

Elvern Hall - Mayor and Chairman of the City of Newberg Contract Review Board NOTE: For purposes of minutes, it should be indicated that all members of the Contract Review Board who are also members of the City Council were notified or attempted to be notified of this special emergency meeting by Bob Sanders, City Engineer. In addition, Office of Bob Sanders, City Engineer, notified all available members of the news media of this special emergency meeting of the contract review board. The emergency conditions that require this meeting are as follows:

That the City crews have spent a considerable amount of time and money in the removal of sludge from one of the city's primary sewage digesters and would continue to do so at a very high cost to the city, that upon seeking bids for this work, competitive bids have been received with one bid from Northwest Industrial Scrub, Inc. in the amount of \$3,250. being substantially lower than any other bids received by an amount of \$6,700. That in order to take advantage of this rate and the availability of this crew and to save the city a considerable amount in staff and employee time and costs, that contract must be entered into after waiver of competitive bidding before the end of the business day Friday, September 24, 1982. That the availability of this service and the necessity of quick action were completely unanticipated by the City.

RE: Note for the Special Emergency Council Meeting pursuant to ORS 192.640(3)

"No special meeting shall be held without at least 24 hours notice to the members of the body, the news media which have requested notice and the general public. In case of an actual emergency, a meeting may be held upon such notice as is appropriate to the circumstances but the minutes of such a meeting shall describe the emergency justifying less than 24 hours notice".

The purpose of this special meeting is to waive competitive bidding under our ordinance for the purpose of obtaining services in clearing and hauling sludge from a defective sewage digester. Three competitive bids will have been obtained with one service provider being able to guarantee his bid of \$3,200. which is \$6,700. below the next lowest bid for the period of this weekend only. Due to this substantial savings, also due to the fact that an inordinate amount of city personnel and staff time has been used trying to perform this function ourselves and due to the fact that other competitive bids have been received by telephone or in person, a special meeting is justified to have the contractor provide this work at a favorable fee and free up city crews for other more important city business.





#### Consent Calendar: The Consent Calendar consisted of three items:

- 1. Approve minutes of August 1, 1983, August 2, 1983 and August 12, 1983.
- 2. League of Oregon Cities Annual Conference Notification
- 3. Report on Housing Correction by the Building Department

Motion: Gano-Halstead to correct page 6 of the council minutes from August 1, 1983, under new business, on the second motion to insert the word "retirement" between mandatory and age. Carried unanimously. Motion: Gano-Halstead to adopt the consent calendar as amended, and changed. Carried unanimously.

Mayor Hall appointed Judy Elliott to the Library Board to replace Nancy Pratt who has resigned and Jerry Fisher to the Traffic Safety Commission. Motion: Halstead-McIntosh to adopt the appointments by the Mayor. Carried unanimously.

#### Requests and Petitions from the Floor:

Al Blodgett, 102 E. Fifth Street, a local businessman, stated he wished to speak on the highway bypass matter. He stated he believed that before the City government gets further involved, the Council should take an independent survey of the businesses and their feelings on the bypass.

Communication from Wilsonville/Tualatin Limousine and Taxi Company regarding taxi application. The City Manager reported thatabackground check had been made on the company wanting to assume the Newberg Taxi Franchise. Two officers of the company are not of legal age. Checks with agencies were the applicants have been in business found few complaints. The comment was made that the applicant was a man of

his word. He stated that he would recommend transferring of the taxi franchise. Councilman Probst asked what the license suspension was for on one of the officer's traffic record. The applicant responded that it was for failure to appear at a court hearing on a speeding violation. The matter of the rate structure was then discussed by Council and staff. The City Attorney stated that the rates would have to be approved by a resolution of the Council.

<u>Motion</u>: Halstead-McIntosh to approve transfer of the taxi franchise to the Wilsonville/Tualatin Limousine and Taxi Company. Carried unanimously.

#### Public Hearings:

Continuation of public hearing on Brugato/Cain Annexation: The Planning Director reported that Chehalem Park and Recreation was working to get a grant to assist in paying for a portion of the property that is requesting annexation.

Motion: Halstead-Tucker to continue the public hearing to October 3, 1983, the regular October City Council meeting. Carried unanimously.

Continuation of public hearing on Growth Management Ordinance: The City Manager stated that he would recommend that the Council discontinue discussion on this ordinance for the present time, as the Council is quite involved in other matters.

Motion: Halstead-Gano to table the Growth Management Ordinance. Carried unanimously.

#### Reports from City Manager:

Report on Library and presentation of Library plans by the Architect. The City Manager reported that the architects are ready to present their plan and schematics to the Council tonight. A grant application has been submitted along with 20 other cities. The Council will need to consider the options on construction and financing.

Doreen Turpen, Librarian, stated that the Library Construction Board has reviewed all the plans of the architects and cost factors involved and will now recommend that the expansion be done in one stage of construction.

The architects, Don Discoll and David Hess, presented to the Council drawings and schematics of the project to expand the present library. Plans presented show expansion of the Library from the existing 1,900 square feet to a projected need of over 17,000 square feet. The main entrance will be on Howard Street and will be accessible to the handicapped. An entry way will serve to separate the old and the new with two skylights and a display area. Howard Street will need to be changed considerably to permit parking and handicapped access. The two stage construction, as originally considered, would have had to include the heaviest expense in the first stage. They would now recommend that the construction be completed in one phase. The total estimated cost of the project is approximately 1.3 million dollars.

Councilman Gano questioned the architects on several features of the schematics, particularly, the north elevation, which appeared to have colonades. The architects responded it is not colonades, but it was mullions on the northwest corner. Councilman Gano was also concerned that the architects had altered entry from the previous drawings that were presented. They responded that the design had not changed, but appears to have been changed because the more recent drawings include a different view at a different elevation.

Eino Aho, 410 Wynooski Street, President of the Newberg Library Friends, read a letter from the Library Friends which was made a part of these minutes as Exhibit Number 1. The Library Friends recommend that a bond issue be placed before the voters for expansion of the Library.

Doreen Turpen, Librarian, presented a letter from the Library Board recommending acceptance of the plan and proceeding with the bond issue for construction. She also presented a memo from the Library Building Committee recommending approval of the plans and recommending that the City proceed immediately to take advantage of the current favorable construction market and also to maintain the development in the project. Additionally, other local organizations have submitted letters of support on the expansion of the Library.

The City Manager stated that one of the most important factors in the proposed expansion is that the plan will meet the needs of the community until about the year 2000. There will be a meeting room to seat about 125 people, which is much needed in the community. Citizens have come forward with support for the expansion and the planned expansion fits in with redevelopment of the downtown area. Construction costs will be less now than in the future. The negative side of the matter is that it will cost someone some money. Also, not to be forgotten, is the upcoming Sewage Treatment Plant expansion. With grants and donations following suit for the Library expansion, the bond issue amount will be lowered to only that amount needed.

Mayor Hall stated that the Mayor's Task Force Committee's first priority is the Sewage Treatment Plant and that the second priority was a new City Hall Complex. The report by Mel Kroke, consultant on the City Hall complex, included the Library with the City Hall and created a lot of concern as people wanted the library to remain separate. A survey sent out with the utility billings indicated that the majority of people wanted the present Library building maintained, and expanded at its present location.

Councilman Gano asked whether the present building had been inspected and found to be sound. The architects responded that the new construction will not bear on the old portion and that part of the rennovation will include some repairs to the existing structure. Councilman Tucker stated he was pleased with the plans but would like to see more details of the plot plan and what is going to be done to sell the project to the public.

The City Manager responded to Mr. Tucker's concerns on selling to the public by stating that the project will have to be sold to the public in the same manner as the new tax base was sold; in other words, door-to-door campaigning.

Richard Meyer, local resident and member of the Traffic Safety Commission, questioned how a bond issue will affect the grant application. Mrs. Turpen responded that it may be looked at as the grant is not needed or it may show that the library is supported by the people.

Leonard Attrell, member of the Library Board, stated that the Board will be involved in getting the support of the public. The multi-purpose room was given a lot of study by the Board. It will be separate from other uses of the Library and will be available to be used by the community for many other functions.

Motion: Rementeria-Tucker that a formal resolution be prepared to place before the voters a bond issue to fund the Library expansion project as proposed by the architects with the bond issue not to exceed 1.3 million dollars. Carried unanimously.

Next City Council Meeting: The City Manager stated that a special meeting of the Council is needed to consider the water and sewer financial studies that have been done by Pacific Economica. Possible dates for the meeting are September 19, 20, or 21, 1983. September 20, 1983 at 7:30 p.m. was set as the date of the next Council meeting.

Highway Rerouting: The City Manager reported that the State Highway Department will hold a meeting in McMinnville to discuss future projects. A petition has been circulated asking the State to look at the issue of Newberg's downtown traffic problems and consideration of rerouting the highway.

Mayor Hall commented more shoppers will be attracted to downtown area if some of the through traffic were removed and this would offset the traffic loss. Councilmember DeMay pointed out that there were two kinds of businesses. Those that depend on traffic and have a parking lot adjacent and others that need only attract pedestrian shoppers.

The City Manager reported that the Public Works Committee has reviewed and recommended eliminating parking in front of the Hospital on Villa Road. This matter has also been reviewed by the Traffic Safety Committee. One concern of the Traffic Safety Committee was the lack of sidewalks on the east side of the street. The sidewalks will be installed by Dr. Abbott. The parking on Villa seems to be done by Hospital employees that choose to park on Villa Road rather than to park in an unpaved lot.

<u>Motion</u>: Gano-Rementeria that an ordinance be prepared for the October Council meeting prohibiting parking in front of the Hospital from Sherman Street to the ambulance entrance. Motion carried; 1 nay, DeMay.

 $\underline{\text{Motion}}$ : Tucker-Poet that a letter be written to the Hospital administration requesting that they ask their employees to use the parking lot which is provided. Carried unanimously.

The City Manager reported that the City Picnic is to be September 10, 1983 at Crabtree Park and all Councilmembers are invited.

#### Old Business:

The Newberg/Dundee Disposal Alternatives Committee presented a resolution that recommends that a transfer station be established to accommodate local, private and commercial waste in the Newberg area and providing standards relating to design, size, location and operation of the transfer station. Councilman Gano, who was a member of the Committee, stated that the Committee considered many alternatives and possible standards for a transfer station. Motion: Gano-Tucker to accept the resolution of the Newberg/Dundee Disposal Alternative Committee which outlines criteria for siting a disposal transfer station. Carried unanimously.

#### New Business:

The Council reviewed several items on the list of Accounts Payable. The following motion was made. Motion: Gano-DeMay to approve the August Accounts Payable. Carried unanimously.

Report on finances of Newberg Redevelopment Agency. The City Manager reported that the estimate used in the Budget for Redevelopment Agency was \$72,000 in tax increment.

The most recent estimate from the County Tax Accessor now places that figure at \$112,000.

Sidewalk Ordinance: The City Manager stated that if the sidewalk ordinance is strictly enforced, then a lessor of a property would have to install sidewalks. This would not seem to be the intent when the lessor is short term. The City has received a request from a lessor which has signed a two year lease on a property on Portland Road which would come under the requirement to install sidewalks. The matter has been reviewed by the Public Works Committee and they recommend the requirement for installation of sidewalks be waived for the lessor of the property, but that the ordinance would still apply to the owner of the property. The Public Works Director stated that this should be clearly understood that this is an exception on a short term lease only.

Motion: DeMay-Gano to adopt the recommendation of the Public Works Committee to waive the requirement for installation of the sidewalk for Unicorn Gardens on Highway 99. Carried unanimously.

Liquor License Application: Unicorn Gardens. The Police Department has reviewed the application and has no objections to approval. Motion: Tucker-Gano to recommend the application to the Oregon Liquor Control Commission. Carried unanimously.

#### Resolutions:

Resolution approving agreement for regional library services. Motion: Halstead-Gano to adopt Resolution No. 83-998 with the date of approval corrected to September 6, 1983. Carried unanimously.

Resolution authorizing secretarial classification plan. Motion: Halstead-McIntosh to adopt Resolution No. 83-999.

Motion: Gano-DeMay to amend the classifications as presented to place word processing/computer in the knowledge and skills section. Carried unanimously.

Vote on the motion to adopt the Resolution as amended. Carried unanimously.

#### Ordinances:

Motion: Gano-McIntosh to read Ordinance No. 2129 by title only, an ordinance prohibiting parking in certain areas of Second Street. Carried unanimously. The ordinance was then read by title only. Roll Call: Aye - 8, DeMay, Gano, Halstead, McIntosh, Poet, Probst, Rementeria, Tucker; Nay - 0. The Mayor then declared the ordinance passed.

Mr. Warren commented on the ordinance calling for an election for the library expansion on November 8, 1983. The \$1,300,000 project has been reduced to construction costs of \$967,428. The balance is to be made up from donations and grants. Mr. Warren stated that grant money is not likely to be available unless we have other money. He read the ballot title.

Councilman Halstead asked if the ordinance must be read in its entirety. Richard Faus, City Attorney, stated that it did not have to be read in entirety, unless a council member requested it.

Jeanette Schnitzius, Rt. 5, Box 529, representing the Newberg Education Association, spoke in favor of the ordinance. She stated the Newberg Education Association will be working to pass the measure.

Tim Olmstead, 420 S. Howard, spoke in favor of the ordinance in the lowered amount.

Stewart Harris, 3305 Vittoria Way, member of the Library Board, spoke in favor of the ordinance.

Motion: Halstead-Tucker to read by title only. Carried unanimously. Ordinance No. 2130 was then read by title only. Roll call: Aye - 5, Halstead, McIntosh, Poet, Probst, Tucker; Nay - 0; Absent - 3, DeMay, Gano, Rementeria. The Mayor declared the ordinance passed.

Mr. Warren reported on the study being done by Pacific Economica for the financial plans for the water and sewer plants. He encouraged the Council members to ask questions after Mr. Burke's presentation.

Council members Cano and Rementeria are now present.

Jim Burke presented a seven-page report on the Water Utilities Financial Management Plan to Council members, staff and press. He explained that all costs presented in the report are costs that will be reflected in rates. The water or sewer system should be run as an independent enterprise. Long-term financing options will be disussed at a later date.

The report was discussed in much detail. Pacific Economica has been able to project in total dollars the cost of operating the water system under a variety of operating options. Mr. Burke stressed that present rates do not cover the costs of operations and maintenance by about \$125,000 per year. He stated that he needed the Council's understanding of what the policy issues are.

The next meeting will be on the sewer master plan. The same process will be done on the sewer plan, and then a final report will be issued.

Mr. Burke responded to questions from the Council. Robert Sanders, Public Works Director, responded to some questions regarding grant status.

Mr. Warren stated that the Mayor/Council call-in for citizens to ask questions about any issue is set for Thursday, September 29th from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.

As you know, this City had suggested over two years ago to the Council of Governments an Insurance Program that would lead toward a group of cities, school districts and/or special districts self-insuring once the insurance market becomes a hard market. The Council of Governments has organized the cities of Newberg, Silverton, Mt. Angel, Keizer along with the Polk County and Yamhill and Marion School Districts for the purposes of insuring liability insurance.

This organization is really made up of seven different entities and has not formed a joint powers agreement (JPA). The market is a soft market and we have not self-insured as it is not economically advisable at this time. We have, however, retained the services of a Risk Manager and a claims adjuster to get better control of our liability exposure and the amount of money that is paid out on claims. The organization is moving well and I believe it to be a definite first step to self-insurance and cost savings for the future.

At a future City Council meeting the Risk Manager, Chuck Huggins, will be addressing the City Council to explain a bit more about the program and what the City can do to limit exposure.

At this time, the organization will need to create a JPA and form some goals. I will be suggesting the following:

- 1. A joint powers agreement that will tie the entities together for the purposes of receiving better quotes and creating an organization that will unite the various public entities and eliminate the atmosphere of joining or ceasing to be a member solely because of short-sightedness on rates.
- 2. Lobbying effort by either the Risk Manager or Council of Governments for the purposes of eliminating any legal constraints on self-insurance for workers comp and property.
- 3. A move toward the broadening of insurance from liability to workers compensation and property insurance.
- 4. Growth of the organization to the point of economic feasibility for self-insurance but not beyond these boundaries allowing the organization to keep the personal flavor.
- 5. A uniformity in procedures such as claims, action by City Council, safety classes, etc.
- 6. Hire a full time Risk Manager.

7. Selectivity in adding new members.

As I mentioned earlier I believe this will be a dramatic cost savings to the City in future years.

#### YAMHILL COUNTY VETERANS MUSEUM BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING AUGUST 9, 1983

CALL TO ORDER:

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Bob Britton presented background information on previous meetings held and progress to date in forming a Yamhill County Veterans Museum. Bob explained that Bud Schmidt (YCAP) has provided assistance in forming the museum organization and that Les AuCoins office was willing to help where they can. 

SUBJECT: Tree Cutting Ordinance

The City of Newberg has never had any formal regulation relating to the cutting of trees within the City limits. Through the City's design review ordinance it is almost impossible to regulate any cutting of trees.

The purpose of this ordinance is not to impose another governmental regulation upon the people of Newberg, but rather to protect the people of Newberg from unnecessary tree cutting. A case in point came about when a neighborhood in Newberg was very upset about trees being cut in an area that was not being planned for development and were located in a water way. The cutting of the trees would have an effect on erosion and definitely have an effect on the aesthetics of the neighborhood. The neighborhood generally agreed that something should be done not only to protect them but future cases of a similar nature.

The establishment of a tree cutting ordinance would help to insure property values of adjoining properties as well as in maintaining the aesthetic qualities and livability of the community. Additionally, the tree cutting ordinance will help to limit soil erosion, drainage and landscaping problems as well as preserving some of the City's open space areas and wildlife habitats for birds and animals.

In preparing this ordinance several cities were contacted which had regulations relating to tree cutting. This particular ordinance is fashioned from the City of Lake Oswego's regulations. In discussing this with the staff of the City of Lake Oswego it was noted that the ordinance is effective in reducing the problems which might otherwise be caused by uncontrolled tree cutting.

I bring this to the City Council's attention for their consideration at tonight's meeting.

#### ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING THE NEWBERG TREE CUTTING REGULATION WHICH ESTABLISHES A PERMIT PROCESS FOR THE CUTTING OF MATURE TREES WITHIN THE NEWBERG CITY LİMITS.

WHEREAS, A public hearing has been held by the Newberg City Council on October 3, 1983 for the purpose of reviewing testimony relating to the establishment of the Newberg Tree Cutting Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, The ordinance will provide for the preservation of mature trees within the City limits; and

WHEREAS, A need has been identified to regulate the cutting of trees within the City limits as is identified by the purpose section of this ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF NEWBERG ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Newberg Tree Cutting Ordinance is hereby adopted and made a part of this ordinance by a reference hereto.

#### ORDINANCE NO.

Title. This ordinance shall be known as the Newberg Tree Cutting Ordinance and may be so cited and pleaded.

Purpose. The City of Newberg is now benefitted by limited numbers of trees. The maintenance of trees and wooded areas in the City of Newberg tends to preserve the ecology of the City through the filtering effect of the trees on air pollution and through the providing of noise barriers as well as adding to the scenic beauty and livability of the City. The uncontrolled cutting or destruction of trees and wooded areas would increase problems of public concern relating to:

- A. The erosion of top soil.
- B. Flood hazards and risk of landslides.
- C. The destruction of windbreaks and shaded areas.
- D. The destruction of natural wildlife habitats.
- E. The reduction of property values and the destruction of aesthetic qualities through the encouragement of substandard development.

#### 300 Definitions.

Cutting. As used in this ordinance, cutting means falling or removal of a tree, or any procedure the natural result of which is to cause the death or substantial destruction of a tree. Cutting does not include normal trimming, pruning or topping of trees.

Planning Director. References in this ordinance to the Planning Director shall be deemed to mean the administrative head of the Planning Department or such other City employee who may from time to time be designated by the City Manager to perform the functions delegated to the Planning Director in this ordinance.

Tree. As used in this ordinance, a tree means any living, standing woody plant having a trunk 5 inches or more in diameter, maximum cross section, at a point 24 inches above mean ground level at the base of the trunk.

Tree Cutting on Private or Public Lands Without Permit Prohibited. No person shall cut a tree upon private or public property without first obtaining from the City a permit to do so. The provisions of this ordinance are intended to apply to the United States and the State of Oregon, and to their agencies and subdivisions including the City of Newberg, and to the employees and agents thereof, to the fullest extent permitted by law. The provisions of this ordinance do not apply to the cutting of any tree lawfully required to be cut under the provisions of any other law or ordinance.

Application for Permits. Any person desiring to cut one or more trees shall file application with the Planning

Director for a permit to do so. Applications shall be made upon forms to be prescribed and furnished by the City. The application shall contain the number, size species and location of the trees to be cut, the time and method of cutting or removal, a statement of the reason for cutting or removal, and information concerning any proposed landscaping or planting or any new trees to replace the trees to be cut. In addition, the applicant shall furnish such other information s may reasonable be required by the City.

Fees. The application shall be accompanied by a filing fee as herein prescribed. The filing fee is not refundable, whether or not a permit is thereafter granted. In determining the fee to be paid, all permits granted within a period of one year for cutting of trees upon contiguous property owned by the applicant shall be considered as having filed in a single application.

- 1. For cutting three or fewer trees; no fee.
- 2. For the cutting or removal of four or more trees from a parcel of land (including all contiguous land in common ownership) not exceeding 20,000 square feet in area; a fee of \$12.00.
- 3. All other applications; a fee of \$50.00
- 4. No fee shall be required with an application filed by a governmental agency.


600 Emergencies. In the event of emergency conditions requiring the immediate cutting or removal of trees in order to avoid danger or hazard to persons or property, an emergency permit will be issued without payment of fee and without formal application, by the PUblic Works Director or in his/her absence, by any member of the Building Department. If the Planning Director is unavailable and no member of the Building Department is reasonably available in the event of such emergency, it shall be lawful to proceed with the cutting of a tree or trees without a permit to the extent necessary to avoid the immediate danger or hazard. In the event of the cutting of any tree under the provisions of this section without the prior filing of an application with the Planning Director, the person doing so shall within 48 hours thereafter report the action taken to the Planning Director, without payment of fee, and shall forthwith provide such information and evidence as may be reasonably required by the Planning Director to explain and justify the action taken.

Criteria for Issuance of Permits. A permit may be issued as requested in the application; may be issued in part and denied in part, or may be issued subject to compliance by the applicant with reasonable conditions to be imposed in order to promote the purposes of the ordinance. A permit shall state the period of time for which it is valid. A permit issued for the reason that an improvement is to be constructed upon the premises shall contain a provision that the permit is not valid until a building permit has been issued for the construction of the improvement. The burden is on the applicant to show that granting of a permit would be consistent with the stated purpose of this ordinance. The following criteria shall be considered:

- The condition of the trees with respect to disease, danger of falling, proximity to existing or proposed structures, and interference with utility services or traffic safety.
- 2. The necessity to remove trees in order to construct proposed improvements, or to otherwise utilize the applicant's property in a reasonable manner.
- 3. The topography of the land and the effect of tree removal on erosion, soil retention, stability of earth, flow of surface waters, protection of nearby trees, windbreaks, and a desirable balance between shade and open space.
- 4. The number of trees existing in the neighborhood; the character and property uses in the neighborhood, and the effect of tree removal upon neighborhood characteristics, beauty and property values.
- 5. The adequacy of the applicant's proposals, if any, to plant trees or vegetation as a substitute for the trees to be cut.

Penalties. The cutting of a tree in violation of this ordinance or the breach of any term, or condition of a permit granted under this ordinance, or the violation of any other provision of this ordinance shall be unlawful and shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$500.00. The unlawful cutting of each individual tree shall be a separate offense hereunder.

#### RESOLUTION NO.

THE CITY COUNCIL SITTING AS CONTRACT REVIEW BOARD AND AS COUNCIL WAIVES COMPETITIVE BIDDING FOR RETENTION OF ENGINEERING SERVICES FOR DEVELOPING PLANS, SITE AND FACILITIES FOR A NEW WASTE WATER TREATMENT FACILITY FOR THE CITY OF NEWBERG AND AUTHORIZES ENTERING INTO PROFESSIONAL SERVICES CONTRACT.

WHEREAS, the City of Newberg, City Staff and City Council desire to obtain the professional services of an engineering firm to, with regard to a new wastewater treatment facility, develop flow and strength data for wastewater discharge, select treatment process and design capacity for a treatment plant, select and prioritize sites for such plant, provide a financial estimate for development of a wastewater treatment facility, prepare a facility siting plan, obtain approval from DEQ, obtain County land use approval, finalize land purchase, treatment process, design capacity, prepare engineering estimates for construction, review design and budget, prepare contract documents, advertise for bids and award contract from construction management and inspection, prepare 0 & M Manual and familiarize staff with 0 & M procedures, prepare as-built drawings and submit set of film copies to City and prepare all the final construction reports for DEQ as required, and additional functions as negotiated; and

WHEREAS, such engineering services are necessary to provide information and details needed for the potential receipt of Federal EPA Grant Funds for the construction of a waste water treatment plant; and

WHEREAS, City Staff have prepared request for proposals and solicited proposals from a large number of professional engineering firms, at least five in number, to provide engineering services regarding the construction of a new wastewater treatment facility or the expansion thereof for the City of Newberg; and

WHEREAS, these proposals have been carefully evaluated in an effort to choose the engineering firm which best meets the needs and desires of the City in this wastewater treatment facility project; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Newberg acting as Contract Review Board, considers the provision of professional engineering services involved in this contract to be a contract for personal services and thus, the competitive bidding requirements do not apply; and

WHEREAS, however, as a precautionary measure and because of the need to retain engineering services in a timely fashion for the reasons outlined above, in particular the need to prepare in the fastest possible fashion the specifications for applying for a 75% EPA Grant well in advance of the deadline in August of 1984, which may save the City of Newberg as much as \$4,000,000. and for all the other reasons outlined above, the Contract Review Board declares that the requirements of Ordinance No. 1793, Section 5 (E & F), are satisfied and it is in the best interests of the public, favoritism not encouraged, competition will remain undiminished and the conditions of an emergency exist to justify the waiving of competitive bidding for professional engineering services for the development of a new wastewater treatment facility for the City of Newberg or for the expansion of the existing facility in a phased fashion and justifying the prompt execution of this contract.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Newberg, Oregon, sitting as Contract Review Board and as Council, as follows, to-wit:

- l. Pursuant to Ordinance No. 1793, Section 2 and 5(E & F), the Council of the City of Newberg, sitting as Contract Review Board finds that this is a contract for personal services and not subject to competitive bidding, but as a precautionary measure and because of the factors outlined above, most particularly, the need to retain services promptly to meet EPA Grant deadlines and due to the fact that numerous competitive quotes and proposals have been received for these services, the City Council sitting as Contract Review Board and as Council declares that the public interests would best be served, favoritism not encouraged and competition undiminished and that emergency conditions require the prompt execution of this contract and the waiver of competitive bidding.
- 2. The City Council sitting as Contract Review Board and as Council authorizes the City Manager to contract with the firm which in the judgement of the City staff and the City Council will provide services best suited to the needs of the City, that firm being

I have contacted John Cach who is the Chairman of the Newberg Planning Commission. He has indicated that he would be willing to represent the Planning Commission and would be able to attend the meetings associated with this endeavor. John's participation would provide a good representation from the Newberg community. One member from the Newberg City Council should also be choosen.

I have contacted Lynn Steiger, who is the Planning Director for Yamhill County, regarding the appointment of an individual from the Newberg/Dundee Planning Advisory Committee. In that this is a County organized committee, the Board of Commissioners will make the appointment from this Committee; however, I have suggested that either Mike Wert or Ken Hunkins be appointed from this Committee. Mr. Steiger concurred with my suggestions and indicated that the Committee will meet on Wednesday, September 28 and will appoint a representative at that time.

The action needed by the Newberg City Council is to appoint one member from the Council and one member from the Planning Commission to serve on this Committee.

SUBJECT: Old Fashioned Festival

With the Old Fashioned Festival now behind us for another year, the police department has reviewed the entire operation from our point of view, and identified the areas of concern or problems we feel will need future attention to make the Festival even better and safer next year.

Although we did experience many problems during the entire Festival, most were minor and quickly remedied. The major problems resulted from: (1) The length of time of the First Street closure, (2) Bicycle races held on First Street, and (3) Dance on First Street.

I have asked our staff people responsible for the planning and implementation of our operation, to submit reports identifying their problems and concerns and am submitting these for your perusal. These reports are fairly well detailed and I think generally express my views also. My personal recommendations for future activities are as follows:

- (1) Handle traffic patterns similarly, however, reduce the hours of First Street closure to around 6 or 7:00 pm.
- (2) Move bicycle races off First Street.
- (3) Hold dance on side street or parking lot. This would remedy the major problems, yet not interfere with the festive atmosphere.

Our principle goal is to extend every courtesy and cooperative effort possible in making the Old Fashioned Festival a very enjoyable and memorable occasion, and still insure the safety and best interests of our citizens.

Due to recent Federal Regulations and a decision to more directly involve employers in the administration of the ICMA deferred compensation plan, amendments have been proposed and it is recommended that the City Council pass the attached resolution.

A RESOLUTION OF THE COUNCIL APPROVING VARIOUS CHANGES IN THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE ICMA DEFERRED COMPENSATION PLAN AS REQUIRED BY IRS 457.

WHEREAS, the City of Newberg maintains a deferred compensation plan for its employees which is administered by the ICMA Retirement Corporation (the "Administrator"); and

WHEREAS, the Administrator has recommended changes in the plan document to comply with recent federal legislation and Internal Revenue Service Regulations governing said plans; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has issued a private letter ruling approving said plan document as complying with Section 457 of the Internal Revenue Code; and

WHEREAS, other public employees have joined together to establish the ICMA Retirement Trust for the purpose of representing the interests of the participating employers with respect to the collective investment of funds held under their deferred compensation plans; and

WHEREAS, said Trust is a salutary development which further advances the quality of administration for plans administered by the ICMA Retirement Corporation:

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the City of Newberg hereby adopts the deferred compensation plan, attached hereto as Appendix A, as an amendment and restatement of its present deferred compensation plan administered by the ICMA Retirement Corporation, which shall continue to act as Administrator of said plan; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Newberg hereby executes the ICMA Retirement Trust, attached hereto as Appendix B; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Newberg hereby adopts the trust agreement with the ICMA Retirement Corporation, as appears at Appendix C hereto, as an amendment and restatement of its existing trust agreement with the ICMA Retirement Corporation, and directs the ICMA Retirement Corporation, as Trustee, to invest all funds held under the deferred compensation plan through the ICMA Retirement Trust as soon as is practicable; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Manager of the City of Newberg shall be the coordinator for this program and shall receive necessary reports, notices, etc. from the ICMA Retirement Corporation as Administrator, and shall cast, on behalf of the City of Newberg, any required votes under the program. Administrative dutires to carry out the plan may be assigned to the appropriate departments.

# Summary of Changes for Plans Administered by The ICMA Retirement Corporation

Recent changes in federal regulations concerning public deferred compensation plans make it necessary for nearly all plans to be amended. Accordingly, we are offering a revision of the deferred compensation plan we administer for your employees on your behalf. Also, we have taken this opportunity to make other desirable changes in our administrative arrangements which we believe will further enhance the quality of our program by increasing your ability to directly influence our activities and policies.

These changes are reflected in the three documents which are enclosed. We ask that you obtain a resolution of your governing body adopting these documents. A suggested resolution is enclosed for your convenience. The documents are as follows:

 A new deferred compensation plan document which amends and restates the existing plan. This plan has been prepared in light of new Internal Revenue Service regulations, was submitted to the IRS, and has received its approval. The basic philosophy of plan design has been to provide a plan as liberal as the law and regulations will allow.

The existing plan provides for amendment upon our proposal with such amendment to become effective within 60 days unless you object in writing. Accordingly, you should regard this as formal notice of plan amendment. While governing body action is not required for plan amendments, we recommend that you formally adopt the new plan in conjunction with the other documents.

2. A Declaration of Trust for the ICMA Retirement Trust. This is a new feature of our organizational structure. We currently have a direct Retirement Trust relationship with you which will continue. The new trust establishes a Board of Trustees to be selected by participating employees, thus giving the employers ultimate control over the management of the funds. Included in the trustees' responsibilities are oversight of our performance, appointment of auditors, and monitoring of investment goals and objectives.

The new trust arrangement has been submitted to the Securities and Exchange Commission for its review. As you may know, unlike the IRS, the SEC does not approve transactions but indicates whether or not it will take action against you if a transaction is carried out. The SEC has given us a "no-action" letter with respect to the Retirement Trust's compliance with the registration provisions of the federal securities laws.

The Retirement Trust has been created by a Founders Committee of persons representative of the participants in the RC program. They have determined that the first elections shall be held in the early fall of 1983, preferably September. We will need copies of your governing body's resolution if you are to vote in the first election or for any of your employees to be nominated as trustees.

It is expected that all investments made on your behalf will be held under the ICMA Retirement Trust after it becomes effective. However, it is also expected that, unless an employer adopts the Declaration of Trust, its investments will not be held thereunder following a transitional period. Therefore, while failure to adopt the Declaration of Trust will not directly affect your plan or have any immediate effect on the investment of your funds, it is required for your full and continuing participation in the Retirement Trust.

3. An amended version of your existing trust agreement. The amendments are intended to clarify this agreement and conform it to the new plan document.

These changes improve and enhance the program. The addition of the ICMA Retirement Trust is done in the spirit of our long-standing objective of serving the best interests of our participants. AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 902 OF THE CITY OF NEWBERG, PASSED AND APPROVED MARCH 25, 1940, AS AMENDED, BY PROHIBITING PARKING IN A CERTAIN AREA OF VILLA ROAD.

WHEREAS, the Traffic Safety Committee and Public Safety Committee have both met and do recommend the parking at certain locations on Villa Road be prohibited due to safety and other considerations involving traffic around Newberg Community Hospital.

THE CITY OF NEWBERG ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

1. That Ordinance No. 902 of the City of Newberg, Oregon, passed and approved March 25, 1940, be and the same hereby is amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 61 which reads as follows:

"Section 61. It shall be unlawful for any driver or other person in charge of a motor vehicle, bicycle or any other vehicle of any description to park the same on the following described portions of Villa Road within the corporate limits of the City of Newberg, Yamhill County, Oregon:

On the west side of Villa Road from a point beginning at the northwest corner of the intersection of Villa Road and Sherman Street and extending in a northerly direction from this point along the west curb line of Villa Road for 246 feet; and

On the east side of Villa Road from a point beginning 57 feet due north along the curb line of Villa Road from the northeast corner of the intersection of Villa Road and Sherman Street and extending in a northerly direction from that point along the east curb line of Villa Road for 147 feet."

2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the Ordinance are hereby repealed.
