Kiwanis meeting what the store's principal merchandise was, he joined a group of local businessmen and went to the mayor. "We were worried that other 'adult' businesses would move in and the commercial section of Kenmore would deteriorate," Ed recalls. "We were told the police were aware of the situation and could handle it."

At first, it seemed the police could. Within a week of the bookstore's opening, two clerks were arrested for selling sexual devices to plainclothes detectives. Police continued to monitor the store all during that winter. But as the months wore on, motion after motion filed by the storeowner's attorney delayed a trial.

Before the bookstore came to Kenmore, Ed and Sue Nickson thought that hard-core pornography peddlers operated only in the downtown areas of big cities. They were wrong.

ver the past 10 years, the pornography industry has infiltrated smaller cities, towns and suburbs. Today there are an estimated 15,000 to 20,000 "adult" bookstores in the United States. In some communities—such as Stoughton, Massachusetts; Darby, Pennsylvania; and Yuccapa, California—residents have fought and put such stores out of business.

"We thought we could do the same thing," Sue says. "We thought we could say, This store doesn't belong here,' and they would leave."

But the Cleveland-based corporation that owned the business had no intention of closing up a profitable enterprise. By the time the winter snow had melted, business was flourishing in the bookstore, and the Nicksons began finding discarded pornographic materials littering their neighborhood.

"We kept finding wrappers from packages of sexual aids with graphic instructions on them," Ed says. "We wondered if people were using these things in parked cars and throwing the wrappers out the windows. We were always picking up, because we didn't want the kids to find this garbage."

When it got warm enough for their sons, 7-year-old Chris and 3-year-old Tim, to play (Continued on page 156)

BASIL JELLY

Makes enough to fill 4 half-pint jars at 80c each.

11/2 cups firmly packed fresh basil leaves, finely chopped

1% cups water

- 31/2 cups sugar 2 tablespoons lemon juice 1 packet (3 ounces) fruit pectin
- Place chopped basil in saucepan. Add water. Bring to boiling. Remove from heat. Set aside, covered, 15 minutes.
- 2. Wash 4 half-pint canning jars. Sterilize in boiling water 10 minutes. Keep hot.
- 3. Strain basil mixture into 2-cup glass neasure. Add water to measure 13/4 cups, if necessary. Return mixture to saucepan. Stir in sugar and lemon juice.
- 4. Bring basil mixture to full boil over high heat, stirring constantly. When mixture reaches boiling, immediately stir in pectin. Return to full boil; boil 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat.

outdoors. Sue made sure she was stationed by a window or in a lawn chair out front so she could keep an eye on them. She noticed strange cars prowling the neighborhood. And she was horrified when she saw a man urinate in plain view in the bookstore's parking lot, across the street from her home.

We were getting really angry," Ed says, "And afraid." See adds.

So when they heard that a public meeting was being held to discuss the store, they were delighted. But when someone began to rant about "smut" and the need for censorship, Ed looked at Sue and shook his head.

"I believe in the First Amendment and I don't believe in censorship," Ed says. But he also believed that a store like Village Books and News did not belong in the heart of Kenmore, a stone's throw from homes and schools. His mixed feelings were resolved when the next speaker proposed that the town exercise its own First Amendment rights by picketing the store. The Nicksons volunteered to help, but they decided they first ought to see for themselves what they would be picketing.

When they walked through the door to the bookstore's back room, they saw a wall display of artificial sex organs and realistic life-size blow-up dolls. There were racks of pornographic magazines dealing with bondage, homosexuality and sadism, others showing close-ups of male and female sex orsans. On the back wall was a cubicle containing peep-show booths where customers could watch two minutes of X-rated movies for a quarter.

The Nicksons returned in silence to their house around the corner.

When the pickets assembled at the store in May 1980, the media were also there. Sue wasn't prepared for the reporters and TV cameras. Nor was she prepared for the public reaction.

Sometimes people in passing cars would beep the horn and wave in support. But other times, people would shout obscenities and throw things at the picketers. More than once, someone would drop his pants and expose himself to the group. And one day, two men on motorcycles drove up on the sidewalk, forcing the picketers to scatter.

"At first, we didn't know that someone could be arrested for harassing us," Ed says. But one night, while he and a neighbor picketed, the police arrested two men who had been shouting obscenities at them. It was the first arrest Ed witnessed, but not the last.

One day, as Sue was crossing the street to visit a neighbor, a man got out of his car, urinated in front of her and

then walked down to the bookstore. " called the police, and they went to the store and arrested him. The man was angry, but his wife, who was waiting in the car, was furious. And she was mad at me, not him."

Sometimes Sue didn't call the police, like the day the boys were riding their bikes in the driveway and a strange man parked at the curb. "I felt silly calling the police to say, 'A strange man is sitting in a car outside my house.' He wasn't doing anything illegal. So I walked outside and stood on the sidewalk. Finally, he held up a disgusting magazine and yelled, Here, is this what you wanted to see?' and pulled away."

Even though Sue warned Chris and Tim not to talk to strangers or go near the bookstore, she worried whenever the boys were playing outside. One day. she saw a stranger stop his car in front of her house and hail Chris. He was asking how old Chris was when Sue rushed out and pushed the boy inside. The man drove away quickly. It was hours before Sue stopped shaking.

Other children walking home from school were approached by strangers. Two girls were asked if they'd like to make money posing for pictures. A man was arrested for trying to pick up young children, another for making suggestive remarks to a 14-year-old girl.

Ed remembers that every time his phone rang at the office, he wondered, as he lifted the receiver, if it would be bad news from Sue or the police.

"People in other sections of Kenmore weren't as affected by the bookstore as we were," Sue says. People who didn't live on their block didn't understand what it was like to be awakened in the wee hours by loud voices and filthy language, or to have strange men hanging around outside their door.

The attorney for the bookstore's owners told reporters the residents were imagining things. "It's their own selfserving hallucinations," he was quoted as saying. But Sue has clippings documenting the illegal and "nuisance" activities the bookstore generated.

"You can't imagine things like that happening," she says. Certainly, the Nicksons did not imagine the letter they received warning them to stop fighting the store because they didn't "know what they were dealing with.

But they didn't stop fighting. And the more people they talked to, the more volunteers joined their crusade. Over 700 men and women picketed the store at one time or another, and 20,000 signed petitions against it.

But as the bookstore's third winter in business (Continued on page 159)

approached, picketers became discouraged. Police had raided the store five times on obscenity charges, and none of the cases had come to trial. In fact, the Nicksons learned that a standard tactic in defending these cases is to delay trial as long as possible. It became clear that an effective battle would have to be fought on political as well as legal grounds.

So the Nicksons started studying lobbying, law and the judicial system. They went to seminars to hear about various legal tactics, such as zoning and fire regulations, to control the spread of "adult" bookstores. They learned, too, that obscenity laws are hard to enforce; that the general public appears indifferent. One FBI study that tied pornography to organized crime concluded, "People seem to feel that as long as it doesn't bother them personally, leave it alone."

"I have a theory about that," Ed says. "I remember when drugs were considered only an inner-city problem. When they moved out into suburbs and small towns, people were shocked. I think the same thing is happening with hard-core pornography: People aren't aware that it's creeping out of the cities. But once it gets to your neighborhood, watch out."

In Kenmore, the village board rewrote

its zoning ordinance to keep other "adult" enterprises well away from homes, schools and the retail section of the village. Ed Nickson thinks it is a good thing. "At least, with a zoning ordinance, a community has a chance to decide where a store like this would cause the fewest problems," he says.

Sue and Ed also helped lobby for change in the New York State Penal Code. The new law made a second obscenity offense far more serious, classilying it as a felony, instead of as a misdemeanor. The new law's effectiveness has already become evident. In October 1982, a grand jury handed down indictments against the store and its employees for prostitution and improper sexual activities; non-enforcement of age restrictions; and sale of allegedly obscene publications, among other offenses. Thirteen were felony charges. Trial is still pending.

But the Nicksons knew these cases wouldn't come to trial soon. As their boys grew, it was harder to watch over them, harder to protect them. And they didn't want to raise them in an environment where they would have to learn to memorize license plates and identify suspects. Sue and Ed began to think seriously about moving from Kenmore.

At about that time, two men were arrested for engaging in sexual activity in a van across the street from the Nicksons' house. The following spring, a 79-year-old man and a 21-year-old youth were arrested while engaging in sex in the stairwell of a nearby building.

"It's difficult enough trying to explain sex to your children," Sue says, "but when you have to start explaining what those two men were doing to each other,

it was just too much."

So the Nicksons regretfully sold the pretty Dutch colonial house to a couple with no children. "Kenmore is still a good place to live and I believe the store will close eventually," Sue says. "We just couldn't wait any longer."

But despite the move to another town, the Nicksons' fight against the bookstore continues. Sue has promised to remain active in the citizens' group and will continue to edit their newsletter. Ed still wants to see "adult" businesses controlled and obscenity laws enforced. They both warn people every chance they get that what happened to them could happen anywhere. They want people to know that pornography is not always a "victimless" crime.

Clay:

After reviewing the Adult Entertainment Ordinance, I recommend that the Planning Commission approve this ordinance in its entirety.

I am personally familiar with working in a city where we had no such ordinance and the problems that can arise. Once the problem surfaces, it's almost impossible to correct it. You and the Planning Commission are to be commended for taking this issue on before we are actually confronted with these problems.

As a matter of interest, Chuck Fessler, Undersheriff of Multnomah County, and I wrote the original rough draft of this ordinance several years ago. His county approved and adopted it and it has been very-effective.

Other counties and cities that have not adopted such an ordinance have experienced continued problems with massage parlors and adult book stores being located in residential areas. One case I am familiar with was that of a massage parlor being located in the same block as a church, causing near riots between church goers and massage parlor patrons.

These businesses also attract other types of crime as well. Studies have shown that these types of establishments tend to draw undersirable people.

In summing up, I see this to be a very important tool in preventing these types of problems in Newberg in the future.

ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF NEWBERG TO IMPOSE STANDARDS UPON THE ESTABLISHMENT, EXPANSION OR RELOCATION OF ADULT ENTERTAINMENT BUSINESSES WITHIN THE CITY OF NEWBERG, OREGON AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

THE CITY OF NEWBERG ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That Ordinance No. 1968, the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Newberg, passed and approved July 2, 1979, as amended, is hereby amended to add four new sections to read as follows:

"Adult Entertainment Businesses.

754 Intent, Purpose and Findings.

- 1. The City Council intends by this amendment to ameliorate the blighting and decay-producing social effects upon residential and residentially-supportive commercial neighborhoods caused by adult entertainment businesses, as defined herein, without intending to impose upon such businesses a restriction of the communication they offer or the right of patrons to have access to such communication.
- 2. The City Council does recognize, and hereby finds, that to regulate such businesses upon the basis of approving or not approving the content of the communication purveyed thereby or to restrict the right of citizens to have access to such communication has been held to violate the protection of free speech afforded by both the United States and Oregon Constitutions and such regulation would be suspect under the law.
- The City Council is advised, and does hereby find, that it is not necessary for the City Council to await the actual occurrence of such blighting and decay to residential and residentiallysupportive commercial neighborhoods from the presence of adult entertainment businesses to enact regulations of the type herein prescribed, but that the City Council can rely upon findings and evidence in support thereof by other urban communities whose investigation into the subject has revealed such phenomena and the need for such regulation. Accordingly, this City Council adopts the determination of the Common Council of the City of Detroit, Michigan, when it enacted legislation upheld in Young v. American Mini Theaters, found in 427 u.s. 50, 49 L.Ed.2d 310, 96 S.Ct. 2040 (1976), to the effect that adult entertainment businesses in the form of theaters offering specific adult-oriented material adversely impact the surrounding community unlike other theaters, thereby requiring different treatment under the zoning scheme applicable to the City of Detroit.

- 4. This amendment does comply with standards within the Newberg Comprehensive Plan policies including citizen involvement, the economy and urban design.
- 5. The City Council finds that adult entertainment businesses, as defined herein, commonly include movie theaters, bookstores, clubs, taverns, relaxation parlors, arcades, merchandising shops and the like, all of which in their generic form are permitted uses within specified zoning districts in the City's zoning ordinance. However, the City Council finds that when such businesses offer the display of sexually explicit erotic conduct, intended to appeal to the prurient interest, including nude or semi-nude dancing and real or simulated specific sexual activities such as masturbation, intercourse, sodomy, sadomasochistic abuse or stimulated sexual organs, or the sale of materials and services intended to appeal to such interests, there is an impact upon surrounding residential and residentially-supportive commercial land uses resulting in deteriorated property values, increased antisocial and criminal incidents and exposure of residents to blighting effects on the quality of residential life.
- 6. The City Council finds that the deleterious effects of adult entertainment businesses upon surrounding residential and residentially-supportive commercial neighborhoods will be reduced if such businesses are required to locate at distances from one another and from such other prescribed land uses as will discourage any clustering of adult entertainment businesses or the concentration thereof and minimize corresponding effects found by the City Council to accompany the intensified presence of adult entertainment land uses.

756 Definitions.

- "Adult entertainment business" is a term intended to cover a broad range of activities characterized by live, closed circuit, or reproduced material which has an emphasis on nudity and/or sexual activity. The term adult business also includes the full range of adult theaters and related businesses defined below. Adult businesses generally limit their patrons to persons at least 18 years of age. Adult businesses include the following types of establishments: adult bookstores, adult theaters, adult arcades, adult cabarets, adult paraphernalia shops, and other establishments which feature a combination of activities or merchandise described above which collectively make up a substantial or significant portion of the establishment's activities or merchandise. The term "adult entertainment business" also includes other uses similar to the uses listed above, presenting material for patrons to view (live, closed circuit or reproductions), and/or purchase or rent, a substantial portion of which is characterized by an emphasis on nudity and/or specified sexual activity; and limiting entrance to patrons who are over 18 years of age.
- 2. "Adult bookstore" is an establishment having, as a substantial or significant portion of its merchandise, such items

as books, magazines, other publications, films, video tapes or video discs which are for sale, rent or viewing on premises and which are distinguished by their emphasis on matters depicting specified sexual activities.

- 3. "Adult theater", is an establishment used primarily for presenting material (either live, closed circuit, or pre-recorded) for observation by patrons therein, having as a dominant theme an emphasis on nudity and/or specified sexual activities.
- 4. "Adult Arcade" is an establishment offering viewing booths or rooms for one or more persons in which a substantial portion of the material presented (either live, closed circuit or reproduced) is characterized by an emphasis on nudity and/or specified sexual activities.
- 5. "Adult cabaret" is an establishment having as its primary attraction live exhibitions (either for direct viewing, closed circuit viewing, or viewing through a transparent partition) for patrons, either individually or in groups, where a substantial portion of the material presented is characterized by an emphasis on nudity and/or specified sexual activities.
- 6. "Adult paraphernalia shop" is an establishment offering as a substantial or significant portion of its merchandise objects which simulate human genitalia and/or objects designed to be used to substitute for or be used with human genitalia while engaged in specified sexual activities.
- 7. "Nudity" or "nude" means being devoid of a covering for the male or female genitalia consisting of an opaque material which does not simulate the organ covered and in the case of a female exposing to view one or both breasts without a circular covering, centered on the nipple that is at least three inches in diameter and does not simulate the organ covered.
- 8. "Specified sexual activities" means real or simulated acts of human sexual intercourse, human/animal sexual intercourse, masturbation, sadomasochistic abuse, sodomy or the exhibition of human sexual organs in a stimulated state or the characterization thereof in printed form.

758 Requirements.

- 1. No adult entertainment business shall be located within a distance closer that 650 feet from the following zoning districts and land uses:
 - another adult entertainment business;
 - the boundary of a residential zone or areas designated on the Comprehensive Plan for residential uses;
 - c. a library;
 - d. a hospital;
 - a day care center;

- f. a public or private kindergarten, elementary, junior high, high school, college or university
- g. a nursing home;
- h. a park or public playground;
- i. a mortuary;
- j. a cemetery;
- k. a medical or dental clinic;
- 1. churches:
- m. amusement centers and areas where minors congregate;
- n. theaters;
- bookstores;
- p. community centers.
- 2. The distance referred to herein shall be measured in a straight line, without regard to intervening structures or obstructions, from the closest point of the structure or portion of the structure containing the adult entertainment business to the closest point of the protected district or use.

760 Saving Clause.

If any article, section, subsection, subdivision, phrase, clause, sentence, or word in Sections 754, 756, or 758 in this ordinance shall for any reason be held invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not nullify the remainder of the ordinance, but shall be confined to the article, section, subsection, subdivision, clause, phrase, sentence or word so held invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 2. Emergency Declared. The City Council hereby declares an emergency to exist because of the prevalence of land uses regulated hereunder and their imminent threat to the preservation of residential and residentially-supportive commercial neighborhoods from deterioration and blight found by the City Council to accompany adult entertainment businesses and therefore this ordinance shall become effective upon its passage by the Council and approval by the Mayor.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING AND PROHIBITING CROSS-CONNECTIONS TO THE WATER SUPPLY OF THE CITY OF NEWBERG; DECLARING CROSS-CONNECTIONS TO BE A HAZARD AND PROVIDING FOR THE ABATEMENT THEREOF; PROVIDING DEFINITIONS; PROVIDING FOR CONTROL AND USE OF BACKFLOW DEVICES; PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGECNY.

THE CITY OF NEWBERG ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. PURPOSE AND SCOPE. The purpose of this ordinance is to protect the public health of water consumers by the control of actual and/or potential cross-connections to customers.

Section 2. DEFINITIONS.

- (1) "Backflow" shall mean the undesirable reversal of water or mixtures of water and other liquids, gases or other substances into the distribution pipes of the potable supply of water from any source or sources.
 - (2) "Backflow Prevention Device" (approved) shall mean a device that has been investigated and approved by the regulatory agency having jurisdiction. The approval of backflow prevention devices by the regulatory agency should be on the basis of a favorable laboratory and field evaluation report by an "approved testing laboratory", recommending such approval.
 - (3) "Backflow Prevention Device" (type)—shall mean any approved device used to prevent backflow into a potable water system. The type of device used should be based on the degree of hazard either existing or potential.
 - (4) "Contamination" shall mean the entry into or presence in a public water supply of any substance which may be deleterious to health and/or quality of the water.
 - (5) "Cross-Connection" shall mean any unprotected actual or potential connection or structural arrangement between a public or a consumer's potable water system and any other source or system through which it is possible to introduce into any part of the potable system any used water, industrial fluid, gas, or substance other than the intended potable water with which the water, industrial fluid, gas or substance other than the intended potable water with which the system is supplied. By-pass arrangements, jumper connections, removable sections, swivel or changeover devices and other temporary or permanent devices through which or because of which "backflow" can or may occur are considered to be cross connections.
 - (6) "Director" shall mean the Director of Public Works of the City of Newberg or authorized agent.
 - (7) "Hazard, degree of" shall be derived from the evaluation of a health, system, plumbing or pollutional hazard.

- (8) "Hazard, health" shall mean an actual or potential threat of contamination of a physical or toxic nature to the public potable water system or the consumer's potable water system that would be a danger to health.
- (9) "Hazard, plumbing" shall mean an internal or plumbing type cross-connection in a consumer's potable water system that may be either a pollutional or a contamination type hazard. This includes, but is not limted to, cross-connections to toilets, sinks, lavatories, wash trays, domestic washing machines and law sprinkling systems. Plumbing type cross-connections can be located in many types of structures including homes, apartment houses, hotels, and commercial or industrial establishments.
- (10) "Hazard, pollutional" shall mean an actual or potential threat to the physical properties of the water system or the potability of the public or the consumer's potable water system but which would not constitute a health or system hazard, as defined. The maximum degree or intensity of pollution to which the potable water system could be degraded under this definition would cause a nuisance or be aesthetically objectionable or could cause minor damage to the system or its appurtenances.
- (11) "Hazard, system" shall mean an actual or potential threat of severe danger to the physical properties of the public or consumer's potable water system or of a pollution or contamination which would have a protracted effect on the quality of the potable water in the system.
- (12) "Health Division Officer" shall mean the Oregon State Health Division Officer, or authorized agent.
- (13) "Potable Water Supply" shall mean any system of water supply intended or used for human consumption or other domestic use.
- Section 3. CROSS-CONNECTIONS. The installation or maintenance of a cross-connection which will endanger the water quality of the potable water supply system of the City shall be unlawful and is prohibited. Any such cross-connection now existing or hereafter installed is hereby declared to be a public hazard and the same shall be abated. The control or elimination of cross-connections shall be in accordance with this ordinance and in compliance with the Oregon Administrative Rules, Chapter 333, Public Water Systems. The Director shall have the authority to establish requirements more stringent than State regulations if he deems that the conditions so dictate. The City shall adopt rules and regulations as necessary to carry out the provisions of this ordinance. The Building Official is hereby authorized to enforce the provisions of this ordinance in the inspection of existing, new and remodeled buildings.

Section 4. USE OF BACKFLOW PREVENTION DEVICES.

(1) No water service connection to any premises shall be installed or maintained by the City unless the water supply is protected as required by Wtate law and regulation and this ordinance. Service of water to any premises shall be discontinued by the City if a backflow prevention device required by this ordinance is not installed, tested and maintained, or if it is found that a backflow prevention device has been removed, by-passed, or if an unprotected cross-connection exists on the premises. Service will not bre restored untill such conditions or defects are corrected.

- (2) The customer's system should be open for inspection and tests at all reasonable times to authorized representatives of the City to determine whether cross-connections or other structural or sanitary hazards, including violations of these regulations, exist. When such a condition becomes known, the Director shall deny or immediately discontinue service to the premises by providing for a physical break in the service line until the customer has corrected the condition(s) in conformance with the State and City statutes relating to plumbing and water supplies and the regulations adopted pursuant thereto.
- (3) An approved Backflow Prevention Device shall also be installed on each service line to a customer's water system at or near the property line or immediately inside the building being served; but, in all cases, before the first branch line leading off the service line.
- (4) Backflow prevention devices shall be installed under circumstances including, but not limted to, the following:
 - (a) Premises having an auxiliary water supply.
 - (b) Premises having cross-connections that are not correctable, or intricate planning arrangements which make it impractical to ascertain whether or not cross-connections exist.
 - (c) Premises where entry is restricted so that inspections for cross-connections cannot be made with sufficient frequency or at sufficiently short notice to assure that cross-connections do not exist.
 - (d) Premises having a history of cross-connections being established or re-established.
 - (e) Premises on which an substance is handled under pressure so as to permit entry into the Public Water Supply, or where a cross-connection could reasonably be expected to occur. This shall include the handling of process waters and cooling waters.
 - (f) Premises where materials of a toxic or hazardous nature are handled in such a way that if back siphonage should occur, a serious health hazard might result.
 - (g) The following types of facilities will fall into one of the above categories where a backflow prevention device is required to protect the Public Water Supply. A backflow prevention device shall be installed at these facilities unless the City determines that no hazard exists.
 - Hopitals, mortuaries, clinics
 - Laboratories
 - Metal plating industries
 - Piers and Docks
 - Sewage treatement plants
 - Food or beverage processing plants
 - Chemical plants using a water process
 - Petroleum processing or storage plants
 - Radioactive material processing plants or nuclear reactors
 - Facilities with fire service lines as specified by the Oregon State Health Division
 - Other Facilities which require cross-connection control through the use of backflow prevention devices as required by this ordinance and OAR Chapter 333, Public Water Systems

- (5) The type of protective device required shall depend on the degree of hazard which exists:
 - (a) An air-gap separation or a reduced-pressure-principle backflow prevention device shall be installed where the public water supply may be contaminated with sewage, industrial waste of a toxic nature, or other contaminant which could cause a health or system hazard.
 - (b) In the case of a substance which may be objectionable but not hazardous to health, a double check valve assembly, air-gap separation, or a reduced-pressure-principle backflow prevention device shall be installed.
- (6) Backflow prevention devices required by this ordinance shall be installed under the supervision, and with the approval, of the City.
- (7) Any protective device required by this ordinance shall be approved by the Director.
- (8) These devices shall be furnished and installed by and at the expense of the customer.
- backflow prevention devices are installed to have certified inspections and operational tests made at least once per year. In those instances where the Director deems the hazard to be great enough he may require certified inspections at more frequent intervals. These inspections and tests shall be at the expense of the water user and shall be performed by a certified tester approved by the Director. It shall be the duty of the Director to see that these timely tests are made. The customer-user shall notify the Director in advance when the tests are to be undertaken so that the Director or a representative may witness the tests, if so desired. These devices shall be repaired, overhauled or replaced at the expense of the customer-user whenever said devices are found to be defective. Records of such tests, repairs and overhaul shall be kept and copies sent to the Director.
- (10) No underground sprinkling device will be installed without adequate backflow prevention devices.
- (11) Failure of the customer to cooperate in the installation, maintenance, testing or inspection of backflow prevention devices required by this ordinance or by State law shall be grounds for the termination of water service to the premises.

Section 5. CROSS-CONNECTION INSPECTION.

- (1) No water shall be delivered to any structure hereafter built within the City of Newberg or within areas served by City water until the same shall have ben inspected by the City for possible cross-connections and have been found free of same and approved.
- (2) Any construction for industrial or other purposes which is classified as hazardous facilities where it is reasonable to anticipate intermittent cross-connections, or as determined by the Director, shall be protected by the installation of one or more backflow prevention devices at the point of service from the public water supply or any other location designated by the City.

(3) Inspections shall be made at the discretion of the Director of all buildings, structures, or improvements for the purpose of ascertaining whether cross-connections exist. Such inspections shall be made by the City.

Section 6. LIABILITY. This ordinance shall not be construed to hold the City responsible for any damage to persons or property by reason of the inspection or testing herein, or the failure to inspect or test or by reason of approval of any cross-connections.

Section 7. PENALTIES. Any person who violates, disobeys, omits, neglects, or refuses to comply with, or resists the enforcement of any of the provisions of this ordinance or the rules and regulations as adopted by the City, shall be deemed guiltiy of a civil violation and, upon conviction thereof, shall for each offense be punished by a fine in a sum not exceeding One Thousand Dollars. Each day of continuing violation shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 8. NOW, THEREFORE, it is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health, peace and safety of the City of Newberg, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage by the Council and approval by the Mayor.
